**Fire Belle Works Among Glacier Park's Lookouts**

**BELTON, MONT.**—(AP)—Glacier National Park officials claim to have one of the most unusual forest fire fighting organizations in America's national park system.

The backbone is 13 lookout points scattered along the rocky continental divide, manned by seven young married couples and five men and one pretty college girl from Missoula, Mont., none of whom mind solitude.

They keep an eagle eye out for smoke, pin-point its location, judge the fire's size and notify headquarters at Belton.

Fourteen fire control aides—all experienced mountaineers—are stationed at strategic points, ready to hike into a fire area. Four packers, with strings of mules always are ready to move supplies over any of the 1,100 miles of trails to a base camp when additional men are needed.

To augment this setup, six U. S. Forest Service parachuting smoke jumpers are kept available at Missoula, to be flown into remote regions.

Humidity, time of season, wind, fuel moisture, visibility and lightning occurrence control the fire danger. Park rangers have figured out a system of interpreting these factors so that they'll know when constant vigilance is required.

The last fire of any size in the park occurred in 1946, when flames destroyed 300 acres of forest on Curly Bear mountain.

The system has been built up through the trial and error method of fighting fires in more than one-million acres of some of the most rugged mountain country in the west.

**New British Plane To Enter Race For Trade Among World's Nations**

**LONDON**—(P)—Air Vice Marshal Donald C. T. Bennett, executive vice president of British South American Airways, has announced that British aircraft builders, for the first time since the war, had evolved a plane able to compete with American-made Constellations and Skymasters (Douglas DC6) in transatlantic service.

The new craft, an improved 32-passenger version of the A. V. Roe Company's four-engine Tudor, showed "only minor trouble" on a recent 12,000-mile test flight to the Caribbean, Bennett said.

He said a second plane now building would make a "dress rehearsal" flight to Buenos Aires in mid-September, to be followed by the prototype and a third Tudor within a few weeks, and that the only "serious problem" remaining was to increase production.

**American Critical**  
Livingston Satterthwaite, American civil air attaché in London, described the original 12-passenger Tudor as "a great disappointment" in a report to Washington last July 3 which caused much comment in British aviation circles.

Bennett pictured the improved Tudor as an admitted stop-gap plane, pending development of larger British postwar models in the next two or three years, but said its performance left "not very much to choose" between it and Constellations now in use by British Overseas Airways Corporation on the North Atlantic.

"We have got an aircraft far more spacious than any British craft now in operation, which appears to have no difficulties. Therefore we are making them available for use on our routes as soon as deliveries allow," Bennett said.

Satterthwaite's principal criticism of the original Tudor was that its 12-passenger capacity, gasoline consumption and cruising speed of around 208 miles per hour were uneconomic.

BOAC, which turned it down, objected to two technical faults, swinging on takeoff and "tail buffeting" in the air.

Bennett said both these faults had been corrected and no others of serious nature had been noted, although some changes were found necessary in the pressurization system.

**Completely Redesigned**  
He said the new version, six feet longer than the original, which was 78 feet, six inches, and completely redesigned inside, would cruise at around 250 mph, and while its 32-passenger capacity compared with 44 for Constellations it had room for 3,000 pounds of freight, which he said was more than the American-made craft's capacity.

Overall weight remains unchanged at 30,000 pounds for takeoff, Bennett said, adding that while he could not disclose cost figures, that for the Tudor was "a fraction" of the Constellation's because of a tubular fuselage easier to produce than the shaped body of the other plane and also a mass-produced wing.

Satterthwaite is now in the United States on leave and his office said he had not yet prepared a report on the new Tudor.

Bulgaria Has Two-Year Plan

SOFIA, BULGARIA (AP)—Bulgaria's government, under Communist Premier Georgi Dimitroff, has made its two-year plan its main factor in the nation's life. The government has encouraged the growth of militant organs, such as those of Soviet Russia, and a youth movement, a speedup movement like the Stakhanov system, regimentation of many groups. It is driving to phase this agricultural balance sheet. Meanwhile it must recover from the Nazi occupation, two existing droughts and the burden imposed by a lost war.

The work campaign goes on also in a bitter political battle in the Constituent Assembly, which is framing a new constitution. There the government is cracking down on the Opposition, having placed Nikola Petrov, its leader, in jail and expelled 23 members of the Agrarian Party. Opposition newspapers were required to cease publication weeks ago.

Under the government's program every Bulgarian is expected to work. When one is done with one task, he is expected to volunteer to begin another.

