# Rusk Pledge Won't Halt Cuban Debate

WASHINGTON (AP) — Secretary of State Dean Rusk has pledged that Fidel Castro will be blocked from trying to export arms to Cuba. His assurance seems unlikely to quiet the crackling debate over the administration's handling of the Cuban problem.

Rusk said in Houston Tuesday night that if Cuba tries to use arms outside its territory it "will be met with the armed forces of the hemisphere" and repeated that "a Soviet military presence on that island cannot be accepted."

Use of arms by Cuba outside the island, he said, would be "immediate," interrupted and stopped.

Cuba must not become a source of infection for the hemisphere," he told a Texas Daily Newspaper Association meeting.

**DETERMINATION**

Senate Democratic leader Mike Mansfield of Montana said Rusk's statements "demonstrate the continued determination of the administration to cope with this situation in Cuba."

Sen. John Sparkman, D-Ala., a senior member of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, called Rusk's speech "a very clear statement of the administration's policy and one I'm confident will be carried out to a successful conclusion."

There was some Republican skepticism.

Sen. George D. Aiken, R-Vt., a Foreign Relations committee member said, "I wish Secretary Rusk could make that determination retroactive, because the Russians apparently are occupying Cuba in force and I understand Soviet-made weapons are showing up in considerable quantities in other Latin-American countries."

The Senate Preparedness subcommittee bears a report today on Soviet military strength in Cuba and how much of a threat it is to the hemisphere.

**TO TESTIFY**

Maj. Gen. Robert A. Brietweiser, chief of Air Force intelligence, has been called to testify at a closed session.

His command provides the reconnaissance photographs which Mansfield said kept a daily check on the island's military status.

The administration Tuesday added 14 ships to the previous list of 12 vessels banned from carrying U.S.-financed cargoes because they engaged in Cuban trade.

There was a feeling on the part of some members of Congress that this wasn't going far enough.

Rep. Paul G. Rogers, D-Fla., told the House, for example, that the United States should close its seaports to all nations which allow their flags to be flown in commerce with Cuba. He said nine British merchant ships put into Cuba in the last six weeks.

In his address, Rusk did not detail any plan to reduce the heavily armed and manned Soviet outpost.

**HAS PROMISE**

President Kennedy, pressing for Soviet troop withdrawals, has a promise from Premier Khrushchev that "several thousand" will be pulled out. So far there has been no sign of any troops leaving.

Meanwhile, the cannonading over Kennedy's foreign policy thundered on.

In a fresh attack, Sen. Bourke B. Hickenlooper, R-Iowa, accused the administration of making it impossible for Congressional Republicans to cooperate on a bipartisan foreign policy.

Hickenlooper, chairman of the Senate GOP Policy Committee and member of the Foreign Relations Committee, told a news conference Republicans couldn't be expected to go along blindly when they were left out of the decision-making process.

"As far as I know there is no bipartisan foreign policy," he said. "Republicans have never been consulted in advance of any decision made by this administration."

# Reichstag Fire Set Off Nazi Crime Wave

**EDITOR'S NOTE** — Thirty years ago today, the Reichstag building in Berlin was set on fire, setting off a chain of Nazi crimes against the world. On hand was a veteran AP correspondent who is now chief editor of The Associated Press in Germany. This is his story.

**BERLIN (AP)**—It was a fantastic sight. The huge glass dome of the Reichstag building was aglow.

There was a sudden explosion and the glass cupola burst into fragments. Flames shot into the wintry sky. Sixty fire engines raced to the blaze. Hundreds of police and brown-shirted Nazi storm troopers encircled the area.

The time: about 10 p.m.—Feb. 27, 1933.

History books mark this as the incident the Nazis used to unleash their reign of terror that led finally to millions of dead in World War II.

Since that date, no German Parliament has sat in the Reichstag building. The Nazis used another building.

**COLD WAR**

War wrought further damage. The old Reichstag has become a symbol of the cold war which divides Germany, prevents the formation of an all-German Parliament and keeps Berlin from regaining its status as capital of Germany.

