IF YOU HADN'T noticed, there seemed to be a special requirement for football teams making the playoffs from our particular region this year.

That requirement was that the city involved be located on Highway 84. Almost every city from the state line to Interstate 20 had a team which made at least the first round of playoffs.

Starting to the west, the Farwell Steers were the champions in District 5-AA. Then you come down to Littlefield, where the Wildcats won District 2-AAA and survived their first round.

Up the road a bit, the Anton Bulldogs, members of conference A, are in the playoffs. So are the Shallowater Mustangs; in fact the Mustangs have been state-ranked. (Of Shallowater's 10-1 record, the "1" was handed them by Friona).

In the city of Lubbock, where Highway 84 is one spoke of the "hub," three schools made the football playoffs. They included the Monterey Plainsmen in class 5A; and both Estacado and Dunbar in 4A.

Estacado and Dunbar met in the final district game to decide the district champion and runnerup in an eight-team district.

Just southeast of Lubbock, and still on Highway 84, the Slaton Tigers made the playoffs once again this year. They were edged by a team, Frenship, that we could almost claim on this list, since Frenship is just off Loop 289 on the west side of Lubbock. It's within a stone's throw.

On down the line, and definitely on the road, is class AAA Post, whose Antelopes have been ranked first in their class in the state for much of the year. Down at the tip-end of our region, Brownwood made the playoffs in conference 4A.

That's ten teams we've mentioned, which is just about every town between Farwell and Roscoe. And of the exceptions, Muleshoe came close to making post-season play. The Mules were involved in the three-way tie with Friona and Dimmitt, and it took five tosses of the coin before the Chieftains won the right to the district's new runnerup slot in the playoffs.

And Snyder's Tigers are usually a sure bet for the playoffs, but must have had a bad year.

That's not a bad record. Maybe the "Highway 84 Association" (if there were such an organization) should put up some signs, proclaiming the road as the "Route of the Champions."

TRAGEDY STRUCK THE community of Friona this past week, with the untimely death of Jerry Brownd.



kilowatts, enough electricity for 225,000 people. Open house for the new electric plant is scheduled this weekend.

SPS Sets Open House At New Muleshoe Plant

Employees of Southwestern Public Service Company will show off their second coal-fired power plant, Tolk Station Unit No. 1, near Muleshoe, Texas, Saturday and Sunday, November 20 and 21, and everyone in the SPS service area is invited to the open house, said Bill Wilshire, local manager in Friona.

The new coal-fired unit will be of significant help in Southwestern Public Service Company's effort to hold down the rising costs for the fuels required to generate electricity, Wilshire said.

When it is generating at capacity, the 561,000-kilowatt Tolk Unit No. 1--the largest unit ever built by SPS-will be able to supply the electricity needs of 225,000 people.

Tours of the plant will begin at 10 a.m. and continue until 4 p.m. on Saturday. Tours will continue from 1 p.m. until 4 p.m. on Sunday, Wilshire said. Casual dress is suggested. Women should wear slacks and low heels.

Tolk Station is located just south of U.S. Highway 70, about ten miles east of Muleshoe, eight miles west of Earth.

The power plant is easy to find, Wilshire said. The building which houses the boiler is 237 feet tall-about the height of a 20-story office building.

The chimney stack, from which cleaned flue gases from the boiler exit, towers 400 feet above the sand hills which surround the power plant.

The great size of the plant is required to house equipment large enough to supply the region's evergrowing demand for electricity, said Berl Springer, chairman of the board and chief executive officer of Southwestern Public Service.

"We're immensely proud of Tolk Station, which was designed by our own engineers," Springer said. "We know it will help us serve our customers in the Friona area, and all of our customers, more economically. And the availability of more electrical power will help attract new industries to our entire 45,000square-mile, four-state service area," Springer remarked.

SPS serves more than one million people in the south plains and panhandle of Texas, eastern and southeastern New Mexico, the Panhandle Oklahoma southwestern Kansas.

Springer said SPS is one of only four major electric utility companies in the United States that employs its own in-house plant design engineers. SPS engineers led by Bill Esler, vice president, engineering, and Jim Matthews, generation design and construction group manager, also oversee construction of the power plants they design, Springer said.

