



New Superlative Announced Today Hot Check Office

Texas and Howard County now lay claim to a new superlative-the saltiest lake in the nation

In fact, Natural Dam Salt Lake, six miles west of Big is one of saltiest lakes in the world. Of course. Russia would have to boast of the only one saltier.

The Texas Water Commission today released an analysis of the water(?) taken from the lake on the H. H. Wilkinson ranch in July, 1963. The sample was found to have a concentration of 275,000 parts per million. This water is as concentrated as Great Salt Lake, Utah, said the commission, and only one other lake in the world has been reported to have a higher concentration - Elton Lake, USSR

Water in Natural Dam Salt Lake has almost eight times the concentration of minerals found in sea water.

The Bereans Did Their Own Thinking

Not many of us think for ourselves when it comes to matters in religion. We prefer to leave religious subjects and Bible issues to those supposedly trained and skilled in this field-the priests, theologians, pastors, and ministers. Sometimes we get the idea that the Bible cannot be understood by common people, Some religious leaders even teach and encourage this view.

Does the Bible say anything about the ability and the responsibility of the average person to understand its message? Most certainly it does,

To the Christians at Ephesus, Paul wrote: "Wherefore be ye not foolish, but understand what the will of the Lord is" (Ephesians 5:17). Surely God does not require of man that

which is beyond his ability. The Jews of Berea, for example, are described in the New Testament as "noble." Yet, they were not famous, nor were they rich or powerful. In fact, they were somewhat obscure. The description of their nobility is recorded in Acts 17:11:

"These were more noble than those in Thessalonica in that they received the word with all readiness of mind and searched the scriptures daily, whether these things were so."

This reference to the Bereans is significant because it is plainly a tribute to a religious people. The Bereans were noble in attitude. They were noble because they were eager to be taught the truth-they were sincerely truth-seekers! Although ready to receive religious teaching from others, they were at the same time very careful to examine such teaching in the light of the scriptures.

Certainly the Bereans could not be called professional theologians. They were simple people of honest hearts and open minds-moreover, a people with a profound respect for the authority of the sacred scriptures.

Unfortunately, this attitude of the Bereans-the spirit of independent, personal investigation — does not prevail widely among religious people in the twentieth century. It is a sad commentary on our lack of love for the truth (2 Thessalonians 2:10-12). Man is in a pitiable state (a sad plight) when he possesses neither the intellectual vitality nor the spiritual interest to study God's will for himself.

The New Testament abounds with evidence that harmonizes with the attitude of the noble Bereans. The apostle Peter insisted that Christians should know what they believe and why they believe it, "ready always to give an answer to every man that asketh you a reason of the hope that is in you" (1 Peter 3:15).

Brings Great Service

The apostle John places the responsibility directly upon every Christian to follow the pattern of the Bereans and prove every teaching to be sure it is from God: "because many false prophets are gone out into the world" (1 John

By revelation John commends very highly the favorable characteristic of the church of Ephesus of being ready at all times to check truth against error. They had "tried them which say they are apostles, and are not, and hast found them liars . . ." (Revelation 2:2).

Members of churches of Christ today are simply trying to reproduce faithfully the church of our Lord as it existed in the first centurythe same in doctrine, worship, name, organization, service, life and work. The Bible clearly teaches that the seed of the gospel—the word of God-will produce after its kind, pure and undenominational Christianity. The first century church was founded upon the basis of the word; it follows that the same word must serve as the blueprint for the twentieth century church.

We invite our friends to "search the scriptures" to see whether these things be so!

Welcome Respite

Republican National Chairman William B. Miller's call for a "total suspension of partisan political activity" until Jan. 1 is decent and constructive statesmanship. And the agreeable bipartisan response to that appeal should be reassuring to the American people, as well as to world opinion now clouded by doubt as to the maturity and responsibility supporting this nation's immense power.