In the vanguard of those who work hard are the Communist-directed mass organizations: the League of Democratic Youth, and the National Women's Union. The Women's Union is headed by

FORT HUACHUCA, ARIZ.—(AP)—The concluding chapter of a memorable unit of the United States Army has been written with announcement here that the last Indian Scouts in service will be retired in about two months.

Headquarters of this historic military post said the four remaining Scouts had been placed on terminal leave. The passing of the picturesque Army unit, established 61 years ago by Gen. George Crook, will not be marked with any formal ceremonies.

Before leaving active service, the Scouts were promoted to sergeant and their leader to staff sergeant.

**Quiet Life Ahead**

Committee Agrees Britain Should Be Relieved Of Palestine Mandate Soon

The United Nations special committee on Palestine has presented divergent majority and minority recommendations regarding the method of dealing with the establishment of Jewish and Arab states, but among the important points on which the members of the committee are in agreement is that Britain should be relieved of its mandate as soon as practicable.

There is no suggestion that the nature of a approach between English and Jewish people would have worried King Solomon himself. However, the committee report obviously is recognition that the mandatory power is unable to deal successfully with the turbulent crisis in the Holy Land.

**England Desires Relief**

So far as England is concerned, the establishment of a Jewish national home is no nearer achievement now than it was 30 years ago when it was promised by the Balfour Declaration. Indeed, the position has so deteriorated under the mandate that the very presence of the British in Palestine is a sorry aggravation, affecting relations between English and Jewish people, the world over—affecting international relations in some cases.

This being so, the probabilities

are that the quickest alleviation of the crisis would be for the UN to take over the mandate and let John Bull step aside. There should be no difficulty about this, for there is a widespread desire in England to be rid of a stewardship which has become a mountainous burden.

It is interesting to find the newly created Dominion of India among the three calling for a federal set-up. The recent granting of independence to the great Indian subcontinent resulted in the establishment of two separate and sovereign dominions—India (preponderantly Hindu) and Pakistan (chiefly Moslem)—which don't have even an economic union and therefore must

labor under a heavy handicap because of the division of resources. India wanted a federal government but Pakistan refused, on the grounds that the Hindus outnumber the Moslems three to one and that Pakistan therefore would be under Hindu domination in the legislature.

However, the two dominions will have to reach some sort of economic understanding or chaos will result. The same would be true if Palestine were divided into two wholly unrelated states—a fact upon which the Palestine committee agrees although the majority and minority reports differ as to the nature of the economic understanding needed.

BAKER PARDONED; JAILED FOR EATING

CHICAGO (AP)—A 45-year-old immigrant baker who was fined \$200 on a disorderly conduct charge after he was found sitting in a vacant lot, munching on a crust of bread, with his \$1,530 savings in his pocket, was pardoned recently by Mayor Kennedy.

The pardon released Albert Yoo from the jail where he had been working out the fine. It was granted after a court psychiatrist reported Yoo was mentally ill.

A bar association delegation asked the mayor to pardon Yoo on the grounds that the fine, imposed Aug. 19, was excessive.

Officials said Yoo would be taken to the Cook County Psychopathic Hospital.

Eagerly confessing she welcomed a chance to speak up, Mrs. Mike Mathes, well-dressed Fort Worth young woman, said she thought the "fashion picture looked terrible."

A British ex-patriate, Mrs. R. G. Deitz, also interviewed in Fort Worth, made this observation:

"The abrupt fashion change is typically American. It was planned and executed for American women who love to buy and buy."

And it was a Dallas woman, Mrs. W. J. Woodward, who organized the "Little Below the Knee" Club.

Chicago girls indicated a reluctant willingness to go along with fashion abusers "a little way" in lengthening skirts. But not all the way to the ankle.

**1,325,000 Veterans May Enter Colleges**

WASHINGTON—(AP)—The Veterans Administration said it expects 1,325,000 World War II veterans to go to college this Fall—a 10 per cent increase over the previous high enrollment of last April.

The agency, basing its forecast upon advance registrations, advised student-veteran candidates for subsistence allowances to take along enough money to meet their personal financial needs for at least the first six weeks of the Autumn term.

**Fresh Apricots Mean Good Marmalade:**

**By GAYNOR MADDOX**  
NEA Staff Writer

Fresh apricots invite the home-canner. So here's an apricot marmalade for that very special jam shelf.

