THIS PAST WEEK, the first indication was given that the national push to convert Americans to the metric system was about to be shelved, along with the Edsel and other museum pieces.

"The metric system has been a tremendous flop," states the former head of a state council which was set up to preach the system as "the way of the future."

"People just want to keep their quarts and gallons and stuff," says Glenn Brown, who is former chairman of the Texas Metric System Advisory Council.

The council was set up by the 1977 Texas Legislature, to aid a national effort to convert to the metric system. But as of September 30, the federal equivalent of the board goes out of business.

President Ronald Reagan, while thanking federal board members for their efforts, has apparently realized that Americans want little to do with the way most of the rest of the world measures things.

The Texas Metric System Advisory Council is scheduled to stay in business until August of 1983, but Charles Forester of Austin, a board member, predicts that it will just "fade away."

"There was a real need a few years ago for a Metric Advisory Council, because it did appear that we'd be involved in the conversion process. I don't know what the reasons were that it went away. Maybe inflation. The American public had other things to think about," Forester said.

The Austin official, who is supervisor of weights and measures for the Texas Department of Agriculture, said the main purpose of the council was "to react to business questions about the metric system. There was nothing, basically, to respond to," he said.

Brown, who also is executive vice president of the Dairy Products Institute of Texas, said that many industries, including the dairy industry, found the cost of conversion prohibitive.

"It's not worth all that extra cost to the consumer at a time when everyone is paying plenty for everything," he said.

However, there are still a few champions for the metric "mess," including some who argue that our failure to convert has cost America in foreign trade, a statement we doubt very seriously.

William Nicol of Dallas, current chairman of the soon-to-be defunct state committee, argues in favor of metric, and points out that changes were made in track and field events, to conform to international competition.

But Cleburn Price, University of Texas track coach, says the metric move has been a failure, anyway you measure it. "By 1985 or 1986 we'll be back to yards," predicted Price, who is a member of the committee which sets rules for college track and field.

"I was on the committee when we voted to go to meters. I thought the whole country was going to meters. Obviously, we're not," Price says.

So, if you're like Ye Editor, and balked at the thought of learning a new-fangled method of measurement, perhaps we won't all be in the "dark ages" after all. Maybe—just maybe—for once, the government officials will realize that they invented a white elephant, and the rest of the country just wasn't ready to accept it.

FI Board Votes 10¢ Dividend

A special cash dividend of ten cents per share on Friona Industries, Inc. common stock was voted by the Company's board of directors meeting in Colorado Springs, Colorado.

At the same time, the board approved the regular quarterly cash dividend of ten cents per share on the common stock.

"Management and the board believe that the Company's financial performance in the 1982 fiscal year, which ended June 30, 1982, justifies this special dividend for our stockholders," said Ron Davenport, chairman, president and chief executive officer.

The special dividend is payable September 29, 1982, to shareholders of record as of September 10, 1982, and the regular quarterly dividend is payable November 3, 1982, to shareholders of record as of October 15, 1982.

Recently, the Company reported that improved profitability from the sale of company-owned cattle, particularly in the fourth quarter, and continued expansion of meat processing and distribution operations enabled Friona Industries, Inc. to generate net earnings of \$3,425,000, or \$1.57 per share, on sales of \$205 million for its fiscal year ended June 30, 1982.

This was a 51 per cent increase in net earnings and 8 per cent higher sales than in the prior fiscal year when net earnings were \$2,262,000, or \$1.02 per share, on sales of \$190 million. "All of our industry segments achieved good profitability," said Ron Davenport.

Friona Industries, headquartered in Friona, Texas, is engaged in meat processing and distribution; the manufacture and sale of commercial cattle feeds; the retail marketing of animal health supplies; the custom feeding of customer-owned cattle; the purchase, fattening and sale of cattle owned by the Company, and the operation of grain facilities.

The Company's common stock is traded on the American Stock Exchange under the symbol FI.

It definitely bids to be a different setting for the two schools, both of which have been used to having losing seasons in recent years. River Road will definitely have its best team in its history, and should be a challenger for the District 1-AAA title, or at least a playoff spot.