Touring the plant "will be quite an educational experience," Wilshire said. Visitors will see Tolk's coalhandling facilities, the coal pulverizers, the boiler, the turbinegenerator, miles of steam piping, the plant maintenance shop, and the plant's state-of-the-art computerized

Unit No. 1's boiler burns lowsulfur coal delivered from near Gillette, Wyoming, by 110-car trains. At maximum rating the boiler burns approximately 296 tons of coal per hour. That's 7,104 tons of coal each

The turbine at maximum output produces about 728,000 horsepower. The main steam piping at the Unit contains high pressure steam with flow rates as high as 3,800,000 pounds of steam per hour.

Bert Ballengee, president and chief operating officer of Southwestern Public Service, said detailed planning and design for Tolk Station, which is named after former SPS board chairman Roy Tolk, began in 1975.

General construction contractor for the plant was Missouri Valley Inc., of Amarillo; the electrical contract work was done by Budwine Service Electric of Carlsbad, N.M. Other companies were contracted to build the evaporative cooling towers and the rail spur to the plant, and to do fencing, paving and insulation work.

On-site construction of the plant involved hundreds of craftsmen and laborers over a period of more than four years. Sometimes, there were as

many as 800 workers on site. "Tolk Station to me is a marvel," said Pete Smith, an SPS engineer who helped manage the job of designing and building the plant. "Literally thousands of people were involved in putting it together and making it work.

Smith said SPS engineers, drafters, blueprint production people, secretarial help, and production department personnel, as well as employees of equipment and parts manufacturers and suppliers from across the United States, contributed to completing the plant.

"Take all those people," he said, "and then the workmen--the craftsmen who actually built that equipment--like the condensers, with the thousands of feet of tubes; the boiler fabrication, and all those parts; the turbine -- a lot of machine work. I guess you're talking about hundreds of thousands of people whose hands touched some part of the plant at one time or another.

Only 150 people are required to operate the Tolk Unit 24 hours a day. Ballengee said.

Cost of the Unit was \$228.2 million, excluding Allowance for Funds Used During Construction of \$48.3 million. Cost per installed kilowatt of capacity was \$489.

"The unit came on-line on schedule and within budget," Ballengee said. "We at SPS are especially proud that Tolk, like our other coal-fired plant, Harrington Station near Amarillo, was completed for less than one-half the national average cost for coalfired plants. Obviously, when we can perform like that, we're saving our customers a lot of money."

50 YEARS AGO--NOV. 11, 1932

The national election for this year is now history. As far as Friona was concerned, we had a most beautiful day for the election, and everything went off peaceably. Mrs. (Ma) Ferguson received 184 votes and Mr. Bullington received 169 votes at Friona (in the governor's race). Judge Aldridge, for county judge, received 300 votes, to 57 for Mr. Kinsley, the Republican candidate. Mr. Rushing for clerk received 313 votes to 38 for Mr. Sympson. The statement that Mr. Roosevelt carried 75 states out of the 48 seems to have gone unchallenged here.

40 YEARS AGO--NOV. 13, 1942

Mrs. Joe Jesko, chairman of the sponsor's committee of the County Home Demonstration Council, announced this week that enrollment in the girls 4-H Clubs shows an 11 per cent increase over last year. The enrollment at present is 150 members in seven clubs. Girls from Friona to be honored this month include Camille Elmore, Dorothy Nell Guinn, Betty Ruth Houlette, Gladys Roberts, Betty Jean Turner, June Moody and Betty Lou Talkington.

35 YEARS AGO--(Entire 1947 issue missing from Star files.)

30 YEARS AGO--NOV. 13, 1952 The Friona Chieftains romped over the highly-touted Anton Bulldogs in

the last regular season game last Friday, copping the District 3-B championship in the 61-33 win on the local sod. The championship game earns the Redmen another game. They will play for bi-district honors against the winning South Plains team, probably Idalou, at a time and location yet undetermined, except that it will be during Thanksgiving week. Friday's scoreboard read 20-0 at halftime, on tallies by Robbins, Robason and Jordan. Anton's first score came after Friona had racked up 34 points.

25 YEARS AGO--NOV. 14, 1957 After a late start, the Friona Chiefs last week rolled over Springlake 35-6 and continued their

Meeting the Springlake Wolverines on the losers' field at the homecoming tilt, the Chiefs turned the game into a rampage before more than 400 Friona followers. After handily beating the Springlake Wolverines last week the Chiefs return to their home field for the last district game of the season Friday. Stacked up against the Chiefs will be the Morton Indians, also undefeated in district play this year, and the two are digging in for the district title.

