Zuber, an attorney, said at his home in Harlem Sunday night he wants to provide a forum for the expression of Negro views.

During the past five years, Zuber has become an expert in de facto school segregation-created by housing patterns. He has won school integration cases in New York City and New Rochelle, N.Y.; and Englewood and Newark, N.J., and is fighting a similar suit in Chicago.

The 37-year-old Zuber said he will conduct an "education campaign setting forth the Negro's position on civil rights" to New Hampshire voters starting next

"No one is better equipped to do this than a Negro, who is more affected by it than anyone else," he said.

Luber contended that neither Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller per his prospective rival in the primary, Sen. Barry Goldwater of Arizona, is qualified to discuss civil rights.

Zuber, a Republican, said he sees indications of a "serious racial explosion erupting in this country, unless the young Negro is convinced that his just demands are being considered by both major political par-

He is not being backed by the new Negro civil rights party, Freedom Now

He said he also will consider entering primaries in West Virginia, Wisconsin, Illinois, and California.



BY CHARLES H. GOREN ANSWERS TO BRIDGE QUIZ Q. 1-As South you hold:

What do you bid now? A.—Four hearts. It is true that partner's return to three hearts is in the nature of a sign off but one

What do you bid now?

A.—Two diamonds Offensive prospects on this hand are outstanding, for when partner responds with one no trump to a club opening that shows a hand of about average high card strength [8-11 points] plus a probable club fit. Since your holding is all controls, a siam investigation ahould be begun. If your reverse in diamonds elicits a glub preference, you can cue bid the ace of hearts next to see partner's reaction.

What do you bid now?

A.—Our choice is six spades. Since partner has made a positive response to your two bid without the ace of clubs, he surely has either the king of diamonds or the king of hearts, or both. This solves the problem of disposing of the six of hearts, for surely he must have a club suit as good as five to the king-jack.

What do you bid now?

A.—A drastic bid by you is in order at this time. While your hand started out with a value of 15 points, it has increased enormously as the bidding has developed, for you solidify both of partner's suits. The indicated call is, therefore, three spades, a cue bid forcing to game. Partner can hardly play you for more, inasmuch as you passed East's two spade bid, which in itself was rather a conservative manneuver.

What do you bid now?

A.—So far as partner is concerned, you may have nothing, yet he is forcing you to bid again at the level of two. He must, therefore, have a powerful holding. If you should respond with only two spades, he will have to proceed on the theory that your hand lacks offensive values. In order to avoid such a construction, you should bid one spade more than necessary, in other words, three spades.

# **Bids Called** For Jan. 3

DALLAS (AP)—Louisiana and Texas Sabine River Authorities will call for bids Jan. 3 on a master contract for the Toledo Bend Dam, power plant and related facilities.

The date was set after a meeting of Toledo Bend project joint operation representatives and officials of three investor-owned utility companies of the two states which will buy the power generated at the dam.

The start of construction on the \$60 million middle Sabine project is expected by May 1. The authorities plan to market \$30 million in revenue bonds to finance half the cost of the proj-

The other \$30 million will be split between the two states sponsoring Toledo Bend. Under a constitutional amendment approved by its voters, Louisiana will contribute \$15 million out of a cash surplus in its Confederate pension fund.

#### Politics Can Be Fun—For Ike

Dwight D. Eisenhower has made a most pleasant discovery: Politics isn't worse than death, it's fun.

Gettysburg, Pa., has become the Mecca for devout Republicans of every hue and stripe. Candidates, those who aspire to be candidates, political managers and fat cats, sidle up in a steady stream to the warm side of the former president. There they pause in ineffable bliss, embraced in the warm smile of the Eisenhower pres-

Pilgrimages to Gettysburg have become thick and fast of late. The comings and goings are minutely chronicled by newspapers. Almost anything Eisenhower says is cherished, seized upon and minutely dissected for any hint that he may favor this candidate as against that candidate.

Few Republicans are willing to accept at face value Eisenhower's statement that he would not take an active part in preconvention maneuvering. For they cannot believe he is so lacking in political humanity to refuse them a nod or a pat on the head. From Barry Goldwater to Nelson Rockefeller there is unquenchable

hope Eisenhower will betray, by word or sign, a preference. This is, so to speak, the "mother lode" of political treasure within the Republican Party in 1963 and 1964, one that must be worked assiduously

Consider, for instance, the wild excitement engendered by his casual inquiry to Herbert Brownell, former attorney general. All he did is ask Brownell if he, Eisenhower, would be qualified to serve as vice president. There is no evidence that Eisenhower had the remotest notion of running for the vice presidential nominationhe wanted to be vice president about as much as he "wanted a hole in the head," one confidant is quoted as saying privately. Nevertheless, the ticket was so overpowering that politicians couldn't bear to put it from them, at least for a time.

