



## Star Lites

**THE TRASH SITUATION** continues to be a headache for City of Friona officials. The city still has not completed action on purchasing a new site for a sanitary landfill.

And the city has been forced to stop burning trash at the present landfill north of town. The amount of space at the old landfill gets smaller all the time.

An Amarillo company has offered to collect the city's trash, but it would involve "curbside" collection, with residential customers bagging their trash in plastic bags and leaving the bags at their front curb on trash collection day.

Mayor R.L. Fleming and the rest of the city council would like an idea of what the public thinks of this idea.

The company has agreed to collect the trash from residents at the recently established monthly rate of \$2.50 per month. However, it would need to do some negotiating on the commercial collection rates.

One of the drawbacks is the fact that trash collection would be only once per week. At the present time, trash is collected twice weekly, with special runs "as needed" especially for the businesses.

However, if the system would work, it certainly would solve a big problem for the city—as to what to do with the trash.

The Amarillo firm already is doing the collecting for a number of towns in the Amarillo area. It has approached the city of Dimmitt on a proposal, and would like to get Dimmitt and Friona on a collection basis.

The council plans to discuss the issue at its regular meeting Monday night (Sept. 8). So, if you have an opinion, it would be well to communicate with Mayor Fleming or the City Manager—immediately.

**WE HAD A NEWS** release the other day from the state highway department in which the department was explaining why it hasn't been able to keep up with one of its maintenance problems—that of mowing the highway right-of-way, across our sprawling state.

The release cited such factors as labor costs as causing the cutback in the right-of-way mowing.

We discussed this at the office, and decided that it would be nice if the people who are on welfare—those who are able-bodied, would be required to just work a few days at this menial chore, then the state wouldn't have to apologize for not having its roadways mowed, and we taxpayers could see little results from our tax dollars that are "doled out" on a month to month basis.

Donnie Spring was pointing out this week that the state of West Virginia has the lowest unemployment ratio of any of the 50 states. The reason, as Donnie explains it, is because in Virginia, before a person can be on the welfare roll, he must sign an agreement that if a suitable job comes up, he will take it.

Even handicapped persons, for instance those in wheel chairs, are considered eligible for such jobs as addressing and stamping envelopes.

As a matter of fact, we know of handicapped people who are more willing to do a day's work than many able-bodied folks, who had rather be on welfare, or unemployment, or one of the "freebie" government programs.

We have always subscribed to the theory that a man should work in order to be qualified to eat.

## Chiefs Blitz Farwell, 44-6

Friona's Chieftains, cast in a re-building role for 1975 after losing a lot of talent to graduation, exhibited an array of running backs, and some devastating line play in the season opener here Friday night against Farwell.

The Chieftains blitzed rival Farwell, 44-6, and sent the Steers reeling in the wake of a six-touchdown volley that sent the hosts into a 44-0 lead early in the final quarter.

The game marked the successful debut of new head coach Mike Garrison, his first actual combat as a head coach, and Garrison relished every minute of the victory.

"I was real pleased with our offensive line, and our running backs. Also, our defense played a super game," an excited Garrison said in a jubilant Chieftain dressing room following the game.

Garrison showed the fans a new wrinkle early in the game by going on fourth and down and three from the 47-yard line. Glen London responded with a seven-yard gain, keeping the opening drive alive and soon putting Farwell into a hole that the Steers never were to escape.

The Chieftains took the opening kickoff, but found themselves in bad field position at their own five. However, London broke for 10 yards and then 22 yards and a first down near midfield. He gained 62 yards of the opening 86-yard drive (Friona got some yardage by penalty), including the final 19 yards for Friona's first touchdown of 1975.

A high snap foiled the point try, but the Chieftains had a 6-0 lead with 6:15 left in the quarter.

Farwell maid a pair of first downs before the Friona defense stiffened and forced a punt. On the second

play following the exchange, Friona was back on the scoreboard.

Halfback Kent Miller broke into the secondary, got some great downfield blocks, and raced 63 yards for a touchdown. Miller made a good cutback at the Farwell five to elude his last would-be tackler.

Davy Carthel ran for two points, and a 14-0 Friona lead.