It is decent statesmanship to suspend partisan politics during the period of official national mourning for the late President John F. Kennedy. It is constructive statesmanship to grant President Lyndon B. Johnson bipartisan support in his difficult task of assuming the emergency leadership of this shocked, shamed and saddened nation and reaffirming its determination and competence to influence world affairs in the direction of peace and freedom.

Within the next few weeks, President Johnson must make critical decisions on the new national budget, the national legislative program, the still smoldering civil rights issues, defense, space and foreign policies. He must strive to sustain confidence in the continued improvement of the national economy. And he must restore shaken international confidence in the stability and strength and purposes of the United States.

It would be intolerable if President Johnson, in this delicate and dangerous transfer of leadership, were to be distracted by partisan, or factional, sniping. This has been commendably recognized by Republican national

The new year will inevitably bring a resumption of partisan politics, for such is the essential process by which this two-party democracy governs itself. But surely, after the traumatic experience to which this nation has been subjected, we can hopefully expect there will be a resurgence of reason and morality and responsibility in our political affairs.

Brink's Great Service

A motorists' road guide of 40 or 50 years ago contained such directions as 'At intersection near red barn, bear left. After crossing creek three miles further, turn left near white church." All directions were like that, without

route numbers. Route numbers were the 1916 invention of John G. Brink, the employe of a map publisher. Conceiving the idea of numbering roads for a map, he won a company competition for his suggestion. The first map with the new feature covered northern Illinois and southern Wisconsin.

Next 60 draftsmen under Brink's di-

rection traveled from city to city, deciding which road should continue the numbering of previously marked highways. The task was enormous, Brink says, solved only by trial and error. In 1925 his scheme was presented to the American Association of State Highway Officials. State numbering then followed, and finally national numbering.

Can anyone imagine a tour of unfamiliar country with no roads numbered, and with only such eye-straining directions as those in the first sentence above? Brink is a public benefactor who deserves lasting fame.

David Lawrence Changeover In Government

WASHINGTON-By a fortuitous circumstance, the United States today has in Lyndon Johnson a President who, though chosen under the American electoral system, possesses the very kind of legislative experience characteristic of the parliamentary system prevalent in other English-

While the vice presidential nomination has been given to members of the Senate or House several times in American history, the leader of a party in the Senate has not as frequently been named for the vice presidency. Yet, by reason of a strategic position in the councils of his party, such a man is closer to the problems of the national government than are any of the governors of states or even individual members of Congress who, though they may become prominent, are not selected by their colleagues to be party leaders.

THE TREND in recent years, of course, has been toward the selection of a vice presidential nominee from Congress. Sen. Charles Curtis, majority leader, was vice president under President Hoover House Speaker John Nance Garner became vice president under Franklin D. Roosevelt in 1933. Senate Majority Leader Alben W. Barkley was elected vice president with Harry Truman in 1948. Although not his party's leader, Sen. John F. Kennedy came close to winning the vice presidential nomination on the ticket with Mr. Stevenson in 1956, but the Democratic convention delegates turned to another senator, the late Estes Kefauver of Tennessee. for the second place, who, too, was not the party's leader.

FEW OF THESE men. however, had the popularity or support inside the Congress that Lyndon Johnson enjoyed in his eight years as Senate majority leader.

But how did Sen. Johnson happen to get the vice presidential nomination? Primarily, Mr. Kennedy recognized the political value of having a Southerner on the ticket, as there was doubt whether all the Southern states would go Democratic. In a dispatch from Los Angeles on July 20, 1960, this correspondent wrote:

"When word was being passed around the convention hall last Thursday that Sen. Johnson had accepted Sen. Kennedy's offer of the vice

Around The Rim Time To Consider The Next Step

Success spelled another way might come out as "the ability to complete a task begun." Once the start is made, someone must have the gumption to bring the task to completion. One such good start has already been made by a group of Big Spring men and a measure of success has been reached. Only follow-through action is needed to reach that climax which can truly be labeled success.