Today, the Reichstag stands within yards of the Berlin wall built by the Communists who now occupy half the old capital and half Germany.

That night the storm troopers refused to let me through although I showed my press pass. "I'm sure they set fire to it themselves," said a voice behind me as tens of thousands gathered to watch the blaze.

Black limousines drove up. I saw Adolf Hitler, propaganda chief Joseph Goebbels and Hermann Goering.

**TELL THE WORLD**

I struggled through the crowds back to the office to tell the world. As we worked all night, reports kept coming in that all leading Communists had been arrested.

"As I walked home at dawn, police were swarming over the offices of the Socialist newspaper, Vorwaerts. I knew then the Nazis meant to weed out all opposition—no matter by what means.

Four weeks earlier Hitler had been appointed chancellor by the aging Reich president, Field Marshal Paul von Hindenburg and Hindenburg.

The Nazis were not yet firmly established. In the elections in November 1932, they had lost two million votes. Their seats in the Reichstag had been cut from 230 to 196, the Communists were the biggest gainers.

# Military Pay Hike Is Urged

WASHINGTON (AP) — Secretary of Defense Robert McNamara has urged Congress to approve a big boost in military pay. He prom-

ised annual salary reviews from now on to keep pay scales on an even keel.

McNamara said he hopes future adjustments in military pay "can be kept abreast of changes in the national economy."

He said the pay bill proposed by the administration would cost \$1.2 billion a year, and additional retirement allowances would mean \$230 million in additional spending.

While the Nazis blamed Communists for the fire, most historians believe the Nazis started it. I am convinced the fire was laid by the Nazis.

All the principals are dead. Dr. Ernst Oberfrohren, alleged to have first exposed the Nazis' role in the fire, was found dead at his desk two months later.

George Bell, a Munich intelligence agent supposed to have known of lies between Van der Lubbe and the Nazis, was found dead in 1933 near the Austrian town of Kufstein.

**ONE HANGED**

Count Wolf Helldorf, the leading storm trooper in Berlin, was hanged as an anti-Hitler conspirator in 1944.

Goering, who committed suicide in the Nuernberg war crimes prison in 1946, insisted in his death cell that he had nothing to do with the fire.

Torgler, the former Communist leader who survived Nazi prisons, died last month. He said he was convinced Van der Lubbe was the sole arsonist.

One week after the fire, the Nazis polled 82 per cent of the popular vote in a general election. The Nazis were on their way to their "1,000-year Reich" which collapsed in the ruins of war in a little more than a decade.

For several years, a few workmen have slowly been restoring the Reichstag's bomb-pocked and shell-scarred exterior. The West German Parliament in Bonn ordered the work.

**NEVER AGAIN**

They work without much enthusiasm. As they climb the walls of the old building, they peer down on the concrete and barbed wire of the wall. They see police patrolling night and day to keep West and East Berliners apart.

"What's the use?" asked one old construction worker. "Germany will never be reunited. The Reichstag will never meet again."

# Cool Front Blowing In

Gusty winds whipped across Northwest and North Central Texas to herald the approach of another cool front Wednesday.

Skies were clear throughout the state in early morning.

The low northern was due in the Texas Panhandle during the afternoon while temperatures in the 80s were in prospect downstate.

Unusually strong pre-dawn winds hit 30 miles per hour in gusts at Amarillo, Wichita Falls, Abilene, Fort Worth and Waco.

The wind was expected to churn dust into the air over Southwest Texas later in the day.

Forecasters called for occasional thundershowers by evening in parts of Northeast and North Central Texas. Lower temperatures were predicted for all sections by Thursday.

Early morning marks ranged from 35 degrees at Texarkana up to 54 at Junction and Palacios.

## GOP Challenges Demos To Clip Powell's Wings

WASHINGTON (AP) — House Republicans have challenged the Democratic leadership to clip the wings of Rep. Adam C. Powell, Democrat from New York.

They want to see \$200,000 cut from the budget of his House Committee on Education and Labor, and a code of ethics established in Congress to curb his night clubbing in foreign capitals.

