GOP To Pick Site For Its '64 Convention

DENVER, Colo. (AP)—With spokesmen declaring President Kennedy can be beaten next year, the Republican National Committee opened today a meeting to choose a site for its 1964 national convention. The GOP chairman of the host state, Jean K. Tool of Colorado, expressed the tone of the session with a declaration that "Kennedy is available for defeat and the situation improves every week." But if the Republican party officials were agreed they have a chance to win the election, there was sharp difference of opinion on the man to select for the presidential nominee.

Cat Food Robber Sought By Police

H. C. King, employe at Charlie's Grocery, 1612 E. 3rd, was struck on the head with two cans of cat food about 10 a.m. today and his assailant fled with between \$70 and \$80 from the cash register. King was taken to Howard County Hospital Foundation, where stitches were taken to close the cuts. Attendants said his injuries were painful, but not serious. King said his attacker, wearing blue coveralls and dark glasses, went behind the counter and picked up two cans of cat food. He came out and asked for a large size can or box, and while King was turned around, the man struck him on the right side of the head and face. The intruder told King to give him all the money in the cash register. The man had a small pistol in his hand, King said. The assailant went outside and a salesman, driving up at the time, said the man got in a blue 1960 model car and drove east on Circle Drive and turned right on Fifth Street. Big Spring police called for roadblocks, which were in position within minutes. However, no sign of the man had been received at noon, although a widespread search was on. Charlie Dese owns the store but was not present when the robbery occurred.

Mac Orders New Inquiry Into Scandal

LONDON (AP)—Prime Minister Harold Macmillan today ordered a new inquiry into Britain's security services in the wake of the Profumo scandal. He told Parliament this week that Scotland Yard had not informed him of espionage suspicions in the three-cornered relationship of former War Secretary John Profumo, party girl Christine Keeler and Soviet assistant naval attache Eugene Ivanov. Macmillan, who has apparently won Conservative party approval to keep his job at least until mid-summer, ordered the inquiry after consulting with Labor party chief Harold Wilson. But it was not the kind of inquiry Wilson wanted and will probably be the subject of political attack. The prime minister told the House of Commons he has set up an investigation by judges, headed by Lord Denning, one of the country's senior law officials. The Labor party had asked for the inquiry to be made by an all-party committee of the House of Commons.

Mahon Reports \$2 Billion Slash In Defense Budget

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Defense Department's 1964 money budget was cut almost \$2 billion today by the House Appropriations Committee. But the committee, in a report written by Rep. George H. Mahon, D-Tex., said the cut would not impede any essential military programs and actually represented money the department probably couldn't spend if it had it. The \$47,092,209,000 recommended by the committee for use during the fiscal year starting July 1 would, the report said. "Support programs which will promote the security of the United States and assure the continuation of the policy of military supremacy."

Suit Is Settled

GEORGETOWN, Tex. (AP)—The state's anti-trust suit which charged conspiracy to rig bus prices in Texas was settled today with a \$100,000 penalty levied against 16 persons and companies. Raimondo Manzini, editor of L'Osservatore Romano, explained to newsmen the significance of the Pope's name. It is a symbol of ecumenical unity, venerated by Catholics, Protestants and the Orthodox. Rainfall in downtown Victoria measured an inch, and hail knocked out some automobile headlights. No reports of serious flooding came from Galveston. Cuban Invaders To Demand U.S. Aid If Russians Attack

MIAMI, Fla. (AP)—The Cuban Revolutionary Council said today it will demand "the promised help of the United States" if Soviet troops attack commandos the council claims to have landed in Cuba. Antonio de Varona, former Cuban prime minister and the guiding force behind the council, told newsmen "The United States has said publicly that it would help if Russians tried to put down a revolt of the Cuban people. "If our troops are attacked by Soviet soldiers, we will demand this help." Press officer Richard I. Phillips

of the State Department said in a report in Washington Wednesday that the United States has made it clear that it will not stand idly in the event of a Hungary-type uprising in Cuba should Soviet troops intervene. Antonio Maceo, president of the council said, "This is the moment when all Cubans should unite for the liberation of our country, which will be accomplished if everything goes as planned." Maceo is grandson of Gen. Antonio Maceo, one of Cuba's national heroes. The Cuban council and thousands of exiles awaited word from commandos the council said it had put on Fidel Castro's shores to launch "the beginning of the liberation of Cuba." There was no confirmation from Cuban or United States governments of such landings. The council said it expected a progress report by radio today from fighting

men it said were welcomed by peasants and who swiftly joined forces with area guerrilla bands. Sketchy and unauthenticated broadcasts pointed to southern Oriente, Cuba's easternmost province, as the possible site of landings and perhaps clashes. One such broadcast Thursday night reported a "Camilo Cienfuegos Battalion" landed and met overwhelming opposition at Caney de Las Mercedes, near Manzanillo which is 280 miles west of the U.S. naval base at Guantanamo Bay. But a former Caney de Las Mercedes resident who heard the same news said "Camilo Cienfuegos" was the name of a Castro youth communism indoctrination school there. He said the report indicated invaders were hotly besieging it. Another exile said a broadcast on the 40 meter band said, "This is the Cuban Anti-Communist Liberation Army. Go ahead Pinar del

Rio." Pinar del Rio is the name of Cuba's westernmost province. A Cuban military network broadcast mentioned no landings, but warned servicemen, especially in naval units, to be alert for anything unusual. The revolutionary council, in its surprise announcement Thursday morning, reported a "Camilo Cienfuegos Battalion" landed and met the forces it said landed recently in groups of 8 to 10. The U.S. State and Defense Departments said they had no information of any landings and expressed doubt that substantial numbers of men or arms could be landed in Cuba without its knowledge. But Rep. Paul Rogers, D-Fla., said he was advised by sources reliable in the past that more than 3,000 men infiltrated Cuba at three coastal points. He refused to identify the sources.

