Star Lites By Bill Ellis

IT IS UNFORTUNATE that so many would-be experts are able to secure the spotlight so easily, and when they do, they can tear down in a few seconds what an industry such as agriculture has worked for years to build up.

One such example was the recent appearance on a national television talk show of a consumer advocate (her name escapes me, but it's not important) who was hurling slanders at the cattle feeding industry.

The TV guest was speaking out in opposition to the growth harmones used as a feeding supplement by feed yards, which help feedlot steers reach their maximum gain in the alloted feeding period.

The latest consumer rabble-rouser was implying that the harmones used by the feedlots, if consumed in beef, might just cause the person eating the beef to put on more weight, or suffer other side effects, due to "leftover" harmones.

No evidence has ever been produced to indicate that such charges have even the slightest chance of holding a grain of truth, but this was beside the point for the consumer advocate, who had her captive

audience of several million people.

When the TV guest was asked by the host what she recommended as a solution to the problem, her answer was "Just don't eat beef," which concluded her condemnation of the beef industry, without trial, hearing or whatever.

WE WERE DISTRESSED to learn that Fred Thornberry, the Republican candidate for Commissioner of Agriculture is apparantly about as far out of touch with the state's farming industry as anyone possibly could be, and yet, he is a candidate on the

ballot for this vital elective office.

In a "media advisory" issued on September 21, Thornberry attacked statements made by his opponent, Jim Hightower, which was decrying the financial plight of the state's farmers. Hightower had said that some 10,000 Texas farmers had gone out of business in the past five years.

Thornberry "media release" ridiculed Hightower's statements, and argued that the fact that "only" 2,000 farmers per year were going out of business did not indicate that anything was wrong with agriculture.

The GOP candidate said that the term "went out of business" did not mean that this many farmers had declared bankruptcy or implied failure. "People change professions for a variety of reasons, don't we?" he asked in his memorandum.

Thornberry went on to quote some figures showing the total Texas farm assets for 1981 as being well above the farm debts for the same year, a very misleading statistic. We feel sure that a number of Parmer County farmers could supply Mr. Thornberry with a more valid set of figures.

The bad part about this situation is the fact that rural Texans won't elect our state officials, but depend upon their urban neighbors—to elect the state's commissioner of agriculture. Farmers have to hope that enough of their city neighbors will know that Thornberry's statements are just "so much malarky," but the fact is that many people will probably accept them at face value.

Thanks to Ralph Roming for calling this situation to our attention. Ralph, who has worked for the benefit of farmers on the state level, goes into the matter further in a letter to the editor in this issue.

A grand opening sale is underway for Friona's new Allsup's Convenience Store, located on East Highway 60 at Columbia Avenue in Friona. The sale started Thursday, October 21, and continues through Saturday, October 23.

Customers are being treated with a free bag of groceries every half hour, from 9 a.m. to 7 p.m. each of the three days. They are also asked to register for a free 26-inch Huffy 10-speed bicycle, to be given away Saturday at 8 p.m.

The newest Allsup's Convenience Store is labeled as "Number 217" in the growing chain of stores, founded by Lonnie Ausup in 1956. (Oddly, the store completed and opened last April on West Highway 60 is Number 225).

The Clovis-based corporation serves portions of New Mexico, Texas and Oklahoma.

Friona has played a vital role in the development of the Allsup's operation. The company's old location on Highway 60 and Prospect Street is number seven in the chain that now numbers 252 stores.

The stores represent a capital investment of over \$500,000 each, according to Russell Haley, the company's director of real estate.

"The residents of Friona have been good customers ever since we have been in business there. Sometimes we have been busy expanding to new towns and have neglected updating our old locations. But we appreciate Friona, and the addition of the two new stores should be an indication of this," Allsup said recently.

Ann Gee, who has served as Allsup's local manager for a number of years, is the manager of the new store. Other employees there include Bonnie Pope, assistant manager, Jimmie Sue Gibson, Sharon Armstrong and Vickie Montgomery.

James Cooper is serving as Allsup's district manager, having replaced Shelby Bishop of Hereford in that capacity earlier this month. Cooper is on hand for the grand opening, along with Lawrence Martin of Plainview, Allsup's district manager for the Plainview area. Pat Hanks and Jack Crow, Allsup's officials from Clovis, also have been present.

