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Congolese Club, Jail Two Soviets

LEOPOLDVILLE, the Congo (AP) — Congolese security agents and gendarmes dragged two Soviet diplomats from their car Tuesday, beat them with clubs and hauled them off to jail. They were still held today. Soviet embassy officials said the diplomats were embassy counselor Boris Noronin and press attache Yuri Miakotnykh. The officials said they had no word on their fate. Eyewitnesses said Noronin and Miakotnykh refused to allow the Congolese to search their car on their return from Brazzaville, across the Congo River. The diplomats claimed diplomatic immunity. Soviet embassy officials said the Congolese also had cut the telephone and electric supply to the luxury apartment where the 100-man Soviet mission lives and works. Sources close to the Congolese government hinted that "highly compromising" documents had been seized from the two arrested diplomats. Gendarmes stood guard outside the embassy building Tuesday night, refusing to allow callers to enter. Relations between the Congolese government and the Communist bloc have been bad, and some members of Premier Cyrille Adoula's regime recently were agitating for a break with the Soviet Union, Poland, Czechoslovakia and Bulgaria, the Communist nations with

Widow Of Baker Ally Summoned

WASHINGTON (AP) — Senators investigating the steaming Robert G. Baker case have called the widow of one of his partners as their first outside witness. Gertrude Novak will be questioned Thursday at a closed session of the Senate Rules Committee, Chairman B. Everett Jordan, D-N.C. announced. Mrs. Novak's husband, Alfred, whose death on March 3, 1962, was ruled a suicide, was among Baker's partners in the Carousel Motel at Ocean City, Md. She will be the committee's first witness other than Sen. John J. Williams, R-Del. Williams has supplied the committee with information he gathered in a one-man investigation before Baker resigned as secretary to the Senate Democratic majority on Oct. 7 after questions of possible conflict of interest were raised about his outside business interests. Sen. Ralph Yarborough, D-Tex., charged Tuesday night that Baker had a hand in keeping him from a choice committee assignment back in 1961. Yarborough told a newsman that after he lost his bid for a seat on the Judiciary Committee he learned from friends that Baker had told some people: "We couldn't afford to let Yarborough have that seat. He would be in a position to prevent Lyndon from controlling it."

20 Dead, 76 Hurt In Caracas Terror

CARACAS, Venezuela (AP) — Police firing bazookas flushed snipers from buildings in downtown Caracas today as officials strove to quell pro-Communist violence that has left nearly 100 dead or wounded. A woman was killed and six other persons, including a policeman, were wounded as fighting spread from the workers' suburbs to El Silencio, a district of modern business buildings. Coming on the heels of Venezuela's worst day of terrorism Tuesday, the new casualties put the two-day toll at 20 killed and 76 wounded. President Romulo Betancourt remained in his office throughout the night, directing the roundup of the terrorists by police, the army and national guard. The number under arrest rose to 150 and police said most were Communist party members. Many were youths who wore black pants and red sweaters as a sort of uniform. Among those held were 40 persons seized by troops Tuesday night for sniping at traffic. With the return of quiet at dawn, business houses reopened and traffic returned to the streets. Merchants shut down because of telephoned threats and motorists stayed home Tuesday when Castroite-Communist op-

PHNOM PENH, Cambodia (AP) — The Cambodian Foreign Ministry summoned U. S. Ambassador Philip D. Sproule today, presumably to deliver orders from ruling Prince Norodom Sihanouk for an immediate end to the \$30 million-a-year program of U. S. military and economic aid to his country. Sihanouk announced his decision to a wildly cheering rally of his political party Tuesday. He charged U. S. aid was being used to undermine his regime and that rebel Cambodians based in South Viet Nam were using American equipment. ALL MISSIONS The prince said he did not want to sever diplomatic relations with the United States but that "all U. S. missions other than a skeleton diplomatic staff must go." The State Department earlier Tuesday instructed Sproule to inform the Cambodian government that the prince's charges were false. But Sihanouk apparently acted before the denial could be transmitted to him. Work on U. S. aid projects actually halted yesterday after Sihanouk's speech. American officials said the various aid programs would be phased out as fast as possible. HIT ECONOMY Cambodia has a foreign exchange reserve of about 90 million which should keep the little Southeast Asian nation solvent for several years. But a break in economic ties with the United States is expected to hit the Cambodian economy hard. Funds derived from the U. S. commercial import program in Cambodia paid for about 40 percent of the upkeep of the nation's small armed forces, but most of the military training is handled by a French mission of about 800 men. Cambodia also receives some economic aid from the Soviet Union and Communist China. MILITARY COUP Sihanouk's decision to cut economic ties with the United States was generally attributed to a widespread belief that U. S. aid cuts in South Viet Nam last summer resulted in the military coup that overthrew President Ngo Dinh Diem. Sihanouk apparently wanted to be free of

any such potential danger. The prince also has shown increasing friendliness to Communist China since the installation of a coalition regime in neighboring Laos raised the possibility of an eventual Communist takeover there. American aid is mainly concentrated on agricultural and educational projects. The United States also has supplied most of the equipment in the small Cambodian armed forces and a 65-man military mission to advise in the use of the equipment.

