Top government researchers concerned with international econ omics, drafted the 30,000-word report in connection with the seifhelp plan for European recovery proposed by Sccretary of State Marshall. They used information which has been assembled by the State and other departments concurrent with the 16-nation conference in Paris on the Marshall Plan. In Paris Tucsday, a food and agriculture subcommittee of the conference estimated some \$21,900,000,-000 will be needed from the United States by these European nations in the next four years to spend abroad for food or the means to produce it.

The report is primarily a survey of what is the problem, rather than an attempt to propose solutions, but it reaches a number of conclusions. These are the major ones. 1. 



in Russia. It would seem, then, that the time has come to sell the responsibilities of American citizenship with banners and with shouting from the housetops. And it seems to us a wise idea to use all of America's precise, well-oiled publicity machinery to do it.
