Egypt-Britain Feud Of Long Standing Is Now U. N. Headache

By DEWITT MACKENZIE AP Foreign Affairs Analyst

Egypt's demand that the UN Security Council order the British to withdraw their troops from the land of the Pharaohs and clear out of the Anglo-Egyptian Sudan, places the Council in a most uncomfortable position and increases an already tense situation between the two countries.

Indeed, to quote Egyptian Prime Minister Nokrashy Pasha, things might easily get out of hand in his country unless the council puts an end to England's occupation of the valley of the Nile.

The Prime Minister's language before the Security Council was pretty strong, and possibly somewhat rhetorical, but there can be no question about Egyptian resentment against the exercise of British influence in Egypt and the Sudan. This feeling has produced bloodshed in the past, as Nokrashy Pasha points out, and what has happened once can happen again. In any event, a quarrel whose focal point is a Moslem nation which is surrounded by sympathetic countries of the same faith, isn't conducive to good health.

The bitterness of the Egyptians against the British runs back for many decades of English domination. The hostility was particularly strong at the time of the First World War when the British established a protectorate over Egypt and appointed Prince Hussein Kamil as Sultan. The Prince was an angry and unwilling figure-head but accepted because he hoped he might do something for his people.

This anti-British feeling has persisted to greater or less degree. Just now it is greater, as Cairo presses its claims to the whole Nile Valley, including the Sudan. The British warned the Egyptian arguments for annexation of the Nile territory could apply equally to Ethiopia, Uganda and the Belgian

Britain has asked the Egyptian case be taken off the UN agenda as without justification. She shows every intention of protecting her interests in the Nile territory.



Mc Kenney on Bridge

The expert player watches the drop of every card, and thus is able to make deductions that give him the maximum number of tricks on a hand. For that reason the little false-card play in today's hand might deceive a good player. Of course at an afternoon bridge party, accompanied by conversation about new hats and new boy friends, no one pays much attention to the cards played. But let us assume that you are playing serious bridge, and

today's hand comes up. The bidding is quick and to the point. The opening lead is won in dummy with the king of hearts, and declarer leads a small club

from dummy. East plays the deuce and South finesses the queen. Now if West plays the four of clubs, declarer very likely will count him for three clubs to the ten-spot; but if West plays the eight on the first club trick, a good player will reason that he must have the ten and eight. Therefore, he will think that his correct play is to lead the jack of clubs, after re-entering dummy, and if East covers, the ten will fall; if East fails to cover, the ten will be picked up and the king will fall on the next round. But of course West's false-card defeats declarer's well-laid plans.

Do not get into the habit of playing carelessly. If you have a hance to deceive your opponent, and it will not hurt your partner, employ a false-card play of this type, especially when playing against an expert.



What Scared Off Recession Which Was Predicted?

By MAX HALL

WASHINGTON-(A)-What happened to the predictions a business "recession," or at least a price "adustment," would occur in the sum-

ner or fall of 1947? Well, the predictions eased off because many of the predictors have changed their minds. They now think the boom will stay with us until next year, and maybe

This is either good or bad, depending on how you look at it. The price "adjustment" that was so widely forecast- and which is very likely to come sooner or later -would be a general drop in prices. It could come when people's wages, or savings, or credit, or patience were no longer equal to the rising prices. The result would be a cut in their buying. Then the supply of goods would get a lot bigger than

Naturally, people would like a general drop in prices. And economists think a gradual decrease would be healthy all around. But if prices fell too suddenly and too far, a lot of businesses would get hurt. They would have to

lay off employes. People wouldn't

Thus a price "adjustment." if it's too violent, can be a business "recession," with unemployment and other effects. And a "recession" that happens to hit the country at a time when its economy is wobbly and vulnerable can be a "depression." Now, many economists believe the longer the boom lasts, the worse the "adjustment" will be when it comes. The higher the prices go, the harder they can

Why did some experts guess wrong and predict a price decline too early?

For one thing, they thought people's purchasing power and patience would give out sooner. But the piled-up purchasing power from the war has been enormous. And they now say there is "still plenty of purchasing power in the hands of the people."

For another thing, there is pretty close parallel between 1920 and 1947, and some experts-it now appears-made the mistake of taking this parallel too literally. In 1920 the postwar boom in pri-

ces ended with a plunge. These experts saw the same forces at work, and concluded the same thing would happen.