**Apricot Marmalade**  
Five pounds fresh apricots, 1 No. 2 can crushed pineapple, 3 lemons, 10 cups sugar, 12 apricot kernels, blanched.

Wash, then remove the pits from apricots. Drain the juice from pineapple. Peel lemons, cut the thin yellow rind of 2 lemons into very small pieces and slice the pulp thin. Combine all the fruit with sugar and cook until thick in shallow kettle, stirring frequently. About 5 minutes before removing the marmalade from the heat, add the blanched and shredded apricot kernels. Pour at once into hot sterilized jars and seal. To prepare the apricot kernels, crack the seeds and remove the tiny kernels. Place kernels in boiling water for 5 minutes to remove the thin skin which surrounds the kernel and to remove the bitter flavor.

Ripe plums make unusually good jelly, too. With this simplified recipe, add a few jars to your shelf.

**Ripe Plum Jelly**  
(Makes about 11 six-ounce glasses)

Four cups juice, 7 1/2 cups sugar, 1 1/2 bottle fruit pectin.

To prepare juice: Crush thoroughly 4 pounds fully ripe fruit. Do not peel or pit. Add 1 cup water. Bring to a boil, cover and simmer 10 minutes. Place in jelly cloth or bag; squeeze out juice. (Sour cling stone plums are used, substitute 1 1/2 cup strained lemon juice for 1/2 cup of plum juice specified.)

To make the jelly: Measure sugar and juice into a large saucepan and mix well. Bring to a boil over hot-tost fire and at once add bottled fruit pectin, stirring constantly, then bring to a full rolling boil and boil hard 1 1/2 minute. Remove from fire, skim, pour quickly. Paraffin hot jelly at once.

**Nice Gal, This Frau Koch Of Buchenwald**

NEW YORK—There must be laughter in heaven and hell over the news from Germany that Frau Ilse Koch is to spend the rest of her life in prison.

There are thousands of spectral victims of Nazi persecution who would rather drop the scaffold beneath her, or haul her up gasping into the sky.

They are the dead people who once knew her as the "Queen of Buchenwald," the Nazi concentration camp outside Weimar where some 50,000 prisoners were put to death.

Frau Koch is an unbelievable woman to the few people who still dismiss the Nazi mass executions as "war propaganda." Such people do exist.

I first saw Buchenwald, where the dead were piled like logs, shortly after Gen. George Patton's Third Army swept victoriously through the birthplace of Germany's short-lived Republic. I didn't get to meet Frau Koch. She wasn't there. But I did get to meet scores of prisoners who remembered her with curses. And I got to see her husband, former ruler of the camp. He was in a small jar. The Nazi authorities placed him there after cremating him for a bad habit he developed of stealing party funds. **Shakes The Ashes**

One prisoner, a former major general, who had commanded the royal palace guard in Vienna when the Nazis moved into the Austrian capital, picked up the jar of ashes and shook them in weak merriment.

"It's nice that we have Herr Koch always with us," he said. "But Frau Koch should be here in another jar also. A wife belongs with her husband."

Ilse Koch denied during her trial she ever had prisoners killed merely to build up her collection of lampshades made of tattooed human skin. But the men in the camp said she often walked around bare-waisted groups of prisoners seeking those with interesting tattoos to add to her collection. And I saw the lampshades of human skin. They weren't antique. She was quite a connoisseur.

Ilse Koch had other interesting diversions too.

She loved horseback riding. She liked to stroll through the woods adjoining Buchenwald and ride full tilt into groups of prisoner laborers too slow to escape. She never halted to determine the deaths or injuries she inflicted.

Ilse, a full-bodied woman, also enjoyed addressing obscene remarks to the prisoners and luring them into "sexual overtures, whereupon she had them flogged for her pleasure.

Cruel, wicked and unrepentant, she managed to set herself with child while still imprisoned—a situation which her American Army captors find hard to explain. Did that help save her from the death penalty?

**Ted Shawn Lauds Australian Primitives**

MELBOURNE—American dancer Ted Shawn said in an interview in Melbourne that Australians had a "treasure" in the primitive dances of the aborigines, but failed to realize it.

When he arrived in Melbourne after seeing an aboriginal corroboree at Darwin, Shawn told a reporter:

"For pure art, choreography and virility of performance this dancing is the highest level of any primitive dancing I have seen in the world. If my whole Australian trip gave me nothing more than my week in Darwin, I would still feel my visit here had been well worth while."

