Pilot Killed In Jet Crash

Capt. Kenneth A. Cunningham, a pilot in the 331st FIS base at Webb AFB, lost his life Sunday when his F104 aircraft plunged to earth about four miles northwest of the base.

Base authorities said the captain was flying a routine training mission at the time of the mishap, which occurred about 12:45 p.m. An investigative board is checking into the cause of the crash.

It was the second fatal crash for the 331st since it has been stationed at Webb AFB, about four years. On Nov. 26, 1st Lt. Harry M. McDowell was killed when his F104 crashed on base.

Connally Back At Home, Looks Forward To Yule

AUSTIN (AP) — Gov. John Connally rested in his mansion again today. He left a hospital Sunday for the second time since he was wounded in Dallas Nov. 22 when President Kennedy was assassinated.

He returned home from Dallas' Parkland Hospital Dec. 5, but was taken to St. David's last Tuesday when a vein in his right leg became inflamed.

Doctors said the inflammation in the leg was a result of blood clots formed when he was fed intravenously. Treatments will continue at home.

Connally left St. David's Hospital here with word from his doctors that he will be up by Christmas.

"I feel fine—a bit weak—but fine," he told newsmen as a nurse pushed his wheelchair out a side exit.

Wearing a sports shirt and dark shorts coat, Connally looked hearty as he climbed into the back seat of a police car for the 2-mile drive to the governor's mansion. His right wrist was in a sling.

Connally was wounded by a bullet which tore through his back, chest and wrist, stopping in the left thigh. He has been in hospitals at Dallas and Austin since then except for five days

at the mansion. He returned home from Dallas' Parkland Hospital Dec. 5, but was taken to St. David's last Tuesday when a vein in his right leg became inflamed.

Doctors said the inflammation in the leg was a result of blood clots formed when he was fed intravenously. Treatments will continue at home.

Sweeping Overhaul Likely For Alliance

More Drizzle Is Forecast

Continued cloudy skies, chill weather and the threat of freezing drizzle or snow flurries held sway in Big Spring and Howard County Monday and will continue into Tuesday, the U. S. Weather Bureau reported.

WASHINGTON (AP) — The appointment of Thomas Mann as assistant secretary of state for inter-American affairs in a sweeping reorganization of the Alliance for Progress.

in charge of all political, economic and military aspects of U.S. policy on Latin America. The Alliance, a 10-year program of economic assistance to Latin American countries, is now under the direction of Bell's Agency for International Development, with Moscoso as Alliance secretary for inter-American affairs who will require legislation from Congress.

Mann, 51, met with Johnson before the appointment was made and again Sunday. Afterward, officials said the President had told Mann he wants him to take the best parts of Franklin Roosevelt's Good Neighbor Policy and John Kennedy's Alliance and use them as a guideline for plans to eliminate poverty, illiteracy and disease from the hemisphere.

PORTRAITS OF PRESIDENTS

Newest Document offered this week in The Herald's Americana series is a beautiful parchment sheet containing portraits of the Presidents—from George Washington through John F. Kennedy.

But if this is in prospect, administration sources are not saying so yet. Mann, of Laredo, Tex., will have to look at this problem and discuss it with President Johnson, Secretary of State Dean Rusk, Alliance Coordinator Theodore Moscoso and Aid Director David Bell, White House press secretary Pierre Salinger said Saturday in reply to questions.

Prior to announcement of Mann's appointment, there was widespread speculation in Washington that Johnson plans a complete reorganization of the Alliance and that Moscoso may be assigned elsewhere. The Mann-for-Martin switch appears to indicate a change in handling Latin American policy.

"I regard this as a move to upgrade the entire Alliance for Progress program and to place additional emphasis on our entire Western Hemisphere policy," assistant Senate Democratic Leader Hubert Humphrey of Minnesota said after he conferred with Johnson. "I think it's a good sign."

U.S. To Keep Strength Up, NATO Told PARIS (AP)—President Johnson assured the North Atlantic Alliance today that the United States will maintain its troop strength in Europe so long as these men are needed. Johnson's promise was contained in a message read by Secretary of State Dean Rusk at the opening of NATO's 3-day winter ministerial meeting to survey the state of Western defenses and hopes for peace.

Johnson stressed that his administration would continue the late President Kennedy's strong line of support for NATO.

DEFENSE STAND Johnson called for "a balanced NATO defense posture, including powerful nuclear and non-nuclear forces, which will deter aggression." The President added:

"To NATO's continuing fulfillment of this task, I pledge my country's will and resources. We will keep in Europe the equivalent of six American divisions that are now deployed there, so long as they are needed; and under present circumstances there is no doubt that they will continue to be needed."

WITHDRAWAL With his pledge, the new American President tried to put at rest the speculation that has been current in Europe since the "Big Lift" exercise two months ago that a sizable withdrawal of U.S. troops was in the wind. Other U.S. officials have also given such assurances repeatedly since Big Lift.

Johnson said U.S. fulfillment of its NATO commitments is "a lasting memorial to the stature" of President Kennedy.

But he also called on America's allies to do their part, saying:

PARTNERSHIP "I am confident that our allies will also make their full contributions to this NATO defense, so that the burdens and responsibilities of partnership may be equitably shared.

Military strength—both nuclear and non-nuclear—is useful only as it serves political ends. "Our task is to ensure that NATO remains an effective means for concerting these ends, as well as for building that strength."

British Foreign Secretary Richard A. Butler was expected to try for new Allied efforts to end the cold war with the Soviet Union. He was expected to encounter hesitation from some colleagues.

Investigation, Cleaning Up Under Way

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Three hundred million gallons of water roared out of a gaping hole in Baldwin Hills Reservoir, leaving three persons dead, at least \$10 million damage—and one big unanswered question: Why?

