Announcing his retirement. Connally told a news conference April 14, 1952; "My friends say I could be re-elected but that it would require a bitter-no, not bitter-an arduous campaign." He was succeeded by Price Daniel, who moved up from Texas attorney general. Daniel at the time charged Connally with failing to halt the Supreme Court suit to take away the state's ownership of the tidelands, although the senator had played an important part in getting tidelands legislation through the Senate Connally reached the zenith

of his influence when in the process of the Senate's seniority system, he came into the chairmanship of the Foreign Relations Committee. That was in the critical summer of 1941four months before Japan's attack on Pearl Harbor swept the United States into World War II. Connally gave heavily of his time over the next four years in promoting President Franklin D. Roosevelt's dream of a world organization to keep the peace.

He urged it in the Senate and in speeches about the country. With the war's end nearly a year away, he said in November, 1944, "If we are to secure the preservation of world peace -and that includes our peacewe must be willing to pay the price. That price is our cooper-ation with other nations of a similar mind."

## Shipping Must Be Protected

An unprovoked strafing attack by a Cuban fighter, on an unarmed ship bringing bauxite from Jamaica to the Reynolds Metals Co. plant here raises grave domestic and international questions.

The 31,000 - ton ore carrier J. Louis was under attack 13 miles off the coast of Cuba last week for approximately one hour. The attacking aircraft dropped flares to illuminate its target and made repeated strafing runs on the ship. Fortunately there were no casualties, but the superstructure of the ship was damaged and a fire started, but brought under control after two hours of fire-fight-

On the international side, the Department of State issued a statement 'deploring' this violation of the traditional freedom of the seas. An investigation is being launched to determine if a formal protest should be made on the basis of U.S. ownership of the ship-Universal Tankships, Inc., of New York-the State Department added.

On the domestic side the incident strikes home. It appears to be a direct threat to an essential U.S. industry, aluminum. At the present time practically all the bauxite ore being against attack without warning.

processed in the United States originates in the Caribbean area. The sources of supply are in Jamaica, Haiti, the Dominican Republic, British Guiana and Surinam. Ships in this trade must pass within sight of Cuba.

Despite stockpiles of bauxite in the continental U. S., systematic interdiction of this traffic could paralyze the aluminum industry of the United States. Immediate steps should be taken to ensure that there will be no repetition of this piratical attack. Naval and air escort should be provided, if necessary

The incident of the J. Louis recalls the mysterious disappearance of the Marine Sulphur Queen off the Florida Coast last Feb. 4. Could the Sulphur Queen have been a victim of a similar attack, one so successful that the ship sank without being able to send out a distress signal?

Freedom of the seas is too basic and fundamental a right to permit violation. The J. Louis was sailing 12 to 13 miles off the coast of Cuba, well beyond that nation's territorial jurisdiction. Even if a ship blunders into the waters of another nation, though, the doctrine of "innocent passage" should and must guarantee protection

## Reds Undermine Academic Freedom

of Caracas until after the Venezuelan presidential election Dec. 1, at the request of President Romula Betancourt, is a more drastic and perhaps more significant action than it may appear in this country

A once great Latin American tradition of academic freedom, sadly deteriorated by abuse into a sanctuary for subversion, may be in for regionwide modification.

Throughout Latin America, the "autonomous" national universities have over the past century acquired an immunity to police or military intervention to allow them academic freedom in an environment of recurrent revolution and military rule. These enclaves have been fountainheads of Latin American intellectual life and national leadership.

The closing of Central University and student bodies in Latin America. and many of the overaged nonstudying students are professional agitators who merely use the campus as a privileged base for treasonable activities. Such was the case in Caracas, where pro-Castro, Communist-led terrorists were using Central University as a sanctuary between sabotage ventures and murderous raids.

# Politics And Civil Rights

WASHINGTON - Maybe there will have to be another "march on Washington," and this time the demonstration may have to be directed to President Kennedy himself

For the Reverend Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., hero of the last 'march' and perhaps the most prominent of the Negro integration leaders, feels that Mr. Kennedy has "retreated" on the proposed "civil rights" legislation. Dr. King has just said in a public speech that "No President can be great or even fit for office if he attempts to accommodate political expediency with human rights."