The Chieftains, after turning around their 17-game losing streak in 1981, have their eyes on a winning season and would like to make the state playoffs for the first time since 1965.

"I have been real pleased with our scrimmages, but we'll find out more from a real game situation. Our defense has really been sharp (the Chieftains allowed less than two yards per play against Springlake), and our offense is definitely ahead of last year at this point," said Coach Tommy Moss.

Although the Chieftains appeared to have their work cut out for them by playing the tough River Road Wildcats on their home turf in the season opener, Moss said he felt that the team would have a performance of which the fans could be proud, regardless of the score.

Springer Named Head Of National Council

Berl M. Springer, chairman of the board and chief executive officer of Southwestern Public Service Company, was inaugurated recently in Denver as chairman of the board of directors of the National Food and Energy Council.

The National Food and Energy Council (NFECE) is a non-profit "think tank" and educational organization headquartered at Columbia, Missouri. Its focus is on energy supplies and energy use in food production, food processing, and food distribution systems in the U.S.

Springer characterizes NFECE as an "organization dedicated to helping the agri-business industry and all the people that industry serves."

Springer's inauguration will open a three-day annual conference in Denver.

"The conference was called to address critical issues that affect our nation's ability to produce adequate food and energy supplies on a timely basis," said Ken McFate, NFECE president.

Subjects to be discussed are vitally important to people in Southwestern Public Service Company's service area, Springer pointed out. Topics and speakers include:

"Water Availability, Use and Distribution," addressed by Senator Maurice Kremer, chairman of the Public Works Committee, Nebraska Legislature, Lincoln, Nebraska.

"A Timely Look at the Future of Farming," by George Stone, president, National Farmers Union, Denver.

"Effective Management of Irrigation Loads," by Roland Skinner, manager, Northwest Rural Public Power District, Hay Springs, Nebraska.

"Optimizing Prime Land Use for Food Production," J. Evan Goulding, Commissioner, Colorado State Department of Agriculture.

"Timely Energy Supplies: Expectations of the Food Industry," Frank Hackmann, of Ralston Purina Company, St. Louis, and chairman of the energy committee of the Grocery Manufacturers Association.

"The Nation's Economy and World Population: Impact on Food and Energy Supplies," by Berry Hughes, Associate Professor, Graduate School of International Studies, University of Denver.

"Coal Severance Taxes and Coal Exports," Dr. Kenneth Lindner, secretary, Department of Administration, Madison, Wisconsin.

Springer said, "One of the great responsibilities we as members of the National Food and Energy Council have taken on is to offer advice—sound, researched, thoughtful council—to both on-the-farm and off-the-farm food system managers."

"Part of what we want them to understand is that our nation's food

system cannot be separated from and cannot function without equally strong energy systems.

"Also, we distribute a lot of information about wise management and efficient use of energy in the food system," Springer said.

The NFECE for years has been telling farmers to use minimum tillage, he said. The Council also suggests farmers should grow genetically engineered crops which require less nutrient from the soil and which require less water.

"Because our petroleum fuel resources are finite—there will be an end to them, someday—we're counseling food producers to hold petroleum fuels in reserve for only the largest mobile field requirements," Springer continued. "We're telling farmers and other managers throughout the food system, 'Whenever possible, substitute electricity—manufactured from our truly abundant fuels, such as coal—to power your stationary operations.'"

The trustees of the Lakeview school district called a mass meeting of the patrons of that school for a discussion of the teacher situation and the state aid set-up of the district, and when it was learned that they could not maintain a two-teacher school, they voted to bring all pupils of the district to the Friona school this year. One additional teacher was required in the grade school in order to take care of the added enrollment.