Investigators probed the cause of Saturday's devastating flood today as cleanup crews and heart-sick homeowners moved in to clear the stricken area of tons of muck and debris.

For some, there was nothing to be done.

DEEP GULLIES

The giant wall of water from the breaking dam swept blocks of homes away. Only deep, eroded gullies remained where attractive dwellings stood. Sixty-four homes were destroyed and 82 were severely damaged.

More fortunate residents picked among the ruins of their shattered homes, hoping to salvage items left behind when the order to evacuate disrupted the tranquil neighborhood.

The big 19.5-acre reservoir, owned by the Los Angeles Department of Water and Power, burst with a mighty roar Saturday afternoon after a small leak developed earlier in the day.

INTO HOLE

The earth shook as huge chunks of earth from the dam collapsed into the hole created by the rushing waters.

The flood smashed through an expensive canyon residential area, hit a garden court apartment development, spread through two business districts and another residential neighborhood, then piled into a flood control channel and poured into the ocean about five miles away.

Up to 10 inches of thick mud covered everything in the path of the water.

The many-faceted investigation starting today will attempt to answer:

WANTS TO KNOW Mayor Samuel Yorty, who wants to know why the dam broke.

Thousands of flood victims, who want to know who will pay for the damage.

Foreign Aid Debate Waged As Congress Nears Windup

WASHINGTON (AP) — The House debates foreign aid appropriations today as an adjournment-bent Congress begins its final week of work.

The House Appropriations Committee has recommended \$2,801,700,000 in new funds for the aid program—\$1,723,825,000 below the request of the late President John F. Kennedy.

President Johnson has appealed to Congress to reverse the reduction lest the United States be forced "to follow policies of weakness and retreat."

The foreign aid appropriation is part of a \$4,430,966,960 major money measure, one of six that are the main items on Congress' program this week.

The House also has cleared up everything else controversial, and leaders hope to call it quits Friday after more than 11 months of almost continuous session.

There also is concern that after Thursday it may be hard to keep a majority of the Senate and the House in Washington to transact business.

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Members already have left and others plan to depart soon.

The aid cut approved Saturday by the Appropriations Committee is one of the deepest

ever recommended for the program. The amount approved is \$832 million below the spending ceiling authorized by Congress last week in a separate measure.

The proposed reductions in foreign aid funds would put our foreign policy in a straitjacket, Johnson said in a statement after the committee had unveiled its ax.

I urge the Congress, therefore, to appropriate the funds essential to conduct strong and forward-looking foreign assistance programs in the U.S. national interest," the President said.

One of the committee's actions, slashing from \$136 million to \$100 million U.S. funds earmarked for voluntary contributions to special U.N. programs,

drew the wrath of Adlai Stevenson, U.S. ambassador to the United Nations.

If this "shocking action" is not reversed, Stevenson said Sunday in New York, the U.N. programs, which help children, refugees and young countries, and U.S. prestige will suffer.

The House may pass the appropriation measure today after attempts to increase the aid funds and others to cut it are made. The bill has not yet been considered by the Senate.

Another new appropriation measure, providing \$41,886,000 to finance two new mental retardation programs, also must get through both branches.

It was approved Saturday by the House Appropriations Committee and is slated for House passage Thursday.

WASHINGTON (AP)— Communist-led tin miners continued to hold 19 hostages today, in Catavi instead of La Paz and awaiting an explanation of a deal for their release negotiated by leftist Vice President Juan Lechin.

It was hoped the hostages would be released sometime today after Lechin, head of the Miners' Union, explains the agreement at a general meeting in Catavi, the mining center 180 miles southeast of La Paz, where the hostages were held.

Originally, the 19 were expected to be freed Sunday night, but some radio stations controlled by the miners criticized the agreement and accused the union leadership of capitulating to government pressure.

Despite the delay, Paz Estenssoro said Sunday night he was optimistic the captives would be freed.

The four American hostages are Bernard Rifkin, 52, a native of Brooklyn, N.Y., a labor adviser for the U.S. Agency for International Development; Robert Ferguson, 26, of Honolulu, a Peace Corps volunteer; and two information officers at the U.S. Embassy in La Paz—Michael A. Kristula, 41, who has relatives in Niles, Ill., and Cadillac, Mich., and Thomas M. Martin Jr., 27, of the Bronx, N.Y.

Posse Hunts Four In Killing, Thefts

BUCKHOLTS (AP)—A 75-man posse scoured this Central Texas area today for four men accused of killing an Alabamian, binding his wife and dumping her into a well with the body of her husband.

Sheriff W. A. Bratton at Cuba, Ala., said the fugitives were former carnival workers likewise blamed for robbing farm families and stealing cars in three other states.

Officers used state prison bloodhounds in a search which continued through the night in freezing weather. It centered on a wooded sector close to the home of one of the wanted men outside Buckholts.

In Alabama, solicitor (prosecutor) Tom Boggs issued warrants charging the four men with murder, attempted murder, armed robbery and burglary. The warrants named Gerald Eaton, 27, of Buckholts; Don Lucas, 18, Clarence Conn, 20, and Dennis Wood, 17, home towns undetermined.

SALESMAN

They were accused in the slaying of Leonard Culpepper, 55, a soft drink salesman, at his home near the Alabama-Mississippi line Friday.

Bratton said four men robbed Culpepper of \$125, shooting him once in the spine and twice in

the head, and dumping the dead man into a well 12 feet deep.

It was next day, while the Alabama sheriff and a deputy were investigating a burglary at a home just one mile distant, before the body of Culpepper was found. His wife, with hands tied behind her back, had spent the night lying atop her dead husband.

Mrs. Culpepper was taken to a hospital in grave condition.

AT BEAUMONT

Bratton said a carnival fired the four suspects Dec. 4 at Beaumont, Tex., and they subsequently were accused of farm house robberies near Buckholts and Walters, Okla.

