WITHHOLDING COAL STRIKE PROPOSALS

GARFIELD DECLARES HIS POSI-TION AGAINST INCREASE IN PRICE UNCHANGED

STILL CLOAKED IN MYSTERY

Charges of Conspiracy to Limit Production Will Be Taken Up at Indanapolis.

Washington.—Government proposals for settling the coal strike are cloaked in a veil of mystery which promises to lift only at Indianapolis when the federal court and the leaders of the United Mine Workers alike will be called on to consider them.

Attorney General Palmer and his special assistant, Mr. Ames, traveled to Indanapolis on the same train with John L. Lewis, acting president, and William Green, secretary of the Mine Workers' Union, whose secret visit and equally secret conference with Mr. Palmer and Joseph P. Tumulty, secretary to President Wilson, resulted in a provisional agreement to settle. Not one of the participants would discuss as meaning or intent.

Before boarding the train for Indianapolis Mr. Palmer, however, said he was quite sure that the end of the strike was in sight. It was learned that he would confer with Judge Anderson of the federal district court on reaching Indanapolis."

In official quarters Fuel Administrator Garfield, speaking with brevity and emphasis, added only doubt to the situation.

"My position has not been budged

one inch and will not be," he said.
It was recalled that Dr. Garfield had reiterated that not one cent could be added to the price of coal to finance wage increases to the miners greater than the 14 per cent he suggested, which operators could pay out of profits and that the government was behind him in the stand.

JENKINS IS LIBERATED FROM PUEBLA PRISON

American Consular Agent Is Released When Friend Makes the Requested Bond.

Mexico, City.—William O. Jenkins, United States consular agent at Puebla, who was released from prison on Thursday night, attempted to secure his re-imprisonment there, according to special dispatches received here by the Excelsior. Judicial authorities at Puebla refused to allow the consular agent to re-enter the prison.

Mr. Jenkins' move, according to dispatches, was prompted by a desire to secure unconditional liberty, Mr. Jenkins being quoted as declaring that ball was furnished by his friend, J. Walter Hansen, without his know-cige and that he refused to accept and tional freedom.

Pennsylvania Strikers Are Charged With Conspiracy and Intimidation.

Pottsburgh, Pa.—Ninety-eight men were arrested at Donora, a steel town on the Monongahela river, 30 miles from here, when troopers of the state police raided Lithuania hall, headquarters of the striking steel workers in that district.

The men were taken to jall, charged with conspiracy and intimidation to prevent men from working in the hills, and later they were arraigned before Grover W. Boyd, a justice of the peace. Each was held in \$500 bail for a hearing next Thursday. Those who were unable to furnish bond, and they constituted the majority. Were taken to the county jail at Washington, Pa. Except seven, the men are foreigners, it was said.

Baptist Drive Extended

Dallas.—The state Baptist headquarters of the \$75,000,000 campaign is advised by General Director L. R. Scarborough, Nashville, that on account of vast areas of the south being visited by heavy rains, rendering roads practically impassable and making a last number of churches inaccessible, the time for concluding the campaign had been extended to Sunday, Dec. 21.

Germany has paid 4,500,000 marks in unemployed benefits since the outbreak of the revolution, according to Berlin estimates.

Dr. Lansing Burrows, aged 77, who for more than 30 years was secretary of the Southern Baptist convention, and one of the leading ministers of that denomination in the country, died at Americus, Ga., recently of bronchial pneumonia.

J. P. Morgan & Co. and Kuhn, Loeb & Co., it was reported, have entered the motion picture field—Morgan & Co as backers of Marcus Loew whose enterprises are to be financed by a corporation with \$100,000,000 capital. It is said that Kuhn, Loeb & Co. are to sponsor the corporation known as the Famous Players.

SECRETARY DANIELS - ON WORK OF NAVY

BECRETARY'S ANNUAL REPORT RELATES THE FINE RECORD OF OUR SEA FORCES

Washington, Dec. 8.—The annual report of Secretary of the Navy Dan-iels, made public today, 's a long and celation of the efficient work of the forces of the United States divisea forces of the United States during the great war and since the signing of the armstice. Much space is devoted to the record made by the navy in transporting troops to and from Europe, and full credit is given it for its excellent work in actual war-fare and in cleaning up the great mine field which it had laid in the North

As for demobilization, Mr. Daniels believes this is being accomplished "without the sacrifice of national spirit, unity or force." He says: of national

"Two fundamental principles have

been constantly borne in mind:

"(1) There must be and there has
been no loss of adaptability to new
and expected issues. The readiness
to hit and to hit hard, which won the plaudits of the allies at the very out-set, has been preserved in every de-tail of change and readjustment. The navy is returning to a peace basis, but it is conserving the power that en-abled it and will again enable it to meet with unweakened sinews any crisis that may arise. Security for the future, though an uncertain future, has for a moment been lost sight of.

