Standard Oil Company of Texas is preparing to start drilling in the near future on a wildcat in South-Central Floyd County, to go to a possible depth of 7.500 feet. to investigate through the Permian and into the Pennsylvanian

The prespector is Stanotex No. 1 L. M. Daniel, and it will be 669 feet from north and east line, of the Daniel land in the Lakeview area, about seven miles south, of Floydada

Detailed information on the section and survey in which the exploration is located was not learned. It will go to at least 6.500 feet and may be carried on down to 7,500 feet-if it is necessary to drill to " that depth in order to test the Cisco section of the Pennsylvanian. Operations are due to be started within two weeks

DOLLAR HIDE EXTENDER FLOWS OIL FROM DEVONIAN

Lion Oil Company No. 1-B Tennie, (Cowden), has assured a onehalf mile west extension to the Devonian producing area in the Dollar Hide field of extreme Southwest Andrews County.

Located 1.986 feet from-west and 660 feet from north lines of section 6, block A-55, psl survey, this development took a three hour drillstem test at 8,309-71 feet, in the Devonian chert, topped at 8.310 feet.

Gas showed at the surface in four and one half minutes. It was not gauged or estimated Drilling mud started flowing at the surface in 48 minutes and dil flowed at the top in 56 minutes. It was turned to the tanks after four minutes, and in the first hour flowed 16 barrels of oil, cut four per cent drilling mud.

In the next 60 minutes it flowed 13 barrels of oil, with a shakeout of six per cent drilling mud. Flowing bottom hole pressure was 750 pounds and shutin bottom hole pressure was 4,000 pounds. No shows of water developed dur-

Russia's Truman Declares Nation Rejected Will 'Remain Strong Protests

WASHINGTON -(AP)-The United States has firmly rejected Russia's protest against a British-American decision to step up the level of industry in their occupied zones of Germany.

A note delivered to the Russian embassy in Washington Friday said the United States government "feels justified in pursuing objectives which have been commonly agreed in making arrangement for that purpose with any other occupying power willing to work toward the common end.

The U. S. and Britain announced greement last week to raise the industrial output of their economically merged zones to approximately the 1936 standard.

Russia had vigorously protested this move, claiming it vio ated the Potsdam Agreement which pledged the Big Four to treat Germany is a single economic unit.

"The Soviet government is ce:tainly aware of the importance of German production to the conomic rehabilitation of Europe. This is particularly true in respect of coal from the Ruhr area of Germany," the American note, made public Tuesday by the State Department,

President Hopes Armed Conflicts Can Be Avoided

QUITANDINHA, BRAZIL-(AP)-President Truman said Tuesday the United States is "determined to remain" strong" to back up a foreign policy based on a desire for permanent peace.

He told the Inter-American Defense Conference this "is in no way a threat" because "no great nation has been more reluctant than ours to use armed force."

But, he said, "Our aversion to violence must not be

misread as a lack of determination on our part to live up to the obligations of the United Nations charter or as an invitation to others to take li'scities with the foundations of international peace.

"Our military strength will be retained as evidence of the seriousness with which we view our obli-

1. Under the Marshall Plan, he said, America intends to do its best. "to provide cconomic help to-those who are prepared to he'p themselves and each other." He added that the United States is prepared, to do everything it can "within safe limits, that will be helpful and offec-

2. Fidelity to the United Nations. "We shall not forget our obligations under the charter, nor shall we permit others to forget theirs."

3. In carrying out its obligations o achieve world stability and peace. the United States is determined "to cmain strong."

4. The problems of countries lin he Western Hemisphere are different in nature from those of Europe and cannot be relieved by the same means, but "will be approached by us with the utmost good fai'u .nd with increased vigor in the coming period."

Truman's address highlighted the closing session of the conference at which delegates have hammered out an unprecedented defense pact binding the Americas to joint action in case of armed attack on any peaceable nation in the hemisphere.

Signing of the treaty by the 19 participating nations, in President Truman's presence, was arranged for this afternoon in Rio De Janeiro's Itmaraty Palace, home of the Brazilian Foreign Ministry.



York September 16. Emile Ghoury of the Palestine Arab Higher Committee declared in Jerusalem his organization had "rejected" proposals by the UN Special Committee to divide Palestine into

Arab and Jewish states and admit 150,000 Jewish immigrants during the next two years. He said the Arabs "would use all

means at their disposal" to combat the proposals and then released to newsmen an Arab Higher Committee statement declaring any attempt by the United Nations to carry out the recommendations would result in violence.

Ghoury said earlier that if Great Pritain tried to force partition "we will oppose it by force."

Arabi spokesmen promised that the seven-state Arab League would fight the report in the General Assembly through its five UN members-Egypt, Iraq. Syria, Lebanon and Saudi Arabia

Immediately after the UN committee announced its proposals. both Arabs and Jews began drawing their battle lines for the assembly fight.