Four men took silverware, clothing, food and a typewriter last Monday night from Mr. and Mrs. J. D. Lewis, who live in this vicinity. The intruders first bound the couple, hauled them to a panel truck parked 3 miles distant, returned and looted the home. They also took the Lewis car.

In Oklahoma, County Atty. Hugh Fitzsimmons obtained warrants charging four men with robbing the home of Mr. and Mrs. T. L. Wileman near Randlett a night later. With their son Larry, 19, the Wilemans were tied and held captive for two hours while money,

guns, clothing, food and their automobile were taken.

SAME MEN

Fitzsimmons said the Lewis and Wileman burglaries apparently were committed by the same men. He identified three of them as Harold L. Edwards, 20; Julius Gonzales and Skeeter Gonzales. Young Wileman recognized Edwards as a former classmate, the Oklahoma prosecutor said.

Except for Edwards, Fitzsimmons said the men probably had been using aliases. This was the only immediate explanation for the difference in names.

Bratton said the wanted men next stole a car at De Queen, Ark., before turning up in Alabama.

Federal agents took part with state and local authorities in a manhunt around Cuba.

"The people here are really up in arms over this thing," Bratton said.

STOLEN CAR

The search shifted back to Texas with discovery of a stolen Alabama car late Sunday outside the family home of Eaton, one of the wanted men, near Buckholts. Witnesses told of seeing four men in the car stop for gasoline at the neighboring community of Seaton about 5 p.m.

Sheriff Carl Black from nearby Cameron and Ranger Capt. Clint Peoples, directing the manhunt, said the men presumably were on foot since no car theft had been reported in this vicinity.

"I don't see how anybody can get out of here," Peoples said. "Every road is sealed off and there are roving patrols also."

While occupants of every home around Buckholts had been warned, Peoples said he feared the fugitives might have forced their way inside a house and seized hostages.

BACK DOOR

State patrolman Ernest Reynolds said he was convinced some of the men fled through a back door as he approached the home of Eaton.

Reynolds said Mrs. Skatie Eaton, widowed mother of the fugitive, acknowledged her son had been there a bit earlier but she insisted he had only two companions.

Guards and bloodhounds were brought from the Eastham unit of the state prison near Huntsville. Some of the possemen followed the dogs on horseback.

In the abandoned car officers found seven shotguns, four rifles, ammunition, luggage, heavy clothing, blankets, a camp stove and a gasoline lantern. The weapons ranged from an old-double-barreled shotgun to a modern high-powered rifle with telescopic sight.

Peoples said the men were believed to be armed with a rifle and two pistols, .38 and .45 caliber, obtained at the Eaton home.

Church Council Mapping Program

MEXICO CITY (AP)—The World Council of Churches' Commission on World Missions and Evangelism began working today on its program for the years ahead.

More than 200 Protestant and orthodox church leaders, representing 300 million members on six continents, for a week have discussed subjects ranging from America's racial problems to church challenges in Africa, Asia, and Latin America.

The conferees turned now to mapping missionary, financial and church unity programs.

They were taking time tonight, however, to hear Dr. Kathleen Bliss of London, general secretary of the Church of England board of education, talk about what the church means to the intelligentsia.

The churchmen heard an American, an Asian and a German speak Sunday.

The Rev. Robert Spike of the United Church of Christ and executive director of the commission on religion and race from New York, urged that other continents help America in its racial crisis.

He called for both financial help and missionaries with experience "in hostile environments."

Dr. C. H. Hwang, principal of Formosa's Tainan Technological College and the Rev. Thomas Ekollo, school manager of the Evangelical Church of Cameroon, agreed there should be church unity.

Ekollo said church members in his area were "disturbed—horrified—by the division of the Christian church."

Hwang said colonialism has left its scars on Asian churches and they could no longer carry on "business as usual."

Clerk Held For Killing Basketball Star With Car

NEW YORK (AP)—A factory clerk is charged with homicide in the death of a basketball star run down by an automobile that police say was deliberately aimed at a group of college students.

The victim was Mike Schaffer, 19, sophomore star at City College, who only an hour earlier had led his teammates to their fourth straight victory.

He was high scorer with 18 points in Saturday night's 74-44 triumph over Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute of Troy, N.Y.

After the game, Schaffer left the uptown Manhattan gymnasium with nine other boys and girls, including his girl friend, Molly Irgang, 15. They began walking toward a subway. But

death intervened five blocks away.

Police said a young motorist, after making remarks to the girls and scuffling briefly with one of the boys, climbed back into his auto and gunned it right at the group. All jumped to safety except Schaffer, who apparently didn't see the car coming. He was dragged almost a block.

About four hours later, armed with the license number of the auto, police arrested Eddie Weissman, 19, of Manhattan and charged him with homicide.

Weissman admitted being in the car at the time Schaffer was killed but denied trying to hit anyone with it, police said. He was held without bail.

Progress Slowly Arriving For Nomads Of Somalia

MOGADISHU, Somalia (AP)—Over the sun-scorched horn of Africa, tall, lithe men in long skirts known as futa patiently lead long camel caravans.

At dusk they build shacks of branches and grass mats. Crouching around fires, they chant a poetry called bagay.

Nearly 75 per cent of Somalia's inhabitants are nomads, moving from place to place in search of pastures for camels, sheep, goats and cattle. The total population is estimated at 2.3 million.

While most of the country remains primitive, plans are being drawn to bring progress into the nation. American and Soviet technicians compete in building schools and hospitals. Both East and West invite young Somalis to study at their universities.

Small Italian cars flash along Mogadishu's dusty, heat-struck streets. Stores with giant fans turning under the ceilings advertise tape recorders and cameras.

A stone's throw from the capital's airport runway, herds of camels and cattle graze guarded by half-naked shepherds. Air traffic halts at dusk for lack of lights.

