Kennedy Warns Racism Holds Danger To Nation

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Kennedy has warned the nation that discrimination against Negroes has lighted "fires of frustration and discord" that threaten lives and the public safety.

The President outlined a broad legislative program he will propose to Congress next week. He said it will be based on the proposition "that race has no place in American life or law."

A great change is at hand, he said, and "our task, our obligation, is to make that revolution, that change, peaceful and constructive for all."

Kennedy appeared Tuesday evening on radio and television in a fireside civil rights lecture to Americans of both North and South only hours after Alabama Gov. George C. Wallace bowed to federal pressure and stepped aside to let two Negro students register at the previously all-white University of Alabama.

"I hope that every American, regardless of where he lives, will stop and examine his conscience about this and other related incidents," said Kennedy.

"When Americans are sent to Viet Nam or West Berlin, we do not ask for whites only," he said.

"It ought to be possible, therefore, for American students of any color to attend any public institution they select without having to be backed up by troops."

"In short," Kennedy added, "every American ought to have the right to be treated as he

would wish to be treated, as one would wish his children to be treated. But this is not the case."

Kennedy, declaring that America faces "a moral crisis as a country and as a people," said he will ask Congress to make a civil rights commitment "it has not fully made in this century."

The President said he will propose legislation that would:

1. Prohibit stores, hotels, restaurants and theaters from discriminating against Negroes.

2. Allow the federal government to take a more active part in court suits aimed at desegregating public schools.

3. Afford greater protection for Negroes' right to vote.

NO REMEDIES

Acknowledging the new laws are not enough, Kennedy said, however, that in too many parts of the country wrongs are inflicted on Negroes because they have no remedies at law—and "unless the Congress acts, their only remedy is the street."

In Congress, leaders of both parties promised to put their shoulders to the wheel.

"I recognize that Congress has a responsibility in this field," said Senate Republican Leader Everett M. Dirksen, "and there should be some action in this session on effective civil rights legislation. To this end I will devote my best efforts."

Senate Democratic Leader Mike Mansfield predicted, "We'll have civil rights legislation at this session and it looks like we will be in session for the remainder of

the year." House Speaker John W. McCormack, D-Mass., said President's speech "would have great weight with the country as well as Congress."

But from a Southern Democrat came warnings of filibuster and violence.

"If the President tries to enforce his legislative proposals I think it will mean violence," said Sen. Allen J. Ellender, D-La.

LOT OF BLOODSHED

Noting a statement by an official of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference that Negroes would stage civil disobedience demonstrations in Washington if Southern senators filibuster against civil rights legislation, Ellender said:

"The threat I just heard tonight that the Negroes will lie in the streets if there is a filibuster—which there will be—will mean a lot of bloodshed. I'm sorry this is what is in store—more violence, bloodshed without question."

In Birmingham, Ala., which was torn by racial strife last month, the Rev. Martin Luther King Jr. disclosed a telegram sent to Kennedy which praised the President's speech as "one of the most eloquent, profound and unequivocal pleas for justice and freedom of all men ever made by any president."

Sitting behind his desk and using few gestures as he spoke, Kennedy reeled off statistics to show the plight of Negroes.

"This is not a sectional issue," said the President. "Difficulties over segregation and discrimina-

tion exist in every city, in every state of the Union, producing in many cities a rising tide of discontent that threatens the public safety."

VIOLENCE FLARED

Not long after he spoke racial violence flared in Cambridge, Md., 85 miles east of the capital. Two white men were wounded by shotgun blasts as whites and Negroes skirmished. Bricks flew and fires broke out in three white business places.

Said Kennedy: "The fires of frustration and discord are burning in every city, North and South, where legal remedies are not at hand. Redress is sought in the streets, in demonstrations, parades and protests which create tensions and threaten violence and threaten lives."

Kennedy said the crisis cannot be met by repressive police action, left to more demonstrations or quieted by token moves.

"It is time to act in the Congress, in your state and local legislative body and, above all, in all our daily lives," he said.