Communism Creeping To Goal In Southeast Asia

By The Associated Press Communism has inched a bit closer to one of its short-term goals in Southeast Asia, and the long-range threat to that strategic area has been increased. What has just happened in Cambodia should be no surprise. The United States has had more than two years to prepare for the announcement that Cambodia would send the Yankes packing, along with their aid. Surprise or not, the effect can be to advance the cause of neutralism in the area. It can cause rulers to weigh cautiously the prospects for making peace with Peking. LAOS FORMULA The Communists achieved a step in their campaign to move in on Southeast Asia when a neutralist formula for Laos was adopted at Geneva. Laos borders Cambodia on the north and separates it from China. The Communists wanted the same formula for the other former French Indo-China states, including South Viet Nam. The idea appeared to be neutralization first, then expulsion of Western influence. Finally the Communists would dominate and not necessarily by outright conquest. Any unraveling of Red designs in Asia is complicated by the ideological war between Moscow and Peking. Moscow helped evolve the neutralist formula for Laos, but Southeast Asia is out of Moscow's reach. If it is to be dominated by a Communist power, it will be by Red China. NOT U.S. More than two years ago, Prince Norodom Sihanouk, Cambodia's chief of state, told a Soviet newspaper that if his country had to be allied with any foreign power, "it probably would not be with one in the West which has never understood or supported us." This was despite American aid. It bruises American feelings to learn that U. S. aid is not always entirely welcome in Southeast Asia. It sometimes creates — as in Laos — problems of inflation and economic dislocations. There never seemed much mutual confidence between the assisting Americans and the Cambodian regime. Always conscious of China, and with the Oriental long-range view of the future, the Cambodian regime wanted to be neutral. The Americans feared it would be "neutral" on the Communist side. Cambodia is taking the plunge and divorcing herself from U. S. help. If this neutralism, combined with that of Laos, should lead one day to domination of the two countries by Communists, overtly or covertly, the West would suffer a severe strategic setback.

Bundle From Stranger Meant Arrest For Prof

WASHINGTON (AP)—Photographs bundled inside a roll of newspapers and thrust into his hands by a stranger in front of a Moscow hotel apparently were Yale Prof. Frederick C. Barghoorn's passport to arrest seconds later by Soviet police. In the 16 days that he was imprisoned on spy charges, he told newsmen Tuesday, he was not mistreated and signed no confessions. He said his experience has not shattered his belief that cultural exchange programs between the United States and Russia are a good thing. But the State Department still has not given a go-ahead for scheduled exchange talks which the United States canceled because of the Barghoorn incident. Barghoorn, 52, who was released Saturday and returned home Sunday, met with State Department officials for six hours Tuesday to talk about his Moscow experience. Then he met with newsmen, telling this story. On Oct. 31, the eve of his planned departure from Moscow, he returned to the Metro-pole Hotel in the Soviet capital around 7:25 p.m. Suddenly he was approached by a "young,ish-looking man, carrying what looked like a roll of newspapers." The man asked something which Barghoorn believes was: "Are you an American?" "I was startled, said yes, and he pushed toward me the roll of newspapers. I took it, I thought, perhaps foolishly, that it was propaganda material and put it into my coat. Almost simultaneously I was grabbed and hustled off in an automobile." He said there were photographs in the roll, adding "I would not understand military matters." Barghoorn said that neither on this trip nor on previous visits to Russia was he on "intelligence assignment."

Must Replace Automation's Jobs, Says Businessman

NEW YORK (AP) — Millionaire businessman John I. Snyder Jr. says the United States faces great social upheaval if it can't provide jobs for men replaced by machines. Warning of "really staggering" unemployment, Snyder urged the AFL-CIO Tuesday to join with the federal government and the National Association of Manufacturers to find a solution. "I'd join with the devil himself if I could find the solution to this problem," said AFL-CIO President George Meany. Meany and 1,200 AFL-CIO convention delegates gave Snyder a reception that was warm, although subdued, after a convention floor fight over readmitting the ostracized Teamsters Union. Meany, with the help of most delegates, wielded a heavy gavel, in killing the move to consider taking back the Teamsters, ousted on corruption charges in 1957. Snyder, president of U. S. Industries Inc., manufacturers of automation equipment, linked the civil rights movement and the growing unemployment problem, saying: "The gap between the column of figures running down the balance sheet and the column of Negroes marching down an embattled street is a slim one indeed." He described himself as no

particular friend of labor, but if the unemployment problem is not solved, I will have difficulty selling them." The problem calls for a total effort by labor, management and government, Snyder said, and he favored a reduced work week as one of the answers.

Vietnamese Policy Talked

HONOLULU (AP) — High level talks on the United States future policies in Viet Nam and all of Southeast Asia began today in Pacific military command headquarters near Honolulu. The day-long session brought together top-drawer military men and diplomats from Washington and Saigon to map out future strategy in the fight against communism in Southeast Asia. Secretary of Defense Robert S. McNamara arrived Tuesday night and termed the meeting "just another in a series in which we will review our program of commitments in Viet Nam." McNamara said in a plane-side interview that U. S. assistance to Viet Nam in its fight against subversion will be discussed at the session, as well as the return home of U. S. personnel in Viet Nam. Also scheduled to attend the meeting was Gen. Maxwell D. Taylor, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff. Secretary of State Dean Rusk was to arrive today. From Saigon Tuesday came Henry Cabot Lodge, U. S. ambassador to South Viet Nam, and Gen. Paul D. Harkins, head of the U. S. military advisory group there.