The country, covering an area of 265,000 square miles, does not have a railroad. American technicians are developing the port at Mogadishu. The Russians are building one at Berbera in the north.

It is a nation of old and proud traditions, with one of the few working democracies in Africa.

Six political parties compete for national and municipal jobs. Authorities have a hard time trying to keep men and women from voting several times in elections.

There is not one political prisoner in Somalia. Criticism of the regime and party in power is free.

The Somali republic was born in 1960 with the merger of areas formerly administered by Italy and Britain. The most heated problem is the presence of Somali minorities in neighboring Kenya and Ethiopia.

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Mrs. Rudd Dies In Monahans

Mrs. Elizabeth Elliott Rudd, who lived a number of years in Big Spring, died Sunday morning in Monahans.

She was 79 and was the wife of a pioneer West Texas dentist. While in Big Spring she made her home with a daughter, Mrs. C. J. Wise, now of Odessa.

Funeral services will be held Tuesday at Arlington. Besides her daughter she also leaves a son, Elliott Rudd of Odessa, and several grandchildren.

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Germany Seeking New Red Trade

BONN, Germany (AP)—West Germany, already the biggest trading partner of the Communist bloc, is driving hard to do more business behind the Iron Curtain.

West German officials say it's just a case of businessmen eager to make an honest Deutsche Mark. Their government considers it healthy for the economy to boost exports.

In political dealings with the Communists, however, the West German government takes a stiffer attitude than most other countries in the West.

West Germany is the world's second biggest trader, after the United States. The deals with the Reds amount to about 6 percent of Germany's total.

COMBINED

West Germany's trade with the Communists is expected to come to about \$1.39 billion this year, exports and imports combined. Of this, about \$437 million is with Communist-ruled East Germany. The West German government still hopes for reunification and regards trade with East Germany as a domestic matter.

If the East German business is left out, West Germany still trades far more with the Eastern bloc than any other country outside the bloc. Britain comes next.

Even so, West German trade with the Communists is on the downgrade. Last year it amounted to \$1.53 billion. The peak was in 1960.

One reason for the decline: The Communist countries export mainly farm products and they have had shortages in recent years.

INCREASE

Britain has increased its business in the Communist bloc while West German trade declined.

Gerhard Schroeder, West German foreign minister, has been working on this. West Germany does not have embassies in the Communist countries except for the Soviet Union. Its policy is to refuse full diplomatic relations to countries that recognize

the East German Communist regime.

The lack of relations makes trade more difficult. Schroeder has been trying to set up trade missions that have many functions of embassies. Agreements have been signed with Poland, Hungary and Romania. Talks begin soon with Czechoslovakia and Bulgaria.

AGREEMENT

Talks had been due to start with the Soviet Union this month on a new trade agreement. The present one expires this year, though deliveries will continue into 1964 and new business can be done without a formal agreement.

No date has been set for the opening of the talks, and no explanation for the delay has been given. The West German foreign ministry says it is ready to start, but has had no reply from Moscow.

Some Western experts think the Soviets may be stalling. In the negotiations on American wheat Moscow may see hope for advantageous trade with the United States—now almost negligible. Soviet leaders may also be awaiting the results of talks in Paris last month on what kind of credit members of the Atlantic Alliance should give to the other side.

15 YEARS

There was no agreement on this Britain still is willing to treat the Communist countries like any others, and give them credit up to 15 years. The United States, France and West Germany agree—at least on paper—that the limit should be five years.

West German trade with the Soviet Union is expected to reach \$342 million this year, against \$422 million in 1962. Much of the drop is due to a loss of West German industrial exports. On the insistence of its allies, West Germany canceled Soviet orders for \$20 million to \$25 million worth of pipe for Soviet oil pipelines. There had been good prospects for more business in this item.

West German exports to Communist China also are dropping sharply this year. Japan is the big competitor.

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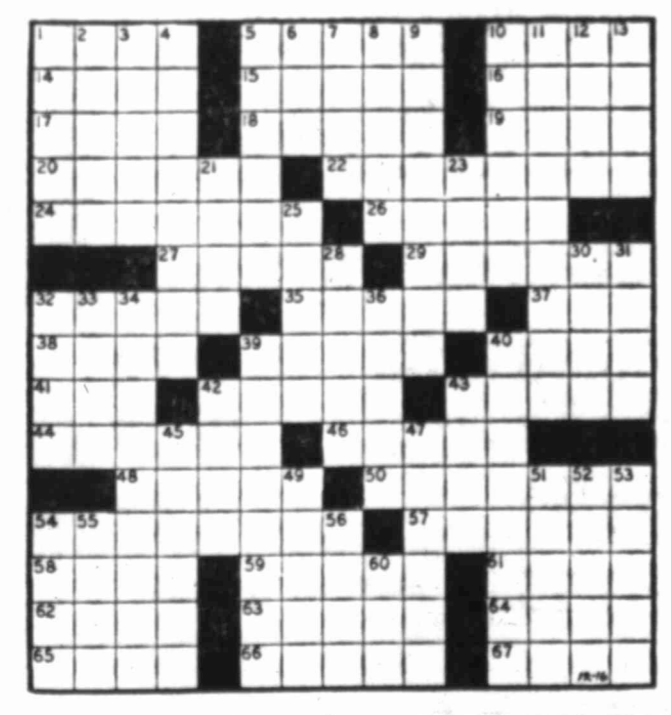

liable account of what happened, the men who knew set about drawing up their summaries. BY HANDS Presumably, in some cases, they wrote by hand, speaking their words aloud to themselves as they shaped the letters, since communication then was more by ear than by eye. As an alternative, they may have dictated to an amanuensis, or professional scribe. In either case, in order to multiply and disseminate the accounts, it was up to others to make handwritten duplicate copies, since there were then no mechanical means for doing it. None of the existing manuscripts bears a date, and the precise time and place of composition cannot be definitely established. However, early tradition provides many pointers. Journals of various church fathers of the first 150 years after Christ, quoted by the ecclesiastical historian of the 3rd Century, Eusebius, offer many details.