"(2) There must be and there has been no loss of symmetry or wholeness in the naval organization. A reduced personnel has not been allowed to mean fragmentariness or dis-proportion in whole or in part. As a vast machine, as a national organ-ism, as a complex of interacting agencies, the navy is in form and spirit a unit, not a fraction."

The story of naval aviation is long and interesting, but contains little that is not already a matter of common knowledge. Like Secretary of War Baker, Mr. Daniels is opposed to the creation of a separate air service.

Here is what the report says of a matter that has aroused considerable public anxiety:

"The attraction of higher pay in the merchant marine has caused the navy to lose many men, many petty officers and not a few warrant and commis-sioned officers. This has made it im-possible to fully man all the ships. possible to fully man all the ships. This loss has been greater than numbers indicate, because those who have left the navy were experienced and qualified, while the recruits now en listing must be trained before they are fitted for the more important duties. The high wages paid to machinists, electricians and other skilled men in private industries has prevented the navy's securing new men in the ratings most needed, it is to be hoped congress will increase the compensation early so that many of these men will have a suitable inducement to re-enter the naval service."

PASSENGER SERVICE IS BEING FURTHER CURTAILED

Railroads Announce Removal of Popular Trains From Texas Line

Dallas.—As a coal conservation measure, the Missouri, Kansas & Texas railroad will discontinue more than 25 passenger trains in Texas. Oklahoma, Kansas and Missouri, effective at once. This announcement was authorized from the general offices of that carrier system in

Pacific, the Chicago, Rock Island & Gulf; the gulf coast lines and the Frisco railroads. Similar announcements are expected to be made concerning curtailment of service on other coal-burning transportation lines serving Dallas and north Texas

MINES OF OKLAHOMA

Governor Robertson Takes Determined Action to Insure Production of Coal

McAlester, Ok.—Gov. J. B. A. Roberson has issued a proclamation declaring martial law in the counties of Pittsburg. Latimer, LeFore, Haskell, Coal and Okmulgee, the coal producing counties of the state, to take effect immediately. The governor also ordered the entire national guard or ganizations of the state to occupy the coal mining regions as a means of protection to those miners who returned to work and to the volunteer workers in the mines.

The proclamation sets forth that martial law was necessary "to queli hostile outbreaks against the public peace; to secure coal for fuel purposes; prevent sebotage and criminal syndicalism and restore the mining section to its normal condition."



IMPORTANT NEWS OF THE EN-TIRF WEEK REDUCED FOR BUSY READERS

BOTH FOREIGN AND DOMESTIC

Carefully Prepared for Those Who Desire to Keep Themselves Posted on Events

FOREIGN-

The congress of independent sotialists, in session at Leipsic, unanimously adopted a program declaring for the soviet system in Germany.

The peace conference has received no notification from Kurt von Lersner, German representative, that Germany will refuse to sign the peace protocol.

The members of the American delegation, with the exception of three. will leave Paris this week for Brest. The three remaining will sail on the steamship America for the United States later.

The threatened demonstration by Italian socolist deputies failed to bring about serious consequences. The socialists attempted no outbreak in the chamber, but left before the hing's address, crying "Long Live Socialism."

The Czecho-Slovakian government has ordered the mobilization of three willitary classes, says a dispatch from Vienna to the National Tidende. A Prague dispatch says that 21 divisions of Czecho-Slovaks are advancing toward the Hungarian frontier.

A movement looking to the establishment of a republic in Roumania, which is under the direction of Generai Foioza Aversco, former minister of war, and Take Jonescu. has spread to Bessarbia, Transylvania and Bukowina, is on foot according to a Bucharest dispatch. The situation is said to be alarming for the dynasty.

William O. Jenkins, United States consular agent at Puebla, who was released from prison on Thursday night, attempted to secure his reimprisonment there, according to special dispatches received in Mexico City, by the Excelsion Judicial authorities at Puebla refused to allow the consular agent to re-enter the prison.

WASHINGTON-

The coal famine is becoming hourly more serious in the central west and has begun to make itself felt in other parts of the country.

After a month's continuous session the first international labor conference has adjourned, to meet again subject to the call of the governing body.

All but \$1,459,244 of the cattle loans made by the war finance corporation has been repaid, as disclosed by a report of the board made to congress.

Joshua Willis Alexander, congressman from Missouri, has been selected by President Wilson as secretary of commerce, succeeding William C. Redfield, resigned.

War-time fuel restrictions were revived when Fuel Administrator Gar-field requested the railroad administration to limit coal distribution to essential consumers.

By canoe from Newport News, Va., to Fort Worth, is the rather perflous trip contemplated by two ex-soldiers recently discharged from the service. Newell McCartney and R. C. Van Zandt.

Col. Gordon Johnson, Infantry, has been detailed by the war department

as inspector-instructor of the Texas national guard. Upon expiration of his present leave he is ordered to report to the governor of Texas and to proceed to Dallas, where he will take his station.