JFK May Land Amidst Texas Democrat Hassles

WASHINGTON (AP) — President John F. Kennedy will make five speeches in Texas Thursday and Friday in a trip billed "non-political" but probably will land in the middle of state Democratic party hassles. Jacqueline Kennedy, the First Lady, will accompany the President on the trip to Texas which also includes two receptions and a night at the celebrated LBJ Ranch, the Gillespie County show-place spread of Vice President Lyndon B. Johnson. White House Press Secretary Pierre Salinger said Tuesday Mrs. Kennedy probably would accompany the President at most of his public appearances in Texas. PARTY FACTION Rep. Henry Gonzalez, the liberal Democratic congressman from San Antonio, said he has reports of friction between Gov. John Connally of Texas and a party faction headed by Sen. Ralph Yarborough, D-Tex., over plans for the Kennedy trip. Gonzalez said constituents had told him that Democrats who didn't support Connally in his race for governor were being ignored in the visit planning. He said Yarborough was not included among those Connally invited to an Austin reception for the President. At Austin, a spokesman for the governor said Yarborough was not invited because the reception is for state legislators and officials elected in statewide elections only. Yarborough, however, has been invited to the dinner and will be introduced

along with other members of Congress from Texas. SAN ANTONIO Kennedy will fly from Washington to San Antonio Thursday arriving at 1:30 p.m. (CST). After the San Antonio activities, he will arrive in Houston by plane at 4:15 p.m. and from there will go to Fort Worth for the night, arriving at Carswell Air Force Base at 10:45 p.m. After a Fort Worth breakfast the President will fly to Dallas arriving at Love Field at 11:35 a.m. where he will address a luncheon which also has touched off fights between party members. In Dallas, Baxton Bryant—a friend of the late Speaker Sam Rayburn and defeated in the last Democratic primary for the nomination for the congressional seat now held by Republican Bruce Alger—has charged that Republicans are running the Dallas luncheon show. RANK AND FILE Bryant heads a group of 63 liberal-loyalist Democrats who fired a telegram to Kennedy this week, asking that he "make himself available to rank and file Democrats." Earlier Bryant had charged that the tentative seating arrangement at the Dallas luncheon did not put Yarborough at the head table. However, it was announced Tuesday that President Kennedy had invited Yarborough to fly with him into Dallas and that the senior Texas senator would be seated at the head table. It was also revealed that Sen. John Tower, the state's Republican senator, had been invited

to attend the "non-partisan luncheon" arranged by Republicans and Democrats. However, Tower said he did not plan to attend. TO AUSTIN The Kennedy party will leave Dallas after the luncheon and arrive in Austin at Bergstrom Field at 2:35 p.m. In Austin, he will attend receptions sponsored by the Democratic State Committee and one at the governor's mansion before an 8:20 p.m. \$100-a-plate dinner sponsored by the State Democratic Committee. Democratic party chairman for Texas Eugene Locke of Dallas will be master of ceremonies at the \$100-a-plate dinner, the only event on the two-day schedule which the White House has said would be a political event. Mrs. Kennedy, Mrs. Johnson, Gov. and Mrs. Connally will be among those at the head table in Austin. A spokesman for the governor said Tuesday it had not been decided whether Sen. Yarborough would sit on the stage, where the head table will be located, or with Texas members of Congress in a reserved section. LBJ RANCH After the dinner, the President and vice president with their wives will return to Bergstrom AFB and take a helicopter to the LBJ Ranch, 65 miles west of Austin near Stonewall. The presidential party is expected to remain at the ranch on the Pedernales River until about noon Saturday. But the White House has indicated no exact time for the departure for Bergstrom from where the group will return to Washington. Mrs. Johnson has said that no other guests have been invited to the ranch so that the President and Mrs. Kennedy might rest after the strenuous tour. Pierre Salinger said Tuesday the Democratic National Committee would pay the cost of presidential transportation for all mileage accounted for by the flight to Austin. Asked how much mileage was involved, the press secretary said, "It's a very small amount."

Tarawa Battle Still Relived By Shoup

WASHINGTON (AP) — After 20 years, Marine Gen. David M. Shoup still relives the blood-drenched Battle of Tarawa — all but a few vital seconds that remain a blank in his mind.

Those were the seconds it took Shoup to dash about 40 yards across bullet-and-mortar-swept coral sand to the shelter of a blockhouse wall.

From there, the man who was to become commandant of the Marine Corps directed the savage assault on the tiny Central Pacific island which Japan had converted into a fortress.

That three-day battle, which began at dawn just 20 years ago today, was the most costly brief engagement in Marine history.

When it was over, 990 Ma-

rine were dead — many shot down before they could wade ashore from disabled or stranded landing craft. Another 2,311 Leathernecks were wounded.

Only 18 of the 4,800-man Japanese garrison lived to be captured. The rest were slain in tank bunkers, or killed themselves rather than surrender.

Shoup, 58, has good reason to remember Tarawa — he won the Medal of Honor there.

