A government spokesman in Canberra said Townley's illness was caused by exhaustion following the recent federal election campaign. His condition was termed serious but not dangerous.

SAN MATEO, Calif. (AP)—Bing Crosby is buying a \$175,000 home near San Mateo and plans to make it his permanent residence, his business manager says.

Crosby, his wife and three children will move into the 25-room mansion by mid-January, Basil Grillo, the entertainer's business manager, said Thursday. Crosby will keep his estate at Palm Springs but has decided to sell his Beverly Hills home, Grillo said.

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—Bob Hope left Children's Hospital after a week of treatment for his ailing left eye and equipped: "Although this is Children's Hospital, I don't feel any younger."

The 60-year-old Hope said Thursday he is almost positive he will make his annual Christmas trip overseas. He is scheduled to entertain servicemen in the Middle East this Christmas. Hope was treated for a blood clot which for five years had caused blurred vision in his left eye. Doctors said the eye is healing well. Hope headed for a week of rest and further treatment at Palm Springs.

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Douglas Pinpoints Income Tax Loopholes As Unfair

WASHINGTON (AP)—In the new tax laws, Sen. Paul H. Douglas, D-Ill., pressing for reforms in tax laws, told the Senate Thursday of an oil operator with an income of \$28,716,932 in 1960 who "paid not one single cent in federal income taxes for that year."

He was one of six oil millionaires who Douglas said paid little or no 1960 taxes according to Treasury records. Douglas mentioned no names.

"This is an unjust and outrageous situation," he declared. "This is the result of the numerous loopholes and truckholes in our tax laws and particularly those which favor oil and gas."

Taft-Goldwater: Rep. Robert A. Taft, R-Ohio, declared Thursday he would be happy to run for the Senate on a Republican ticket headed by Barry Goldwater.

When Taft announced his candidacy for the Republican senatorial nomination last Friday, he was quoted as saying that a Goldwater-led national GOP ticket "would make it difficult" for his own campaign in Ohio.

"This was inaccurate and not stated by me," the son of the late Mr. Republican said in a statement.

Job bias: President Johnson told a meeting of 64 business executives Thursday that "no one should be exploited because he is a member of a minority group, and no one should be denied employment because he is a member of a minority group."

He said the only consideration should be "merit and ability." The executives were called to the White House to hear an ex-

planation of a program to eliminate discrimination in hiring. Mrs. Kennedy: Mrs. Jacqueline Kennedy intends to observe a full year of mourning for her late husband and will make no public engagements, her press secretary announced Thursday. The statement was presumably aimed at scotching reports she may take a hand in next year's presidential campaign. There had been published reports that Mrs. Kennedy had advised President Johnson she would play any role he might ask her to in the 1964 campaign.

CAIRO (AP)—The labor ministers of 21 African countries resolved Thursday night to press for the suspension of South Africa from the International Labor Organization on the ground that its apartheid policy makes it unworthy of membership. This suspension demand is contained in a resolution to be presented at the organization's general conference next June.

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP)—Five Saudi Arabian princes who are feuding with their brother, King Saud, have been granted political asylum in Lebanon. They left Saudi Arabia for the United Arab Republic last year. They later came to Beirut and took up residence in Lebanon, a refuge for many Arab politicians.

SEOUL, Korea (AP)—About 200 lay students clashed with club-swinging police today as they tried to stage a prohibited demonstration in front of the headquarters of South Korea's ruling military junta. The police dispersed the students after a 30-minute free-for-all. The students, from Seoul National University's law college, object to a recent national examination law which they claim is unfavorable to them.

Refuses To Halt Printing Picture

HOUSTON (AP)—Dist. Judge John Snell refused Thursday to grant a temporary injunction against the Houston Chronicle, sought by Leslie Douglas Ashley to prevent republication of a picture to which Ashley objects.

Ashley and Carolyn Ann Lima are in the Harris County jail awaiting a new trial. They were sentenced to die in the electric chair for the slaying of Houston real estate man Fred Tones in 1961, but the verdict was overturned by the 5th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals. The Chronicle printed the picture last week after Ashley was returned from the state prison at Huntsville.

