





Curious Group Needs Investigation

WASHINGTON - At last the eyes of the law are on a trouble-making group in Birmingham which has been playing a mysterious role in Alabama and elsewhere to the consternation of both those an able team of two prominent men to citizens who favor and those who oppose integration of the public schools,

JUST WHY SHOULD an organization call itself a "National States Rights Party" and adopt a name that has been used in previous years in the South by per sons who had no connection with racial demonstrations? Just why should such a comparatively new group-composed to no small extent of individuals from outside the state and Canada-issue a monthly newspaper in Birmingham which has been printing scurrilous and baseless attacks on the personal life of President Kennedy and other articles impugning the patriotic motives of prominent persons in the North, with bitter attacks especially on Catholics and Jews? What has all this to do with states' rights'

A federal grand jury has just indicted some of the members of this so-called "States' Rights" group-all of them white -for alleged conspiracy to interfere with a court order and some for allegedly obstructing by violence the process of law enforcement in desegregating public schools. Two white boys-arrested and charged with shooting a 13-year-old Negro boy a few hours after a Negro church was bombed on Sept. 15 in Birmingham -had just attended an impassioned rally held by the "States' Rights" group.

WHERE DOES the money come from to finance such a mischief-making organization. The time would seem to be ripe for the House Committee on Un-American activities to subpoena records and ascertain whether any foreign funds have been coming to the Birmingham group. Again and again, in different parts of the world-especially in Latin America -groups that seem to be still espousing the Hitler-Nazi doctrines are found to have close links with Communist agents. What more natural way would there be for the Communists to stir up trouble and

The whole story of how the law-abiding people of Birmingham have been maligned through such incidents as the church tombings and otherwise will sooner or later be revealed. The Federal Bureau of Investigation has not been able under federal law to delve into crimes which are in the category of state offense and can only come into a case where some specific federal statute is involved, such as transporting dynamite across state lines. Before long it is conceivable that leads turned up by the FBI will disclose the perpetrators of the church bombings.

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

Militarily the program has no legs to stand on. Its main objective is to see how fast and how well U.S.-based troops can be rushed to a far distant trouble spot. This implies an emergency. If time is of no consequense, preparation can be less costly.

Like the fire alert, it will prove nothing, since the Army will have an entire month to plan and prepare for this single simulated "emergency" run. The Cuban fiasco should have given our armed forces some indication of what irons we can pull out of the fire on a rush basis, and what adjustments we need to make.

A lot of college students, reading these lines of ancient reminiscence, will say that my generation of collegians was uncommitted, and if they mean to jail they're dead right.

SOMEHOW, MY generation managed to latch onto an education without ever attacking a policeman. This may be interpreted as a lamentable lack of free enterprise or the swamping of the individual in conformism. To this sorry record must be added the admission that no one ever screamed, "Cossack! Fascist!" at any officer trying to maintain

law and order. All of this flashed through my mind the other day as I watched, via television, students rioting in Times Square. It was an anti-Castro demonstration. While the collective heart was in the right place, the collective head didn't even exist. The destructive priorities of the young men and women involved seemed to be, first, the police and, then, Castro-

IT STRUCK ME with considerable force that "when there's riot duty to be done, a policeman's lot is not a happy one. In the face of every provocation, the police behaved with remarkable self-control. And the same with the police of Washington, D. C., who had to deal with pro-Castro student demonstrations

during Senate hearings 10 days ago Until recently we in the United States have been spared the kind of violent student demonstrations that have distinguished European, Asian and Latin-American politics for generations. Such students and such demonstrations have played a turbulent role in the political life of three continents

BUT NOW. I suspect, we had better brace ourselves for such demonstrations in the United States as gusty political passions begin to invade the campus. We are probably seeing the beginning and by no means the end of this phe nomenon.

Of course, when I was in college, it was a capital offense to be either married or jailed Both states were regarded as indecent and unbecoming an undergraduate of either sex. Let me conclude by saying that some progress confuses me. I grant that it is better to marry than to burn. But what educational progress there is in the pokey escapes

But Estes Kefauver of Tennessee promises to be an exception to this unhappy rule if only because he stood for certain deeply held beliefs above and beyond the erosion of easy compro-

Whether his last big drive-to investi-

gate the power of American drug manufacturers to enforce high if not prohibitive prices for wonder drugs in Latin America-will be scuttled is the question of today. With his old opponents closing in, the prospects are not bright.