The citation said this: "Although severely shocked by an exploding enemy shell soon after landing . . . and suffering from a serious, painful leg wound which had become infected, Col. Shoup fearlessly exposed himself to the terrific and relentless artillery, ma-

chinegun and rifle fire. . . TO CHARGE

"Rallying his hesitant troops he gallantly led them across the fringing reefs to charge the heavily fortified island and reinforce our hard-pressed, thinly held lines. . .

Graying but still rugged-looking, Shoup reminisced about the battle as he sat in his big, memento-cluttered office at Marine headquarters.

"It's as clear as though it was yesterday," Shoup told an interviewer in accents that reflected his Indiana birth.

"But there's one period of several seconds that's been a blank all these years. . .

"I remember looking over a coconut log barrier and picking the route I would take. I

remember reaching the blockhouse with my radio man. But I've never been able to reconstruct what happened in between."

Shoup had crouched behind the log barrier after wading several hundred yards through shallow water churned by bullets and exploding shells.

Like many of his men, Shoup started walking toward shore when his amphibious tractor was knocked out. His amtrack's driver was picked off.

The colonel clasped his hands with a Marine corporal and began pushing his way along the shallow reef.

"I felt his grip tighten, and I looked around at him," Shoup said.

"A sniper had put a bullet be-

tween his eyes."

Shoup was silent a moment, then went on:

"I wouldn't be here today if I hadn't turned to look at him."

For just then, another bullet fired by a Japanese sniper struck the water, spent its force and slammed into Shoup's neck.

If it had hit him in the face, Shoup believes he would have been killed. Instead, he escaped with a badly swollen neck.

In all, Shoup was struck in nine different places. Most of the wounds were nicks, he said.

His most acute memories are the promises he made in an effort to comfort some of those who were dying under the blazing sun of Tarawa — promises

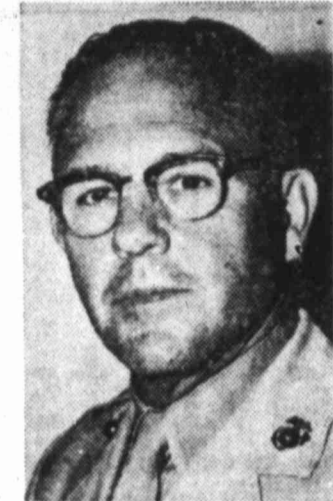
to help take care of their children.

"These promises I made without any realization of how I could fulfill them," he said, "yet those men died believing what I promised."

To make good on those battlefield promises, Shoup has put all his weight behind a scholarship fund set up by the 2nd Marine Division Assn. to educate the children of men who died at Tarawa.

Tonight, as on all other anniversaries of the battle, Shoup will get together with a group of its survivors.

They will gather at the commandant's home for the last time before he retires Dec. 31, ending a 37-year career with the corps.

Railroad Plans To Appeal Damage Suit Tried Here

The \$95,586.71 verdict returned Tuesday in favor of a former locomotive fireman against the Texas and Pacific Railway Co. by a jury in 118th District Court will be appealed. Walter J. Burns, Big Spring, is plaintiff.

George Leonard, Sweetwater chief attorney for the defendant and R. H. Weaver, Big Spring, his associate have already ordered court reporter Jerry Spence to prepare a transcript of the case.

Technically, the appeal cannot be filed until after a motion for new trial has been made and judgment entered. However, the preparation of the transcript will be a sizeable task. Leonard has already ordered the work started. The case took four days to try.

Two Career Girls' Murder In 'Unlikely Crime' Still Mystery

NEW YORK (AP)—The victims were unlikely. The location was unlikely. The crime was unlikely.

Yet, on Aug. 28 in their fashionable \$250-a-month apartment, two young career girls from well-to-do backgrounds, died beneath the slashing knives of a killer. In the frenzied attack their slayer broke off the blades of two knives, flung them aside and got still a third from the kitchen of the 4-room apartment.

The killer took nothing. He left nothing behind.

"There was nothing there that wasn't supposed to be there," one officer said. "There is nothing to check out."

AROUND CLOCK

Still, 24 detectives and some specialists work around the clock, continuing the routine checking which they hope will turn up a lead. A special telephone is manned 24 hours a day.

They have questioned 400 persons, talked with police in virtually every state and with Scotland Yard about knife crimes, evaluated more than 1,000 telephone calls, and taken the fingerprints of friends of the girls.

Officers checked out known perverts of the type who make anonymous telephone calls to women, such as had bothered Miss Wylie.

No solid lead has emerged.

Three girls shared the apartment.

NEWSWEEK

Miss Wylie, 21, daughter of television producer and writer Max Wylie, niece of novelist Philip Wylie, an aspiring actress, employed as an editorial assistant by Newsweek magazine, which has offered a \$10,000 reward.

Miss Hoffert, 23, daughter of Dr. Henry Hoffert, a Minneapolis surgeon; scheduled to begin teaching at Valley Stream in Long Island the next month; in the process of moving into another apartment with her former college roommate.

Patricia Tolles, 21, daughter of Dean Winton Tolles of Hamilton College, Clinton, N.Y.; an editorial assistant for Time magazine.

Police reconstructed the events at the third-floor apartment at 37 East 88th St., between Fifth and Madison Avenues.