Ashley also sought to keep the newspaper from referring to the slaying of Tones as a "torch murder" and to Ashley as a female impersonator.

Mrs. Sylvia Ayers, Ashley's mother, told Judge Snell her son never earned any money as a female impersonator. She stated the only time she ever knew her son to appear in female clothing was at the time of his arrest in New York and at Halloween. A request for an injunction forbidding Sheriff C. V. Kern to let newsmen or photographers see Ashley without Ashley's consent is pending.

Youth Admits Shooting Mom

TYLER (AP)—A charge from a .410 gauge shotgun fatally wounded Mrs. Charlie Tate, 38, at her North Tyler home Thursday night.

Dist. Atty. William Coates said her son Gene, 17, signed a statement admitting he fired the fatal shot after an argument. The youth was held without immediate charge.

Mrs. Tate died at a hospital about two hours later while undergoing surgery. She was shot in the left side.

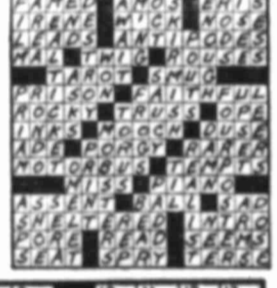

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THE LORD'S Forgotten PRAYER

Millions of people have been impressed by the beautiful and touching words of Jesus in his prayer recorded in Matthew 6:9-13. Even small children have become familiar with this prayer, which begins with the words "Our Father who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name . . ." This prayer has become so well-known that it is now referred to as "The Lord's Prayer." Yet, another of Jesus' prayers has been virtually forgotten. This was the prayer he uttered his last night upon the earth. For what would Jesus pray in such a crucial hour? That his betrayal might be averted? That he might not be forsaken and denied? Our Lord prayed for none of these things. Here is a portion of this prayer of Christ—a prayer too long and too often ignored: "Neither pray I for these alone, but for them also which shall believe on me through their word: That they all may be one; as thou, Father, art in me, and I in thee, that they also may be one in us: that the world may believe that thou hast sent me. And the glory which thou gavest me I have given them; that they may be one, even as we are one: I in them, and thou in me, that they may be made perfect in one; and that the world may know that thou hast sent me, and hast loved them, as thou hast loved me." (John 17:20-23).

The gospel is described as the "power of God unto salvation" (Romans 1:16). Our Lord commands men to obey terms of the gospel—through faith, repentance, confession, and baptism. And when one is baptized into Christ he is simultaneously added to the spiritual Body of Christ and is thus made complete "in Christ" (1 Corinthians 12:13 and Colossians 2:10). When men insist on the right to have divisive creeds; when they insist on the right to wear denominational names; when they insist on the right to have a religious hierarchy and human organizations; and when they insist on the right to determine terms of church membership—when they do all of this, they are insisting on the right to perpetuate religious division. Jesus prayed for unity, and every believer in Christ should submit to the divine plan for bringing it about. Oneness in Christ is a paramount teaching of the New Testament: "There is one body, and one Spirit, even as ye are called in one hope of your calling; One Lord, one faith, one baptism, one God and Father of all, who is above all, and through all, and in you all" (Ephesians 4:4-6).

It was prophetic. Just before second-ranked New York University took the court at Madison Square Garden for a game with unranked Toledo Thursday night, the NYU cheerleaders raced on the court toting a huge banner.

"We're No. 1," the flag boasted, erroneously proclaimed. Right in front of the cheering section one of the cheerleaders got his feet tangled in the banner and took a tumble.

A few minutes later, so did NYU.

The Violets were out-rebounded, out-manuevered and thoroughly played off the court by the fired-up Rockets, 87-74. Top-ranked Loyola of Chicago, the only other ranked team in action Thursday, had to work hard for a 105-102 decision over Western Michigan.

"I've been saying we've got a helluva team," jubilant coach Eddie Melvin of the Rockets, now 5-0 for the season, said. "Now maybe they'll believe me."