20 YEARS AGO--NOV. 15, 1962 The Running Water Draw Watershed project cleared a legal hurdle in Parmer County on Tuesday, when the commissioners' court tentatively agreed to act as co-sponsor of the project. The Parmer County Soil Conservation District, original sponsor, asked the commissioners to co-sponsor the project.

Figures compiled this week by City Manager Arley L. (Jake) Outland, revealed that the city has already set a new record for building permits within a calendar year, with a month and a half remaining in 1962.

15 YEARS AGO--NOV. 16, 1967



season opponents made the playoffs, three were still playing this weekend, and two have been ranked statewide in the top ten for their class.

Junior runningback Charlie Morgan had some impressive statistics. He led the team in scoring with 68 points, and in individual rushing with 1185.

Morgan's rushing total is the most for a single season since Tony Perea, Friona High School's all-time rushing leader, ran for 1,761 in 1968, his senior year. Morgan's junior year produced 401 more yards than Perea The workhorse on the team,

Morgan carried the ball 242 times, one more than half Friona's total. He had scoring runs of 67 yards against Farwell and 65 yards against Abernathy. For the season, Morgan averaged 4.9 yards per carry.

Quarterback Bruce Patterson completed 20 of 67 passes for 345 yards, and added 131 yards rushing, to rank second to Morgan in total offense with 476 yards.

Eloy Caballero was the leading pass receiver, with four catches for 126 yards, an average of 31.5 yards per catch. Caballero's receptions included two for touchdowns.

Max Perea was the runnerup in individual receiving with seven catches for 76 yards and one TD.

Patterson passed for seven touchdowns. He also had an 80-yard pass interception return for a touchdown against Dalhart.

Montoya tied a school record established in 1964 by Doug Dodd by kicking four field goals in a season. His 47-yard goal against Tulia is thought to be a school record for length.

Montoya also had goals of 44 yards against Littlefield and 43 yards against Muleshoe.





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

Tolk Open House....

(Continued from Page 1)

A second, identical unit at the Muleshoe site, Tolk Station Unit No. 2, is now under construction. It is scheduled to be in service in 1985. The second unit will share some of Unit No. 1's largest equipment, including the on-site coal-handling system, the water treatment facility, and the offices and control room.

Economy is the major benefit Tolk Station will afford SPS customers, Wilshire said, explaining, "The more we can use coal to fuel our power plants, the more money we can save our customers."

"Some people don't realize it," Ballengee said, "but electricity is a manufactured product that is made from some other energy source. Essentially, we start with one type of energy, for instance, the energy locked in coal or natural gas, and we use that power to heat water into steam. The steam, under pressure, is used as another kind of energy, mechanical energy, to turn a turbine generator. The generator creates a third energy form, electrical power.

"So, electricity is something that is made, or manufactured, from another energy source. And the cheaper that other energy form, the better for our electricity customer."

Historically, Southwestern Public Service used natural gas to fire the boilers which heat water into steam, Ballengee said. "But we saw in the early 1970s that the cost of natural gas would shoot up, and continue to get higher, so we began building coalfired plants, because coal is cheaper to use."

SPS' average fuel cost in 1982 to make one kilowatt-hour of electricity generated by natural gas, Ballengee said, was 3.178 cents. The fuel cost of a kilowatt-hour generated by coal, he said, "by contrast, was only 1.803 cents."

"So, one of the main ways we're helping our customers--or, as we express it in our Company's theme, our partners--manage electricity," he concluded, "is by maximizing use of our coal-fired plants."

The Company's theme is "You and SPS, partners managing electricity, make the difference."

Tolk Unit No. 1 in 1983 will raise SPS' generation by coal to 53.6 per cent, Ballengee said.

The environmental control system at the Tolk Unit No. 1 is another money saver, he said. The fabric filter system, called a baghouse, sifts "fly ash" from the boiler flue gases on their way to the 400-foot-high stack. SPS sells the captured fly ash for use in oil well mud, concrete, road and parking lot fill, as a soil conditioner.

The money made from the sale of the fly ash by-product is charged against the price SPS pays for coal. "That brings down the cost our customers pay for fuel," Ballengee said.