Catholic Cardinals Elect A New Pope

New Prelate Identified As A Progressive

VATICAN CITY (AP)—A blue-eyed prelate with a penetrating mind today became the 262nd pontiff of the Roman Catholic Church—Pope Paul VI. In Milan, where as Giovanni Battista Cardinal Montini he had been archbishop, they remembered him as "bishop of the workers," a prelate who had put on a miner's helmet to visit the people who toil. In the Vatican, where he had been top collaborator of Pope Pius XII, they remembered him as an efficient administrator with a keen mind. Now, as Pope, he is the bishop of Rome. The 65-year-old ruler of half a billion Roman Catholics is identified with the progressive group in the Church hierarchy. He is expected to continue with new vigor the Ecumenical Council called by Pope John.

Chooses Name Of Paul VI

VATICAN CITY (AP)—In age-old ceremony the College of Cardinals today elected Giovanni Battista Cardinal Montini, archbishop of Milan, the new Pope of the Roman Catholic Church. He chose the name of Paul VI as a symbol of Christian unity. The new Pope is expected to carry forward the progressive policies of his predecessor, John XXIII, who died June 3 at the age of 81. Pope Paul at 65 is the 262nd ruler of the Roman Catholic Church. "I have tidings of great joy," proclaimed a cardinal to thousands who jammed St. Peter's Square. "We have a Pope." In line with tradition, Pope Paul then appeared on the basilica balcony at 12:21 p.m. to make his first public appearance as the chief pastor of the world's half-billion Catholics. It was an hour after the white smoke puffing from the chimney of the Sistine Chapel had first signaled his election. Only for an instant did the voice of the new Pope shake with emotion as he gave his first blessing: "Urbi et orbi," to the City of Rome and to the world. His message rang out clear and strong to the crowds below. They responded with a great roar. He stayed on the balcony for five minutes, clad in papal robes of white, with a white skullcap. An embroidered papal stole draped his shoulders. Gray-haired, blue-eyed, he presented a figure of great dignity and fine physical appearance. As he delivered the blessing he made the sign of the cross toward the crowd.

Huge Crowd Gets Glimpse Of Pontiff

VATICAN CITY (AP)—The new Pope of the Roman Catholic Church stepped onto a sunlit balcony high above St. Peter's Square today to give his first blessing to a roaring sea of over 100,000 rejoicing persons spread before him as far as he could see. Pope Paul VI—Giovanni Battista Cardinal Montini—stepped before the crowd and gave his blessing just an hour after a white smoke signal announced his election. During that hour a crowd of 10,000 had stood for hours in broiling sun for the reward of seeing the first puffs of smoke float from the Sistine Chapel smokestack. From every part of Rome people came. Within half an hour the vast square was nearly filled and the crowd flowed back into the broad Via Della Conciliazione. Still they came. All eyes focused on the dull gray balcony high above the square. There was no motion behind the white-curtained glass doors. SEEN AT LAST At last they opened and the crowd roared. Alfredo Cardinal Ottaviani, senior cardinal deacon, stepped forward with attendants at his side. It was 48 minutes since the smoke came. His voice boomed over the loudspeakers. "I announce to you tidings of great joy. We have a Pope—the Latin word 'Papa'—Pope—the crowd unleashed its jubilation. The deafening tumult drowned out the start of the cardinal's next phrase. Great hushing noises went from lips in the square. The cardinal paused, then continued. He named Montini but his voice cracked with tension, and he had to repeat it. Cries of "Montini!" came from the teeming throngs. Cardinal Ottaviani, his hands raised as if for silence, then pronounced. "He has chosen to reign under the name Paul VI." "Viva Paolo!" roared the crowd. EXULTANT CROWD The Pope of just one hour then stepped onto a wooden stand his hands folded in front of him, his mouth in prayer. For minutes he stood still while about 100,000 voices shouted in exultation and hands thundered applause. Around his neck was the broad, gold-embroidered stole of the papacy. A small white zucchetto, or skullcap, rested at the back of his head. Pope Paul VI chanted the ritual of the blessing, then raised his right hand slowly and said in a clear voice. We bless thee in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost. The words reverberated from loudspeakers. "Amen," responded thousands below. Then the Pope disappeared through the balcony doorway. The crowd roared continuously.

Race Crisis In Summary

LEXINGTON, N.C. (AP)—Eighteen white men and 10 Negroes were convicted Thursday of engaging in a race riot in which a white man was killed June 6. They were given suspended prison sentences and fines ranging from \$25 to \$250. Judge Charles E. Williams Jr. suspended the prison terms providing the defendants pay the fines and court costs and be on good behavior for at least three years. DALLAS (AP)—Six young white men reported to police today that they were attacked by Negro youths when their car stalled Thursday night in the south Oak Cliff section of the city. The white youths got out of their car when it stalled to push it to a service station, said Mansel Beggs, 18, the complainant. At this point, several Negroes came across the street from school grounds, the police report said. When the white youths saw the Negroes approaching, they got back into their car and locked it. The Negroes surrounded the car and started throwing bottles and hitting the windshield, breaking two door glasses, the right front one and the rear one," the report said. "One of the door windows was broken by one of the Negroes hitting it with his fist. The front window was broken by bottles. The Negroes then left and the white youths pushed the car to a service station and called police.

