Critical Index

Texas, despite many aspects of prosperity, is encountering serious difficulty in financing educational improvement and expansion, providing the community facilities needed by a burgeoning urban population, and meeting other state needs.

One cause of that difficulty is the lag of Texans' per capita income behind the national average. Although aggregate income in this state is at an all - time high of around \$20 billion a year, per capita income has lagged from 7.2 per cent below the national average in 1949 to 12.9 per cent below now. Population growth is outrunning economic expansion in this state by a wider margin than it is nation-

So long as that is the case, Texas is likely to continue to find itself below national averages in such things as educational payments, welfare programs, and public works and services. For per capita income is a good measure of a state's relative prosperity, well-being and capacity for prog-

Noting this per capita income lag,

Dr. John R. Stockton, director of the University of Texas' Bureau of Business Research, warns that this state must become more vigorously competitive. Speaking at the recent Texas Municipal League convention in Houston, he advised that no economic up-

surge can be expected in the fields heretofore powering the Texas economy-agriculture, oil and gas, and refined products. Best prospects for boosting the

state's economy are space industries. tourism, and manufacturing not confined to local markets. The latter are largely "footloose" activities, whose location is not governed by such fixed factors as raw-materials sources, and competition in attracting them is keen and intensifying. If Texas fails to meet that competition successfullyand it is just starting a relatively modest state advertising programits per capita income will continue to lag hurtfully behind the national av-

The picture of the getaway car driver struggling in vain with a standard gear shift until he and his fellow thieves had to flee without the loot makes for belly laughs.

The second act in the drama has its humorous aspects, too. Wrecking crew laborers watched the first act from box seats high on a nearby build-

ing, then got into the show by appropriating the stolen jewels themselves. But amusement sours as one considers the attitude of these men. They were workers, not criminals-yet when the chance came they grabbed what was not theirs. The temptation was great, true. But this ready seizure of opportunity to commit high crime is not all an amusing commentary on the materialism that calls the turn so often in our society.

IN A SIGNIFICANT memorandum written on July 16, 1933, to President Roosevelt by Robert F. Kelley, chief of the division of Eastern European Affairs in the Department of State, the following warning had been giv-

"It would seem, therefore, that an essential prerequisite to the establishment of harmonious and trustful relations with the Soviet government is the abandonment by the present rulers of Russia of their world revolutionary aims and the discontinuance of their activities designed to bring about the realization of such aims. More specifically and with particular regard to the United States, this prerequisite involves the abandonment by Moscow of direction, supervision, control, financing, etc., through every agency utilized for the purpose of Communist or other related activities in the United States."

THE DOCUMENTS exchanged in Washington on November 16, 1933, between President Roosevelt and Foreign Minister Maxim Litvinoff made a particular effort to cover the point in the Kelley memorandum. The notes of recognition contained mutual promises, and the Russian government thus agreed to the following

"To refrain and to restrain all persons in government service and all organizations of the government or under its direct or indirect control. including the organizations in receipt of any financial assistance from it, from any act overt or covert liable

The Voice Of Doom

There have been few times in my career as a newspaperman when I have covered murder trials where the state was in earnest about trying to get the death penalty. Occasionally, the prosecutor will qualify jurors as to their opinions on capital punishment, but only in rare instances is the supreme penalty an inflexible objective.

And if the verdict turns out that way, it is not always easy to pronounce doom upon the defendant, although like as not he did that very same thing on his victim.

MANY YEARS ago the community had been stirred when a man was charged with having killed his wife. From the time the special venire reported until the jury came in, there was hardly a moment that the courtroom on the second floor of the old sandstone courthouse was not jammed. Spectators came early, some bringing their lunch. Old nesters had nothing better to do, and they got there early and stayed late. Some mamas brought along babies, who set up a howl now and then and had to be muffled and slipped out through crowded aisles. School children, perhaps on the pretext this was a project in civics, lined the walls. The air was foul, and you could cut the smoke with

THE TRIAL WORE on laboriously. The state was able to establish a chain of abuses and through them the element of premeditation. The defense hammered at its best hope, that the defendant had been intoxicated, committed the act in a fit of irresponsible passion and therefore without premedtation. One after one the witnesses paraded through the standing spectators, and then came the final summa-

Dramatically the prosecutor reviewed his case, reconstructing the events carefully, step by step and with rising feeling until he came to the climaxthe moment of death-and down he

brought his hand, again and again. Mercy, mercy, mercy-this was all the defense could really plead. The jury went out and in a matter of a few hours it filed solemnly back in. The court rapped for order. "Gentlemen," he asked, "have you reached a

THE FOREMAN spoke, half inaudibly and nodded. The court asked

him to state the verdict. "We find the defendant-guilty." A murmur went through the room, and the court swept stern eyes over the spectators. Everyone strained to catch the next words, and somewhere there drifted through the word . . . "death."

The usual motions for trial were filed and overruled, the ordinary courses of appeal followed, and finally the final decision-the verdict was upheld

THE SENTENCE had to be pronounced, but here there was a hitch. The judge had been called to another district to hear litigation. A member of the bar was named to sit in his place, but when this erstwhile gentleman got wind what was involved, he begged off. Another was approached, and though he did not relish it, he agreed to handle it.

He had the defendant, now sallow and thin from long confinement, brought before the court and asked if he had anything to say before sentence was passed. The man said "no"

THEN BRAVELY, the special judge pronounced the sentence that "you be taken to the state penitentiary and be electrocuted until you are DEAD, " and his voice choked . Dead . 'dead, and may God have mercy on your soul.

The man seemed to sag just a little. The judge banged down the gavel, and the man hung his head and turned between the sheriff and a deputy, and walked out on his journey to

ONE ESSAY in this book, "Change in a Disarmed World," by Arnold Toynbee, is sapient to a degree that destroys the central argument for warlessness. Some civilizations, he says-like the Roman and Chinese Empires-were "warless" in that they kept peace with the sword. Well. a Communist Empire could do that, but we wouldn't like it. For a "warless" society to prosper, says Toynbee, it must act upon "the truth that continuous change is of the essence of human life.

BUT WHEN was there ever change without violence? And when was peacetime change a final substitute for war? Our own American "empire" reached its continental limits, and consolidated itself in the War of 1861-65, and thereafter allowed the greatest play to internal changes. Following the Civil War, we won the Wild West, accepted waves of foreign immigrants, went through the successive disruptions of Labor strikes, economic depressions and readjustments -did just about everything that should, by the Toynbee theory, distract our minds and energies from

BUT SOME necessity in the human spirit would never permit even as free, fortunate and self-contained an empire as ours to turn pacifist. When we had driven Spain from the Hemisphere, we no longer had an enemy in sight. Nevertheless, soon we acquired one in Japan by extending into the Pacific, and we allowed Presidents Wilson and Roosevelt to join wars in Europe.

Such is the nature of man. It is not to be altered by any power less than our Maker. The danger is that pacifism could make us lose sight of a verity which isn't much cited in these days. It is this-horrible though it be to fight a war, it's a whole lot worse