I AM THINKING of the recent action by the agricultural committee of the Big Spring Chamber of Commerce to get assistance for the cotton farmer with insect control problems. The first step was taken-a rather hesitant step to see how much interest others in the area and state have in their problem. The result was far beyond the expectations of the handful of men who carefully drafted a petition asking for protection of their livelihoods through research into the problem. A research center for the area has virtually been promised.

Now that the first giddy feeling of success has passed, one can hardly refrain from shouting the line on which most of us practised at the typewriter, "Now is the time for all good men to come to the aid of their

INSECT CONTROL is not a problem of the cotton farmer alone. The grower of citrus fruit or grain has a similar one. It cannot be solved without work and attention by men skilled in the field. The problem was stated succinctly at a recent meeting of the chamber group by Herb Helbig, county agent

'There are just too many things

about control of insects of which we know nothing," he said.

IT APPEARS that some of those unknowns may be exposed to view soon with establishment of a research center to study the problems of these farmers. These men of Howard County have focused attention on the problem and men such as Gov. John Connally and Secretary of Agriculture Orville Freeman have expressed deep

Now that the solution has been offered for the area, it is time to put the ball into play to continue the game. There is no reason why the research center could not be located in Big Spring. But a lack of action on our part can put it elsewhere.

A RESEARCH center in Big Spring would serve a two-fold purpose. It would help the cotton farmer, who is an important segment of the Howard County economy, and it would bring another new business into the city. Big Springers have their foot in the doorway already with the first bold action. It is time now to begin exploring the ramifications. What is needed for and by such a research center? How well does Howard County fit that description?

WE HAVE the insect control problem in our fields, so field study should present no great difficulty. The Industrial Foundation has land to house buildings. We have an adequate supply of water for irrigation of test plots. And most important, we have the people who had the gumption to take that first step when they found out they had a problem.

Holmes Alexander Goldwater Vs. Johnson

WASHINGTON - Senator Barry Goldwater's friends are saying a lot of things he can't say for himself during this period of political mora-

The Senator, always on the best of terms with President Kennedy, has a very different feeling toward President Johnson. Goldwater never did like the Tall Texan. He didn't like the way Johnson used to run the Senate. He never fell for LBJ's fatal charm. The campaign of 1964 would have been a heated political argument if the main match had been Kennedy vs. Goldwater. The matching of Johnson an excellent impression. > FOR YEARS Goldwater has been publicly saying that the country's real danger is from the Far Left. The tragedy at Dallas proved him terribly correct, for Lee Oswald's only experience and identification were with Marxism and its bloody history.

Goldwater has probably worked more against the other extreme-Far Rightism-than any active politician. He personally tried to talk Robert Welch out of publishing the notorious Black Book. The Senator has openly advised Welch to resign as head of the Birch Society, and has urged Birch Society members to unseat Welch-or. failing that, to dissolve the member-

THE ARIZONAN'S campaign, if he gets the Republican nomination, will still be that of an economic conservative against an avowed Democratic Liberal. It seems certain that many Southerners will move to support Johnson much as most Catholics supported John Kennedy as one of their own. But the Senator will shift his tactics so as to direct his fire against the image of Johnson as a Southern renegade, whereas Mr. Kennedy would have been pictured as a Yankee aboli-

Goldwater, his friends say for him, couldn't quit now if he wanted to. His name and personality at the head of the national ticket are needed to give GOP Congressional candidates an extra tug, needed still more to maintain the host of GOP workers who will turn out for him-and for nobody else.

BUT THE Senator's backers are watching with mixed feelings the developments in Latin America. President Betancourt of Venezuela appears on the verge of demanding an invasion of Cuba in order to lift the seige of terror that has fastened upon the whole northern shoulder of South America. President Johnson is thought to be much more likely than President Kennedy was to join in forthright action against Castro.