Seven GOP members joined in the latest attack on Powell, taking the House floor Tuesday to criticize his travels, the spending of his committee, and the granting of \$250,000 in federal funds for a juvenile delinquency project in his Harlem congressional district.

The attack on Powell, a rarity in the House, which prides itself on its rules of courteous debate, was launched by Rep. John H. Ashbrook, R-Ohio, a member of Powell's committee. Powell was not present and none of the 30 or 40 Democrats present spoke up.

WASHINGTON (AP) — The young intelligence specialist who conducted the television briefing on the Cuban missile situation is about to get a \$1,500 a year pay increase.

It was learned today that Defense Department officials have approved promotion for John T. Hughes, 34, special assistant to the chief of the Defense Intelligence Agency.

Only some paperwork at the Civil Service Commission remains to be completed before Hughes goes up in pay from \$14,500 to \$16,000 a year.

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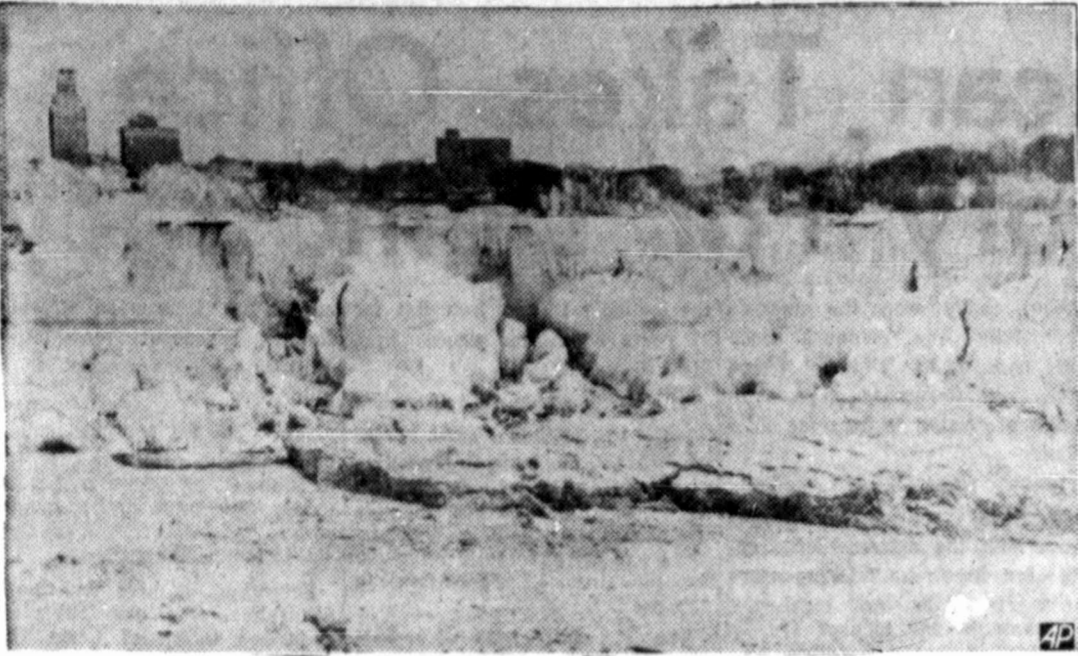

### Nuclear Ship Changes Said Part Of Plan

GALVESTON (AP) — Changes are being made in the nuclear ship Savannah but all were planned before safety advisers to the Atomic Energy Commission raised objections, a shipyard official said Tuesday. His comment followed a disclosure that chairman D. B. Hall had written his advisory committee on reactor safeguards could not approve further voyages until a major overhaul is finished and the vessel's status reviewed. Hall's letter, dated Feb. 6, went to AEC Chairman Glenn T. Seaborg.

The Savannah, first atomic-powered merchant ship in the world, is here for overhaul of its nuclear propulsion system by the Todd Shipyards Corp. Ben W. Winchell, manager of Todd's nuclear division, said nothing new or unexpected had arisen and he was amazed that the safety committee would not recommend immediate future voyages. Stressing there is nothing wrong with the ship's reactor and there is no danger from it, Winchell said: "This whole business of what is being done in the yards now is purely routine and has been planned for a long time."