"How did I feel going against the No. 2 team? Hah, we should be No. 1 or 2. I've been saying we should be one of the top ten teams. This proves it."

They barged out to a quick 14-7 lead, using a spread-out, wide-open offense, and simply took it from there. They moved calmly, deliberately on offense and used a harassing, shifting man-to-man defense that forced the frustrated Violets into mistakes. It was NYU's first loss in four games.

And while the Violets were wilting, the top-ranked Ram-

blers from Chicago Loyola had a severe scare thrown their way by Western Michigan before escaping with their fourth straight victory.

Little Manny Newsome, a 5-foot-10 sparkplug, was the chief tormentor of the defending national champions, throwing in 44 points. Ron Miller led the winners with 33 points.

On-rushing but unranked Oklahoma State remained unbeaten with a 71-64 triumph over Brigham Young.

Johnson Has New Plans For SA Alliance

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Johnson is reported planning a sweeping reorganization of the Alliance for Progress in a broad move to develop more dynamic and effective U.S. relations with Latin America.

A well-informed congressional source predicted a "complete reorganization and real shake-up" with changes in its top echelon and in the alliance methods of operation.

At the White House, press secretary Pierre Salinger told reporters Johnson is looking over the entire range of governmental operations to see how they could be improved. Salinger declined to discuss the alliance problems specifically.

Asked whether a reorganization would mean the replacement of Teodoro Moscoso as coordinator of the alliance operation, Salinger said he did not believe Johnson has had time to decide on the effectiveness of Moscoso's office.

There is widespread speculation in diplomatic quarters that Johnson may name Thomas C. Mann, 51, U.S. ambassador to Mexico, to some new high-level position with broad authority over the whole range of U.S. policies and operations in Latin America.

Mann, who has had long experience in Latin-American affairs as a career diplomat, was an assistant secretary of state for inter-American affairs before he became ambassador to Mexico in 1961. Mann, a Texan, conferred with Johnson Wednesday.

The Alliance for Progress was set up by the late President John F. Kennedy with the aim of promoting sweeping social, economic and political reforms in Latin America.

Mateos Slates Puebla Tour

MEXICO CITY (AP) — President Adolfo Lopez Mateos will tour the state of Puebla this week to dedicate 42 public works projects.

He is to visit San Marti, Puebla, San Miguel Canoa, Atlixco, Atlacatlan, Tepeaca, San Antonio Texcala and Texhuaca.

Steel Industry Keeps Eye On Signs Of Slowdown

NEW YORK (AP) — The steel industry is riding high at the moment but keeping a wary eye on signs of a slowdown in construction and the odds on making recent steel price increases stick.

Steel output is back to the level of mid-July before the summer slump really started, largely as an aftermath to a strike-hedging inventory buildup earlier in the year.

Steel plant expansion and modernization plans indicate confidence is high in the industry and, even more, so is determination to cut costs from using obsolete equipment.

And profits of steel companies have bounded back nicely from the 1962 slump.

Most of this year's boosts in prices — covering some two-thirds of total shipments — have held stoutly enough so far. Steel mills report their customers have accepted them as inevitable in times of rising production and increased labor costs.

But the government hasn't reacted as it did a year ago when a steel price increase was quickly rescinded after administration protests. Summoning of steel company records by a grand jury recently is now generally accepted as an investigation of antitrust law compliance rather than as a protest against price boosts.

But the strength of the recent increases depends on continued high demand by steel users — auto makers, construction, consumer durable goods.

The auto makers are very busy, and the market there seems assured for the immediate future. Consumer durable goods also have been selling well, and consumers still seem in a buying mood.

Calls For Arab Unity

BIZERTE, Tunisia (AP) — President Nasser of the United Arab Republic called today for Arab unity in opposing Israel, which he described as "one of the last sequels of colonialism."

Speaking before a cheering, rain-soaked crowd celebrating the recent withdrawal of French troops from Tunisia, Nasser said:

"The Palestine problem demands our unity. It is one of the last sequels of colonialism which divided us. Palestine gives the power to other Arab nations to unite and triumph."