Miss Hoffert left about 9:25 a.m. to return a car to a friend in the Riverdale section of the Bronx and pick up her own car. She had borrowed the larger car to move some furniture to her new apartment.

Five minutes later, Miss Tolles left for work, leaving Miss Wylie asleep in the bedroom they shared. Miss Wylie had planned to go to Washington for the civil rights march that day, but changed her mind and agreed to work in place of another Newsweek employee, beginning at 1 p.m. She slept nude.

About 10 a.m., Miss Hoffert arrived in Riverdale, where she stayed for about an hour.

IN RAINCOAT

Sometime after her friends' departure, Miss Wylie apparently was awakened by the doorbell and apparently answered it in a raincoat. The raincoat was found by the entrance.

Her body, still nude but sexually unmoiled, was in Miss Hoffert's room, the nearest refuge from the front door. She lay across the wire of an electric radio-clock, stopped at 10:32.

No one remembers seeing Miss Hoffert return, but it must have been after 11:30 a.m. because of the distance from Riverdale.

The killer washed in the bathroom. No one remembers seeing a bloody or rumpled person in the area.

NO ANSWER

Newsweek called the apartment during the afternoon, without answer. The magazine also called Miss Wylie's parents and Miss Tolles at work, trying to find out why Miss Wylie had not come to the office.

Miss Tolles came home about 6 p.m. and opened her front door to a disarray of overturned furniture. She saw the bloody bathroom and the stained knife there and called Miss Wylie's father.

He found the bodies in Miss Hoffert's room, on the floor between the blood-drenched bed and the window.

BY BOTTLE

Each had been struck with a soft drink bottle, Miss Wylie so hard as to crush her skull. Each had been slashed again and again about the neck and body. The two broken kitchen knives were there with the shattered soft drink bottle.

Strips of sheet bound the wrists and ankles of the victims. Other strips tied them together by the wrist, facing each other. Miss Hoffert fully clothed.

There are explanations for all the fingerprints in the apartment except two: One on the bedroom dresser and one on the bathroom doorjamb and neither classifiable.

Police don't know whether the killer was a man or a woman, stranger or friend.

New Cold Front May Bring More Showers

A wide sector of Texas was drying out Wednesday after general, soaking rains while a new approaching cool front was due to set off another round of precipitation during the week-end.

Downpours ranging up to 3.80 inches fell at many points Wednesday while two tornadoes

inflicted minor property damage in the Red River Valley. Baird in Central West Texas had 3.80 inches while Thorp had 3.50 and Norton 3.20. Other heavy rains included Tuscola and Ovalo 2.75 inches, Putnam 2.70, Cisco 2.60, Winters and Snyder 2.50, Eastland 2.40, Robert Lee 2.25, Dublin 2.20, Wichita Falls 1.72, Abilene and Bowie 1.65, Strawn 1.54, San Angelo 1.13, Lubbock 1.11 and Roanoke, Tyler and Longview one inch with lesser amounts reported at a number of other points. Sections of Dallas received up to 2 inches.

One twister knocked down a barn and overturned a house trailer in the Spanish Fort community, 17 miles northwest of Nocona, while another tornado damaged five barns near Muenster.

Skies were clear in West Texas and partly cloudy to cloudy in the eastern section of the state early Wednesday. The U.S. Weather Bureau reported that rains, which had swept eastward across the state, ended along the Louisiana border shortly before dawn.

Early morning temperatures ranged from 28 degrees at Dal-

hart to 71 at Palacios and Galveston. Generally they were in the upper 30s and the 40s in the Panhandle, far West Texas and North Central Texas, in the 50s across the central portion of the state and in the 60s along the coast.

A new cool front was due to move into the Panhandle late Thursday, triggering showers. The extended forecast called for the showers to spread over most of the state by Friday and Saturday with rains ranging up to one inch.

Opening lead: Jack of ♠
A slight slip in timing proved fatal to declarer's cause in today's hand. The bidding was straightforward. Holding seven points in support of spades, North had a minimum but nevertheless sound raise. South was well fortified and, even allowing for the slight devaluation of his singleton queen, he had more than enough to contract for game in spades.

West opened the jack of diamonds and the ace was played from the dummy. Declarer apparently had to lose three tricks in the heart suit, so that the fate of the contract appeared to hinge on the trump situation. In his haste to find out how the spades split, South promptly cashed the ace and king.

When East showed out on the second round, declarer's prospects were considerably dimmed. He continued by taking his top clubs and ruffing a third round in dummy. A diamond was trumped in the closed hand to enable South to ruff out his last club. Another diamond was trumped with the eight of spades bringing declarer's trick total to nine — five top tricks in spades, diamonds and clubs and two ruffs in each of the minor suits.

South was still left with one trump, the jack of spades and, if there were some way to lead from the dummy at this stage, he could have put his trump honor to good use by ruffing out North's last diamond for the game fulfilling trick. Since he was in his hand, however, he had to surrender the lead, and after West drew the last trump with the spade queen the defenders took the remaining tricks.

South's mistake was quite simple. At trick two, he should have led a diamond from dummy in order to get in an early ruff. He could now cash top trumps and, if the spades split, everything becomes routine. When the queen of spades holds out, South begins his cross-ruff as before. The only difference is that, with one ruff already in, declarer is in position when the last diamond is led from dummy to put his jack of spades to effective use to score the 10th trick. The defense has no effective counter-measure at their disposal.