There's no denying that Eisenhower is enjoying this interlude. For eight long years he remained above the political battle. Now he has found that politics can be a diverting, intriguing and pleasantly rewarding pastime. No one of any political persuasion would begrudge him this new-found pleasure

#### David Lawrence Real War Threat In Berlin

WASHINGTON-A most sensational revelation has just been made by Premier Khrushchev. He tells the world that at any moment a war could break out between the United States and the Soviet Union, inasmuch as the Russian military commanders on the Berlin highway can decide for themselves to open fire on Allied troops and vehicles.

This state of affairs would normally be protected against a dangerous climax by diplomatic intervention, but Mr. Khrushchev apparently has given discretion to subordinate officers to shoot if they construe existing regulations about access to Berlin to be challenged. He indicates, that irrespective of the facts, he will blame the United States forces for having provoked the fighting.

THE SOVIET Premier permitted an unedited version of his remarks to a group of American businessmen to be released without any modification of his extreme statements. This is unusual. One of the visitors asked:

"Are you saying that if we cannot agree over procedure on the autobahn, that you would give an order that would result in shooting and possible

TO THIS, Mr. Khrushchev replied as follows:

"No, we gave no such order but there is an established procedure . . . It is a matter of a soldier being a soldier. He has operational instructions and if someone wants to break through, then it is the natural course of things that force will be met by force.

"It is something that is based on standing orders. A soldier is not a foreign minister. He cannot enter into negotiations and he has to carry out his orders. That is the law both for our soldiers and for yours.

"THEY (THE AMERICANS) made an attempt to ignore the established procedure. Thus our armored trucks came out of concealment to bar the way and then the American and British agreed to observe the established procedure.

to that. It is possible that you and I would not be here today. We would not have yielded and they would have had to move over our dead bodies."

THE AMERICAN version of the autobahn incident is that it was the Soviets who departed from the "established" procedure. This is the kind of argument that normally is threshed out by the foreign offices and the diplomats but the Khrushchev statement indicates clearly that the Soviet troops are under "operational instructions" to shoot whenever they themselves wish to deviate from the customary procedure and the Allied forces in response attempt to maintain their own rights.

No more dangerous set-up could be devised to bring on a war. If shooting starts, there will not be time to argue afterwards just who departed from the "established" rules. But now men. everybody knows that the Soviet military forces have been told to shoot when challenged. Mr. Khrushchev's policy appears to be to seek gradually to impose more and more restrictions until the Allied forces have been driven out of the Berlin area altogether.

IT WOULD APPEAR that nothing is more important now for the United States government than to have a clear-cut understanding with the Soviet Union as to what it intends to do in the area around Berlin and to ascertain whether Khrushchev has actually instructed his military forces to fire upon American forces whenever the latter do not act in accordance with procedures "established" unilaterally by the Soviets. It would seem desirable, too, to set up a machinery for immediately resolving any conflicts in understanding about "established" procedures.

How many times have you failed to do the thing which, in your heart, you knew God wanted you to do? How often have you committed a wrong act deliberately, knowing it was wrong? But during all this time, did Christ stop loving you? If you repented, did you find Him unwilling to forgive you? It may help you to stop and think how great is the love of Christ, how wonderful His forgiveness and compassion to you, although you never deserved it. If you will do this, with an honest heart, I do not believe it will be hard for you to forgive the one who has wronged you. Ask God to give you a truly loving and forgiving heart. Ask especially that He will bless the one against whom you have these feelings. If you will do this, His peace and joy will come into your heart and instead of resentment, you will have love. Best of all, your attitude may be used of God to win your enemy.

#### Nobel Prize For The Computer

In this best-of-all-possible worlds, to be forewarned is not so much to be forearmed as to be equipped to roll with the punches, which is a sound tactic for lasting out the fray.

So with this terse preliminary, I haul up the warning flag for persons in their middle and their sunset years. It is only a matter of timeand it is later than we think-until the Nobel prizes are awarded to computers, electric brains and the whole kit and kaboodle of electronic thinker-

IT IS BOUND to be a shock when the Nobel committees bypass man for the first time and award the laurels to computer XM 347-921-885374. It is bound to be a shock, that is, for those of us who grew up in the belief that man was the thinking reed, the only one of his creatures whom God endowed with intelligence to raise him above the level of the beasts.