It was Nasser's first trip to Tunisia, where hardly three years ago his pictures and Egyptian newspapers were banned. The 1961 battle of Bizerte, in which French troops crushed an effort of Tunisians to eject them from that Mediterranean base, brought Tunisia and the United Arab Republic together after years of feuding.

Referring to Tunisian President Habib Bourguiba, who was standing at his side, Nasser said: "May God help him in his struggle."

President Ahmed Ben Bella of Algeria, who entered Bizerte in triumph with Nasser and Bourguiba, also called for action against Israel.

The absence of King Haasan II of Morocco undermined the obstacles facing Arab unity in North Africa. Hassan declined an invitation to attend because of Nasser's presence. He sent Minister of State Abdelhadi Boutaleb to represent him.

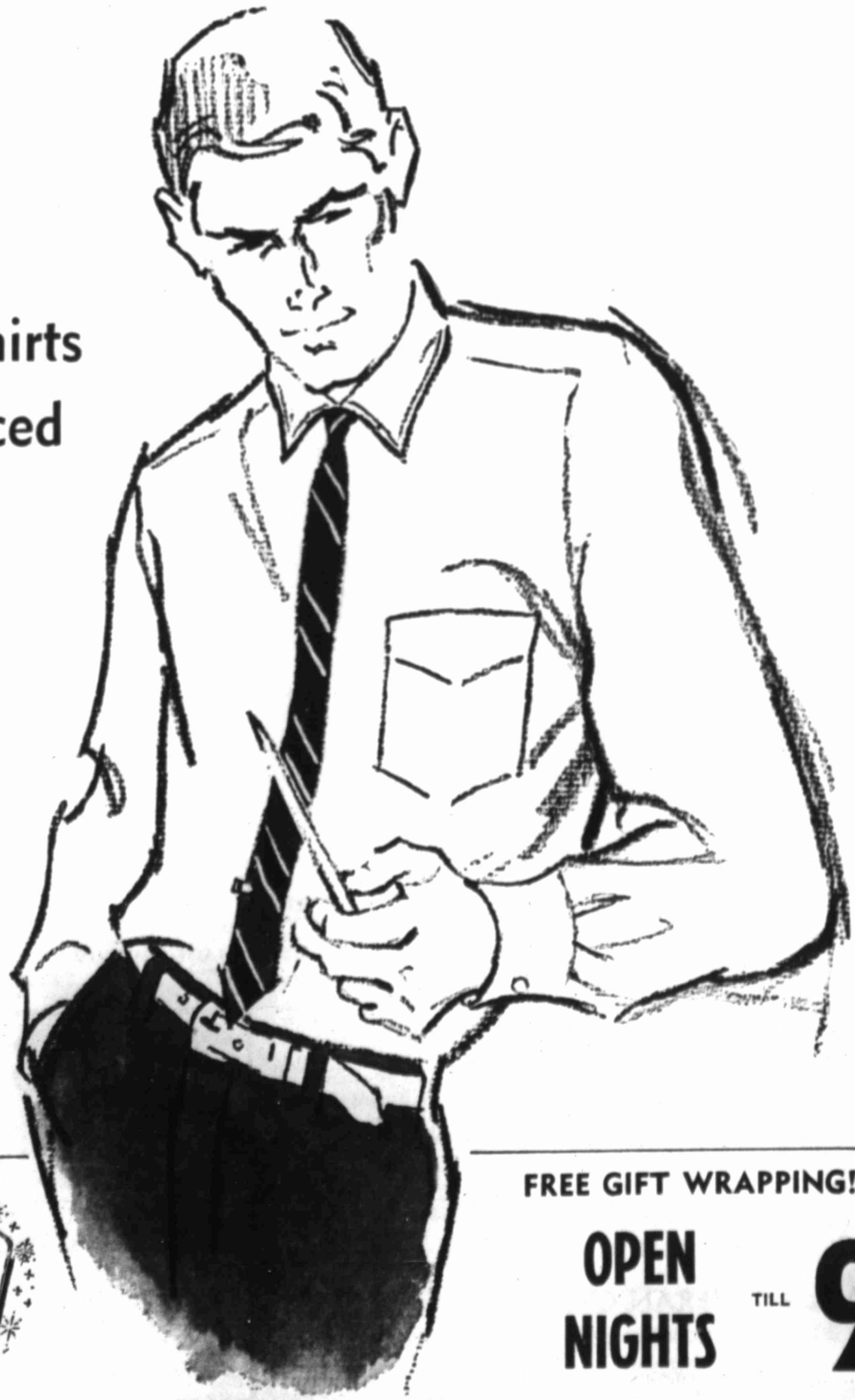

Crestview Baptist Has Rapid Growth

Growth at the Crestview Baptist Church has come along faster than anticipated, necessitating additional building at the church, according to the Rev. R. B. Murray, pastor.

"It is beginning to look as though our 15-year building program may well be shortened to 10 years," he said Thursday morning.

WORK BEGUN

Work is already nearly a week along on a new chapel and educational building. Work was started Monday by Pioneer Builders, who were awarded the contract for the \$20,562 project. Furnishings for the structures are expected to cost another \$7,000.

It was only two years ago, early in September, 1961, that the present facilities east of the Snyder Highway were completed. At that time \$70,000 worth of building was completed. Then, two new educational buildings were constructed, with one of them being used as an auditorium. With completion of the new chapel in about three months, it will be converted back to educational space.

NEW CHAPEL

The new chapel will be 75 feet long and 40 feet wide, with a seating capacity of about 350. Additional Sunday School and educational space will consist of five classrooms, a pastor's study and an assembly hall.

The building will be of concrete blocks at this point. Later when all work contemplated is finished, all the buildings will be bricked to give them a uniform appearance, Rev. Murray said.