Lonnie Allsup attributes his success to the philosophy of providing convenience and service to his customers.

In the convenience store field, Allsup is an innovator, willing to try new ideas in retailing. And he usually is followed by other national chains.





said Dr. John Pelham, state 4-H and youth leader with the Extension Service. "Even though scholarship standards are high, several hundred young people compete annually for the more than 70 scholarships available through the Texas 4-H Foundation.

The Texas 4-H Foundation is a non-profit educational organization which works cooperatively with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service to develop private sector support in behalf of 4-H programs, he

Davison said that about \$350,000 in scholarships will be available to graduating 4-H members in 1982. 4-H members may apply for these scholarships by securing an application from their local county Extension office after January 1, 1983



The Friona Chieftains were renewing their oldest football rivalry Friday night by hosting the Dimmitt Bobcats.

The game also was an important District 2-AAA contest for both teams, especially the Chieftains, who were trying to keep their district record unmolested.

But the Chiefs were expecting a run for their money. Dimmitt came into the game with a 3-4 record for the season, having dropped both district games to tough Littlefield 20-3 and Muleshoe last week, 21-14.

However, the Mules had to score on a bomb in the last minute for their win over the Bobcats.

Dimmitt's non-district wins were over Plains, 21-0; Olton, 10-0 and Boys Ranch, 33-7. They lost to Floydada, 19-6, and to River Road, 21-7. Comparative scores for the two common opponents, Boys Ranch and River Road, indicated a close game Friday.

Coach Tommy Moss was encouraged this week by the return of a pair of players to workouts who had been out for awhile. Richard Malouf, who sustained an arm fracture prior to opening game, was released for contact, and Mike Neill, who suffered a knee injury against Dalhart and missed the last three games, has been working out. Whether these two see action Friday will be dictated by their progress in workouts and the game situation.

Dimmitt quarterback Richard Guzman is a threat for the Bobcats. He likes to run the option, and can keep the ball effectively, as witnessed by his 100-yard plus game against district favorite Littlefield

Friona's top offensive weapon, runningback Charlie Morgan, bruised a knee against Abernathy, but has been running well in practice, according to coaches. Morgan enters the game with 921 yards already this season. He's a fourth leading rusher in class AAA on the South Plains, and also ranks high with his ten TDs.

Dimmitt leads the ancient series, 32-13, but in the past 20 years, it's much closer, Dimmitt having 11 wins to Friona's nine.

Chiefs Blank Abernathy 21-0 In Series Renewal

It was the first football meeting between the two schools in seven years. When the series was broken off following the 1975 season, Friona enjoyed a 6-4 edge in games played between the two schools.

So naturally, the Chieftains were anxious to renew old acquaintences of this sort, and they picked up right where they had left off, with a 21-0 victory, which kept the team unbeaten in District 2-AAA play.

Charlie Morgan did his part to welcome the 'Lopes back to the schedule. The Chieftain scatback put on quite a show for the Friona fans who made the trip to Abernathy. He ran 65 yards for a touchdown on Friona's first play from scrimmage, and finished the game with 177 yards in 17 tries -- a gaudy 17.7 yards-percarry average.

Morgan's average would have been much higher, except for six carries in the second half on a "gimpy" knee which was injured during the first half of play. Had Morgan been allowed to sit out the entire second half, his "stats" would have been: 11 tries, 176 yards, and 16.0 per try.

Charlie showed his speed on the opening play run, outracing all defenders for the game's first score. Mark Montoya's kick made the score 7-0. Only 3:55 had elapsed in the

Then Bruce Patterson found Eloy Caballero streaking up the left sidelines on a pass play. Caballero caught the ball at about the 15 and zipped into the end zone for a touchdown. Montoya's kick made the score 14-0, with 2:07 remaining in the opening quarter.

The Chieftains should have scored 21 more points in the second quarter, but stopped themselves twice with fumbles. The team drove to the Abernathy eight, aided by an Abernathy bobble and Morgan's running. But Reese Fleming had the ball pop out of his grip and the Antelopes recovered at their own five to save a TD.

A minute later, Friona was driving again. Morgan raced 17 yards to the Abernathy 27. But even Morgan is human, and he was rocked loose from the pigskin and Abernathy recovered at their own 20, to again dodge the bullet.