On the other hand, it will come as no shock to the truly younger generation accustomed to machines that spew out three-course luncheons, radio back to earth the secret of the stars, wash the dishes, and in 30 minutes solve mathematical problems it would take 100 scientists, working in continuous eight-hour shifts, 42 years

HOWEVER, we who are a little older must face the fact that there is already a machine - a computer bucking for the Nobel prize in 1964. It is a computer in the hands of the Rev. Andrew Q. Morton of Culross,

Scotland, a Presbyterian minister. In conjunction with the computer, the Rev. Morton has just proved to his satisfaction that St. Paul, the mighty thunderer of Christianity, is the true author of only five of the epistles attributed to him in the New Testament. Mr. Morton says the computer declares that the great missionary-preacher wrote only Romans, First and Second Corinthians, Galatians and Philemon.

THE COMPUTER has spoken. St. Paul is not the author of First and Second Timothy, Titus, Ephesians, Philippians, Colossians and First and Second Thessalonians. His epistle to the Hebrews has always been in such doubt that the computer may not even have found it worthy of considera-

Even if he only wrote Romans, First and Second Corinthians, Galatians and Philemon, St. Paul is still the towering giant of the apostolic age, the tireless missionary who went up and down the world teaching the Gospel. He is still "a fountainhead of Christian doctrine," as much so for Catholic as for Protestant.

AND IF ST. PAUL is not the author of the suspect epistles, can the computer tell us who is? For whoever the other letters was in with the same fervor and faith that set St. Paul on fire. If the computer can deny authorship, should it not prove its pre-eminence, its worthiness of the Nobel prize, by attributing authorship?

#### Some Views On Venezuela

CARACAS, Venezuela - She is a dark, handsome Spanish-Colombian, the mother of two children, and her American husband is off on a field trip to the interior. We are at a late cocktail party in a Caracas apartment house, looking down from the balcony over the winking city where the Terror roams by night:

"THIS COUNTRY and my country, Colombia, will go the way of Cuba. There is no stopping it. We know that arms are coming in by boat and plane. It is no longer possible to reason with people who are poor. They say 'Go away. We have Communist leaders who tell us what to do.' My husband could go back to his New York firm and we would all be safe, and my children would grow up as Americans. But he says that it is right for him to stay because he has some knowledge. Everybody with knowledge should do whatever can be done to help."

HE IS Lynn Rinehart, Peace Corps, Parkersburg, West Virginia, a lean, blond boy with an aristocratic air of social purpose, a YMCA worker who looks more like a young author. He invites me to go with him tomorrow on a jeep trip into the cloudland that sits upon the mountains which rim this town. Often hidden from view by the clouds, he says these are the workers' slums, the heart and center of the Communist population. His jeep has a government license, so the Communists will sometimes yell at him and sometimes, at night, take

"YOU ALWAYS think that things which happen to others won't happen to you. But I don't drive through there at night any more. The Y's job is to organize sports, and to try that way to instill some ideas of leadership and responsibility What does a Peace Corpsman hope

to accomplish, anyhow? Rinehart said that he hoped to improve the living standards of a few people who might, as their lives brighten, look to something better than communism and America-hating. He hoped, also, that as Corpsmen returned from their two-year tours of duty, they'd spread some awareness in the home communities of how much the world needs American leadership.

HE IS A SUAVE, cultivated Venezuelan scientist, educated in part in the U. S. A., but he does not wish to be identified with what he has to say. "There is one word to sum up Veneruela-confusion! This covers all the social classes, high and low. We have taught some of the people to talkbut not to work.

"Then there is perhaps 65 per cent of the country which is illiterate. And fully 75 per cent which does not know how to think. Ignorance is their trouble, and the politicians get to them. Who is the culprit? The Communists tell them that it's America. There is only one reason why the people in this generation hate America-that reason Russia. There is no hope for a change-not for two or three generations of education."

HE IS DR. Victor Fossi, Dean of the Faculty of Architecture at the Central University of Venezuela. We are talking in his office amid the singularly attractive, semi-tropical campus created under the regime of the tailed Dictator Perez Jimenez. A trim, energetic, humorous man. Dr. Fossi took his degree in City Planning at the University of California at Berkeley in 1954. He thinks of architecture as a blend of classic arts and social utility. Today, he feels, the teaching of architecture is caught in the mangle of polemic politics.

"MORE AND MORE, the teaching and discussion of building runs to ideology. Where you have the idea that all enterprises must be nationalized, and that only the State can coordinate urban and industrial planning, it is impossible to keep politics out of the classroom. We have leftwing professors who talk politics and little else. We have 1,000 students in the architecture school, where we ought to have 200 or 250."

A HOUSEWIFE, a Peace Corpsman, a don't - quote - me - scientist, an outspoken educator . . . You could say that their opinions on Venezuela's chances to survive as a free nation run the gamut from no to maybe to very provisional affirmative. It is a fair estimate of a tortured situation.