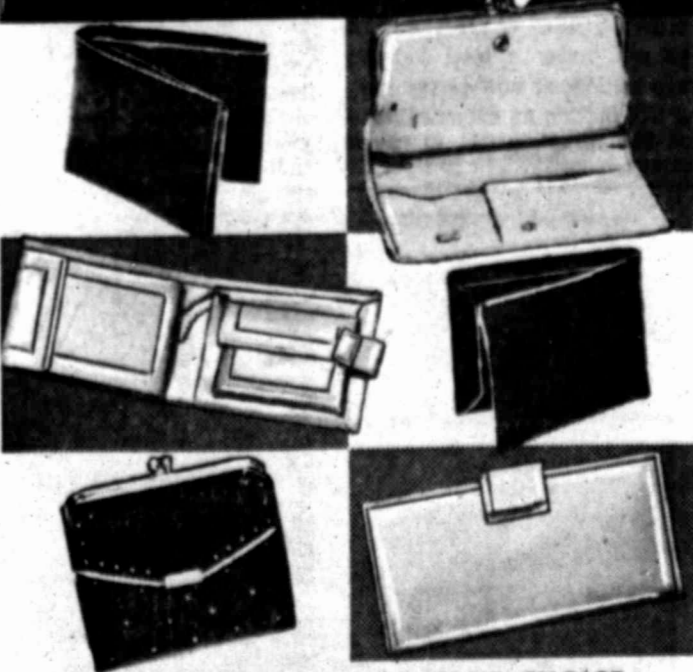

Connally Signs List Of Bills

AUSTIN (AP)—Gov. John Connally has signed two bills to liberalize married women's legal rights.

The bills, by Rep. George Cowden of Waco, allow married women to enter into contracts, sue and be sued without court authority, and allow married women to convey separate property without a husband's joinder.

Another measure signed Monday is enabling legislation for a proposed constitutional amendment to allow issuance of \$150 million more in bonds by the veterans land program and raise from \$7,500 to \$10,000 the ceiling on loans to veterans. Voters will ballot on the amendment Nov. 9.

Connally also signed a bill to allow game wardens to arrest trespassers.

The bills, as well as these other signed measures, take effect in late August unless noted as "immediate."

SB222, amending the Workmen's Compensation Act.

SB268, providing that any person with 18 years service on one or more state courts shall be qualified for retirement.

SB298, providing that banks shall not be required to disclose to third parties the amount deposited by any depositor.

SB300, authorizing an alternative method to measure oil production.

SB463, validating acts of certain cities bordering on the Gulf.

SB470, relating to the establishment of boards for commissioners of pilots for certain ports.

SB472, relating to the appointment of branch pilots in the ports of Galveston County; immediate.

SB481, authorizing junior college districts which may overlap pre-existing boundaries of other junior college districts to disannex the overlapped territory.

SB505, relating to the investment of the permanent school fund by the state board of education.

HB210, setting up a pilot program for the education of emotionally disturbed children.

HB452, limiting maximum working hours of sheriff or constable in certain counties.

HB514, relating to the offense of obtaining board or lodging by fraudulent representation and refusing to pay.

HB786, creating public hospital district in Jefferson County.

District's Water Demands Low Due To May Rainfall

Member cities of the Colorado River Municipal Water District will have to develop an insatiable thirst during the remainder of the summer if the district's estimated consumption is reached.
A series of showers in May knocked off demands of Odessa, Big Spring and Snyder by one fourth from last year. At the same time, the amount of water required by oilfield repressuring units declined by one-eighth, wiping out a gain for the previous four months of the year.
June rains have not indicated any immediate change in the pattern. During the weekend Odessa came up with about an inch in two showers.
During May, Odessa consumed 404,583,000 gallons of water, a decline of 21.89 per cent from the same month a year ago. Big Spring took 205,377,000, a decline of 28.61 per cent, and Snyder drew 55,790,000 gallons, a drop of 28.32 per cent. The average for the three cities was down 24.64 per cent.
The five oil company groups required 213,337,934 gallons for their purposes, which was 12.80 less than for May of last year. Lion

Oil was up 21.63 per cent. Texas Gulf (which uses a relatively small amount) was up 140.3 per cent, and Standard-Sinclair up 24.08 per cent.
Deliveries by the district during May amounted to 879,087,934, which was 22.08 per cent down from the 1,128,214,000 gallons in May of 1962. The total delivered to date by CRMWD was 3,637,963,960, or down 3.72 per cent.
District supplies are in excellent condition and the system is ready to meet any peak demand put upon it, said O. H. Ivie, assistant general manager.