The Red Rage defense forced a punt without yielding a first down, and fans got to see a nifty punt return by Rolando Caballero. The punt was fielded at the Friona 30, and raced up the west sideline, behind a wall of blockers, to the Farwell 23.

Six plays later, Miller crossed the

speaker of the Texas House of Representatives.

Also on the schedule for Saturday, and beginning the day's activities at 6 a.m. will be the Pancake Breakfast sponsored by the Friona Rainbow Girls. The breakfast will be held at Friona High School Auditorium, and will last until 9 a.m.

Main item on the Friday schedule will be the football game at Chieftain Field at 8 p.m., pitting the Chieftains against neighboring Muleshoe.

A pet show will be held on Saturday at 2 p.m. on the lawn in front of the Friona Public Library. Prizes will be awarded to top animals in a variety of categories.

## Post Office Eyes Move

Williams indicated that the post office "might" be able to move during the weekend of September 13-14, and open in the new location on Monday, September 15, but said he was afraid to say for sure.

### Current Comments From . . .

**BEN EZELL** in the **CANADIAN RECORD**...Leaders of the Postal Workers unions are using the threat of a postal strike like a club over the heads of the people. Continued success with that threat will mean only that the club will threaten again and again.

Blackmail is the name of the game, and blackmailers are insatiable.

It is always traumatic for the victim to defy blackmailers, frequently dangerous, and sometimes fatal...but defiance, together with dependence on the established law of the land for protection, is the only effective answer...ever.

There is no question that a nationwide postal strike would be damaging to the economy...nor is there any question that such a strike would be in violation of the law.

But the postal service, as it is currently operated, is also damaging to the economy, and poses a constant threat of becoming more so as its service deteriorates and its rates soar.

Let's have the showdown...we doubt that it will be fatal to the economy, although it is entirely possible that it could prove fatal to the Postal Unions.

But isn't it worth the inconvenience of a postal strike (and none would be inconvenienced by it more than the press of this nation) to put an end to blackmail, and to bring about the total reform of a government-created monster which has got out of hand?

**JOE DON HANCOCK** in the **PLAINVIEW REPORTER-NEWS**... True to our promise last week that we'd tell you how much wheat is contained in a loaf of bread, we herewith submit the following comments by Secretary of Agriculture Earl Butz.

Noting that the average price of wheat in Kansas City had fallen \$1.70 per bushel from Oct. 1974 to June this year, and that bread prices hadn't dropped, Butz said, "now that average wheat prices in July have recovered about 35 cents of that \$1.70 drop, it doesn't make sense to scream that this is going to increase bread prices."

He also noted that wheat and flour prices had declined from October through June and bread prices didn't, and suggested "Either what farmers get for wheat has little to do with what consumers pay for bread, or somebody was making exorbitant profits during the last several months."

Butz also said that the bushel of wheat that's now worth 35 cents more than it was in June will make 70 loaves of bread so there is little chance the increase will hike bread prices. (This is where Sen. Hubert Humphrey got his information on the one-half cent a loaf price increase. We apologize for misquoting him somewhat last week, but based on \$4 a bushel there is still less than six cents worth of wheat in a

loaf of bread.) In defense of recent wheat sales to Russia, he said those sales amount to less than 10 per cent of what will be available to export from this year's crop, and not as much as was sold to India last year. Butz also said while very little was sold to Russia last year, U.S. consumer food prices still rose 14.5 per cent, and "more than three-fourths of that increase took place after the food left the farm. That's where to look for the explanation of higher food costs."

"Two years after the first massive grain sales to the Soviets (in 1972), farmers were getting 3.6 cents for the wheat in a loaf of bread, just one cent more than a month before the 1972 sale, yet bread prices at the store have gone up 10.9 cents per loaf," he concluded.

**A.E. RICHARDS** in the **RALLS BANNER**...George Dolan of the Fort Worth Star Telegram had an interesting story in a recent issue of his column.

It seems there was this old timer who operated a general store. He was a very religious man and he had made a practice of every time he made a sale, he quoted a portion of the Bible in fitting with the sale.

A young boy came into the store and purchased a 15 cent bar of candy. He rang up the sale with this comment: Suffer little children to come unto me, and forbid them not.