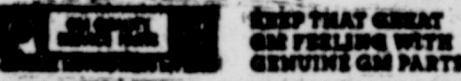

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

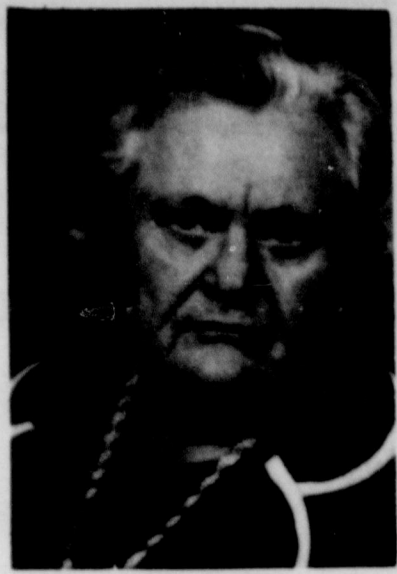
Pallbearers were grandsons, Ricky, Dennis, Gordon, Gary, Keith and Jerry Carter, and a great-grandson, Darcy Carter.

Surgeon General Gives Warning

The recently published Surgeon General's report on smoking and health for the first time warns non-smokers about exposure to second-hand smoke and the risk of developing lung cancer said K. Joy Robertson, M.D., president of the American Lung Association of Texas.

"It acknowledges that health risks resulting from involuntary smoke exposure are a serious public health concern and urges non-smokers to avoid exposure to second-hand tobacco smoke," Robertson said.

The report, the fourteenth to be issued by the Public Health Service, was released at a Washington press conference called by Surgeon General Everett C. Koop, M.D.

It describes three epidemiological studies which examined passive or involuntary smoking in 1981. Evidence from two of the studies demonstrated a statistically significant correlation between involuntary

smoking and lung cancer risk in non-smoking wives of husbands who smoked. A third noted a positive association that was not statistically significant.

According to Robertson, the report also notes that lung cancer, first correlated with smoking over 50 years ago, is the single largest contributor to the total cancer death rate. Lung cancer alone accounts for 25 per cent of all cancer deaths in this country, and an estimated 85 per cent of lung cancer cases are due to cigarette smoking.

"We are alarmed that the lung cancer death rate for women is increasing. Perhaps as early as next year, it will surpass the breast cancer death rate," Robertson said.

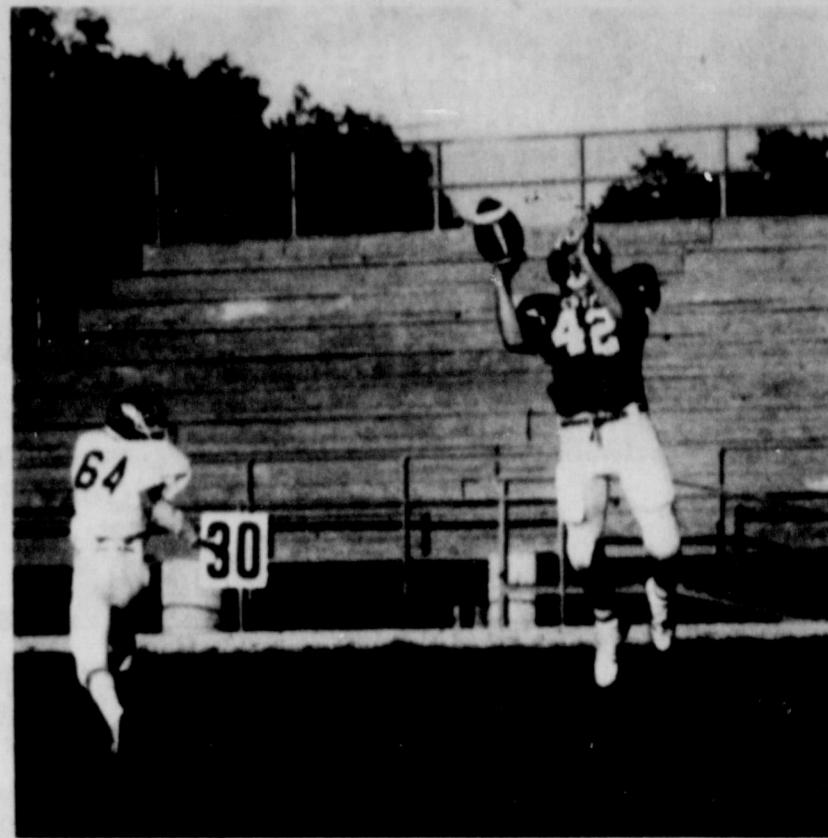

Strake Talk

TWO TERMS IS ENOUGH

Texans have a healthy skepticism of their elected officials, a wariness of entrenched power that they have embodied in the state constitution. They have historically refused to keep top state officeholders more than a few terms.