The congregation moved to its present location from the old Northside Baptist Church, which has been converted into the Northside Baptist Mission. The Mission is served by the Rev. Luis Gomez.

Pastors Foresee Better Relations

Pastors of Big Spring's Catholic churches foresee better relations between Catholic and Protestant churches as a result of the Ecumenical Council.

The second session of the Council ended Sunday. This is the first Ecumenical Council since 1870. It was called by the late Pope John XXIII to bring Church policies up to date and to promote Church unity.

"This is the first time in the history of the Church, or at least since the Council of Trent, that Protestants have been invited to attend an Ecumenical Council as observers," the Rev. Francis Beasley, pastor of the Immaculate Heart of Mary Church, pointed out. Sixty-three leading Protestant ministers are observing the sessions.

The Big Spring priest said changes approved by the Council will have a liberalizing influence. The change allowing a part of the mass to be conducted in the language of the native country where it is held will provide greater participation by the people, he said.

This change was voted by a majority of the 2,600 Bishops of the Church, and it was approved by Pope Paul VI, successor of Pope John. Pope Paul is continuing the Ecumenical Council called by Pope John last year.

LOCAL LEVEL

"It should be about a year before the change is instituted on the local level," Rev. Beasley said. Authorization for English to be used here will come from the most Rev. Thomas Drury, Bishop of the Diocese of San Angelo, who will return from Rome soon.

The change from Latin to the native tongue has been authorized for the Mass of the Catechumens. This is the first part of the mass, consisting of five sections—Introit, Prayer, Epistle, Gradual and Gospel. The first part of the mass is devoted mostly to Scripture reading.

"This will allow more participation by the people," Rev. Robert J. McDermott, rector of St. Thomas Catholic Church, said.

Wade Caustic Toward Ruby's New Attorney

DALLAS (AP) — Dist. Atty. Henry Wade says "the only persons who have pronounced Jack Ruby insane are his own attorneys."

The prosecutor's remark was made Thursday in caustic references to Melvin Belli, a California lawyer who agreed Tuesday to head the defense staff in Ruby's murder trial.