RECEIVES HOMAGE

Then he returned to the Sistine Chapel to again receive the homage of the College of Cardinals who had chosen him Pope. The throng was told that the new Pope had granted them a full indulgence—a remission before God of temporal punishment due for sins. Eighty princes of the church elected the Milan archbishop on the second day of their secret conclave in the Sistine Chapel. He had been regarded as a favorite. The election came on the fifth or sixth ballot. He was archbishop of Milan for the past eight years and worked closely with Pope John during his reign of four years and seven months. A Vatican diplomat he was secretary of state for Pope Pius XII. As the tidings were given to the throngs in St. Peter's Square the great bell of St. Peter's—the campanone—rang out. Other churches took up the peal. The new Pope went all the way back to the 17th century to take the name of the Roman, Paul V, who died in 1621. In this he followed the example set by John XXIII, who chose a name that had not been used for centuries.

Lodovico Montini, the eldest, is 66, and a lawyer. He served as a member of the Italian Chamber of Deputies through three parliaments and was elected to the Senate in the last election, April 28. He is married and has seven children, three boys and four girls, all but two of them married. The younger brother, Francesco Montini, 62, is a physician. He is married and has two daughters. Montini's father and mother both died in 1943. His father was a well-known journalist and Christian Democrat politician.

Crewman Killed In Tanker Crash

CHICOPEE, Mass. (AP)—A four-engine KC135 Air Force jet tanker plane crashed early today in a wooded area about three miles from Westover Air Force Base. One crewman was killed, three others paroled to a nearby hospital. The Air Force said the body of Sgt. Daniel F. Donohue, 32, of Rye, N.Y., was found in the vicinity of the wreckage. The other three crew members were reported in good condition at the base hospital. They are Maj. Harold P. Farr, 45, Tunkhannoc, Pa., the pilot; Lt. William O. West, 26, Oklahoma City, Okla., copilot; and Maj. Jerome A. School, 38, Brillion, Wis., navigator.

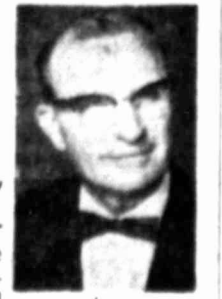

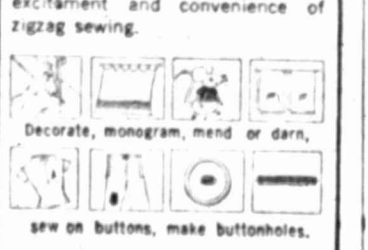

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'Hot Line' Doesn't Mean Agreement On Other Issues

WASHINGTON (AP)—U. S. officials cautioned today against expecting speedy East-West accord on other disarmament proposals just because Washington and Moscow have agreed to set up a hot line.

While the for-emergencies communications link agreed on in Geneva Thursday is a welcome step forward, they said, other more substantial arms control issues are still in deadlock at the 17-nation disarmament conference.

Looming as the next main goal in disarmament effort is a nuclear test ban. Undersecretary of State W. Averell Harriman will lead a U. S. mission to Moscow in mid-July for a renewed attempt at a treaty to outlaw atomic explosions.

So far, U. S. officials said, the Soviets have shown no sign of yielding their opposition to inspections the West says are necessary to safeguard a test ban against cheating.

The U. S.-Soviet confrontation in the Cuban missiles crisis last fall appears to have been a principal spur for the hot line agreement concluded in Geneva between disarmament negotiators Charles C. Stelle for the United States and Semyon K. Tsarapkin for the Soviet Union.

Even the urgent messages between President Kennedy and Soviet Premier Khrushchev took hours to clear through the normal diplomatic channels. At the peak of the October crisis, both governments heads resorted to public statements flashed around the world almost instantaneously by news services.

The new Washington-Moscow hot line setup will use facilities similar to those of the commercial wire services.

U. S. officials predicted the hot line facilities will be completed in 60 days.

This is the arrangement: The Pentagon and the Kremlin will have teleprinter machines linked by leased commercial circuits routed through London, Copenhagen, Stockholm and Helsinki. The Washington-to-Moscow message sending gear will be set up for English messages. The Moscow-to-Washington half will be set up for Russian, which uses a Cyrillic alphabet.

As a backstop to the full-time leased land wires, the two sides will maintain a full-time radio-telegraph circuit routed via Washington, Tangier and Moscow. This can be used for servicing the land line and for official exchanges if the land link breaks down. A third land wire circuit may be set up later if the communications experts decide it is needed.

