

The Legislative Budget Board and the governor's budget office spend presession months preparing separate budget proposals from agency requests, hearings and staff studies. Then the House and Senate appropriations committees spend most of the session working and holding hearings on the main spending bill. The House passes a bill, the Senate usually rewrites it, it goes to conference committee, and that is where the system breaks down

There the five senators and five representatives on the joint committee are handed what Connally called "awesome discretionary powers over what money goes where." It is not supposed to be that way: the conference committee is supposed to confine itself to adjusting differences between the Senate and House bills. But it doesn't

The Supreme Court of the United States has exhibited a curious inconsistency in dealing with such facilities in the state courthouse in Norfolk Virginia

APPARENTLY no legal barrier is recognized today by the Supreme Court when brushing aside state ordinances. customs, or even statements of an advisory nature favoring practices of racial segregation in public buildings or facilities. The utmost flexibility prevails, and the highest court has taken it upon itself again and again to tell local authorities they must give due regard to the "equal protection clause of the Fourteenth Amendment A decision rendered on March 9, 1959, by the Supreme Court, however remains a conspicuous exception and is still in effect

THE CASE AROSE when a Negro attorney sought from the United States district court a permanent injunction to restrain the City of Norfolk and certain of its administrative officers from maintaining certain signs in state courthouse in city indicating segregation of races in public restrooms maintained in building for men and women

The U.S. district judge, after the hearing dismissed the complaint on Feb 26, 1958. The case was taken to the United State Circuit Court of Appeals, which affirmed the decision on Oct. 15, 1958, In 1959, by refusing to hear the case, the Supreme Court of the United States upheld the appeals court ruling, which said:

"WE THINK this action was properly taken Whether or not the federal court. should take cognizance of the case and grant the relief prayed was within the sound discretion of the district judge sitting in a court of equity.

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

"It has long been accepted practice for the federal courts to relinquish their jurisdiction in favor of the state courts. where its exercise would involve control of or interference with the internal affairs of a domestic corporation of the

THERE ARE stronger reasons for adopting a like practice where the exercise of jurisdiction involves an unnecessary interference by injunction with the lawful action of state officers"

Again and again state officers have sought to maintain segregation in public parks or in schools or in public buildings. But the Supreme Court of the United States has rebuffed every such effort and has ignored the opinions of the state



U.S. Declares Landings Small

Department said today that fewer than 50 anti-Castro infiltrators may have landed in Cuba in the past couple of weeks. It denounced as "inaccurate and highly colored" claims of bigger

Press officer Richard L. Phillips made this statement in the wake of claims by Cuban exiles in Florida of sizable landings in Cuba. "We have no information, and

we have checked very carefully, which would support in any way the reports of yesterday from some Cuban exile sources that there have been several landings of sizable numbers of men in Cuba," Phillips said.

"It is possible, however, that some small numbers of infiltrators may have entered Cuba in the past two or three weeks. A disturbing aspect of inaccurate and highly-colored statements of this kind is that they deceive and frustrate the hopes of anti-Castro elements within Cuba.' In addition to the claims by Cu-

ban exiles, Rep. Paul Rogers, D-Fla., said Thursday night that he was advised by sources reliable in the past that more than 3,000 men infiltrated Cuba at three coastal points. He declined to identify the sources. Phillips, however, said in reply

to newsmen's questions that "less than 50" are estimated to have been involved in the landings, and that there is 'no information indicating that they departed from the United States.'



THE END DOES NOT JUSTIFY THE MEANS

It would seem that even some churchmen, leaders in religion and politicians, leaders in government in this land and over the world have debased, depraved and degraded themselves with the idea that the good or supposed good end to be attained justifies any means possible to reach that end: regardless of how poisoning, or how contaminated or polluted that means may be. Deception and dishonesty can thus easily be ustified, murder and adultery, lying and stealing, cussing and killing, you name it, whatever the sin it is not too low down for the fellow or for the system, whether religious or political, that follows the idea that the end justifies the means. There seems to be very little that is corrigible, curable or improvable in the the people who take this attitude. This attitude is born of pride and self-righteousness; it is born of ignorance of the truth: A man must put himself in the place of God to believe the theory that "the end justifies the means to reach it."

Henry Clay once said, "I would rather be right than president." He had in mind that if in order to reach even the highest political office of the U.S.A. and if he were the best man for the job he would prefer to be right than be wrong or do wrong to get or to hold the job.

Lincoln said, "Let us have faith that right makes might and in that faith, let us to the end, dare to do our duty, as we un-