ONE EVENT Each of the narrators sees separate facts, yet one event. Each sees a special set of scenes, actions and circumstances, yet one meaning. Each sees parts of one whole; distinctive portraits, yet one person—Jesus the Christ.

LANGUAGES Modern scholarship also has shed further light on the circumstances, by analyzing the language, the usages, the indications of instances of borrowing material from one another, and by comparing contents to external events. The clues suggest that additions and revisions occurred, in some cases, before all the books reached their present finished form. The process may not have been completed until around the end of the first century. But the original documents, on which the final versions are based, clearly came much earlier, while Christ's apostles still lived.

INTO FOCUS In this way does history sharpen its gaze. Time is required to bring the burst of fact into focus. Yet the primitive accounts of the coming of Christ were largely compiled in its immediate aftermath. Thus each sees only parts of the totality.

LATER VERSIONS Assuming this is so, scholarly studies indicate that later renditions of his book, as it now stands, also incorporated material from Mark, while retaining distinctive qualities of its own. Luke also may have drawn from Mark.

LITTLE GROUPS In homes and synagogues, in market places and tents of travelers, little groups met to recall incidents and share memories. "remember the words of the Lord Jesus, how he spake, saying..." they would relate. He was then expected to return soon, and no pressing need was seen initially for committing the details to writing. The expectancy rang in their words, "Maranatha—our Lord come!"

Neither he nor John refers to the genealogy or birth of Jesus, nor to the visiting wise men, the star, the manger, or the shepherds, but plunge immediately into the consequences. It is Luke who uncovers the most graphic scene of the nativity. The writers worked in a time

of turmoil. Israel smoldered with fires of revolution. Preaching about Christ was alternately outlawed or suspect as sedition. Fear of reprisal had silenced many.

The land seethed with clandestine societies, some of them fanatically violent, and the Roman militia trooped the countryside to hunt out and crush the dissident. Forbidden manifestos circulated from hand to hand. Posters offered rewards for conspirators.

Staffers Receive Kennedy Gifts
WASHINGTON (AP)—In the Christmas gifts: Members of the White House staff have received prints of a painting of the Green Room that President and Mrs. John F. Kennedy had planned to give them as Christmas gifts. The prints, mounted in red portfolios decorated with the presidential seal in gold, bear facsimile signatures of the late President and of Mrs. Kennedy under the inscription: "With our appreciation and best wishes for Christmas."

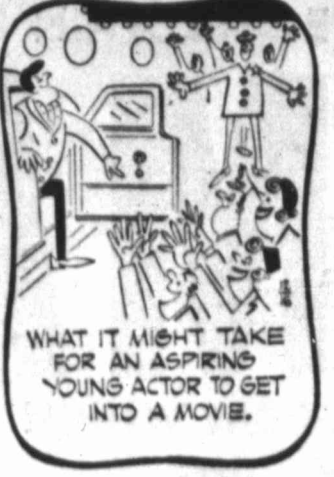

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Trio Takes Harrowing Ride For Six Blocks In Flood

EDITOR'S NOTE — What's it like to float six blocks in the family car? H. E. Dulude, in the following story, told to the Associated Press and the Long Beach (Calif.) Independent Press — Telegram—tells how his car was swept away when a reservoir broke in the Baldwin Hills.

By H. E. DULUDE
LOS ANGELES (AP)—I don't know how we did it. We floated six blocks in my car, and hit five or six other cars on the way. It's a miracle we're here.

My wife, Rosanna, and I live in an apartment below the Baldwin Hills Reservoir. My sister, Mrs. Orise Giguere, had come to visit from her apartment next door when we heard helicopters warning everyone to evacuate.

It was about 2:45 p.m. Saturday. The helicopters said the dam was breaking.

I went out and started the motor on the car and told the girls to hurry up.

Rosanna looked up the street as she came out and screamed, "The water is coming!"

She jumped in the car with us and I tried to outrun the water. I didn't make it.

The next thing I knew, my

new white sedan was hurled into the air by a horrible force of water.

I am an amputee and have special controls on my car. I kept trying to drive while we were bobbing up and down like a cork in that ocean. We floated straight down the street. We bounced off other cars, some floating, some sinking.

The car hit a pole at the intersection of La Brea Avenue and Rodeo Road and it deflected us between two buildings, a grocery and a restaurant.

I looked up and saw police

officers on the roofs of the two buildings. The water was about 11 feet deep in through there.

Officer R. J. Holoubek of the Los Angeles Police Department jumped into the water and swam toward us, shouting, "Close the windows, close the windows." We did. The car was filling up, now. Water was up to our waists.

Other police officers jumped in and formed a human chain to keep the car from floating off.

Holoubek opened the door of the car with one hand and pulled us out with his other.

I have never seen anything like what happened today. Before I retired, my wife and I lived in Topanga Canyon and twice we had to flee from brush fires. But at least we were able to escape—but what can you do when tons of water and mud surround you?

We spent the night on a high school gymnasium floor—at an evacuation center — and then, later, learned that our home and all of our belongings are gone. But thank God — and thanks to Officer Holoubek — we are alive!

High Court Overturns Alabamans' Conviction

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Supreme Court overturned today contempt convictions of two officials of the National States Rights party, an Alabama segregationist group. In an unusual twist in the integration struggle, the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People had on principle—joined the segregationists in fighting the convictions.

The NAACP was concerned that its own activities might be put under a disadvantage if the convictions stood up in the case of the segregationists.

The Supreme Court's decision was announced in a brief, unsigned order.