Ruby, 52-year-old owner of a Dallas strip joint, shot accused presidential assassin Lee Harvey Oswald in the city hall basement here Nov. 24. His trial is set for Feb. 3.

Talking to newsmen, Wade said:

"This international lawyer Melvin Belli from San Francisco, who has recently traveled extensively in Russia and written a book entitled 'The Russian Life and Law,' is an interesting, if not intriguing, person.

"According to his press releases, he flies into Dallas, talks with Ruby and Ruby employs him to represent him.

"Belli then announces to the press that Ruby is a fine, conscientious citizen; but in the next breath he pronounces Ruby insane. It has been almost three weeks (since Oswald was slain) and the only persons who have pronounced Ruby insane are his own attorneys."

Belli told reporters he would contend Ruby was temporarily insane when he shot Oswald. If a jury agrees, Ruby would go free.

Wade has said he will seek the death penalty.

The California lawyer said two days ago he was arranging for a nationally known psychiatrist to examine Ruby.

Shortly after Ruby was jailed, a Dallas psychiatrist examined the prisoner in his cell. No findings have been made public.

Belli said in San Francisco he anticipated there would be "insinuations and innuendoes" as a result of his book about Russia.

Gallant In Resolve For A New Life

EDITOR'S NOTE: What has happened to Marina Oswald, the young widow of the man accused of assassinating President John F. Kennedy? After appearing at her husband's funeral, she dropped out of sight under a Secret Service guard. Since then, she has been no news item. The following story was obtained through interviews with persons handling her affairs.

DALLAS, Tex. (AP)—She is a somewhat bewildered young woman, remorseful over the tragic slaying of President John F. Kennedy, but gallant in her resolve to create a future for her children in America, and bear whatever burden is her lot.

That picture of Marina Oswald emerges from interviews with persons in close contact with her since she was widowed on Nov. 24.

Her husband, Lee Harvey Oswald, was slain before he could be brought to trial as the accused assassin of the president.

SEALED OFF

Mrs. Oswald, 22, a native of Russia who has been in the United States less than two years, was sealed off by the Secret Service immediately after her husband's funeral.

The blonde widow appeared stunned by the collapse of her quiet life in the Dallas suburb of Irving, Texas, taken at that time showed her hugging her baby tightly, with a withdrawn expression on her face.

Now, almost three weeks later, she still has not given way to any overt emotional reaction, her advisers say. She seldom talks about her husband, but appears to feel his apparent guilt also is hers. She answers questions about him, but does not rise to his defense.

Her children are her life. She is described as completely devoted to the two girls—June, 2, and Rachel, 7 weeks. The family is living in an undisclosed location in the suburban Dallas area under a protective Secret Service guard.

This week she was sent to

Parkland Hospital — the hospital where Kennedy and her husband died—to get a postnatal six-week checkup. She was pronounced in excellent health.

FREE TO GO

She is free to go anywhere, but always is accompanied by two agents. She has paid two brief visits to her husband's grave in a Fort Worth cemetery, bringing flowers each time.

Last week she was taken to a Dallas shop to buy a pair of shoes.

She prefers to remain indoors. She spends a lot of time sewing, altering some of the clothing donated to her and the children. She also reads her Russian-language Bible, four of which have been sent to her.

Although she is a devoted member of the Greek Orthodox Church, she has not attended services since the assassination, presumably because she would be noticed.

Television has little appeal for Mrs. Oswald, the sources say, but she enjoys chatting with the Secret Service men, improving her English.

She is said to be extremely eager to cast off her Russian ties, and wants to learn to read, write and speak good English. With the aid of a Russian-English dictionary, she tries to

decipher the daily newspapers, and does a good job of it.

The outpouring of money and sympathy from the United States and the rest of the world has overwhelmed her. So far, she has received more than 1,000 letters, along with donations that have passed the \$12,000 mark.

Some writers apologize for the fact that her husband was not given a chance in court. A few letters are derogatory. One person sent in \$2 "to help pay your fare back to Russia."