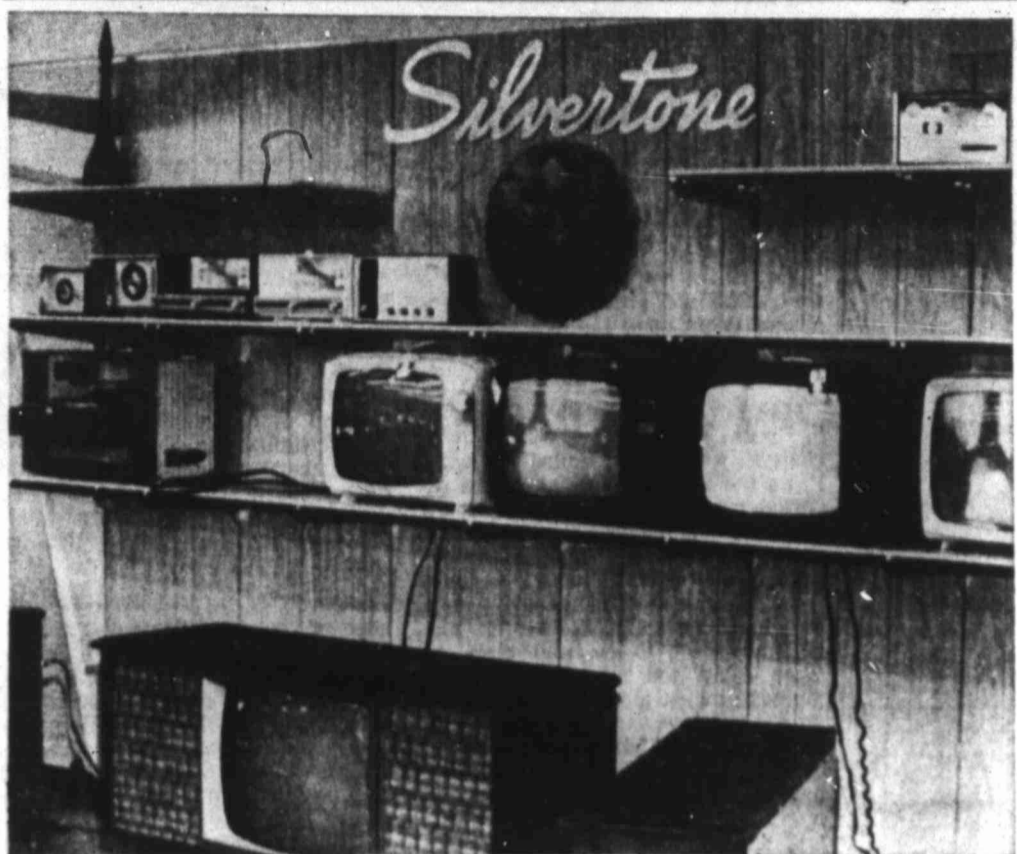

The Literature Of Pacifism

WASHINGTON — My headmaster at Gilman School in Baltimore, and my lifetime authority on war, was the heroic Captain L. Wardlaw Miles.

HE WAS A lover of the English language, and adorned his conversation with naturally-flowing phrases from "Beowulf," Shakespeare, Pope, Kipling and Alfred Noyes. Miles had volunteered for combat training when he was past the enlistment age, already held a medical degree and was a member of the Princeton faculty where he taught literature. In brief, he learned about war when he was already a mature, cultivated man. He was physically and intellectually qualified as an expert in that subject.

I KNEW HIM in the 1920's and 30's when, as now, the press, the stage, the political forum were bilious with propaganda about the idiosyncrasy of war and the cloying virtues of everlasting peace. The gallant Old Captain would rumble against these preachments of pacifism.

Sometimes in wading through the brine and bilge of contemporary peace-mongering, I seem to hear the Old Captain's snort of contempt. A good deal of modern pacifist writing is like the old biblical sermons of the revivalists who regularly scared the yokels out of their skins by predicting the end of the world.

SOME OF IT is pure Simon Gibberish, as the forthcoming book, "The Anatomy of Liberty," by Justice Douglas, who says in his introduction that "A warless world... can be achieved in this century if, instead of expending our energies on deterrent power, we make an understanding of the anatomy of liberty... whatever such dreamy stuff means. Another book, "A Warless World," edited by the pious Arthur Larson, could be more honestly entitled, "A Weaponless World," for its authors

would leave us bare-handed before the foe.

ONE ESSAY in this book "Change in a Disarmed World," by Arnold Toynbee, is sapient to a degree that destroys the central argument for warlessness. Some civilizations, he says—like the Roman and Chinese Empires—were "warless" in that they kept peace with the sword. Well, a Communist Empire could do that, but we wouldn't like it. For a "warless" society to prosper, says Toynbee, it must act upon "the truth that continuous change is of the essence of human life."

BUT WHEN was there ever change without violence? And when was peace-time change a final substitute for war? Our own American "empire" reached its continental limits, and consolidated itself in the War of 1861-65, and thereafter allowed the greatest play to internal changes. Following the Civil War, we won the Wild West, accepted waves of foreign immigrants, went through the successive disruptions of Labor strikes, economic depressions and readjustments—did just about everything that should, by the Toynbee theory, distract our minds and energies from war.