The order cited a decision of some years ago in the case of "Shuffling" Sam Thompson, a Louisville Negro. The court, in the Thompson case, set aside

his arrest on the grounds that there was no evidence to support the action of city police.

Dr. Edward R. Fields, information director of the National States Rights party, and Robert Lyons, youth organizer for the group, were convicted of contempt on the ground they violated an injunction against distributing handbills and holding a rally in Fairfield, Ala.

The city of Fairfield obtained the injunction from an Alabama judge after Fields and Lyons distributed handbills announcing a meeting Oct. 11, 1961, in a private hall.

The handbills contained, among other statements, assertions that "The Nigger gets everything he demands!" "Communists in NAACP and Washington say whites have no rights!" and "White supremacy can be saved."

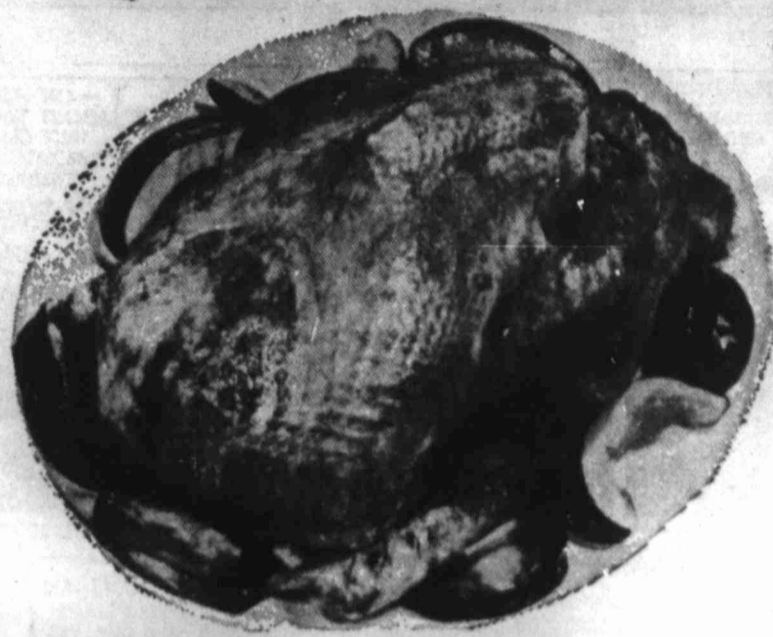
An arctic front which twice drove deep into the state and then retreated to the north edge of the Texas Panhandle got the blame for the coldest weather. This front was stationary before daybreak near Dalhart, where it drove the mercury down to 19 before gradual warming began. Dalhart also had early morning fog.

There was a freezing drizzle at Lubbock on the South Plains of West Texas. Farther south with temperatures generally a few degrees above freezing, light rain or drizzle fell around Midland, Laredo, Cotulla, McAllen, Corpus Christi and Palacios.

Occasional snow flurries were expected to reappear Monday night and Tuesday with somewhat colder weather spreading from the Panhandle into North Central and Northeast Texas.

Southern areas of the state were promised more occasional light rains in South Central and Southeast Texas and the south edge of Southwest Texas, but principally near the Rio Grande and along the coast.