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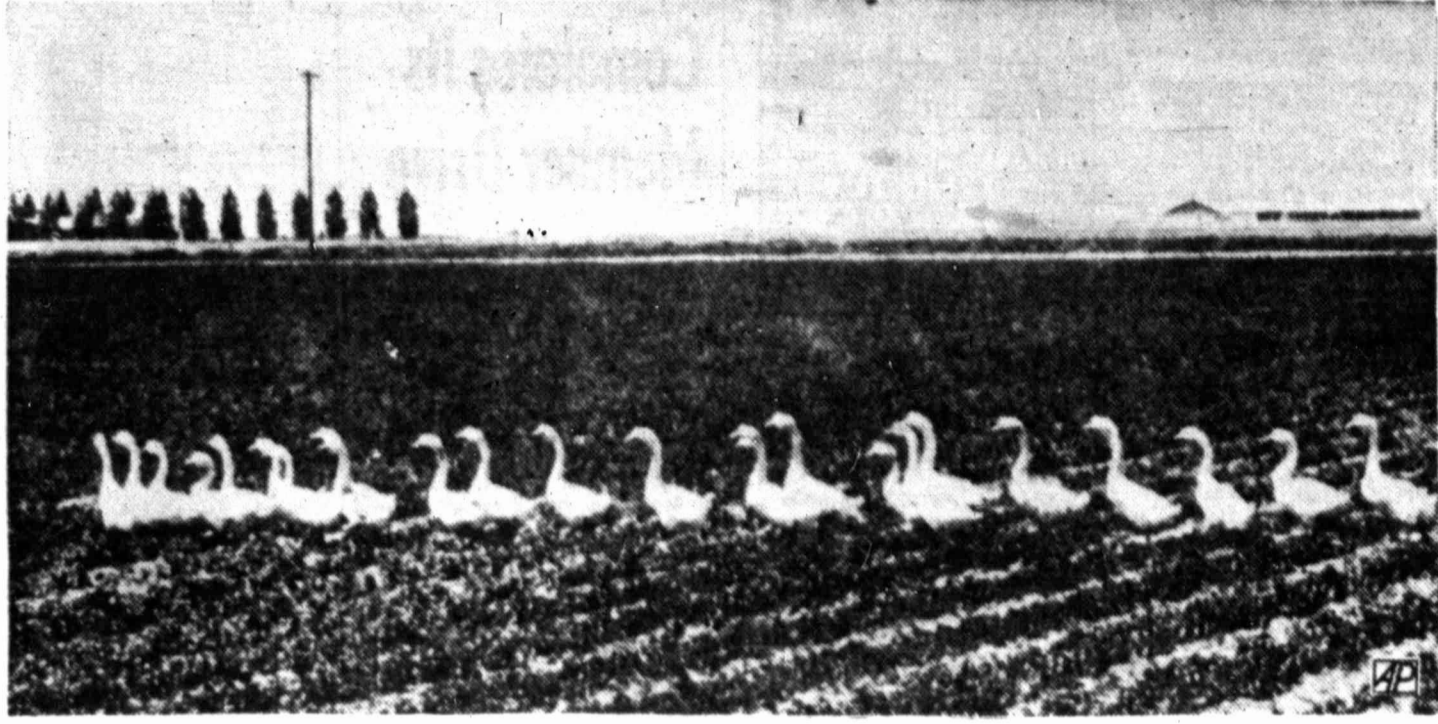

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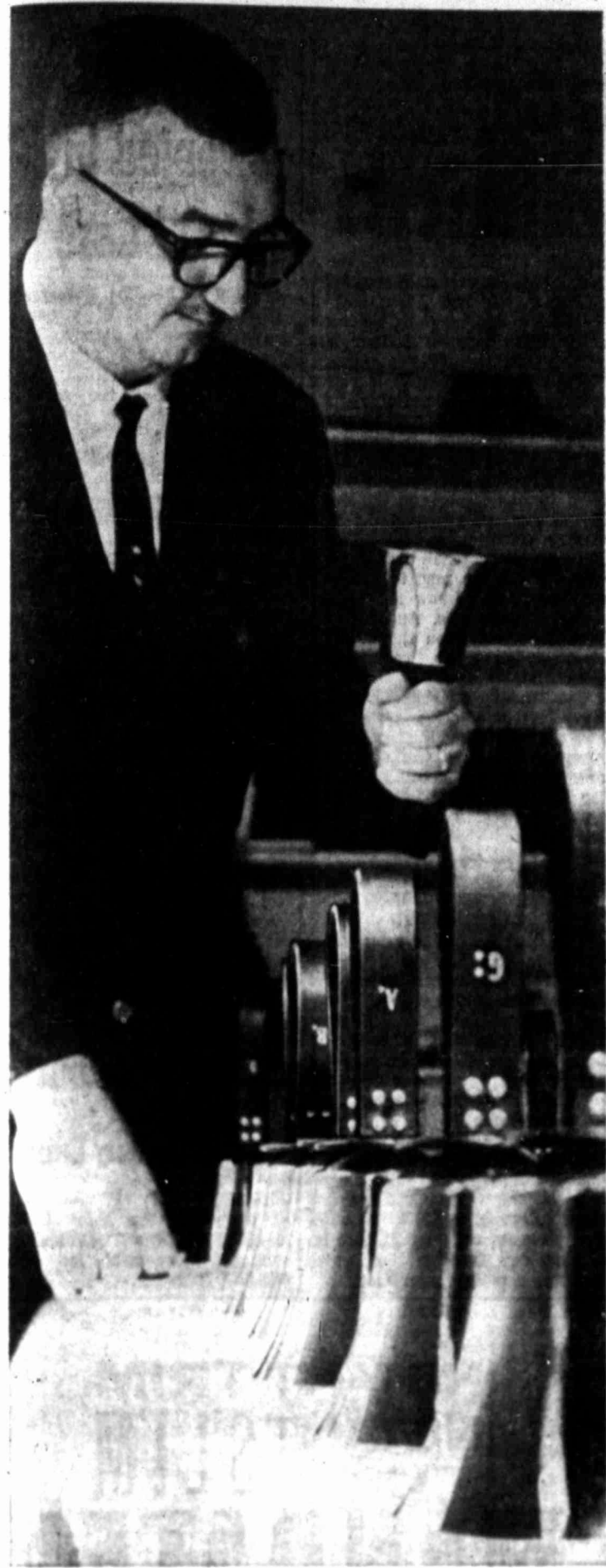
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First Methodist Is Organizing Handbell Choir



Ring the News

Ted James, music director of First Methodist Church, is ringing out the news that a new set of handbells has been donated to the church and plans are under way for three handbell choirs.