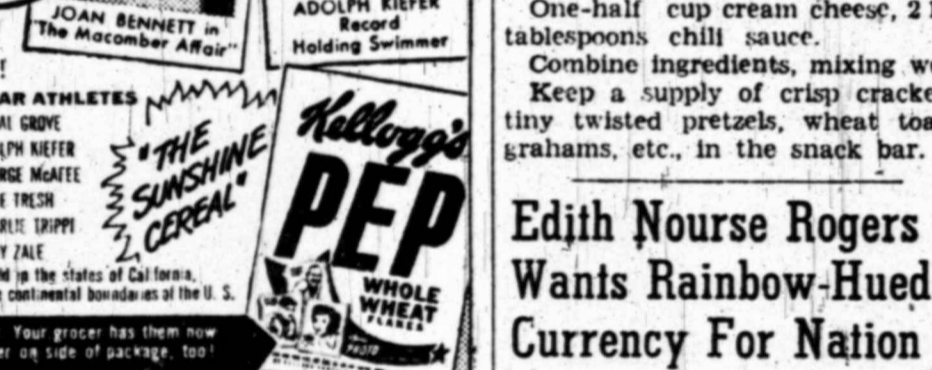
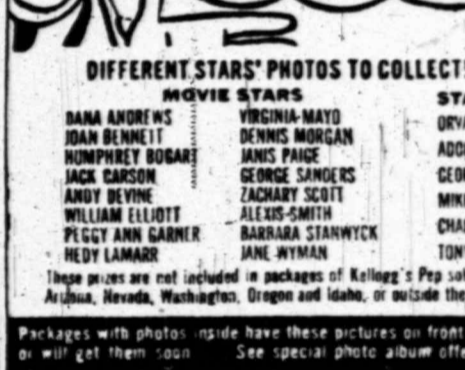

So says Richard Kamperman of Grand Rapids, Mich., past president of the National Association of Piano Tuners.

"Nine out of 10 homes have moths in their pianos, even though the housewife swears that her home is free of the pests," Kamperman declared.

Moths are fond of the wool felt pads on the hammers which strike the strings in pianos, he said, adding that they eat away the felt which affects the tone of the strings as the thickness decreases.

**Miami Expects \$1 Return On Every 1c Spent On Ads**



MIAMI—(NEA)—Greater Miami expects to get back about one dollar for every penny of the \$25,000,000 it will invest this fall and winter—mostly in newspaper and magazine advertising.

Last winter tourists spent more than \$220 millions in Miami and Miami Beach. This year money is plentiful; coal and oil for heating northerly homes are expected to be short and higher priced; railroads and airlines are offering more, better and faster service; highway connections have been improved; and there are available 7,500 new apartment units, 500 more hotel rooms and hundreds of rooms in new private homes added since the last Florida season.

These things, coupled with an imposing convention calendar and an attractive program of traditional and special sports events, are counted upon to make this year's business even greater than last.

Greater Miami's optimism is confirmed by the response it has had to more limited expenditures for advertising up to now.

The \$65,000 summer campaign was so successful that 200 resort hotels, instead of closing for the warm season as they used to do, operated at near capacity.

The State's \$250,000 spent mostly in newspaper and magazine ads last year brought 119,000 clipped coupons, and a lot of these are expected to bring tourists who will spend all or part of their time in Miami.

For advertising, Miami and Miami Beach have budgeted \$400,000.

The State is spending another \$250,000. Travel and transportation agencies are spending large sums not included in these figures.

The area's 312 hotels will spend from \$500 to as much as \$30,000 each for newspaper and magazine advertising, a total of at least \$1,800,000. In return, on the basis of studies made recently by O. P. Hart of the Miami Research Bureau, visitors are expected to spend \$66,000,000 on housing this year.

Greater Miami's 2400 eating places expect to take in another \$64,000,000. Hart figures visitors will spend \$22,000,000 for amusements and the same amount shopping. Service trades will get \$18,000,000; \$18,000,000 will be spent for personal services, and \$11,000,000 for gas and oil.

To give its winter visitors something new to see, Miami will open the new Rickenbacker Causeway to Virginia Key, at the mouth of Biscayne Bay, and the new \$6,000,000 Crandon Park in November. President Truman is scheduled to dedicate the Everglades National Park in December.

**Church Claim Is Biggest On Guam**

HONOLULU—(AP)—The Navy has paid the largest claim on Guam against the United States—\$524,950.23 to the island's Catholic Church.