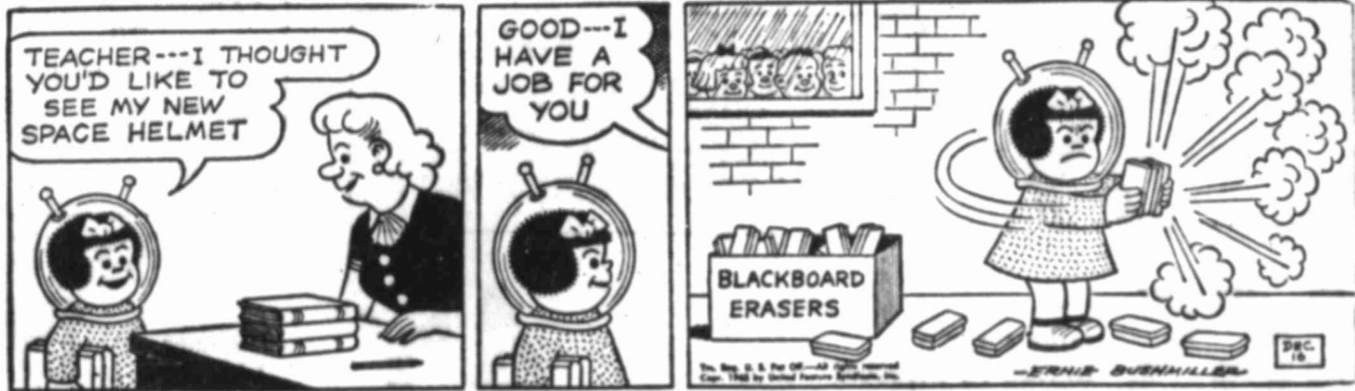

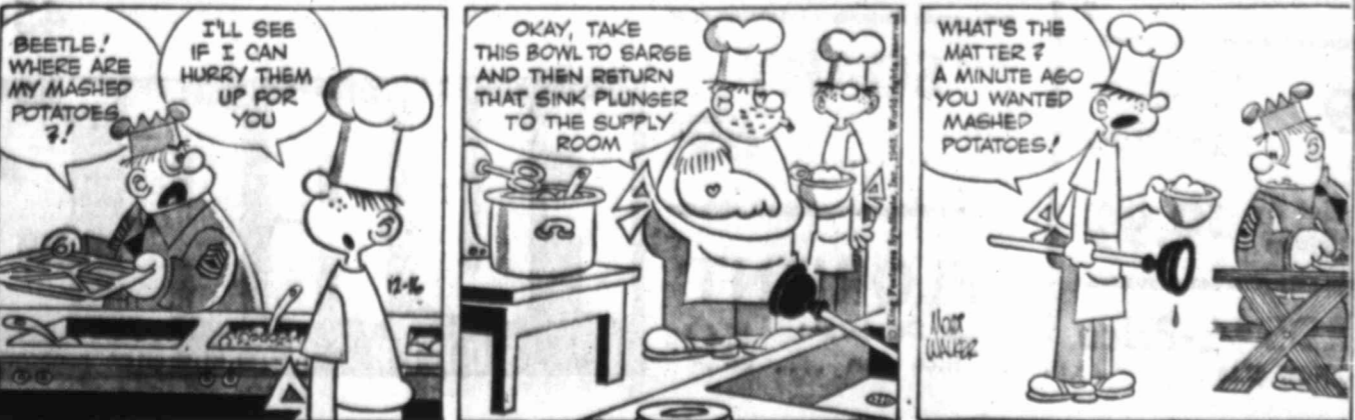

Russians Approve Arms Budget Cut

MOSCOW (AP)—A cut of 43 per cent in the Soviet military budget and an increase of 53 per cent in investments for consumer goods industries over the next two years were announced today. The new budget submitted to the Supreme Soviet — Parliament — reflected Premier Khrushchev's proclaimed goal of giving the Russian people more bread and fewer guns. But it was only a modest start in his plans for giant boosts in fertilizer and other consumer industries in the next seven years. With Khrushchev listening, Finance Minister Vasily Garbuzov announced the military budget for 1964 would be cut by 600 million rubles—\$666 million at the official exchange rate. A cut had been promised by Khrushchev at the meeting of the Communist Party Central Committee last week. Without giving figures, national planner Pyotr Lomako announced additional investments in agriculture, housing, light industry and food processing in the 1964-65 period would be 53 per cent higher than in the past two years. The military budget for 1964 totals 13.3 billion rubles (\$14.76 billion) out of a total government expenditure of \$13.3 billion. Military spending for 1963 was given as 13.9 billion rubles (\$15.4 billion). Western specialists in Soviet budgets insist that approximately half the annual Soviet expenditure is associated with the military, about the same proportion as in the United States. However, there is no immediate means of making a clear comparison between Soviet budgets and American budgets. The Soviet budget, unlike the American, includes investments in industry which are made by private operators in America. The budget proposed by the late President John F. Kennedy for the current fiscal year, now half gone, came to \$98.8 billion, of which \$55.4 billion was earmarked for defense. The finance minister emphasized the cutback in military spending will not weaken Russia's defenses. "These appropriations will enable the Soviet Union to maintain its defenses at a level that would ensure the security of the country and the entire Socialist camp," he said. The budget called for expenditure of 11.9 billion rubles (\$13.2 billion) in 1964 on the lagging Soviet agriculture. Garbuzov said this was 22.7 per cent more than the 1963 allocation. He said the 1964 expenditure on agriculture would be 12.8 billion rubles (\$14.2 billion).

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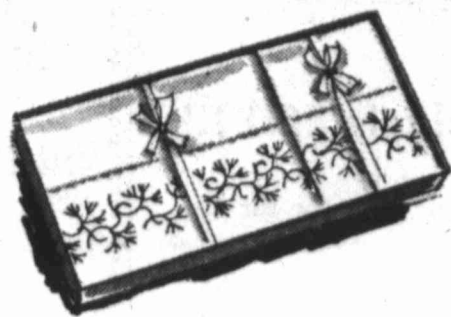

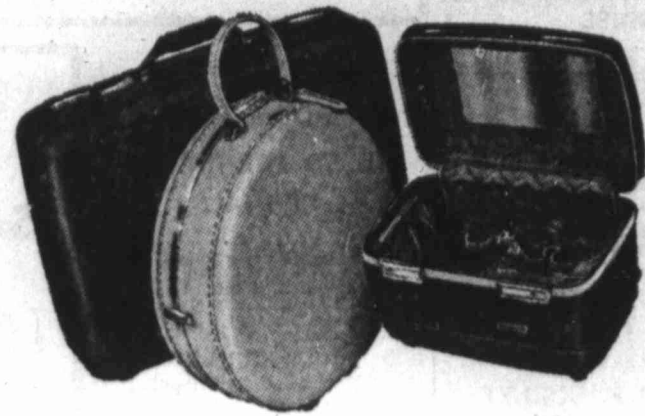

ANSWERS TO BRIDGE QUIZ

Q. 1—As South you hold:
 ♠Q7♥KJ9432♦75♣A92
 The bidding has proceeded:
 North East South West
 1♠ 2♦ 2♥ Pass
 4♥ Pass ?

What do you bid now?
 A.—Five clubs. Prospects for a slam are very good and an 11 trick contract should be safe. Showing the ace of clubs will induce partner to contract for slam if he has the other controls.

Q. 2—As South with both sides vulnerable you hold:
 ♠AQ865♥K9♦AJ2♣1065
 The bidding has proceeded:
 South West North East
 1♠ Pass 2♥ 2NT ?

What do you bid now?
 A.—Pass. East has relieved you of the obligation to rebid and you should be pleased to defer temporarily to partner. East may be using the unusual no trump overall or he may just be up to monkey business, but in any event North heard you open the bidding and the next decision should be his.

Q. 3—As South you hold:
 ♠1098♥74♦AQ10♣108432
 The bidding has proceeded:
 North East South West
 1♠ Pass 1NT Pass
 2♠ Pass ?

What do you bid now?
 A.—The 11 is true that you have already shown your six points by the original response, nevertheless your hand contains two features which it might not have possessed, namely: three trumps to the 10, and the ruffing value in hearts. Therefore, bid four spades.

Q. 4—As South you hold:
 ♠K62♥J75♦K108♣10963
 The bidding has proceeded:
 North East South West
 1♥ Pass 1NT Pass
 2♠ Pass ?