"Hear dem bells, oh don't ya hear dem bells."
So goes the time-honored spiritual, and the congregation of the First Methodist Church, will soon hear bells—all 25 of a set recently donated anonymously to the church. The bells are one of the first 100 sets made by the Schulermerich Carillons Inc. of Sellersville, Pa.
Ted James, musical director, plans to organize three bell choirs, one during the summer and two more in September.

"I'm trying to interest one of the women's Sunday school classes to organize for the summer choir," James said. In the fall, he plans to use junior high and high school students.

Through books and literature he has read, James gave some background on his new bells. They are made on the same principle as large carillons used in many churches and they are hand-made, as no mechanization has been perfected for mass production. The English and Dutch are the most prominent producers, having only the American Schulermerich Co. as competition.

The history of handbell ringing dates back over 400 years to England when tower bell ringers used handbells to practice timing sequences for change ringing, a mathematical progression in time rather than following a musical pattern or melody.

In the 18th Century, handbells were expanded in musical range and tuned to the equally tempered musical scales in North America, the first use of them was through entertainers called "Swiss Bell Ringers."

Unique for this type of bell is the handle. Unlike the English and Dutch versions made of leather, these handles are of plastic. The manufacturers found that leather wears out sooner and substituted the more serviceable plastic.

Ten players will make up the choir, with each one playing two bells—in some cases, three. The handbell choir is scheduled to accompany the vocal choirs as well as perform alone for seasonal and special music programs.

Interest in bell choirs is growing among church congregations. First Methodist in Midland and First Baptist in Lamesa already have them organized. At present,

God in His World

JEHOVAH'S CHARACTER, WORKS AND KINDNESS SHOULD LEAD US TO PRAISE HIM CONTINUALLY

By N. SPEER JONES
THE TITLE of this week's lesson is slightly misleading in that it does not indicate sufficiently the central theme around which it is built—the praise of God.
The three psalms chosen form a crescendo of development of this theme. The first (Psalm 19) is a revelation of God's character, both in Word and in deed (the universe He has created). The second (Psalm 95) indicates God's loving concern for man, and the praise man owes Him as a result of this and God's great character in general. The last (Psalm 148) expands this concept of praising God to include the whole universe, from all the hosts of heaven to—more especially—the chosen children of Israel.

meaning for man, it also represents a diminishing of the vastness of the whole universe, through man's history, to the individual man's soul.
More specifically, the word "armament" in the first verse of this psalm refers to the vault of heaven as described in the early chapter of the creation (see Genesis 1).
The substructure of verses 7-9 is also worth study. In each line is found an aspect of the Lord (law, testimony, precept, commandment, fear, ordinances), a corresponding adjective describing it (perfect, sure, right, pure, clean, true), and an effect of this aspect (revives, makes wise, rejoices, enlightens, endures, is vindicated). Verses 10 and 11 enumerate four benefits of following God's law or Word—it gives man a sense of possession, abiding pleasure, sure protection and great profit.
Psalm 95 sets forth two great reasons for worshipping and praising God—He is supreme over all other gods, and He is creator of our whole universe. It is in two parts, the first (verses 1-7) inviting worship and the second (verses 8-11) warning against the lack of it.
Verse 5 mentions the sea—a Biblical symbol for the instability and restlessness of human life.
Psalm 148 is one great anthem. Like Psalm 19, it also progresses from the general (all the hosts of the universe) to the specific (the people of Israel).

GOLDEN TEXT

"The heavens are telling the glory of God; and the firmament proclaims His handiwork."—Psalm 19:1.

These three psalms also represent a chronological build-up of the whole book of Psalms. The first is chosen from the early part of the book and was written by David. The second was written later, coming in the fourth section of the Psalter. The last comes from the very last page of the Book.
The 19th Psalm is a great one, which we have discussed often before. Within it we find another, smaller crescendo of growth, also in three parts. The first six verses reveal God in nature; verses 7-11 reveal Him in scripture; verses 12-14 reveal Him in individual experience. These constitute the three aspects of religion—natural, revealed and practical, respectively. While such a progression is a crescendo in power and