BUT SOME necessity in the human spirit would never permit even as free, fortunate and self-contained an empire as ours to turn pacifist. When we had driven Spain from the Hemisphere, we no longer had an enemy in sight. Nevertheless, soon we acquired one in Japan by extending into the Pacific, and we allowed Presidents Wilson and Roosevelt to join wars in Europe.

Such is the nature of man. It is not to be altered by any power less than our Maker. The danger is that pacifism could make us lose sight of a verity which isn't much cited in these days. It is this—horrible though it be to fight a war; it's a whole lot worse to lose one. (Distributed by McNought Syndicate, Inc.)

30 Years Of Violating Pledges

WASHINGTON — Thirty years ago on November 16, 1933—the United States government formally recognized the government of the Soviet Union. The anniversary furnished an opportunity to publicize formally the many violations of pledges by the Soviet government during the intervening years, but somehow the United States government was strangely silent.

Certain conditions were imposed in the agreement which have since been flagrantly violated again and again by the Soviets.

IN A SIGNIFICANT memorandum written on July 16, 1933, to President Roosevelt by Robert F. Kelley, chief of the division of Eastern European Affairs in the Department of State, the following warning had been given:

"It would seem, therefore, that an essential prerequisite to the establishment of harmonious and trustful relations with the Soviet government is the abandonment by the present rulers of Russia of their world revolutionary aims and the discontinuance of their activities designed to bring about the realization of such aims. More specifically and with particular regard to the United States, this prerequisite involves the abandonment by Moscow of direction, supervision, control, financing, etc., through every agency utilized for the purpose of Communist or other related activities in the United States."

THE DOCUMENTS exchanged in Washington on November 16, 1933, between President Roosevelt and Foreign Minister Maxim Litvinoff made a particular effort to cover the point in the Kelley memorandum. The notes of recognition contained mutual promises, and the Russian government thus agreed to the following pledge:

"To refrain and to restrain all persons in government service and all organizations of the government or under its direct or indirect control, including the organizations in receipt of any financial assistance from it, from any act overt or covert liable

HINTS FROM HELOISE

Wax Has Other Uses

Dear Heloise: After our basement had been tiled, we found black tile cement oozing up between the tiles. I tried steel wool soap pads, strong detergent, and what have you, when suddenly I thought of using paste wax. The floor had been laid early in the spring and several large glops of the black cement had been dropped on the tile and had dried. I scraped up as much of the glops as I could with a scraper. I then took a paper towel and dipped it into the wax and rubbed it firmly on the smear. When the cement was loosened I took a clean paper towel and wiped up every bit of the black cement. The small amount which seeps up through the cracks between the tiles from time to time can easily be removed the same way. "Easy Does It!"

Dear Heloise: I happen to have wooden parquet floors. This black stuff oozed up over mine, too. We scraped up as much as possible when we could catch it. When we couldn't it left a mess on the rest of the floor! The most successful method and the easiest method we have found to date is: kerosene. Just dip an old washcloth or a piece of sponge in the kerosene and "wipe. Viola! The black cement comes off instantly and the kerosene does not leave dull marks on your floor. Heloise

Committees Talk Promotional Ideas

Members of two Big Spring Chamber of Commerce committees ventured into the world of ideas Tuesday during a joint session to promote Big Spring, Tuesday afternoon were 18 members of the tourist and convention committee and the advertising and promotion committee.

One of the topics of discussion was the State Park on Scenic Mountain and its possibilities as a tourist attraction. The park is listed on official parks bulletin and map of the state, but locally little is said or done to point to it. One proposal was that signs be installed on entrances to the city pointing up the fact that there is such a park here.

Cecil Thixton proposed sponsoring regular motorcycle races around the mountain, indicating that perhaps as many as 1,000 motorcycle riders could be lured here for such an event. Other proposals included building a cactus garden on the side of the mountain.

Ed Fisher, Cecil Thixton and Doug Clemens will check with the State Parks Board on such possible uses and will report the results at a meeting scheduled Dec. 3 at 4 p.m.

Another suggestion was that the old "big spring" be restored, and possibly be made to "flow" again by means of a recirculating system. Another idea was to build an old western town in the area of the spring. The committees suggested that work be started immediately to assure signs on the bypass route of IS 20, pointing out services available in Big Spring. Approximate cost of 10 such signs would be \$18,000, spread out over several years.

Signs received more attention with the suggestion that trade-offs be made with such tourist areas as Carlsbad, N.M. and Big Bend. It was pointed out, however, that any local tourist attractions would have to be developed first.

Monuments Grow As Poor Go Hungry In Indonesia

JAKARTA, Indonesia (AP)—Expensive monuments dot Jakarta and even more expensive are on the way. And millions of Indonesians, in the midst of natural riches, are hungry. They are going to get hungrier as the crisis involving creation of Malaysia gets deeper.

Westerners look with astonishment at this sprawling nation of islands whose 100 million people represent great potential power in Southeast Asia. They wonder what keeps the country's economy from complete chaos. They use words like dangerous and critical, but the economy somehow staggers along.