The coal-unloading system SPS uses at Tolk also saves customers' money, he said. Instead of bringing coal from Wyoming in heavy bottomdump railroad cars, and emptying the coal from trestles into a stockpile, SPS has its Tolk coal shipped in lighter-weight "rotary dump" cars. The lighter-weight cars are rolled over on their sides in a "rotary dump house" at Tolk, and the coal is poured onto the stockpile. "That helps us keep down our customers' fuel costs," Ballengee said, "because use of the lighter-weight cars means SPS is hauling in more coal per freight dollar.'

Muleshoe YH Club Sets Arts & Crafts Bazaar



Dental Program Is Available For Elderly

The Texas Dental Association has introduced a new statewide dental program that provides dental care to senior citizens at reduced cost. The program, called for by the 1982 TDA House of Delegates, is designed to increase access to comprehensive dental care for elderly citizens on low, fixed incomes. Volunteer dentists--all members of the Texas Dental Association--have agreed to provide dental care at a reduced cost to senior citizens across the State of Texas. The program named "Senior Dent" has received wide approval on both a state and national level.

To be eligible to receive reducedfee care under the "Senior Dent" program, an individual should be age 65 or older; not eligible for federal, state or other dental health assistance; not eligible for private dental insurance and should have an annual household income of \$12,000. or less OR be accepted by the participating dentist due to special circumstances.

To receive a referral to participating dentists, the senior citizen simply calls the TDA statewide toll free number -- 1-800-252-9377. The caller is informed of the eligibility guidelines and given the telephone number of several participating dentists in their Zip Code area. In some instances, they will be referred back through the component dental society for a similar referral.

The actual kickoff for the "Senior Dent" program will be November 30 with a statewide press conference planned at the State Capitol. Recognizing the diverse needs and dental condition among the elderly population, the program promotion will emphasize preventive care and retention of natural teeth. Approximately 1,400 dentists have agreed to provide their services at a reduced fee to senior citizens

In designing "Senior Dent," one of the Association's primary objectives was simplicity. Its goal is to explain the program to the dental profession and the public in a way that all parties could understand. In addition, TDA encourages senior citizens to use "Senior Dent" for regular preventive dental care. Regular examinations and preventive care are needed for individuals who have dentures as well as for those with some or all of their natural teeth.



Local Woman Attends Annual WIFE Meeting

The Sixth Annual Convention of Women Involved in Farm Economics (W.I.F.E.) was called to order Thursday, November 11 at the Holiday Inn, Denver Northglenn, Denver, Colorado by National President June Saylor of Muleshoe,

Saylor gave the president's address Saturday morning reminding the membership "Time has run out on the economic clock for many producers. We who have survived thus far are only marking time." She went on to say, "It is time for all to admit the Free Market oriented agriculture policy has bankrupted too many and led producers to the lowest commodity prices since the Great Depression. The repercussions of the loss of income to agriculture has led our nation to the highest unemployment of 10.4 per cent and lowest corporate profits since the '30's Depression.'

Saylor also noted the fact that America is the envy of almost every country in the world, not for our military, our social life, our welfare system, or our banking system...but for our agriculture.

Mrs. Saylor's address was closed by saving that, "Farmers must have a program designed with protection for producers, which will allow the farmer to continue producing plentiful food and fiber supplies, reasonably priced...but at the same time must be a no cost program to the government."

Mrs. Saylor announced that WIFE had voted unanimously to begin immediate preparations for an Agricultural Women's Summit Meeting to be held as soon as possible. "In light of the severity of the economic situation in which the agricultural producers of America find themselves, we must seek unity of purpose in finding solutions to our problems," Saylor stated.

The Saturday Banquet guest speaker was Sister Thomas More Bertels. Sister Bertels is a member of the Franciscian Sisters of Christian Charity, a teaching and nursing order. At present, Sister Bertels is a full professor of history at Silver Lake College in Manitowoe, Wisconsin.

Sister Bartels told her audience that the most important thing to the farmer, is who develops Agriculture Policy. Bartels' message for WIFE was that producers need once again to bring together marketing and producing. She emphasized that producers must develop power at the grassroots level to offset power at the

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Even if you just go for a walk, unarmed, let's say to pick wild fruit or photograph something, on private property, you can be hit with a Class B misdemeanor charge, maximum fine of \$1,000 and/or 180 days in jail. It is not necessary for a property owner to post no-trespassing signs, if he has fences.

Crossing a fence or other enclosure constitutes the misdemeanor in either Class A or B. If there are no fences, signs are all that are needed. And, if a landowner tells a person, orally or in writing, that trespass is forbidden, neither fences nor signs are needed.

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
