



Exhaustion of the "national emerprovisions of the Taft-Hartley Act in the railway labor work-rules dispute moved Congress to apply compulsory arbitration for the first time in regulation of labor-management relations. Organized labor would do well to realize that failure to prevent work stoppages over inter-union rivalry could force resort to compulsory arbitration as a solution for jurisdictional disputes.

In fact, such a bill, though narrowly limited in application, is now under congressional consideration. Introduced by Sen. Frank J. Lausche, D-Ohio, the bill would require compulsory arbitration (meanwhile prohibiting a strike) on any jurisdictional dispute under an unexpired collective bargaining contract in the maritime industry and longshoring operations. The bill's passage is highly doubtful at this time, but is is handwriting on the wall. It was brought on, among other things by the absurd inter - union, squabbling that plagued the nuclear ship Savannah.

The American labor movement has been sorely troubled by juris-

dictional disputes ever since the 1935 Wagner Act multiplied union organization and the 1936 expulsion of the CIO from the AFL split the labor movement. Since the AFL-CIO merger in 1955, top labor leaders have tried to work out machinery within their own organization to prevent jurisdictional disputes reaching the strike stage, and have been partially successful. But the problem is a serious one and could easily get worse dur-

ing the current automation squeeze. Strikes caused by jurisdictional disputes are against managements that are not responsible for the interunion rivalry and are powerless to resolve the issues involved. And the public interest is violated by economic damage that is not justified by any of the arguments supporting the rights of collective bargaining.

Voluntary action by labor movement leadership to end jurisdictional strikes is preferable to compulsory arbitration, and Congress will move slowly and cautiously in this field. But labor should not be unaware that public opinion would likely force governmental intervention should jurisdictional disputes get out of hand.

William S. White Available Mr. Lodge Is Disquieting

WASHINGTON-The extraorinarily eager interest shown by Henry Cabot Lodge in former President Eisenhower's reported suggestion that he seek the Republican presidential nomination is troubling two very different groups for very different reasons. People in the administration, though far from afraid of Mr. Lodge as a potential rival to President Johnson in next year's campaign, do

not hide their concern at the ambassador's open and wholly unexpected injection of himself into partisan politics in an arena of hot war with Communist invaders.

MR. LODGE accepted President Kennedy's appointment as ambassador to South Viet Nam for the precise purpose, on his side and on Mr. Kennedy's side, of keeping domestic policies strictly out of a war effort in which 18,000 American troops are involved alongside the anti-Commu-

nist Vietnamese The regular Republicans, for their part, are putting out for Mr. Lodge a mat upon which the word "Unwelcome" is, in spirit, written large. The ambassador, who lost his Senate seat from Massachusetts to John F. Kennedy and went on to represent President Eisenhower at the United Nations, has been in the black books of loyalist organization Republicans since 1949. He led an unsuccessful effort to oust the late Sen. Robert A. Taft of Ohio, "Mr. Republican," as principal GOP spokesman in the Sen-

THEN HE BURNED the last bridge with the orthodox Republicans by taking the lead in accusing Taft men of attempting to "steal" the 1962 Republican presidential nomination from Gen. Eisenhower.

When Is An Investment 'Suitable?'

issues at the convention of the Investment Bankers Association here at the Hollywood Beach Hotel had nothing to do with fast-moving stocks which, when first underwritten, vault to the sky in the over-the-counter market and then slide down again. This particular "hot issue" can be summed up in a word-"suitability"-though SEC Chairman William L. Cary would put an "un" in front and make it 'unsuitability."

WHAT IS A suitable investment for an elderly widow with no other income than the funds left her? Or what is suitable for an orphaned student about to enter graduate school? He or she is over 21 but not yet hep to the vicissitudes of Wall Street and securities.

The special study group for the Securities & Exchange Commision has proposed legislation to hold investment advisers and firms accountable for recommendations which are not suitable to the needs of an investor.

UNDERSTANDABLY, brokers and investment bankers hate the very thought. Where would the liability end? Amyas Ames, senior partner of Kidder, Peabody & Co., and retiring president of the IBA, indicated the ndustry's repugnance by saying that judgment, "suitability," can't be legislated. He used an example:

Once upon a time railroad stocks were prime investments suitable for widows, orphans, trust funds, and college endowments. But automobiles, highways, and airlines eroded the financial strength of many of the finest railroad properties in the country.

WHAT MIGHT have been a sensible, suitable investment in 1927 for a widow has become-with the benefit of hindsight-unsuitable, a non-dividend paying capital loss.

Mr. Ames would not defend a recommendation to a widow to switch from, let us say, American Telephone & Telegraph to a speculative untried stock. But he would prefer self-discipline from the industry to a regula-

When International Business Machines Corp. was flying high, approaching \$700 a share, a representative of a large New York house advised a widow to put a legacy entirely into the stock. The stock went down. The widow hired a lawyer. The firm settled out of court, as a matter of conscience and good business.

IN THIS CASE, the money put in IBM was not the widow's sole asset. She had other investments. None the less, the partners in the firm decided that the advice wasn't appropriate. It "over-IBMed" her at a high price. The salesman should have emphasized income, not the long-term gain. Chairman Cary would agree with Mr. Ames that no investment house can be held liable for vast economic changes affecting industry-such as the railroads, or, say, steel in its competition with aluminum, glass, or concrete.

What is suitable in one era ought not to be reviled five or ten years

BUT SOME recommendations, thinks the chairman, can be judged at the instant as unsuitable-and by the standards of most persons within the business.

