

## State Insurance Commissioner Is Midland Speaker

Butler of Austin, state insurance commissioner and a former Texas legislator, told members of the Permian Basin Life Underwriters Association and their ladies here Saturday noon "The state insurance department, the companies and the agents all must work together to keep the insurance business clean and to keep it the best investment in the world.

The commissioner was the honor guest and speaker at the association's monthly meeting in the Crystal Ballroom of the Scharbauer Hotel. More than 75 life underwriters, their ladies and guests from Big Spring, Odessa, Monahans Crane. Pecos, McCamey, Kermit and Midland attended the luncheon. President Roy McKee of Midland presided, and W. B. Harkrider of Midland introduced the speaker. Harold Steck of Big Spring gave the invocation.

Commissioner Butler traced the history of insurance and said insurance companies are the best investment concerns in the world. having withstood wars, major disasters and depressions

"You do not have to apologize to anyone for your chosen profession." he told the insurance men.

In discussing the duties and problems of the state insurance department, he said its main functions are taking care of the rights of policy holders and taking care of the problems of the companies and underwriters. He said more than 1.400 insurance companies are operating in Texas.

Butler pointed out that the state insurance code should be revised and modernized so the business may keep in step with the progress and development of Texas. Floyd Herring, a member of Butler's staff, accompanied the com-

In answer to the association questionnaire, 237 operators, believed to be a representative crosssection of the independent operators of Texas, reported as follows: (1) They would drill 1,835 additional proven locations at this time if they could get the pipe - an average of 7.74 wells per operator. (2) On the basis of present allow-

ables, these wells would yield a daily production of approximately 95,875 barrels-a daily average per operator of 404.5 barrels. (3) For these wells, 8,798,095 feet of casing and 8,178,830 feet of tub-

ing is required—an average of 4.-794.6 feet of casing and 4,475.1 feet of tubing per well. (4) These same operators report

He said some of the buyer resistance" is caused by the fact that the industry is new and basn't yet accustomed the public to the idea of prefabricated homes

So far, prefabricated homes aren't seiling cheaper than other homes but Steidle says they can be built more efficiently and therefore will be encaper later.

I'm looking back time 25 years when I investigated the appalling of the Welsh coal mines. Terrible privation, including stark hunger, prevailed in numerous areas, not only in Wales but in Northern Figland This was due in part to the pitifully low wages paid the men who spent much of their lives in darkness, and in part to the closing of collieries when the price of coal dropped below what seemed profitable to the owners.

It was a bad show. It was so bad, in fact, that the general strike of 1926 throughout Britain - the world's first general strike-was the outgrowth of a protracted walk-out of miners throughout the country for better wages and working conditions. The rest of labor joined them.

That brings us up to the Grimthorpe miners. They're striking, as I get it, largely because they still are living mentally in those harsh days. In refusing to mine an additional two feet of coal each shift they are fearful of losing advanages which they have gained. completely overlooking that they now are working for their own Labor government, which has nationalized the mines. They haven't become orientated towards changed

NEW YORK-(A)-The Webster. Mass., golf pro who took 3,333 shots in an unsuccessful all-day effort to score an ace shouldn't become dis-

When 1948 rolls around, the World Almanac will show that the odds on a hole-in-one are 9.366 to 1. These figures are based on the New York "World-Telegram" annual hole - in - one tournament which recently completed its fourteenth ace competition.

A total of 1.061 golfers-male and female-participated in the tournament. Each had five shots but only one ace was scored. The shot was made by Emery Thomas, home pro at the Forest Hill Field Club, Bloomfield, N. J. During 14 years, 9,366 golfers,

who at one time or another scored a hole-in-one, have taken 46.830 shots. Five shots, usually played on a short 150-yard hole, have found their way into the cup. After Thomas' recent ace the

odds dropped to 8,704 but when nobody duplicated his performance the figures skyrocketed. Every Four Years

Cddly enough, the holes-in-one have come at four year intervals ince the first one was scored by holed in 1937, another in 1941 and one this year, the fourth year of the tournament since 1941 due to a suspension during two wartime



## New Technique In Skidding Rigs By JACK RUTLEDGE Associated Press Staff

Two brothers who have been in the oilfield business 15 years have developed a new technique in skidding rigs, using airplane wheels on each corner of the derrick, with trucks or tractors as motive power. They are C. W. Kelly and C. D. Kelly. Company headquarters is in Houston. They obtained a patent this spring.

They figured that "there was great advancement to be made in skidding," in both efficiency and time-saving. They figured that it could be done on wheels, and decided if a B-29 could carry between 50,000 and 60,000 pounds, it would be possible to put a derrick on wheels, too.

So they did. And it worked

Patent Is Granted The advantages of the rolling mechanism, the Kellys said, are in flexibility, safety and maneuverability. Their plans were worked out. The patent was granted March

Kelly said skidding jobs have been done on two rigs on the King Ranch, at Lake Charles, La., and at Dickerson, near Texas City. Recently they have been operating at Odessa.

The skidding method and equipment has been checked by insurance inspectors, Kelly said, and has full insurance coverage.

In September 1946 the American military in Germany substituted "military payment certificates" for invasion marks to stop the GI practice of accumulating large amounts of invasion marks at bargain rates and turning them into dolars. Thereafter the holders of Allied military marks could use them only for the purchase of German goods

The Russians informed American military government officials in Germany that they stopped issuing joint allied invasion money on July 1, 1946. United States Army officials said, however, they had no way to check on this.

Senator Bridges (R-N. H.) charged the Soviet with "legalized looting of Germany with printing

press money. No Rate Of Exchange

When the Americans and Britsh invaded German territory in 1944, they started circulating Allied\_military marks at par with Reichmarks. No general rate of exchange between the Rechsmark and the dollar was established. However, for computing the pay of troops a provisional basis of 10 marks to the dollar

Military lire were used in Italy under similar conditions. However. President Roosevelt directed in 1944 that the Italian government receive dollar credits covering the extent to which invasion currency in lire denominations had been used in Italy for

the pay of troops. Later dollar credits were authorized to cover invasion, currency used for the purchase of Army supplies.

Cur military government in Japan is reported to have had less trouble with ven invasion currency than was experienced with marks in Germany. However, military payment certificates were substituted for the invasion yen as a currency for our soldiers in Japan in July 1946.

Some persons have questioned the authority of the American military to issue invasion currency. The United States government cites a legal basis for it. It is a provision of international law under which military commanders are for the time being the legal government of an invaded coun-

After the last war. Treasury officials say, our army of occupation made gross disbursements of almost \$300,000,000 in Germany, most of it by cashing dollar checks for marks at German banks and by paying out actual dollars to our troops. These dollars were never recovered.