Barry would go along with Johnson on such a policy," said one of Goldwater's managers. "He's been all for using force against Cuba, and he wouldn't hesitate to support the President there

ONCE MORE, if we were forced to take up arms against Communism, Goldwater would be proved right. But the country would undoubtedly rally to the President, ending Goldwater's chances to win the White House, but leaving him a prophet with all the honors

Predicting a quick and easy victory for Goldwater at the San Francisco convention, Knowland went on to say, according to the newspaper reports, that the senator from Arizona "will have all 86 delegates from California." This was, of course, a direct challenge to Kuchel.

That statement assumed that Knowland would determine the fate of the delegation of the largest state in the Union. and that state, according to the reckoning of the recent past, could have been the key not only to the nomination but to the election.

THAT WAS the past. The Republican party in 1964 cannot run against the Kennedy dynasty. President Johnson will be a difficult target to fix on, since he will have been in the office so short a time before the election.

If the Republican party has a hopeful future in the coming year it rests with men like Sen. Kuchel and Gov. Rockefeller. That is to say, with men who know what it takes to win elec-

Presbyterian **Numbers Hold Even Keel**

Initial reports of the first state-wide church survey conducted by the three Presbyterian denominations in Texas indicate that Presbyterians represent 1.8 per cent of the state's


During the past 60 years, the three Presbyterian denominations (U.S., United, and Cumberland) have maintained a steady keel in population percentage. In 1900, Presbyterians represented 1.7 per cent of the Texas population, indicating a proportionate increase of one tenth of one per cent since the turn of the century

Norman Huneycutt, coordinator of the survey, noted that although the percentage of communicants has remained constant since 1900, the number of churches has dropped sharply, indicating that today fewer churches serve more members. According to church reports.

there were 176,094 Presbyterians in Texas in 1960, with 117,470 in the Presbyterian Church, U.S.; 50,157 in the United Presbyterian Church, and 8,467 in the Cumberland Church.

More detailed information about Presbyterianism in Texas will be presented Tuesday at Austin Presbyterian Theological Seminary when leaders of the three denominations meet to study maps, charts and statis-

Purpose of the Presbyterian survey is to help local churches and the 16 denominational presbyteries improve their ministry to the surrounding community.

It would seem to one who has studied the Bible and become humbled before it that a good deal seen today in the controversy for equal rights is from a somewhat conceited and perhaps even an ignorant source. A source that seems to have a morbid passion for controversy which leads only to dissention, insults and strife. Paul wrote in I Tim. 6:4 of some who were fighting for equal rights. God did not suddenly break slave relations but gently by changing the heart and moulding the lives of both master and servant, and by setting into motion the principles that would lead to trust rather than distrust to goodness rather than to evil. But the conceited ignorance, which the Bible here teaches is so wrong, leads to rebellion and to revolution in its most violent forms. A Christian is not a striker, not a revolutionist. Where conditions of unequal rights do exist they may best be broken by putting New Testament principles into operation, not by violence, nor by those who are "doting about questions and strifes of words, whereof comes eavy strife, railings and evil surmises."

CRMWD At **High Demand** For Water

By the end of this week, the Colorado River Municipal Wa-ter District will be nearing its

first 10 billion-gallon year. Production reports through November showed 9,861,636,084 gallons metered to customers and if November's rate is main tained, the 10-billion mark may be reached within a few days.

The November total of 739, 529,918 gallons was a 26.35 per cent increase over the same month last year. The member cities of Odessa, Big Spring and Snyder used 443,708,000 gallons, a gain of 13.72 per cent over November of last year, and oil companies were up 51.23 per cent in reaching 295,821,918 gallons. Seventy-nine million gallons of the increase came in new Sun Oil Company deliveries, but four of the other five oilfield repressuring projects also showed increased demands.

During November Odessa re quired 224,870,000 gallons, a gain of 13.80 per cent; Big Spring 171,508,000 gallons, a gain of 9.11 per cent; and Snyder 47,330,000, a gain of 33.79 per cent. Snyder now is furnishing the Rotan water district through its filtration plant.