The sympathetic reaction of the American people has moved her deeply. It undoubtedly has reinforced her desire to stay in the Dallas area and rear her children here.

As a girl, she told advisers, she used to dream of being in America and actually walking on American soil. She does not intend to give up her goal of a normal life in this country.

CANNOT ESCAPE

Rejecting suggestions that she change her name and move away, Marina says she feels she cannot escape from what has happened to her and she must bear the burden of it.

Described as extremely intelligent and learning quickly in her new surroundings, Marina wants to get a job when her children are older so she can support them herself. She had pharmaceutical training in Russia.

Her main concern is for her girls. Clothes have little appeal. She uses no lipstick or makeup.

Following Russian tradition, she considers her brother-in-law Robert Oswald, who lives in nearby Denton, the head of the family. A sales coordinator for a brick firm, he does not have sufficient income to support Marina and her children.

Marina does not see her mother-in-law, who lives in Fort Worth.

The widow has her health, her children, and her courage.

The lawyer who is arranging for a trust fund for the family from the donations that come in, says:

"Without assistance this girl will be lost. She has no way of making it on her own."

Lawyer To Try To Get Bail Set For Ruby

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Lawyer Melvin Belli says he will try to get bail set for Jack Ruby, slayer of President Kennedy's accused assassin.

The flamboyant San Francisco-Los Angeles lawyer also said Thursday he would try Dec. 21 to get the strip-tease joint owner's murder trial moved to San Antonio, Houston or Fort Worth. Belli, named earlier in the week to defend Ruby, said in Dallas earlier he had no plans to ask a change of venue.

The lawyer said Thursday it would be difficult to find an unprejudiced jury in Dallas. He said bail money is ready and waiting in Dallas if the court would let Ruby out of jail for \$100,000.

The lawyer would not say who had promised to post the bail.

Belli said here he favored television coverage of the trial. He added that telecasts should be handled "so as not to interfere with the orderly process of the court."

The case is set for trial Feb. 3 in the state district court of veteran Judge Joe B. Brown. The jurist has said repeatedly he has not made up his mind whether to allow television of the trial.

Attorney Thinks It's Good Advice

Webster's car was found with the ignition still unlocked.