Winchell and an AEC spokesman in Washington both said all the safety committee recommendations had been discussed and some of the proposed changes already were being effected. In the letter to Seaborg, Hall's committee recommended installation of a reliable auxiliary power source with adequate maneuvering and propulsion reversing capacity. It likewise proposed ventilation, filter and monitoring changes to "provide adequate assurance that they will function properly in event of an accident," releasing fission products.

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## Venus Not Earth's Twin After All, Reports Show

WASHINGTON (AP) — On earth's dead sister, Venus, it must be a lonely, dark world of dry, sandy desert with 800-degree heat. And above, always the burden of heavy, nearly waterless clouds. Such was the grim picture scientists gave Tuesday from the reports of radar contact from earth and the close-up look by space-exploring Mariner II.

greenhouse admit sunlight but keep in heat, so is the heat retained on Venus—probably by carbon dioxide in the atmosphere. The clouds probably shield Venus' surface from some of the sun's radiation. To a person standing on the surface, there would not be too much difference from the sunlit to the dark side of the planet. Radar encountered a bright spot—just 7 o'clock on the disc it observed, and near the center. This bright spot might be a surface feature of some kind—perhaps a mountain or ocean.

Mariner, in flying by at 21,000 miles, also found a strange break in the uniformity of the clouds that shroud the planet. That was a sudden and definable cold spot in the clouds near the planet's south pole. It might also mean that some large surface feature lies beneath, a scientist speculated, perhaps a mountain. As for the clouds, they might range from 45 miles above the surface of the planet to 60 miles at their highest.

The clouds are likely a sort of smog—a layer of condensed hydrocarbons, a scientist speculated. So the space agency panel of scientists, reporting on Mariner II, gave an epitaph to the idea that earth and Venus were twin sisters in space. They are similar in size, and neighbors in space, but there the similarity ends.

The latest and about the only recent trend is westerly," said a spokesman at the U.S. Public Health Service's Communicable Disease Center in Atlanta. Radar beams aimed at the planet from earth—while Mariner was heading for its rendezvous last Dec. 14—seemed to feel out a sandy or dusty surface on Venus.