On Friona's fifth possession, the team started at their own 21, and put together a drive. Morgan got loose on a 37-yard ramble to the Abernathy 40. Then Patterson and Caballero hooked up again on a 22-yard gain to the Antelope 17.

From there, Morgan took the pitchout and went right, getting good blocking and eased into the end zone for his second touchdown. Montoya's kick made the count 21-0, as only 34 seconds remained on the halftime clock.

his knee during a pileup in the first half, and his running ability was severely affected. He continued to see action, carrying the ball six times in the second half, but for little yardage. In fact, this resulted in his only minus yardage try for the game and on three

However, there are other bypartisan, far reaching repercussions





Local Drive Set To Benefit "C.R.O.P."

For the past three years, youth from our community have trick or treated for CROP. The response as a community has grown with each year of experience and labor. This year, again, the FFA boys, and the youth groups from the Congregational and Methodist churches will be uniting in a common effort to fight hunger at home and abroad.

At the end of World War II, many Christians wanted to share America's abundance with European war victims. To act as a vehicle for relief services, 17 Protestant denominations joined forces in 1946. CROP grew out of that coalition in August, 1947. Originally known as the Christian Rural Overseas Program, CROP's first purpose was to gather wheat and other crops from American farms for shipment to Europe.

Over the years, CROP increased its urban appeals while remaining in contact with its rural constituents. Urban campaigns began in 1966 and the name was changed to Christian Relief Overseas Project.

Member denominations, some 30

in all, continue to provide basic support for programs to fight hunger. CROP has moved from primarily providing resources for emergency relief to supporting long-range self help and development work.

For millions of people each day the question they ask is: "Will the future be one of hunger, poverty and despair? "CROP is helping to provide a positive and hopeful answer. By giving more than food, more than a handout they have assisted. A helping hand from CROP means helping people to develop personally, socially and economically," says Rev. Skip Sirnic, spokesman for the drive.

CROP provides ox-plowing training, thus turning the family animals into an eight-legged tractor. This training and a good sturdy plow from CROP are the first steps toward agricultural self-reliance.

"CROP provides opportunities for building a foothold in the future. But, it's only a beginning. Much more is needed. We need your help," Sirnic concluded.

Green Thumb **Program Survives**

For almost 1,000 older workers in the Texas Farmer's Union Green Thumb program, the "battle of the budget" came to a happy conclusion with the recent Congressional override of the President's veto of a supplemental appropriations bill.

The bill provides money for a variety of programs and agencies ranging from the defense department to NASA to Title V of the Older Americans Act, which funds TFU Green Thumb and other senior employment programs, according to John Willingham, Green Thumb Assistant State Director.

Speaking to 48 Green Thumb workers at a training session in Tulia on October 18, Willingham said the Congressional override was "decisive" in saving the jobs of more than 54,000 Title V workers nationwide. The workers are all 55 and over, low income, and provide services for libraries, schools, senior centers, museums, and other public service agencies.

"Without the override, the only hope would have been yet another approprations bill," he said, "and there were no real guarantees that another one would have been passed and signed in time to keep the program going." The new bill funds the program through June 30, 1983.

HUNTERS--TAKE NOTICE!

Q: Why should hunters have their vision checked annually? A: A hunter's decision to squeeze the trigger is influenced primarily by what he "sees," or more specifically, "what he thinks he sees." Many hunters are unaware that their vision is defective. They may think they see just fine, while others hesitate to admit they have a problem for fear they must give up their sport. Fortunately, most vision defects can be corrected and there is no need to give up hunting.

Q: Is defective vision really that dangerous?

A: Yes. A Minnesota Hunter Casualty study showed that 77 per cent of those who wounded fellow hunters had defective vision--and half of them were not aware of it. Also, it is estimated that as high as 15 per cent of our male population are either color-blind or color-deficient. Of approximately 17 million hunters, 850,000 cannot distinguish color properly, a dangerous threat to fellow huntsmen.

Q: What vision skills are needed to be a safe and successful hunter? A: Hunting is a sport that requires excellent hand-eye coordination. Reflexes must be fast, and the hunter's eye true if he is to hit his target with any degree of accuracy. He must be able to:

1. Distinguish detail at considerable distance and against a variety of backgrounds. 2. Focus clearly on near and distant objects and switch focus within a

fraction of a second. Judge distance with speed and accuracy.

Detect objects and movements on either side of the target.

Identify colors and perform under a variety of light and weather