A teenage boy came in and purchased a birthday present for his dad. The dollar was rung up with this statement: Honor thy father and thy mother, and thy days shall be long on the earth.

### Accident Takes Life Of Former Resident

Funeral services were conducted for Donald E. Gaskins on Tuesday, September 2 in the Calvary Baptist Church of Dumas.

Gaskins, 26, a Dumas resident, was killed early Sunday morning

when he was struck by a car near Amarillo.

Rev. Joe Gilmore, pastor, officiated. Burial was in Dumas Cemetery.

### 45 YEARS AGO-AUGUST 29, 1930

## Clayton Sets Visit To Parmer County

Bill Clayton, Speaker of the Texas House of Representatives, will be in Castro and Parmer Counties on Wednesday and Thursday, Sept. 24 and 25, to discuss the proposed new Texas Constitution with area residents. On Wednesday, the 24th, the Speaker will have a meeting in the Community Room of the Security State Bank of Farwell from 5 until 5:45 p.m. He will meet in the Friona High School Cafeteria from 6:15 to 7 p.m. on the same day. Another meeting will be held in Dimmitt on Thursday, the 25th, from 8:30 to 9:30 p.m. in the Castro County Exposition Building.

Speaker Clayton, who is from Springlake, will comment on the proposed constitutional revisions and will answer any questions people might have on the new charter.

"I'm looking forward to talking with the people in my district about the effect the new constitution will have on us West Texans," said Speaker Clayton.

After a revised constitution failed to win majority approval by the 1974 Constitutional Convention,

the 64th regular session of the legislature passed eight proposals last April completely revising the present document. Under the leadership of Speaker Clayton and Lieutenant Governor Hobby, the legislature built on the work of the Convention and agreed to give Texas voters the opportunity to vote yes or no in each of the revision proposals.

The election deciding the fate of the new constitution will be held November 4. This will be the first time since 1876 that Texas voters will have the opportunity to vote on a complete constitutional revision.

Citizens will be able to read and study the proposed constitution in full because every registered voter in the state will receive an information booklet on the constitutional revision. The booklet will contain the full

text of the proposed constitution, background information, and an outline comparing the present and the proposed documents. It is being mailed the second week in September by the Secretary of State's office.

Eligible voters who do not receive ballots by Oct. 2 may obtain one from a county agent.



(Continued from Page 1) double stripes again, and Bobby Zetsche's PAT run made the score 22-0, which was the halftime margin. The third quarter belonged to Bobby Zetsche. The Chieftain wingback sped seven yards for a touchdown after a high snap to the Farwell punter found the kicker

covered on the Farwell ten by tackle Cris Ingram. Zetsche's TD came with 7:02 left in the quarter. A running try for points failed, and the score became 28-0, Friona.

A minute later, Farwell punted, and this time Miller ran the ball back from his own 30 to Farwell's 37. On the second play, Zetsche zig-zagged his way 32 yards to the goal-line.

The Chiefs were going to try a kick for the PAT, but Carthel picked up the bobbled snap and raced it over for two points instead and Friona's lead became 36-0 with 3:34 left in the quarter.

Again the defense held the Steers, and Friona took over on their 47 yard line.

London and Zetsche took turns lugging the ball, and Miller added a 14-yard gain for good measure. Zetsche got his third TD of the game just 3:02 into the final quarter, and Carthel's run for points had the game tucked away at 44-0.

With reserves getting in on the action, Farwell came up with their only sustained drive of the game, going 80 yards in 11 plays, with quarterback Russ Jones diving in from the one. This salvaged a measure of pride from the Steers, who suffered a bruising defeat.

Adding to Farwell's woes was the fact that halfback Gerald Hardage, considered one of their top backfield men, suffered a possible fractured ankle early in the game and had to be helped from the field.

Tackle Joe Haseloff also left the game with a knee injury.

The win was an unprecedented sixth straight for Friona over the Steers, and gave Friona a two-game lead in the longtime county rivalry which the Chieftains now lead, 20-18-1.

Fans were delighted at the way the Chieftains blocked during the game, making it easier for their backs to gain yardage.