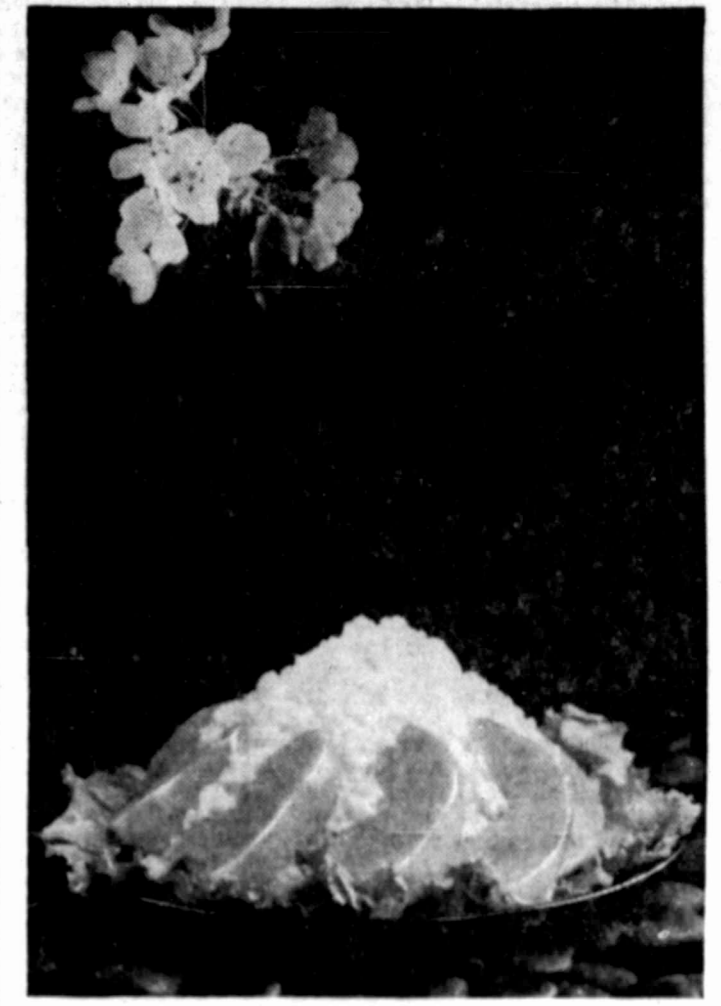

# Tax Cut Idea Too Academic For Most Folk

NEW YORK (AP)—The tax cut proposal's failure to arouse the expected public enthusiasm is reported by various pulse takers. A tax cut is supposed to be the most popular of political acts. Public reaction this time has brought forth many explanations.

One is that linking tax cuts and federal deficits to economic growth rates has made the whole thing too academic for most people to grasp. But President Kennedy says his proposal is far from academic.

He tells a symposium sponsored by the American Bankers Association that "pushing our economy to grow at the rate of 4 per cent instead of 3 per cent" would work out over the next 10 years to an increase of "\$5,000 more in income for every family."

The ordinary fellow can understand \$5,000 all right. He may be a little hazy as to how he can be sure that getting something called the Gross National Product to increase by 4 per cent a year instead of 3 is going to mean that he will get an extra \$500 a year, instead of the \$400 he would get with \$1,000. This is the educational problem that the President and his advisers face.

Another reason many persons haven't gone overboard for the tax cutting plan could be that after figuring up everything else involved they can't see how they'll be ahead much if any at the end of the year. Some contend that the proposed cut in deductions would take away much of the benefit from any lowering of federal income tax rates.

Others point out that other taxes, fees, rates, at all levels of government, are going up at the same time. When they've paid everything from Social Security to property to sales taxes to auto license fees, their disposable income may be about the same size. They wonder just how much of a boost they personally can give to the economic growth rate.

Many ordinary fellows can't grasp how going further into debt is going to make the economy grow, or how it can do anything but postpone the time the piper must be paid.

The new economic school rejects this fear as outdated. It holds that the tax cuts and the increased government spending between them will spur business in general. This will get the GNP—the total dollar value of all goods and services produced in the nation—to move ahead by the 4 per cent the President is aiming at and which he says over 10 years would add \$210 billion more to wages and \$110 billion to profits. And if it did, the U.S. Treasury could take in \$80 billion more in taxes.

Many people would like to believe this, if only they could be sure in their own minds.

The section of El Paso involved is along the border with Juarez, across the Rio Grande.

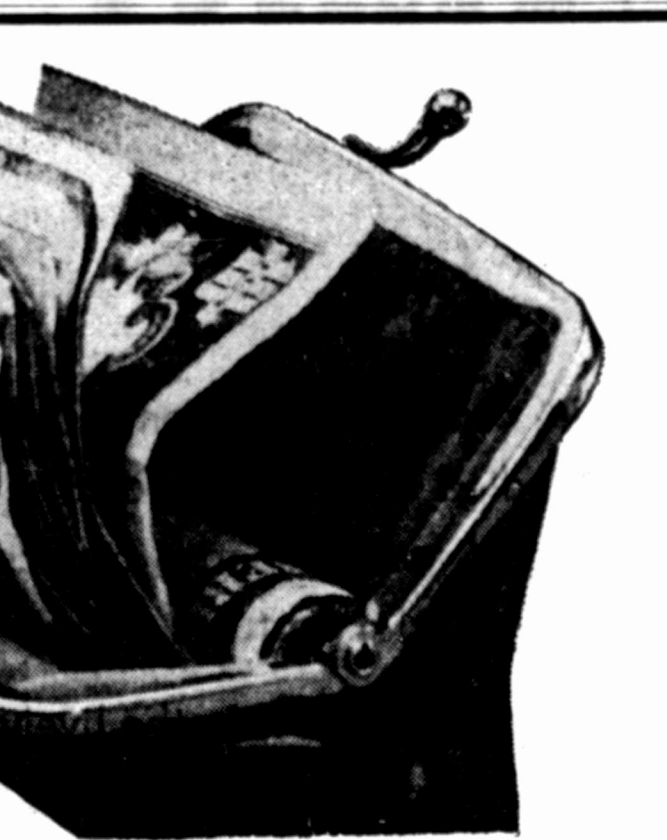
The Mexican land is in an area north of the Rio Grande called Cordova Island, which juts like a swollen thumb into the United States.