Now my opponent comes along, having spent nearly ten years in the Lt. Governor's office, one of the top state policy-making offices. Mr. Hobby wants yet another term to make it 14 years in that crucial job. That is unprecedented. Never in Texas' history has any Lt. Governor served that long—or wanted to.

His desire, frankly, puzzles me. You would think he would have other goals, other challenges he might want to tackle. As his primary opponent this year said, "If he had anything to get done, you'd think he would have done it by now."

My opponent will tell you that experience is what counts. I think voters need

to look at the experience they have had with him. After ten years, our highways are in bad shape, the quality of education has declined, we still do not have a new, statewide water plan and he has refused to tackle the growing crime problem. We can't afford more of that kind of experience.

I have a long-held belief in what I call the citizen-politician: someone who holds a job, serves his country or state for a reasonable time, then returns to that job and private life. For that reason, the first order of business after I am elected will be to have a constitutional amendment introduced in the legislature limiting the Lt. Governor to two terms—eight years. That is enough time for anyone. Too great a concentration of power for too long is bad. That is a principle of democracy.

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Phacoemulsification (Fak-e-o-E-mul-si-fi-c-a-shun) is a new technique being used to remove cataracts. This technique is becoming more popular because a smaller incision can be used and the eye heals much faster. Because of the faster healing time, the patient's vision is restored faster.

Only an 1/8 inch incision is needed when using this method of cataract surgery. After the incision is made, the central part of the cataract is removed using a special probe. Only patients in whom the cornea is free of disease, the pupil is able to dilate fully, and the anterior chamber is of normal depth can be considered for the operation.

PROPOSICION NUMERO 1 EN LA BOLETA

Resolución Conjunta de la Cámara de Representantes 1 propone una enmienda constitucional que prohíba cualquier impuesto estatal por avalúo. Los recibos de impuestos estatales por avalúo anteriormente autorizados que son cobrados después de la fecha efectiva de la propuesta enmienda a esta sección serán depositados al crédito del fondo general del condado que cobra los impuestos y pueden ser gastados para los fines del condado. Los impuestos que son cobrados antes de esa fecha serán distribuidos por la Legislatura entre las instituciones educativas que son elegibles para recibir esos fondos bajo ley previa. La propuesta enmienda también revoca una sección de la Constitución que impone un impuesto por avalúo para un fondo para la construcción de 17 colegios y universidades estatales. "La enmienda constitucional que revoca el impuesto estatal sobre la propiedad."

PROPOSICION NUMERO 2 EN LA BOLETA

Resolución Conjunta de la Cámara de Representantes 2 tal como fue enmendada por Resolución Conjunta del Senado 10 propone una enmienda constitucional que elimine el límite de \$80,000,000 de asistencia pública estatal durante cualquier año fiscal.

La enmienda establecerá el límite de gastos de asistencia pública estatal a \$160,000,000 para el bienio 1982-1983.

Además la enmienda provee que para cada bienio subsiguiente la cantidad máxima que se pueda gastar en asistencia pública no será en exceso de 1% del presupuesto estatal.

PROPOSICION NUMERO 4 EN LA BOLETA

Resolución Conjunta de la Cámara de Representantes 4 propone una enmienda constitucional que autorice a la Legislatura establecer un límite de cuatro años para los plazos de ciertos distritos de agua y distritos de conservación y reclamación.

La propuesta enmienda aparecerá en la boleta como sigue:

"La enmienda constitucional que autoriza a la Legislatura proveer plazos de no más de cuatro años para los miembros de las juntas gubernamentales de ciertos distritos de agua y distritos de conservación y reclamación."