The Chieftains had three backs with close to 100 yards gained rushing. Sophomore fullback Glen London led the way with 108 yards. Miller had 89 yards on only five trips with the ball, and Zetsche compiled 82 yards.

The Chieftains had 312 yards rushing, and didn't even try a pass. The Chieftain defense held the Steers to 86 yards rushing until the late drive put the visitors over the 100-yard mark.

Friona, now anxious to test its success further, must wait two weeks for their next outing, due to the open date this Friday.

The meeting is open to the public at no charge and is sponsored by the Clovis branch office of Heinold Commodities, Inc. Manager of the Clovis office of Heinold Commodities is Newman Jarrell, Jr., former Friona resident and businessman.

Errol Baxter, manager of Heinold's Farm Market Division, will discuss the marketing practice of hedging through the commodity futures markets. Hedging is becoming an accepted management practice among livestock and grain producers across the country.

Baxter was an agricultural economist, specializing in hedging, for the University of Illinois 10 years before joining Heinold. Until he was appointed manager of the new Farm Market Division, Baxter was a regional manager for the commodity brokerage firm. The division was created last January to provide assistance and guidance to farmers and

ranchers in hedging. Heinold Commodities, one of the nation's largest commodity futures brokerage firms, is a subsidiary of DEKALB AgResearch one of the world's major suppliers of seed corn, sorghum and grain seeds.

### PUBLIC NOTICE SUMMARY OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS (S.J.R. NO. 11) SPECIAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 4, 1975

#### PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Revising the separation of powers, legislative and executive provisions of the Texas Constitution. Article II, Separation of Powers, is amended to:

Provide that the powers of government of the State of Texas are divided among three distinct branches: legislative, executive, and judicial. Except as otherwise authorized by the constitution, members of one branch may not exercise any power properly attached to either of the others.

Article III, The Legislature, is amended to:

Continue the present structure of the legislature consisting of a senate with 31 members and a house of representatives with 150 members. The present organization and procedure of the legislature are continued except that the provision allowing closed executive sessions of the senate is omitted. Provisions on the conflict of interest of members of the legislature are continued, as is the governor's power to veto bills or line items in appropriation bills. The article provides for single-member senatorial, representative, and congressional districts. A compensation commission is created to recommend the compensation and allowances to be received by members of the legislature. The legislative compensation, set by law, may not exceed this recommendation and does not take effect until after an intervening general election. The article provides for annual sessions of 140 days in odd-numbered years and 90 days in even-numbered years, and a veto session of 15 days upon request of three-fifths of the membership of each house. The legislature may meet in organizational sessions prior to the convening of the legislature in regular sessions.

Article IV, The Executive, is amended to:

Continue the present status of the governor and all other statewide officers, and include the commissioner of agriculture as an executive department officer. The governor is limited to two consecutive terms. The governor is authorized to designate chairmen of state boards, and to remove gubernatorial appointees to state agencies for cause unless the removal is vetoed by the senate. The article mandates the legislature to provide a new governor-elect an appropriation so the governor-elect may organize an office prior to inauguration, and permits the legislature to grant powers of fiscal control to the governor. All governmental agencies, with several exceptions, have a life of not more than ten years unless extended by the legislature, and, at the regular session held in odd-numbered years, the governor shall submit to the legislature a report on the organization and

efficiency of the executive branch.

The wording of the proposed constitutional amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment revising the SEPARATION OF POWERS, LEGISLATIVE, AND EXECUTIVE PROVISIONS OF THE Texas Constitution."

If adopted by the voters, will become effective January 1, 1976, except Article III, Section 5, which becomes effective January 1, 1981.

#### PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

Revising the judiciary provisions of the Texas Constitution. Article V, The Judiciary is amended to:

Establish a unified judicial system consisting of the supreme court, court of appeals, district courts, and circuit courts. Existing county courts and county judges are continued until otherwise provided by law. All judges (except municipal judges), district attorneys and district clerks must be elected by the people. The supreme court and the court of criminal appeals are merged into a single court of last resort, and this supreme court is authorized to provide for efficient administration of the judicial system and to balance case loads. Individual rights for a trial by jury and appeal by the accused are continued. The state is granted the right to appeal in criminal cases in limited circumstances, and the legislature is permitted to establish methods of appeal to the courts from decisions of state agencies.