# New Armor Stops Anti-Tank Rifle Bullet

AZUSA Calif. (AP)—Americans in the Korean War were somewhat disturbed to encounter a hand-held Soviet 14.5 mm. rifle which bored holes through the armor of our newest tanks.

Now U.S. technology has come up with a new armor, lighter and tougher than steel, which stops the thumb-thick 14.5 mm. bullet.

The new armor is made of plastic.

Unlike metal alloys, which stop projectiles by being dense enough to absorb their high-speed energy, the new plastic plays tricks on the bullets. It lets them penetrate slightly, then twists them sideways so they break into small pieces snugly pocketed within the armor panel.

This happens even when the bullet is fired head-on.

Inventor Harry King, a materials engineer at Aerojet-General Corp., says the armor is now being tested at the Army's Aberdeen, Md., proving grounds. Many of the details are secret.

"We can say that the plastic armor is approximately 40 per cent lighter than the conventional armor it would take to stop a given projectile," King disclosed.

"The speed of a bullet traveling 3,000 feet per second drops to zero after traveling half an inch through the armor."

The armor which stops the Soviet 4.5 mm. antitank projectile is made of sheets of glass fiber and secret non-metallic materials, bonded into panels about two inches thick.

Just how the bullet, traveling more than a half mile per second, is turned sideways and shattered is something that King himself isn't sure he knows.

"When I set out to make the panel, I predicted this would happen," he says, "but until the tests are completed I can't be positive why it happens."

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**Leg Rejoining Attempt Fails**

BALTIMORE (AP) — Carleton F. Arnold's right leg, which surgeons tried to reunite, has been removed. A doctor said Tuesday that attempted rejoining of the leg — severed by a power saw — was not successful because proper blood circulation could not be maintained. "We were able to maintain the circulation down to the ankle, but the bottom of the sole and the toes had lost their circulation," said Dr. Oscar Camp, a specialist in vascular surgery. Arnold, 32, a television technician, was cutting logs outside his home at Savage in nearby Howard County Feb. 10 when the power saw fell from its support, severing his right leg at mid-calf.

**Gore Vidal Thinks Bobby Kennedy Not Fit Candidate**

NEW YORK (AP) — Playwright Gore Vidal says Atty. Gen. Robert F. Kennedy will be the Democrat candidate for president in 1968 but "it will take a public relations genius to make him appear lovable." He also says the attorney general "would be a dangerously authoritarian-minded president." Vidal, a personal friend of President Kennedy, says in an article in Esquire magazine that the President will be re-elected in 1964.

married to Jacqueline Kennedy's mother, Mrs. John Bouvier. Vidal, a Democrat aligned with the liberal wing of the party, campaigned on the Kennedy platform in 1960 when he unsuccessfully ran for Congress in New York's 29th District, which includes five counties in the Hudson River Valley. In the magazine article, Vidal says of 1968: "There is no doubt that when Bobby goes before the convention in '68 he will seem beautifully

qualified—and from the point of view of sheer experience he will be qualified. "But there are flaws in his person hard to disguise. For one thing, it will take a public relations genius to make him appear lovable. He is not. "His obvious characteristics are energy, vindictiveness, and a simplemindedness about human motives which may yet bring him down. "To Bobby the world is white or black. They and us. He has none of his brother's ease; or charity." The article says that while President Kennedy is perfectly suited to the office, brother Robert is not. A spokesman for Robert Kennedy in Washington said there would be no comment by him on the article.