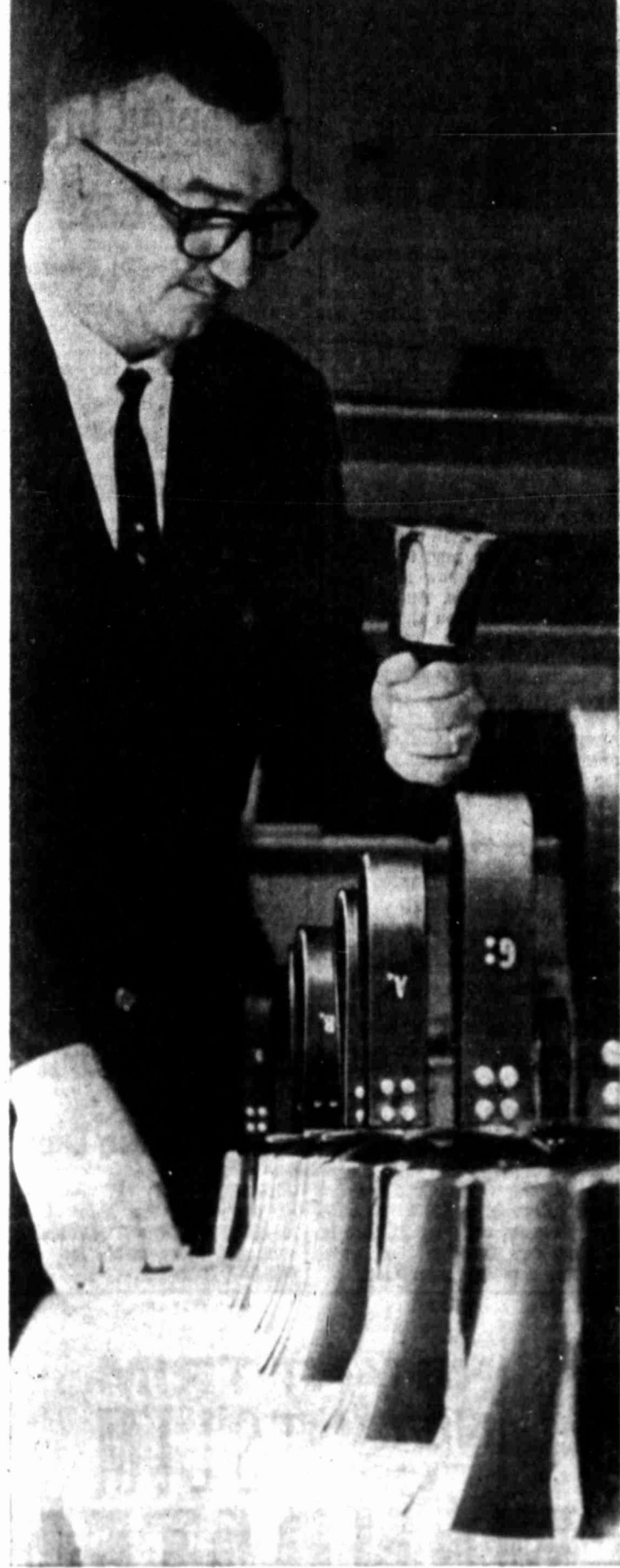

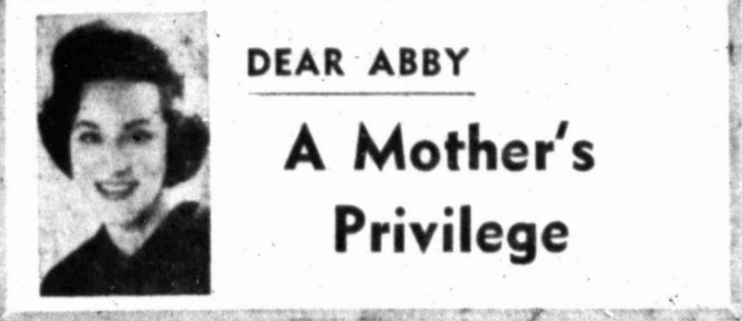

Production Of Nuclear Subs Reaches A New High

Production of nuclear submarines is almost as great as in the shooting war two decades ago. The race with the Soviet Union is growing tight.

SMALL ADVANTAGE
The United States (even with its huge building program and a head start in the nuclear submarine field) holds only a "very small numerical advantage" over the Soviet Union, Adm. George W. Anderson, Chief of Naval Operations, said recently.

The reason for the race is twofold: To build a force of Polaris submarines big enough and fast enough to help maintain the missile lead over the Soviet Union; to build a force of deep-diving, high-speed, far-roaming attack submarines to cope with the Kremlin's own Polaris-type sub threat to American cities.

The U.S. Navy fleet has 28 atomic-powered submarines—11 Polaris, one guided missile craft; 16 attack subs.

The Navy estimates that since the Nautilus backed away from a pier and sent the historic message "under way on nuclear power" on Jan. 17, 1955, the Navy's atomic submarines have steamed about 2.25 million miles, mostly underwater.

American atomic submarines have girdled the globe submerged, voyaged under the ice of the North Pole. They wait at stations, under the ocean waves, with missiles in their tubes, within range of the Soviet Union. They roam deep and far to guard against hostile submarines approaching American shores or shipping.

IN PROGRAM
A half dozen shipyards are in the nuclear submarine building program, and the rate of constructing the atomic fleet may prove to be faster than crews can be provided.

Manning 86 atomic submarines will require more than 16,000 men—each specialized in the already specialized technique of handling submarines. Many will come from conventional submarines after training in operation of nuclear power plants and nuclear weapons, both missiles and torpedoes.

The Navy foresaw the training problem as soon as it conceived the idea for a nuclear-powered submarine. Schools were started. About 2,000 men are in classes at any one time, but the Navy hopes that by next year the size of the classes can begin to diminish.

It is easier to man the programmed 44 attack submarines than the 41 Polaris ships.

The attack submarine has a crew of 80 to 100 men, compared with the 260 for a Polaris.