PROPOSICION NUMERO 5 EN LA BOLETA

Resolución Conjunta No. 119 de la Cámara de Representantes propone una enmienda constitucional que autorice a los condados de Tarrant y Bee celebrar elecciones en los dos condados para anular por mayoría el oficio de tesoroero del condado.

Si se anula el oficio de tesoroero del condado, se cederán los deberes, poderes y funciones de dicho oficio al auditor del condado o al sucesor de las funciones del auditor.

"La enmienda constitucional que anula el oficio de tesoroero del condado en los condados de Tarrant y Bee."

PROPOSICION NUMERO 6 EN LA BOLETA

Resolución Conjunta del Senado 6 propone una enmienda constitucional que aumente el límite de la tarifa constitucional de interés en los bonos generales estatales de obligación de 6% a 12%. Sin embargo, el nuevo límite de 12% no se aplica a bonos emitidos de la Junta de Terrenos para Veteranos.

La propuesta enmienda aparecerá en la boleta como sigue:

"La enmienda constitucional que aumenta la tarifa máxima de interés que se permite en los bonos generales estatales de obligación a un promedio ponderado de 12% de interés anual."

PUBLIC NOTICE BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS GENERAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 2, 1982

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 1 proposes a constitutional amendment that prohibits any state ad valorem tax. Receipts from previously authorized state ad valorem taxes that are collected after the effective date of the proposed amendment shall be deposited to the credit of the general fund of the county collecting the taxes and may be expended for county purposes. Taxes collected before that date shall be distributed by the legislature among educational institutions eligible to receive those funds under prior law. The proposed amendment also repeals a section of the Constitution levying an ad valorem tax for 17 state colleges and universities. The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment repealing the state property tax."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 62 as amended by Senate Joint Resolution 10 proposes a constitutional amendment that would eliminate the \$80,000,000 ceiling on state welfare aid during any fiscal year. The amendment would set the state welfare spending limit at \$160,000,000 for the 1982-1983 biennium. The amendment further provides that, for each subsequent biennium, the maximum amount spent for state welfare shall not exceed one percent of the state budget.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to provide assistance through the appropriations process to needy persons and to place a ceiling on payments for needy dependent children at one percent of the state budget."

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 8 proposes a constitutional amendment that would exempt machinery and equipment used in the production of farm and ranch products from taxation. No dollar limits would be imposed and the exemption would apply to corporations and partnerships as well as to families and individuals. The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment exempting implements of husbandry (agricultural machinery and equipment) from ad valorem taxation."

PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 77 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the Legislature to set a four year maximum term of office for board members of certain water districts and conservation and reclamation districts.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide terms not to exceed four years for members of governing boards of certain water districts and conservation and reclamation districts."

PROPOSITION NO. 5 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 119 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize Tarrant and Bee counties to hold county-wide elections to abolish the county treasurer's office by majority vote.

Should the county treasurer's office be abolished, the duties, powers, and functions of that office would be transferred to the county auditor or the successor to the auditor's functions.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

PROPOSITION NO. 6 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 6 proposes a constitutional amendment that would raise the constitutional interest rate limit on state general obligation bonds from 6% to 12%. The new 12% ceiling does not, however, apply to bonds issued by the Veterans' Land Board.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment increasing the maximum interest rate allowed on state general obligation bonds to a weighted average annual interest rate of 12%."

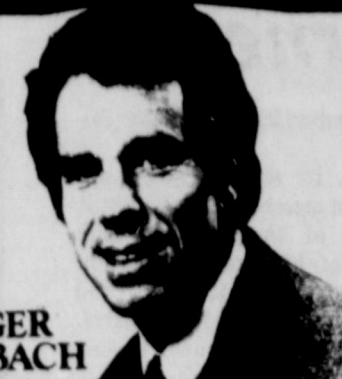

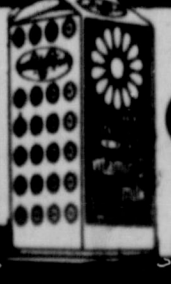