In between, of course, is a vast middle zone of judgment on which honest men and canny investment analysts can differ. That's the "hot issue." Can standards of suitability be defined in a law?

the beautiful and touching words of Jesus in his prayer recorded in Matthew 6:9-13. Even small children have become familiar with this prayer, which begins with the words "Our Father who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name . . ." This prayer has become so well-known that it is now referred to as "The Lord's Prayer."

Yet, another of Jesus' prayers has been virtually forgotten. This was the prayer he uttered his last night upon the earth.

For what would Jesus pray in such a crucial hour? That his betrayal might be averted? That he might not be forsaken and denied? Our Lord prayed for none of these things. Here is a portion of this prayer of Christ—a prayer too long and too often

"Neither pray I for these alone, but for them also which shall believe on me through their word: That they all may be one; as thou, Father, art in me, and I in thee, that they also may be one in us: that the world may believe that thou bast sent me. And the glory which thou gavest me I have given them; that they may be one, even as we are one: I in them, and thou in me, that they may be made perfect in one; and that the world may know that thou bast sent me, and bast loved them, as thou bast loved me." (John 17:20-23).

Plainly, Jesus prayed for the unity of his disciples. He recognized his influence in the world would be magnified if his followers stood as one. Would Jesus have prayed for something that would be impossible to achieve? Was he a mere idealist?

Christ not only prayed for unity, but also left a plan for achieving it. This plan, based on a respect for the authority of Christ, is revealed in the New Testament. It consists of four basic principles:

1. All-sufficiency of the word of God as the only creed. "All scripture is given by inspiration of God, and is profitable for doctrine, for reproof, for correction, for instruction in righteousness: That the man of God all good works." (2 Timothy 3:16,17). Human creeds represent a source of division.

2. All-sufficiency of the divine name. "Yet if any man suffer as a Christian, let him not be ashamed; but let him glorify God on this behalf" (1 Peter 4:16). Denominational names represent a source of division.

3. All-sufficiency of the spiritual Body of Christ. "And hath put all things under his feet, and gave him to be the head over all things to the church, which is his body, the fulness of him that filleth all in all" (Ephesians 1:22,23). Differing religious federations, conferences, conventions, synods, and other organizations represent a source of division.

4. All-sufficiency of the gospel plan of salvation. The gospel is described as the "power of God unto salvation" (Romans 1:16). Our Lord commands men to obey terms of the gospel-through faith, repentance, confession, and baptism. And when one is baptized into Christ he is simultaneously added to the spiritual Body of Christ and is thus made complete "in Christ" (1 Corinthians 12:13 and Colossians 2:10).

When men insist on the right to have divisive creeds; when they insist on the right to wear denominational names; when they insist on the right to have a religious hierarchy and human organizations; and when they insist on the right to determine terms of church membership-when they do all of this, they are insisting on the right to perpetuate religious division.

Jesus prayed for unity, and every believer in Christ should submit to the divine plan for bringing it about. Oneness in Christ is a paramount teaching of the New Testament: "There is one body, and one Spirit, even as ye are called in one hope of your calling; One Lord, one faith, one baptism, one God and Father of all, who is above all, and through all, and in you all" (Ephesians 4:4-6).



Naismith adopted 13 simple rules for conduct on the court. From that set of statutes, the laws have been enlarged to such a point that officials seem now to blow their whistles almost constantly, with the result that the average fan rarely can spot the infraction and wouldn't recognize it if he did.

At one time in the early history of the game, the only method of scoring was by field goals. Each goal counted two points. It wasn't until 1894 that rules makers decided to award a point for each foul made by the opponent. That didn't work out so well. The following year a team fouled against was given a free throw from a line several feet from the basket. To this day, the foul shot remains a part of the game and it now wins many agame — perhaps too many.

In the early days of the endeavor coaches taught their boys to shoot basketball with both hands. Trying to shoot with one hand was regarded as "show-boating" or "funny stiff," and was strictly forbidden.

It was natural that the players would develop better ways of shooting and gradually the coaches permitted variations. Today, the one-handed push shot, hook shots and jump shots are the rule rather than the exception. The

jump shots are the rule rather than the exception. The twohanded set shot is still used, however, and remains one of the most productive.

One of the basic principles of the sport as contrasted with football is that there must be no rough body contact. A player, for instance, must not hold, push, charge, trip, im-

pede the progress of an opponent by extending an arm, shoulder, hip or knee, or by bending the body into other than a normal position, or use any rough tactic. The game remains simple but the rules are becoming increasingly complicated. If you watch the referee, as he signals

the official scorer and timer, you can keep fairly well informed

on what is happening. He will signal all infractions, including technical fouls which he indicates by forming a "T" with open palms. A technical infraction can be committed by a non-player as well as a player and does not involve contact with an opponent, instead usually involves unsportsmanlike conduct.

If you still don't understand why the whistle must be blown most of the time, don't worry about it - probably the coach doesn't, either.





BIZERTE, Tunisia (AP) President Nasser of the United Arab Republic called today for Arab unity in opposing Israel, which he described as "one of the last sequels of colonialism. Speaking before a cheering rain-soaked crowd celebrating the recent withdrawal of French troops from Tunisia, Nasser

'The Palestine problem demands our unity. It is one of the last sequels of colonialism which divided us. Palestine gives the power to other Arab nations to unite and triumph." It was Nasser's first trip to Tunisia, where hardly three years ago his pictures and Egyptian newspapers were banned. The 1961 battle of Bizerte, in which French troops crushed an effort of Tunisians to eject them from that Mediterranean base, brought Tunisia and the United Arab Republic together after years of feuding Referring to Tunisian Presi