This was one of the 517 claims totaling \$1,321,091.10 which have been authorized for payment, said Adm. Louis E. Denfeld, commander in chief of the Pacific. All claims paid so far with the exception of the church's were for death and injury, according to the Navy announcement.

The church claim covered 38 properties including the cathedral at Agaña which was being completed when the Japanese invaded Guam in December, 1941.

**Invention Sheds Light On Watches**

HAGERSTOWN, MD.—(AP)—"Why, that is so simple that anyone could have thought of it!" is what most Hagerstown folks said when Sig Smith and Paul Willis invented the "lasscope."

Smith, a watchmaker, here, conceived the idea that it would be easier to see the little wheels and springs if he had a tiny searchlight shining into the dark crevices of the watch-case.

So he fitted out his monocular—the bell-shaped eye-piece that jewelers use—with its own head light.

It took Smith and his friend, Willis, almost a year to perfect the idea. In its final form, it has a head-piece so it can be pushed back on the forehead when not in use.

The lamp is mounted on the shell that holds the magnifying lens, and is fixed at such an angle that the beam is aimed directly at the point of focus.

**Church Group Raps IRO Limitations**

GENEVA, SWITZERLAND—(AP)—The Ecumenical Refugee Commission of the World Council of Churches has gone on record in opposition to racial discrimination by the United Nations.

The resolution was in connection with the policy of the proposed International Refugee Organization that refugees and displaced persons, of German ethnic origin, are ineligible for assistance by IRO.

The church commission is formulating plans for increased material aid for refugees through Protestant relief committees in Germany and Austria, particularly for those not cared for by the IRO.

# Shorty Fulton Ducks Zooming Planes To Catch Pilots Cutting Corners Around Pylons In Cleveland Races



Not so close here. But "I've seen 'em come as close as 10 feet," says Shorty Fulton, veteran air race judge.

CLEVELAND —(NEA)— You can talk about the rugged life of a baseball umpire, who is liable to be a target for a pop-bottle or a juicy tomato, but what about the pylon judge at the National Air Races? There he stands, atop a flimsy 60-foot skeleton-like pylon, with his P-38s and P-51s whizzing by his head. If one of the pilots objects to a decision, our friend the pylon judge is apt to get a Thunderbolt tossed at his noggin. "They come pretty close, at that," says Burt "Shorty" Fulton, who has been head pylon judge at the Air Races for years. "Why, I've seen 'em come as close as 10 feet." So far, no plane has ever hit a

pylon, but there have been as many as five in a single year. Penalty for cutting the pylon is disqualification, unless the pilot goes around and turns the pylon again, or takes the alternative of flying an extra lap. Roscoe Turner was once disqualified for cutting a pylon. "The worst part of being on top of those things," says Shorty, "is the smell of burning oil when the planes come close. Most of the time the planes are above the pylon, but four or five—no, make it 10—times a year, the pilots come in level with my head. "I can see the whites of the pilots' eyes." Shorty's equipment is a pair of binoculars, and a camera. The latter "in case they cut close, why, then I take their picture so there'll be no kick-back." The course is not a perfect rectangle, because they place the four pylons as far as possible from any other high buildings or trees. Shorty is a five-foot-four, 120-pound, old-time airman. He's been parachute jumping and pylon judging in every Air Race since the first one. He had his own flying service in Akron, O., in 1924, and now he's manager of the Akron National Airport. During World War II, Shorty's ship blew up over Germany. He bailed out and was a prisoner of war. "Bad? No," he says, "it was all right." Besides planes, he goes for motorcycles.

"I pretty near live on 'em," he says. "You can do on a motorcycle what you'd get bawled out for doing in a plane—beighopping." The job of being a pylon judge he likes. He thinks it looks more dangerous to the spectator than it actually is, but he's got his plans all made in case a plane does crash into the pylon while he's up on top. "I've often wondered where I'd land if one hit me. Some of the boys wish they had a parachute, but not me. I got it all figured out. I'm gonna hang on and ride that blinkety-blank thing to the ground."

# McKenney on Bridge

There are many fine card players who never can remember a good hand. Either they find the play of all hands so simple that they do not recognize the more interesting ones, or they just do not bother to remember them. This is not true, however, of Lee Hazen, vice president of the American Contract Bridge League. Lee runs across some very interesting hands and can outline the theory for correct play in clear terms.