KEFAUVER HAD an old-fashioned belief in competition. He was for free enterprise-free and competitive enterprise. A close friend in the Senate once asked him to join in sponsoring a "price notification" bill requiring firms in basic manufactures to serve advance notice of upcoming price increases along with a justification for the boost. Kefauver declined saving this sounded too much like government regulation to him.

The senator from Tennessee with the coonskin cap and the limp handshake has a monument in the greatly strengthened drug bill that followed the thalidomide scandal and in an anti-merger law putting more teeth into the anti-trust stat-

PROPOSING TO investigate the prices of American drugs in the Latin-American market. Kefauver ran into a buzz saw. His associates believe his experience so shocked and saddened him that it contributed to his fatal heart attack.

McKesson & Robbins, the nation's leading drug wholesaler, went into Colombia and began selling antibiotics and other drugs under their generic rather than their brand names. This meant a saving many times over to the consumer. But the big American pharmaceutical houses were outraged, and McKesson charged them with shutting off supplies.

WHEN KEFAUVER proposed to investigate they turned the heat on friendly senators. Kefauver's anti-monopoly sub-

WASHINGTON-The waters of oblivion committee was blocked by the full Justice Committee Finally, Kefauver was granted a hearing before the Senate Foreign Relations Committee to consider the repercussions in Latin America of the proposed investigation. To the hearing came Thomas G. (Tommy the Cork of the New Deal era) Corcoran, representing his brother, David, president of Sterling Products, a drug company with a large operation in Latin America. Corcoran's law partner, Edward H. Foley, represents the pharmaceutical manufacturers association.

> CORCORAN made a forceful, not to say fierce, presentation. He told the committee that even the proposal of an investigation had been blown up in senational newspapers in Brazil and elsewhere to show that American drug firms were guilty of trying to extort criminally high

> Sen. Wayne Morse, chairman of the Latin-American subcommittee, sided with Corcoran. Kefauver felt that his allies of the past had deserted him. In the face of Corcoran's warning it was agreed that if anything was done it should be by the Department of Justice inquiring into possible violation of the law in this country, to Kefauver a brush-off

> THE OTHER DAY Sen. Phillip Hart of Michgian, who succeeded to the chairmanship of the anti-monopoly committee, got a vote of all eight members approving a resolution keeping in force the subpoenas issued for records of the big drug houses Hart feels strongly about the Kefauver goals of checkmating monopoly pressure so that business can be free to produce to the fullest. But when the real showdown comes on whether to investigate or not the chances are that he will have only two votes-his own and that of Sen. Thomas J. Dodd of Connecticut.

> A melancholy footnote to the Kefauver career is that he left an estate of \$20,000. Friends and admirers are trying to raise a fund to help educate the four Kefauver children. Honesty, as Lincoln said, may be the best policy. But in an era when money values are supreme it can impose heavy penalties. (Copyright, 1963, United Feature Syndicate, Inc.)



Thornberry (D-Tex.) will leave Congress to become a federal judge Dec. 20.

His voice trembling with emotion, he disclosed this timetable Thursday night at a barbecue in his honor beside the San Gabriel River near here in Central Texas. Vice President Lyndon Johnson

and Gov. John Connally were among the 1,500 men there to pay tribue to the congressman from the 10th Texas District. The date Thornberry's resigna-

tion is effective obviously was chosen to keep him on the job through the present session as a member of the powerful House Rules Committee President Kennedy's nomination

of Thornberry to be U. S. District judge at El Paso already has been confirmed by the Senate.

Johnson predicted the 10th District would pick a new congressman in a special election coinciding with a statewide ballot Nov. 9 on four proposed amendments to the Constitution. Connally said he expected to make an announcement about this in a few days.

State Rep. Jack Ritter of Austin announced as a candidate in the special election. Another probable candidate is Texas Employment Commissioner Jake Pickle

"No man has ever had a brother who was more faithful to me or to the people of the 10th District than Homer Thornberry," the Vice President said.

Two deaths and heavy property losses were reported after four days of rain that swelled the Grijalva and Samaria rivers and spilled flood waters across their tropical basins about 450 miles southeast of Mexico City.