What do you bid now?
 A.—A bid of three hearts is clearly indicated, because partner presumably has five hearts and four spades. It is your duty, therefore, to return to the suit in which your side has eight trumps rather than seven. Your response of one no trump was entirely sound, and unless it is your intention to cast a slur upon your partner there is no occasion to be nervous.

Q. 5—As South you hold:
 ♠108742♥J96♦KQ4♣K2
 The bidding has proceeded:

North East South West
 1♥ Pass 1NT Pass
 2♠ Pass ?

What do you bid now?
 A.—There is nothing for you to do but pass. Any other bid in an effort to escape from playing with a three card trump suit would be entirely unjustified. Partner will construe it as an effort to go to game. You need not fear playing with only three clubs for partner has at least four good ones, if he has been properly brought up.

Q. 6—As South you hold:
 ♠AQ1072♥KJ2♦852♣95
 The bidding has proceeded:
 North East South
 1♥ 2♦ ?

What do you bid now?
 A.—This hand contains distinct offensive values but not quite enough to insist upon a game. The suggested call is a free raise to two hearts which designates such a holding. A bid of two spades, while it appears inviting, should be avoided. Such action will almost certainly force your partnership into a game contract. For, if partner rebids three hearts, which he may be obliged to do, surely you intend to go to four, without knowledge that he has any additional values.

Q. 7—As South you hold:
 ♠KQ105♥5♦AQ1086♣KJ9
 The bidding has proceeded:
 South West North East
 1♦ Pass 1NT 2♥ ?

What do you bid now?
 A.—Two spades. This may seem rather drastic to many readers, who will charge me with "reversing" on insufficient values. I am quick to confess that in the absence of a two heart bid by East my rebid would have been not two spades but two diamonds. A two spade bid under such circumstances would indicate a stronger hand. But in this particular case, we would not wish to give up the fight too easily and the cheapest possible way to contest at this juncture is by a bid of two spades which we hope partner will not construe as too violent an act.

Q. 8—As South you hold:
 ♠J843♥J753♦AK♣AJ4
 The bidding has proceeded:
 South West North East
 1♠ Pass 2♣ Pass ?

What do you bid now?
 A.—There is nothing for you to do but pass. Any other bid in an effort to escape from playing with a three card trump suit would be entirely unjustified. Partner will construe it as an effort to go to game. You need not fear playing with only three clubs for partner has at least four good ones, if he has been properly brought up.

Jerusalem Charged With Excitement Of Pope Visit

JERUSALEM, Jordan Sector (AP)—The forthcoming visit of Pope Paul VI to the Holy Land has charged the cool, clean air of Jerusalem with excitement and a renewed sense of history.

People are looking with fresh interest at the narrow streets where Jesus walked and at the hills where he taught and died. The January pilgrimage of the Pope somehow puts a different light on them and narrows the span of centuries.

"Will he come here?" asked a young French priest with a fond glance at the face of the Church of St. Anne over the spot where Mary is believed to have been born, and the nearby pool of Bethesda.

"It is so lovely—and so important. Don't forget, it was here that the Lord cured on the Sabbath."

IN JORDAN
 The Pope arrives three weeks from Sunday in Jordan's capital city of Amman, 80 air miles from the eastern end of the Mediterranean. He will quickly be on sacred ground. His drive westward to Jerusalem will take him down from the stark mountains of Moab into the valley of the Jordan River, where Christ was baptized.

As he crosses a bridge over the narrow, muddy stream he will pass within half a mile of the Dead Sea, lowest spot on earth. A few miles farther on he will come within sight of Biblical Jericho, oldest city in the world and now a winter resort scented with orange blossoms.

The drive will then take him up into the barren Judean Hills until, 55 road miles from Amman, he comes in sight of the Holy City, its spires reaching up from the hills.

PANORAMA
 If the Pope were an ordinary pilgrim he might first go to the top of the Mount of Olives. There, near the rock from which Christ traditionally ascended into heaven, he could see in panorama the beauty and tragedy of the Holy City.

Below, descending toward the Valley of Kidron, lies the Garden of Gethsemane where Jesus went to pray with His disciples the night He was betrayed. West across the valley, behind the medieval walls of Jerusalem, is the golden dome of the Rock Mosque, third most sacred

shrine in the Moslem religion. Rising in the distance behind it are the tragic hill of Calvary and at its little summit the Church of the Holy Sepulcher on the spot where Christ was crucified and buried.

The Pope could see, looking beyond that, more walls and the area called no-man's land separating the Israeli and Jordanian sectors of the city. The two nations are technically still at war with each other.

VISIT SHRINES
 During his three-day pilgrimage, he is expected to cross into the newer or Israeli side of Jerusalem and visit the Christian shrines in Israel, at Nazareth and the Sea of Galilee. He will then return to Jordan, a two-way crossing normally only allowed to diplomats or United Nations personnel.

One of the Pope's first acts on arriving in the Jordanian sector from Amman probably will be a visit to celebrate Mass at the Holy Sepulcher—like Jerusalem itself, a victim of conflict and division. The Roman Catholic, Greek Orthodox, Assyrian, Coptic and Armenian churches hold jealous guard over this ancient church, originally built by the Roman Emperor Constantine in the fourth century and several times destroyed and rebuilt.

Blaze Sweeps Packing Plant
 TYLER (AP) — Fire which raged out of control nearly an hour caused major damage to the Tyler Packing Co. on the city's east side Sunday night. Firemen reported several thousand pounds of meat were destroyed in addition to the loss of equipment and damage to the metal and stucco building. There were unofficial estimates the loss would range up to \$100,000. The roof over the back part of the structure collapsed as firemen battled the blaze in freezing weather, but none was injured. Ice formed as spray from fire hoses touched ground.