The wording of the proposed constitutional amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment revising the JUDICIARY PROVISIONS OF THE Texas Constitution."

If adopted by the voters, will become effective September 1, 1976.

#### PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

Revising the voting and election provisions of the Texas Constitution. Article VI, Voter Qualifications and Elections, is amended to:

Provide for registration and qualifications for voting, including voter residency requirements to be established by law. A citizen of the United States who is at least 18 years of age and who meets the registration and residence requirements provided by law is a qualified voter unless the person has been convicted of a felony and for that felony is incarcerated, on parole, or on probation, or unless the person is mentally incompetent as determined by a court. Voting by the people in all elections must be by secret ballot, and the legislature shall provide by law for residence, registration, and absentee voting

requirements, for the administration of elections, and for the protection of the electoral process. The general election for state and county officers is to be held in even-numbered years on a date prescribed by law.

The wording of the proposed constitutional amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment revising the VOTING AND ELECTION PROVISIONS OF THE Texas Constitution."

If adopted by the voters, will become effective September 1, 1976.

#### PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT

Revising the education provisions of the Texas Constitution. Article VII, Education, is amended to:

Provide that the Permanent and Available County Funds and the county public school funds are continued for the support of the free public schools. The State Board of Education is retained and the Permanent and Available University Funds are continued for the benefit of The University of Texas and Texas A&M Systems. A new Higher Education Fund for Texas is established for the benefit of colleges and universities outside The University of Texas and Texas A&M Systems. The state ad valorem tax of ten cents on \$100 valuation is continued as the source of revenue for the Fund. The ten cent higher education tax may be changed by law within the ten cent maximum. The legislature may allocate by law a portion of the Higher Education Fund to certain state vocational and technical institutes. The article provides that the public education system must furnish each individual an equal educational opportunity, but a school district may provide local enrichment of educational programs exceeding the level provided by the state consistent with general law. Authority to issue Permanent University Bonds is continued but the bonds may not exceed 30% of the Permanent University Fund.

The wording of the proposed constitutional amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment revising the EDUCATION PROVISIONS OF THE Texas Constitution."

If adopted by the voters, will become effective September 1, 1976, except Article VII, Section 9, which becomes effective January 1, 1979.

#### PROPOSITION NO. 5 ON THE BALLOT

Revising the finance provisions of the Texas Constitution. Article VIII, Finance, is amended to:

Provide that state taxes may be levied and collected only by general law and to prohibit any state ad valorem tax on real property or tangible personal property except the ten cent tax provided for in Article VII and a

tax of two cents on the \$100 assessed valuation to provide funds for the State Building Fund. Provides that all real property and tangible personal property must be taxed equally and uniformly in proportion to market value. Existing exemptions from ad valorem taxation are continued. The present dedication of motor fuel taxes for highway purposes and the Available School Fund is retained. The "pay-as-you-go" principle for the operation of state government is retained. The legislature shall establish separate formulas for appraising land to promote the preservation of open-space land devoted to farm or ranch purposes and may establish separate formulas for appraising land to promote the preservation of forest land devoted to timber production. The \$3000 exemption from state ad valorem taxation for residential homesteads is continued and the legislature by law may increase this amount. A separate \$3000 exemption from ad valorem taxation by political subdivisions is provided for the residential homestead of persons at least 65 years of age and the political subdivision may increase this amount. The legislature by law may exempt from ad valorem taxation certain property owned by veterans' organizations, non-profit water corporations, and persons in need because of age or disability, and economic circumstance. The legislature may also exempt property to preserve historical, cultural or natural history resources. Taxpayers are provided a new method of correcting inequitable tax assessments by paying ad valorem taxes under protest and suing for a refund in a district court. State debt may be authorized by law only if approved by a two-thirds vote of each house of the legislature and submitted to and approved by a majority of the qualified voters of the state voting on the question. Public funds and public credit may be used only for public purposes and no public funds or public credit may be used to influence the election of a public officer. The article prohibits a retail sales tax on agricultural machinery or parts, fertilizer, feeds or seeds, prescription drugs or medicine, or food, except food sold by restaurants for immediate consumption. An assessment voted by marine food or agricultural producers on their product sales is not a tax if provision is made for the individual producer to receive a refund of the assessment when the producer does not desire to be assessed.