But the conditions of work are different. A Polaris submarine takes station and may remain submerged continuously for 60 days. Although the crews rotate, the ship itself remains overseas for prolonged periods. The George Washington, first of the Polaris ships deployed, has pined up more than 2½ years overseas.

GLAMOR WEARS OFF
The glamor of Polaris service may be wearing off. Navy officials say the morale of crews re-

turns is almost as great as in the shooting war two decades ago. The race with the Soviet Union is growing tight.

AN EXAMPLE
Example: One Polaris missile costs slightly more than \$1 million. There are 16 missiles in each submarine, others stockpiled ashore.

Here is the schedule for Saturday. The Polaris submarine Tecumseh and the attack submarine Flasher launched (as near simultaneously as possible) at the Groton, Conn., yard of Electric Boat Division, General Dynamics Corp. The John C. Calhoun, Polaris ship, at the Virginia yards of the Newport News Shipbuilding and Dry Dock Company.

The Polaris submarine Daniel Boone at the Navy's Mare Island, Calif., yard.

For the next several years, atomic powered submarines—Polaris and attack—will be delivered to the fleet at the rate of one a month. This doesn't mean that they will be launched at that rate. The Navy has a backlog of new submarines in the water to be completed and commissioned. By Saturday night, the total of launched submarines, awaiting completion and commission, will be 12.

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Testimony Accepted In Hot Oil Case

TYLER (AP)—The government succeeded in trial of a hot oil case Thursday in entering testimony that the 2-X well on the L. Givens lease in Rusk County was bottomed on the adjoining Shell-Cantrill lease.

This testimony by W. H. Audley of Tulsa, seismologist for Century Geophysical Co., drew defense objections, but U.S. Dist. Judge Joe Sheehy allowed it to stand.

Audley was the principal witness at an afternoon session in the trial of E. B. Hearn Sr. of Houston and E. B. Hearn Jr. and Daryl Gaumer of Longview.

A 29-count indictment accuses the three men, along with the Associates Drilling Co., of interstate transportation of illegally produced oil, conspiracy and filing false production reports.

Prosecutors have charged that the 2-X well on the Givens lease was drilled to angle underneath the Shell lease. But Thursday was the first time the government was able to keep testimony to that effect in the record.

Audley said seismograph methods pinpointed the bottom of the 2-X well. He said this was done by setting off blasts in three wells on the Shell lease.

Earlier in the day Judge Sheehy took under study a defense objection to testimony concerning a gamma ray survey of the 2-X well.

Conviction In Oil Fraud Trial

MEMPHIS, Tenn. (AP)—Defense lawyers moved for a new trial after a criminal court jury found an Abilene, Tex., geologist guilty Thursday night of fraudulently selling stock in a worthless oil well.

After more than three hours of deliberation, the jury set punishment for George Hamilton Fewell at \$1,250 fine.

Judge Sam Campbell set a new trial hearing for July 30 and continued Fewell's bond at \$3,000.

Fewell was charged with misrepresenting some property, where three dry holes had previously been drilled, and with falsely telling investors he had been cleared by the Tennessee Banking and Insurance Commission.

Defense lawyer Ike Clinto said the investors, who claim to have lost \$1,942 to \$3,844 each in the venture, were never promised a return on their money.

They were told they were putting up funds to drill a specific well and were not acquiring a lease in any property, he said.

Fewell and a business associate in the oil venture, W. A. Lewis of Denton, Tex., face trial in federal court July 1 on charges of failing to register with the Securities and Exchange Commission, using interstate mails and transportation to defraud, and conspiracy.

Cool Reception For Summer

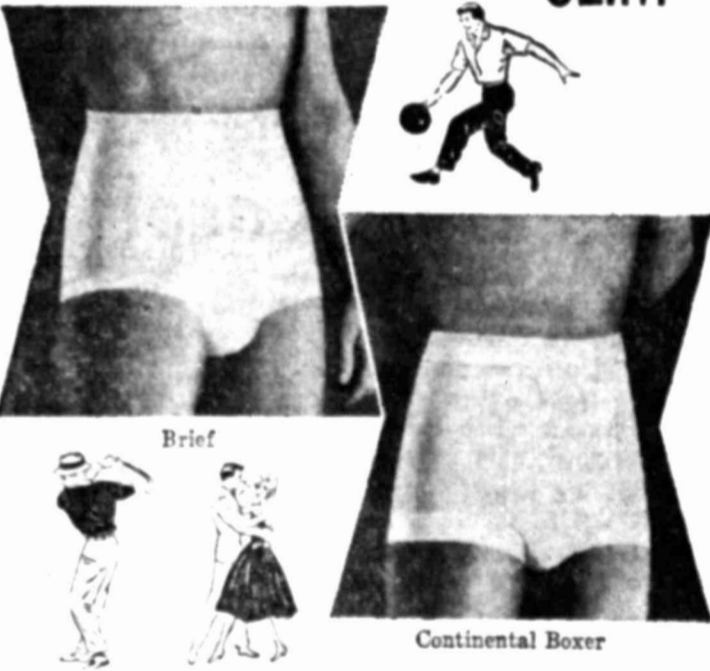

Baptists Seek Public School Bible Reading

HARLINGEN, Tex. (AP)—The Mexican Baptist Convention of Texas adopted a resolution urging the state's two senators to introduce a bill permitting Bible reading in public schools.

Directing that telegrams to this effect be sent to Sens. John Tower and Ralph Yarborough, the resolution was adopted Thursday night by a slim majority vote of convention delegates.

