A native of Oklahoma by birth, Randel moved to Dalhart while he was a young boy. His father was a farmer and his mother taught school. He was one of four children-he has one brother and two sisters, all of whom are living. He

took a job with the old Dalhart field station in June, 1921. He was supposed to have been just a "summer" worker at the station. Graduating the following year, he re-enrolled for post graduate courses and it was in 1923 that he became a full-time employe of the USDA. He remained at Dalhart until 1951 working as a research technician, working on crop variety and rotation. From 1948 until

1951 (the year the station was

closed), he was in charge of its operations. He came to Big Spring that year to join the staff of the U.S. Field Station here. He has spent most of his time collecting field data on soil and water conservation projects and he is credited by the department with making many keen observations of great importance in research projects. Because of the nature of his work, he has devoted much time to compiling weather data-an enterprise in

terest. Few men know as much about weather records for this area as Randel and his interest in the work never lags.

He and Mrs. Randel live at 207 Jefferson. Connie. their daughter. graduated from Big Spring High School this year. She is planning to study commercial art-a field in which her brother, Kent, is already engaged. Her other brother, Gaylord, is an engineer and works for Chance Vought in Dallas. Both are graduates of Texas Tech.

All in all, it was a big afternoon for the veteran USDA worker. But today is another day. And if you call out to the station and ask for him, the operator will probably tell you that she is sorry she can't get in touch with him.

"Mr. Randel," she will say, "is out in the fields.

Working, she might add, toward another 10 years of service for agriculture in West Texas.

Lyndon Urges Labor To Join Jobless Fight

CHICAGO (AP)-Vice President Lyndon B. Johnson called on labor today to join with business and government to "put prejudice, partisanship and pessimism" aside in attacking the unemployment problem.

Johnson said in a speech prepared for the National Retail Clerks Inion that the United States cannot "submit to the doctrine that in these prosperous times the present level of unemployment is an 'acceptable' level.'

'We have nearly as many unfilled jobs as we have unememployed workers, he said. "The workers are not able to fill the placency about this condition because it will not be corrected by time-or by temporizing."



We need to be creating nearly 100,000 new jobs each week-but we are falling far short of that mark. La bor and industry and government together must do much more to answer this need.

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
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
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
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



He presents-from the committee records in Congress, the speeches of members, the official acts-undisputed evidence concerning the exact method by which Southern legislatures were coerced in to "ratifying" the Fourteenth Amendment. Mr Kilpatrick writes

"ON JULY 20, 1868, Secretary of State Seward issued a cautious proclamation certifying that the Fourteenth Amendment had been ratified. There were, he surmised IT states then 'in the union' Twenty-eight, by Seward's count, had approved the amendment, but he was doubtful about the whole affair. Among his 28 were Arkansas Florida North Carolina Louisiana, and South Carolina, where ratification had been sanctioned by 'newly constituted and newly established bodies allowing themselves to be acting as the legislatures' of these states If their resolutions were valid, and if the original ratifications of Ohio and New Jersey. were still valid notwithstanding their subsequent withdrawals, the amendment was a part of the Constitution

"ON THE FOLLOWING day, July 21, Congress passed a joint resolution to resolve Seward's doubts. It ordered him to declare the amendment unconditionally adopted, and on July 28, adding the names of Alahama and Georgia, whose notifications had just been received, Seward declared the Fourteenth officially a part of the Constitution

"Was the Fourteenth Amendment thus legally and constitutionally added to the Constitution in 1868° It is exceedingly doubtful. Neither a resolution of the Congress nor a proclamation of a secretary of state can supersede the Constitution itself. If the states of Arkansas. Florida. North Carolina, Alabama, South Caroli-

Roman authorities are preparing for such a vast throng of the faithful, as well as hordes of tourists, to pour into the great square and the upper end of the Via Della Conciliazione next Sunday afternoon when the triple crown of the Papacy will be placed on the head of the

NEVER BEFORE have so many persons been actual witnesses of a Papal coronation Rome is jubilant at the startling decision of Paul VI to be crowned on the wide porch of the Basilica-enabling 10 times as many persons to attend as could have crowded into the Basilica it-

It is estimated the Basilica of St. Peter's, the largest church in Christendom, can hold 70.000 persons. However, with the stands for the Ecumenical Council still in place, there now is space for only about 50,000

THE NEW POPE will be crowned at an improvised altar on the wide porch that fronts the Basilica and from which a long, wide flight of steps leads down into the square. By this decision the new Pontiff has greatly endeared himself to the Romans at the very start of his reign As the Bishop of Rome, the Pope always is possessively regarded by the Romans

as their own shepherd Pope Paul has set his coronation for 6 p.m. Sunday, when the head of the Roman day begins to fade and a little breeze can be expected in the square. This is regarded as further evidence of his

AS A BACKDROP for his coronation Pope Paul is trading the storied magnifiglories of the square - more formally known as the Piazza di San Pietro.