THIS CRITICISM came as a result of the efforts of the President and the Attorney General to obtain a "civil rights" bill which would get through both houses of Congress. Dr. King accused the administration of using 'bad tactics' and said that, "If you start with a weak bill, and then get it watered down," it could become "a nothing bill.

The President, however, is much more familiar with what goes on behind the scenes in Congress than is Dr. King. Having been a member of the House as well as the Senate, Mr. Kennedy is acquainted with the many difficult barriers that arise through ordinary parliamentary procedures and these can block the passage of legislation. He feels that, if there is an opportunity to obtain later a separate bill that is stronger, he could always give his support to it.

THERE ARE fundamental differences between what is being called a "strong" bill and a "weak" bill. Thus, the President would be content with a bill which provided safeguards for the right to vote, the speed-up of public-



# Inez Robb Don't Write-DIAL

WASHINGTON-A new organization to counter probably the most dangerous instrument of policy in the nation's capital is spreading like wildfire through Washington. It is called the Compulsive Letter Writers Protective Association and demands the suppression of all letterheads in federal agencies.

Its motto is: "Don't write, DIAL." Its ballooning membership is pledged to run, not walk, to the nearest pay telephone station when he she feels an irresistible urge to write a private letter on a piece of public or federal

THE RECENT incident, in which former Secretary of the Navy Fred Korth was sunk without a trace by a backfiring Navy letterhead, has alerted all government employes to the built-in danger inherent in all federal letterheads

This incident follows by an administration (Eisenhower's) the first demonstration of the firepower inherent in departmental letterheads. The late Harold Talbot, former Secretary of the Air Force, was shot down by Air Force letterheads which he, too, used for the conduct of private business matters

THE FATAL attraction of such letterheads and their lethal fallout has led to a Washington rewrite of the old advice, "Do right and fear no man, don't write and fear no woman." The CLWPA now advises: "Do right and fear no man, don't write and fear

no Senate investigation. Until the CLWPA can obtain its objective, i.e., the complete suppression or abolition of all letterheads in federal offices a member who feels an uncontrollable urge to use federal

stationery for private ends has only to call the association THE CLWPA, in turn, will rush another member, his pockets loaded with dimes, to the succor of the weakening brother. The rescuer, after destroying all letterheads in sight, will lead the troubled member to the nearest public telephone booth.

"Our aim," an officer of the association explained to me, "is to teach our members that security lies not in the written but the speken word, especially if spoken into a pay booth. Such booths are not apt to be bugged and the federal servant can speak freely about his private hopes and dreams of private gain.

"WE HAVE discovered that too few people in government employ in Washington have ever heard the old wisdom in 'The moving finger writes: and, having writ, moves on; nor all your piety nor wit shall lure it back to cancel half a line, nor all your tears wash out a word of it.

> BRAZILIANS THINK of the Alliance for Progress as the Alliance for Problems. There hasn't been much "progress"-but the "problems" have increased, mainly because North Americans seem to be telling Brazilians. how to run their country. For example, the United States has made "land reform" in Brazil a condition for much of our AID. Our own government has often practiced agrarian reform by distributing publicly-owned land to homesteaders, by teaching agriculture methods and offering easy credit terms for seed and fertilizer. But the kind of reform which we seem to be pressing on Brazil-with the approval of the Labor ministers-is merely to take land from successful people and give it to the shiftless and unfortunate. Brazilian landowners naturally resist this as a form of "Cubanization."

VAST AMOUNTS of money - and arms-are coming into Brazil from the Soviet bloc. The American authorities know this, because they have confirmed to me what I learned in other places. Midnight landings of launches along the coasts, and unauthorized aircraft coming into major airports, could be stopped by the Brazilian Armed Forces, just as subsidy rings for printing tons of subversive literature could be smashed. But the Brazilian military, though 99 per cent loval, has been corrupted in the top echelons by the key appointment of Leftists

WHILE THE Russians make their money count, the Americans often let theirs dribble into blackmarket operations rather than crack down on Brazilian racketeers. A cache of Food For Peace, marked "fertilizer." was reported by the Mayor of Ouro Preto in the State of Minas Gerais. The American aiders have a policy of letting the materials pass through as many local hands as possible so as to spread the work of distribution.