In today's hand, which is one of Hazen's East's problem was to keep from losing three diamond tricks. 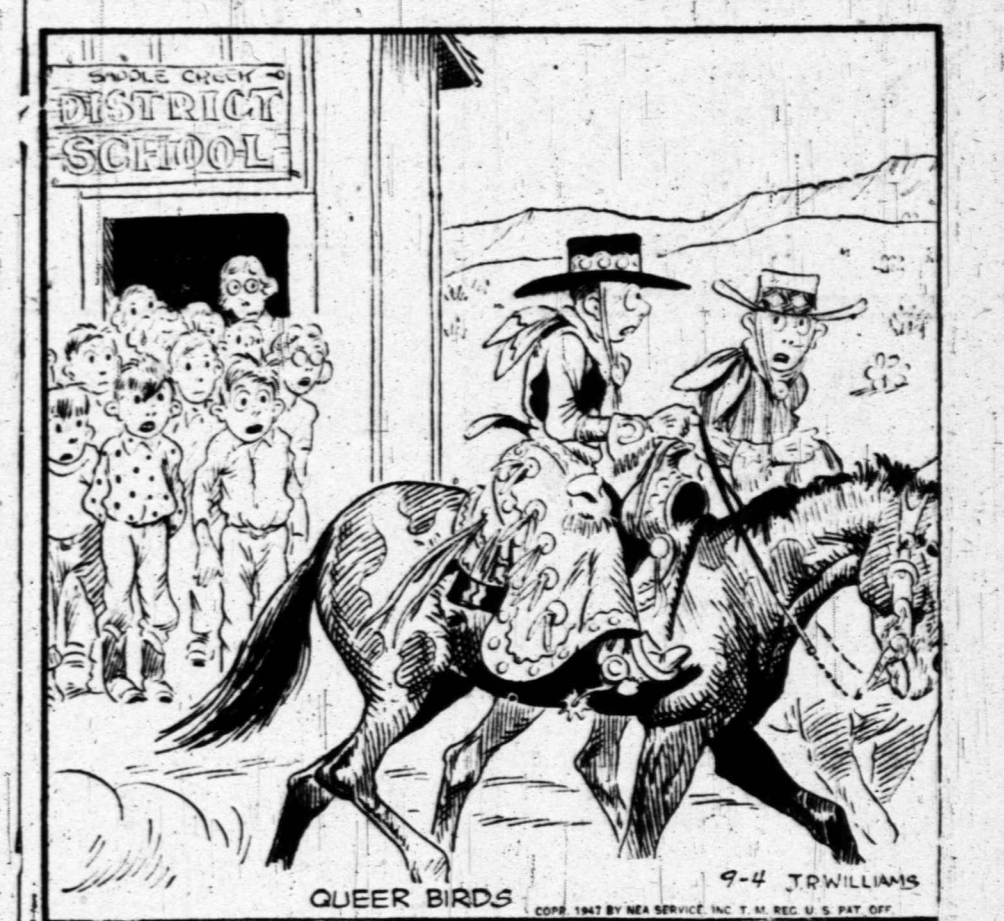

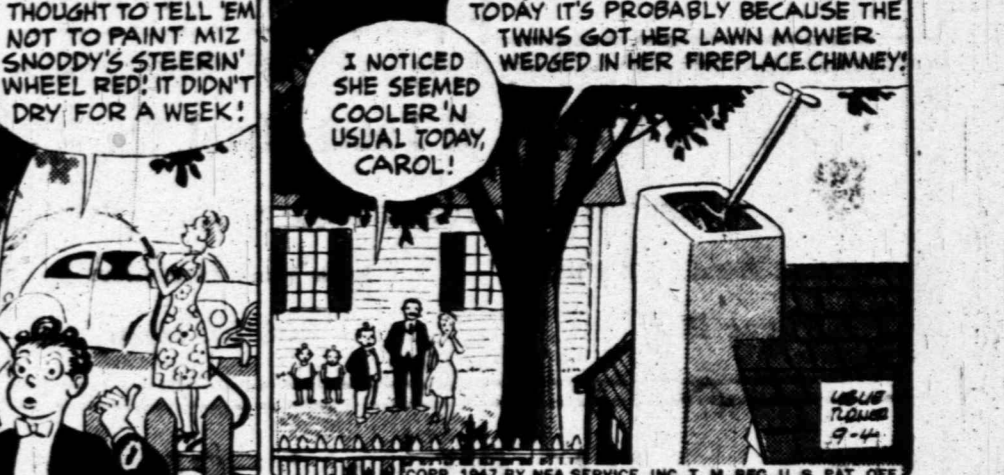