"The constitutional amendment revising the LOCAL GOVERNMENT PROVISIONS OF THE Texas Constitution."

If adopted by the voters, will become effective on September 1, 1976.

#### PROPOSITION NO. 6 ON THE BALLOT

Revising the mode of amending provisions of the Texas Constitution. The proposed article will be the last article of the constitution. If only Proposition No. 8 is adopted, the article will replace Article XVII of the present constitution. If other propositions are adopted, the article will be appropriately renumbered to remain the last article of the constitution. If all propositions are adopted, the article will be Article XI. Article XVII, Mode of Amending the Constitution of the State, is amended to:

Establish a procedure for constitutional amendments requiring a two-thirds vote of each house of the legislature and majority approval by the voters. The calling of a limited or unlimited constitutional convention with voter approval is provided. The question of whether to call a constitutional convention must be submitted to the people every 30 years.

The wording of the proposed constitutional amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment revising the GENERAL PROVISIONS OF THE Texas Constitution."

If adopted by the voters, will become effective September 1, 1976.

#### PROPOSITION NO. 7 ON THE BALLOT

Revising the mode of amending provisions of the Texas Constitution. The proposed article will be the last article of the constitution. If only Proposition No. 8 is adopted, the article will replace Article XVII of the present constitution. If other propositions are adopted, the article will be appropriately renumbered to remain the last article of the constitution. If all propositions are adopted, the article will be Article XI. Article XVII, Mode of Amending the Constitution of the State, is amended to:

Establish a procedure for constitutional amendments requiring a two-thirds vote of each house of the legislature and majority approval by the voters. The calling of a limited or unlimited constitutional convention with voter approval is provided. The question of whether to call a constitutional convention must be submitted to the people every 30 years.

The wording of the proposed constitutional amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment revising the FINANCE PROVISIONS OF THE Texas Constitution."

If adopted by the voters, will become effective on September 1, 1976, except Article VIII, Section 2, Subsections (b) and (c), which becomes effective January 1, 1978, and Article VIII, Section 6, Subsection(c), which becomes



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effective January 1, 1979.

#### PROPOSITION NO. 8 ON THE BALLOT

Revising the local government provisions of the Texas Constitution. Article IX, Local Government, is amended to:

Provide that the counties of the state are those that exist on the date of adoption of the local government article and that county boundaries may be changed if approved by a majority of the qualified voters in each affected county who vote on the question. Counties may be merged or county seats relocated if approved by two-thirds of the qualified voters in each affected county who vote on the question. The present elected constitutional county offices are retained and four year terms of office are provided. The voters of a county may create additional offices, eliminate offices, or combine the duties and functions of offices. The voters may also grant ordinance making power to the governing body of the county. Cities and towns having more than 1,500 inhabitants may become home-rule cities. Tax limitations are established for operating purposes for cities and counties and the legislature is required to fix debt limits for cities, towns, counties, and school and community junior college districts.

The wording of the proposed constitutional amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment revising the LOCAL GOVERNMENT PROVISIONS OF THE Texas Constitution."

If adopted by the voters, will become effective on September 1, 1976.

Revising the mode of amending provisions of the Texas Constitution. The proposed article will be the last article of the constitution. If only Proposition No. 8 is adopted, the article will replace Article XVII of the present constitution. If other propositions are adopted, the article will be appropriately renumbered to remain the last article of the constitution. If all propositions are adopted, the article will be Article XI. Article XVII, Mode of Amending the Constitution of the State, is amended to:

Establish a procedure for constitutional amendments requiring a two-thirds vote of each house of the legislature and majority approval by the voters. The calling of a limited or unlimited constitutional convention with voter approval is provided. The question of whether to call a constitutional convention must be submitted to the people every 30 years.

The wording of the proposed constitutional amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment revising the MODE OF AMENDING PROVISIONS OF THE Texas Constitution."

If adopted by the voters, will become effective September 1, 1976.

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