It suggested that the Bible's Old Testament be read without comment in opening exercises of public schools.

"That section of the Bible would be acceptable to either evangelicals, Catholics or Jews," the resolution stated.

It asserted that a Supreme Court decision earlier this week on Bible reading in public schools "favors atheism."

About 150 Latin Americans attending the convention voted for the resolution and approximately 100 opposed it. Balloting followed an hour of debate.

The Rev. Ricardo Alvarez led opponents of the resolution, arguing that the Supreme Court decision was a step in the direction of guaranteeing separation of church and state.

The Rev. Mr. Alvarez, pastor of the First Mexican Baptist Church here, said that as a Baptist he did not believe the Old Testament should be separated from the New Testament. He said the Supreme Court decision did not outlaw Bible reading as such but banned only compulsory Bible reading.

Named convention president was the Rev. Carlos Paredes, pastor of the First Mexican Baptist Church in Austin. Other officers are the Rev. Cirio Garcia of Austin, secretary, the Rev. Ruben Hernandez of Del Rio, training union president, and the Rev. Roberto Garcia of Dallas, brotherhood president.

Delegates selected Lubbock as the site for their 1964 meeting. Abilene for the 1966 assembly and Dallas for the 1968 meeting. Sites for the 1965 and 1967 gatherings will be chosen next year.

Communications Box Ready For Use By First On Moon

BALTIMORE, Md. (AP)—Although future space travelers may find moon-to-earth communications as simple as the roadside telephone, lunar pioneers will have to settle for something a little more complex.

Anticipating this need, the systems management division of Westinghouse Electric Corp. has developed a complete communications package for use by America's first man-on-the-moon.

Weighing some 450 pounds, the system could be hauled aloft as early as 1965, carried by the Saturn C1B rocket. It could, if necessary, remain dormant on the moon's surface for a year before being activated.

Although designed primarily for a "soft" landing, using retro-rockets to cushion its descent, the package could be modified to withstand a lunar landing force of 20 to 30 times the force of gravity.

In its operational position, the system mock-up looks for all the world like a toy space robot.

A large circular cone or dish extends from a telescoping mast. The mast, in turn, projects from the main housing, which resembles a hat box with louvers on top.

The dish is the antenna for two-way voice communications, television and telemetry data between earth and moon. It rotates slowly, always aimed toward the earth, tracking it automatically by means of infra-red rays.

A small antenna mounted on the circumference of the dish receives the command signal from earth when the system is to be made operational.

An antenna, 75 to 100 feet high

when fully erected, extends from the main housing to pick up radio, television and telemetry data signals from lunar explorers for relay to earth.

Two television cameras are mounted on opposite edges of the base.

Should it precede a manned lunar expedition, the system would carry with it a system of nuclear auxiliary power. This nuclear energy would be sufficient to raise the antennas and make the system operational upon command from earth. It also would keep the instruments warm during the lunar night, when temperatures drop to minus 2,000 degrees.

The louvers, or veins, which operate like a venetian blind, open during the lunar day to permit escape of the heat developed by

the system's generators. At night, they close to contain this same heat.

The main power plant for the package operates from hydrazine gas.

Although dormant when pressurized, the gas rapidly decomposes upon release and generates a tremendous amount of heat which operates a piston engine, similar to that in a car. The engine, in turn, powers a turbine to generate the electrical power needed for the communications system.

In a related project, Westinghouse engineers are developing an unmanned lunar exploration vehicle dubbed "Rover."

Weighing some 3,000 pounds, it could make a lunar landing via the Saturn 5 rocket and roam the moon's surface at four miles per hour up to 100 miles before its hydrazine engine expired.

Three more might be obtained in clubs, if declarer were lucky enough to find East with the ace and one. He could then lead a club from dummy thru East and win the first trick with his queen. A club return is then ducked in both hands felling the ace and establishing the rest of the suit.
Declarer led a spade to dummy's ace and returned the deuce of clubs. East was forced to play low and South's queen won the trick. Declarer was about to play a second club when he perceived an alternative prospect. With the club in, he now had seven tricks and needed only two more. If East had either a singleton diamond honor or the doubleton king-queen, then two additional tricks could be established in that suit.
At no additional cost, South decided to cash the diamond ace just to see what happened. East was fully aware of the consequences for his side if declarer played another club and, in an effort to convince his opponent that richer rewards lay elsewhere, he casually dropped the king of diamonds under South's ace. The results of this play were far reaching: Declarer confidently continued with the seven of diamonds permitting it to ride.
East took the trick with the ten of diamonds and another round of hearts cleared South's last stopper. There was no way for declarer to establish his ninth trick in time anymore, and he went down instead to a two trick defeat.

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Crows Adapt To Civilization

STANFORD Calif. (AP)—Crows are such adaptable feeders that they patronize hot dog stands in Hollywood, scientists were told today.

"The voice of the crow is now part of city life" and their robbing of the nests of mocking birds and jays has brought a new noise to urban communities—a new phenomenon, Roland East Ross of Los Angeles State College told the 44th annual meeting of the Pacific division, American Association for the Advancement of Science.

"Crows have survived by adaptation and dispersion," he said. "Feeding habits have changed."

Now in some communities, North Hollywood for instance, "their first flight mornings is to hot dog stands, night gas stations and drive-in movie lots for food debris and light-killed insects before cleanup crews arrive," Ross reported.