Foreign Minister Subandrio says Indonesia must build national character based on "an ideological identity." "Indonesia will not collapse despite the fact that our economy does not get first priority," he told this correspondent.

Perhaps the building of "national character" explains all the monuments. One vast area will become a park dominated by a structure something like the Washington Monument.

There are monuments to the "new emerging forces." There are monuments to the Indonesian revolution. New government buildings go up where the old ones would have served. Jakarta is building the biggest Moslem mosque in the world. There is a huge Soviet-built sports stadium.

While this is going on, people in rice-deficient areas are living close to starvation level.

President Sukarno, 63, seems content to let matters take their course. He looks like a man without a worry in the world. But Sukarno needs an outside threat, and the Malaysia issue is convenient.

After years of clamor, Indonesia got Dutch New Guinea. It was a convenient issue that appealed to Indonesian patriotism, whipped up antiforeign fervor, and took minds off economic woes.

Now the regime has a new issue—Malaysia. It calls Malaysia a threat to Indonesia. Malaysia has 10 million people, Indonesia 100 million.

Patriotic fervor is being whipped up in a violent anti-Malaysia campaign. But patriotic fervor is not edible.

The crisis makes it difficult for assisting nations to help Indonesia conquer her vast economic trouble. Unless there is a political settlement of the crisis, Indonesia will get deeper into hot water.

Litton Opens Lubbock Plant

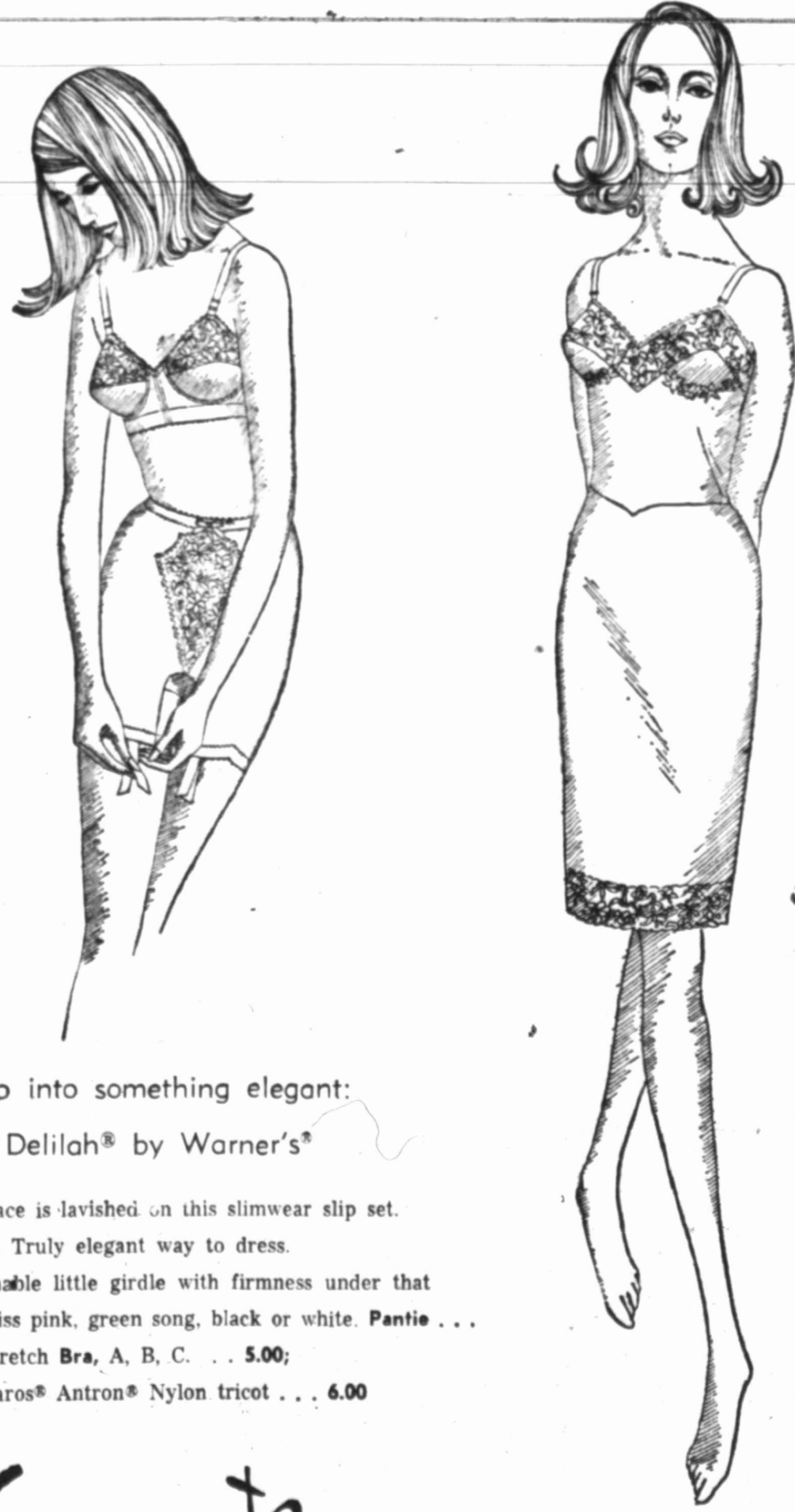