Provisions to re-establish the border patrols by which the government would prevent the entry of a large number of aliens and undesirables through Mexico and Canada are marked for defeat in the announcement of the house committee on immigra by Representative Johnson, chairman.

Under the permanent chairmanship of Secretary of Labor Wilson, another attempt to harmonize relations between capital and labor has begun with the opening of the second industrial conference, called by President Wilson. Herbert Hoover was elected permanent chairman and Stanley King of Boston temporary secretary.

Sugar profiteers will be prosecuted under the Lever act, even after the sugar equalization board goes out of existence Dec. 31, Attorney General Palmer has declared.

About \$10,000,000 in gold has been withdrawn from the subtreasury for shipment to South and Central American points, chieffy to Buenos Ayres. This represents part payments for imports of wheat and hides from the Argentine, although it also is due to the present exchange rates.

Sixty radical aliens have been deported from the United States in the last two years, the department of labor has reported to congress.

Gen. John J. Pershing has left Washington to begin a tour of inspection of the country's military resources, will visit Dallas on his rounds.

A total of \$3,806,200 is asked for Texas river and harbor improvement in the estimates furnished congress by the treasury department, of which \$2,228,000 is asked for the Galveston district.

Officials continue their fight to conserve fuel in the west. Three regional railway directors, meeting in Chicago, decided to cut all passenger serrice between that city and the Paciic coast one-third.

Headquarters from which the work of the bureau of markets in the administration of the United States warehouse act in the states of Texas, Oklahoma, Arkansas and Louisiana will soon be conducted, will be established in Dallas by R. L. Newton of the bureau of markets, United States department of agriculture.

DOMESTIC-

Henry Clay Frick, steel magnate, died at New York recently of ptomaine poisoning.

The strike of railway switchmen at Kansas City which began last week, has been called off by the strikers.

Ratification of the federal woman suffrage resolution has been completed by the South Dakota legislature.

Governor Frederick D. Gardner of Missouri has issued a proclamation seizing fifteen coal miners in Barton county.

The state department of education of Texas has completed allotment of the \$2,000,000 appropriation made by the legislature for aid of rural schools.

Volunteer workers have made the chips fly in the woods near Durant and have provided over 100 cords of wood to relieve the fuel famine

Proceedings have been instituted in the supreme court of Texas involving the oil and gas rights on Hog Island, which are reputed to be worth a large sum.

Mexican bandits raided the Clareno ranch on the American side of the Rio Grande, eleven miles southcast of Zapata, escaping with provisions from a store on the ranch.

W. H. Stratton, Dallas, Texas, was elected president of the International Association of Fair and Expositions at the concluding session of the association convention held at Chicago.

Gov. J. B. A. Robertson of Oklahoma cancelled his request for troops to protect mine properties when he earned that two companies of negro infantrymen were to be sent to the state from Columbus, N. M.

Fifteen subjects of kings, emperors and other rulers of Europe have disavowed their allegiance to their native countries at Dallas during October and made application for citizenship in the United tSates.

A train bearing Kansas national guardsmen and volunteer coal strip pit workers was derailed at Humboldt, on the way to Pittsburg. Reports to Pittsburg indicated that the train ran

CHARGES CONSPIRACY TO LIMIT COAL OUTPUT

FEDERAL GRAND JURY CALLED AT INDANAPOLIS TO INVESTI-GATE OPERATORS

Indianapolis, Ind.—Judge A. B. Anderson of the United States district court has summoned the federal grand jury to appear here immediately to take up the investigation of alleged violations of the Lever act and the criminal provisions of the anti-trust acts by the coal operators.

This information was given out in a statement by L. Ert Slack, United States district attorney, and Dan W. Simms, special assistant attorney general in charge of the proceedings in the coal strike.

in the coal strike.

The determination to summon the grand jury, it was said, came as a result of disclosures in the proceedings against the officials of the United Mine Workers of America, which, the statement said, tended to show that the coal operators, as well as the mine union officials, were engaged in a conspiracy to violate the i ever act. It is said the investigations of the grand jury will cover alleged violations of the Lever act on the part of defendants in the injunction suit against the mine union officials, as well as on the part of the coal operators.

What the investigation is to dis-close finally, the statement says, is whether "the government of this country rules or whether lawless peo-ple shall have their way—whether this is a government of law or a

group of men."

The statement declares that "from facts now in our possession, it ap-pears that the coal operators are also engaged in a conspiracy to violate the

Headed by Acting President John L Headed by Acting President John L. Lewis, six general and district officials of the United Mine Workers have appeared at the federal building and surrendered to United States Marshall Mark Storen, who held capiases for their arrest in information field charging officers of the organization with contempt of court.

The men provided bonds of \$10,000 each, which were furnished by a surety company.