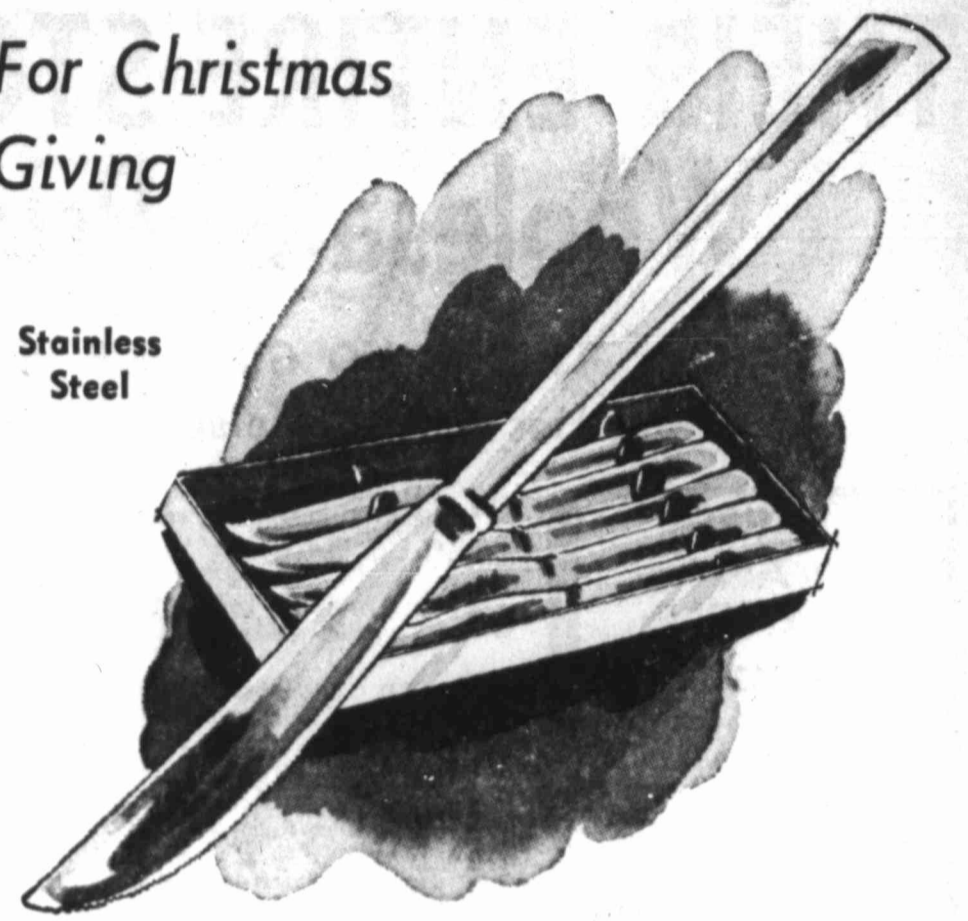
Russian Family To Visit Ohio

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Wants Johnson Interests Checked

WASHINGTON (AP) — Rep. H. R. Gross, R-Iowa, wants the Senate Rules Committee to investigate the radio and television operations of President Johnson's family.

"The Johnson family piled up a multi-million-dollar fortune in this government-controlled radio and television business while Lyndon Johnson was in government office, prior to becoming President," Gross said in a House speech Thursday.

"On the basis of available facts, it would appear that the burden of proof is on the LBJ Co. to demonstrate that the FCC (Federal Communications Commission) never engaged in any

favoritism for a company owned by this family."

Shortly after Johnson became President, the FCC announced Mrs. Johnson had won approval of her bid to transfer to trustees all her holdings in the LBJ Co., which owns a television-radio station in Austin, Tex., and interests in three other stations.

Mrs. Johnson had held 32.8 per cent of LBJ Co. stock. The trustees already hold 30.9 per cent of the property in trust for the Johnsons' daughters, Lynda Bird and Lucy Baines.

Subsequently, FCC Chairman E. William Henry said he found the arrangement satisfactory.

In his speech, however, Gross said it would be "naive to accept the self-serving contention that Lyndon Johnson has no interest in this business when his wife owns 32 per cent of the stock and his daughters have had 30 per cent of the stock in their names."

Gross called for an examination of the FCC's records dealing with the LBJ Co.

The Senate committee, he said, has information that the company was spending \$7,000 to \$12,000 a year for a \$200,000 insurance policy on Johnson's life. "Certainly," Gross said, "that would indicate Mr. Johnson had more than a benign interest in the firm."

Bus Driver Wins Acquittal

SALINAS, Calif. (AP)—Francisco G. Espinosa, 34, the driver of a farm labor bus involved in California's worst vehicle accident, was acquitted of 32 counts of misdemeanor manslaughter Thursday in Monterey County Superior Court.

Defense attorney Robert Ames argued that Espinosa did not see or hear the train which struck his bus near Chualar last Sept. 17, killing 32 Mexican laborer passengers.

Ames said Espinosa's peripheral vision was poor and that his view of the oncoming train was obscured by an overcast sky and a row of utility poles.

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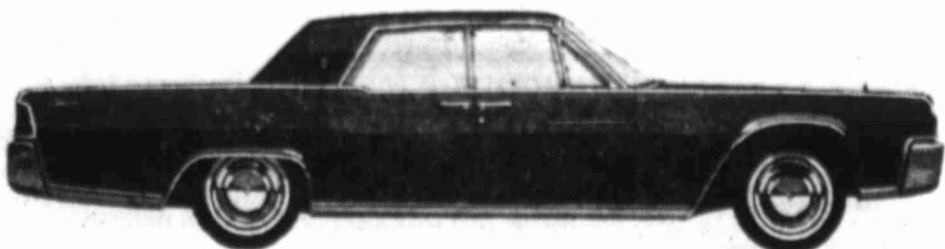
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