In reality, the piazza is not a square but a huge, flat bowl which can hold 300,-000 persons. Its glory is the great colonades, designed by Bernini, that flank the facade of St. Peter's The colonades are like two great arms flung wide to bless and embrace the world.

THESE SEMI-CIRCULAR colonades comprise 284 soaring columns. In ranks of four, plus 83 Doric pillars, 182 colossal, statues of the saints stand guard on the balustrades high above the square

WASHINGTON - Respectability has often fought with Revolution. An existing order, slow but sure in its decency and justice, has many times been confronted "in the streets" by the spirit of vengeance and by demands for instant reform of undoubted and long - lasting wrongs. Often, also, this conflict has been between two races, one standing for overdue redress by violence, the other standing for measured adjustment.

WELL, THE BATTLE has not always gone to the attackers and against the defenders of an admittedly imperfect system, for there is a lot of courage in respectability. One of the finest parables to illustrate this truth was written by Charles Dickens in "A Tale of Two Cities" when he described that fight to the death between Miss Pross, the old maid English governess, and Madame Defarge, the terrible, tavern - keeping Queen of the Guillotine. They met, face to face, in mortal combat in an upstairs apartment of a deserted building in Paris at the height of the Terror.

CONSIDER THE adversaries, and think of them in terms of today's Negro revolution against the white man's sometimes muddling way of running our free country. The analogy is not an exact one, but it is serviceable.

Miss Pross, says Dickens, "had never struck a blow in her life." Madame Defarge was stained with the blood of aristocrats whom she had sent to the executioner. The skinny old maid was defending the getaway of her beloved Lucie, her "Ladybird", for whom she had long been a household retainer. Madame Defarge, grim and tough as "the wife of Lucifer", yearned for one extra victim under the death-dealing knife. Miss Pross belonged to a system of capitalism and caste. Madame Defarge was the avenger of discrimination and injustice, a gun-

She, understandably but vindictively, is determined upon destruction of an existing order. It would have been far better if they hadn't had to fight, and maybe in our enlightened day the fight can be averted-but in the parable, and just for the record, Miss Pross acquitted herself very well.



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



Water Project Order Appealed

AUSTIN (AP)-Opponents of a \$12.5 million dam to supply Wichita Falls water appealed a court order authorizing the project Tuesday

Dist. Judge Jack Roberts of Austin upheld Texas Water Commission approval of a permit to construct the project on the Little Wichita River

The project is opposed by Glenn and Mrs. Rosalie Halsell of Clay County, whose land will be covered by the proposed reservoir.

Asst. Atty. Gen Frank Booth said the case is the first appeal of a water commission order to be based on merits of the case instead of procedure.

Roberts upheld the state's contention that the dam permit was granted on the basis of substan-

Alex Pope, Fort Worth lawyer for the Halsells, argued that the commission acted without substantial evidence, several commission rules were not followed and the permit wrongly allows diversion of water from one watershed to another.

The city of Wichita Falls wants to build the 288,000 acre-foot reservoir on land which includes the Halsell Ranch

The Halsells and the Red River Authority contended at a commission hearing in February, 1962, that the reservoir should be developed at a site near Ringgold which would provide more water

BERLIN (AP) - The East German Communists are trying to drum up a big show for Soviet Premier Khrushchev's visit to East Berlin Friday in a bid to match President Kennedy's reception in West Berlin.

Berlin experts predicted that for Khrushchev's seventh visit East Berliners would heed a Communist appeal to 'decorate houses, streets, squares and factories with the red flags of the working class," but would do so sullenly

Would he confine himself to making a reply to Kennedy's pledge of support for West Berlin and Western Europe?

Or would he make some move that would launch a new crisis? Khrushchev could unveil the peace treaty he has been promising the East Germans for 412 years. 


