Southwest Grid Teams Get Real Tests This Week

The Southwest Conference will have a good idea after Saturday night on how it stacks up with the rest of the country in football.

Its teams will be playing from Miami, Fla., to Portland, Ore., which covers half the nation.

The Conference will be favored to win more than half its inter-sectional games. Only Baylor is generally picked to lose. Texas and Southern Methodist are heavy favorites. Rice is given an even chance against the L. S. U. powerhouse and Texas Christian is a light favorite over Oklahoma A&M.

The Rice-Louisiana State battle is one of the nation's outstanding games. It matches teams rated among the best five, and sends into combat two veteran outfits that fought on even terms last season.

Arkansas is due to beat North Texas State by a fairly comfortable margin and Texas A&M is a well-ranked favorite over Texas Tech.

set his opponents 800 points on today's hand by underleading two aces. Declarer could not be blamed for allowing the opening club lead to ride up to his hand, but North won with the queen and returned the four of diamonds. Declarer won this with the ace of diamonds and led back a club, which von Zedwitz (South) won with the ace. Now, without a moment's hesitation, he led five of spades. Here again declarer held the jack-knight with the king on the board. Again he decided to let the trick ride up to his jack, and again North won with the queen.

North cashed the diamond king and played the third diamond, declarer ruffed and led a spade. Von Zedwitz won this with the ace and came back with a spade. A low club was discarded from dummy, North ruffed and led back another diamond, on which declarer discarded a spade. Dummy ruffed and a club was led. North trumped with the ten of hearts, and he could not be prevented from getting two heart tricks. Thus declarer lost three heart tricks, two clubs, two spades and a diamond.

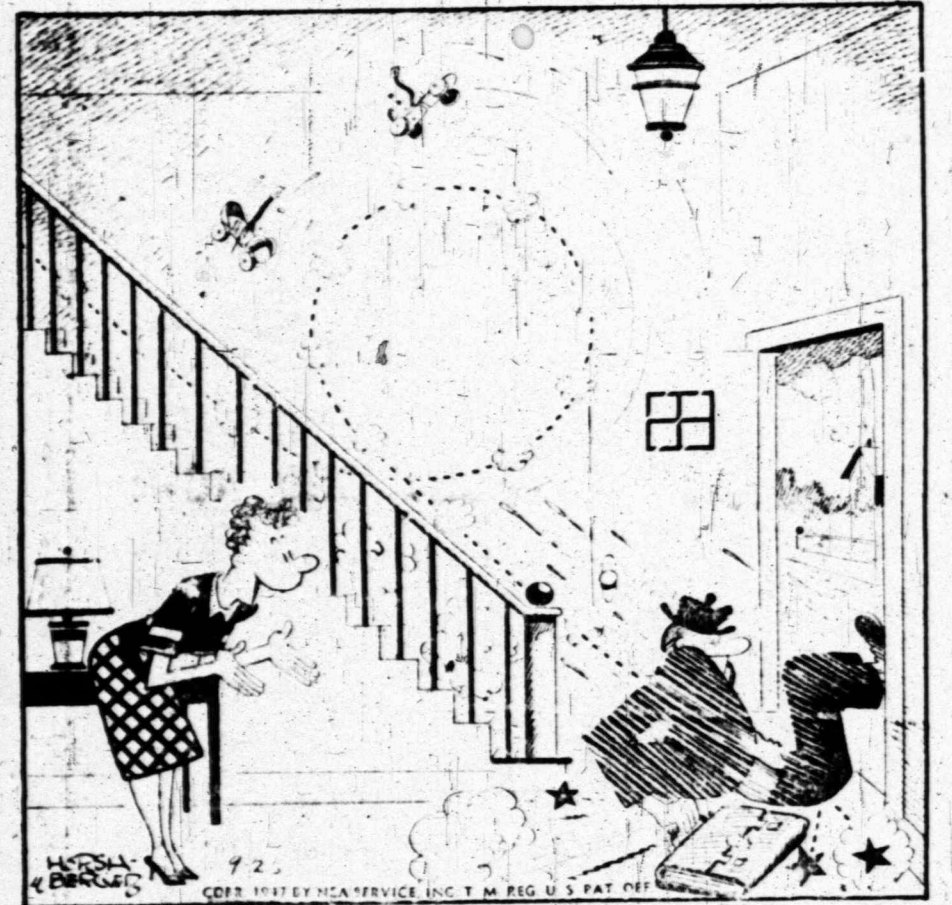

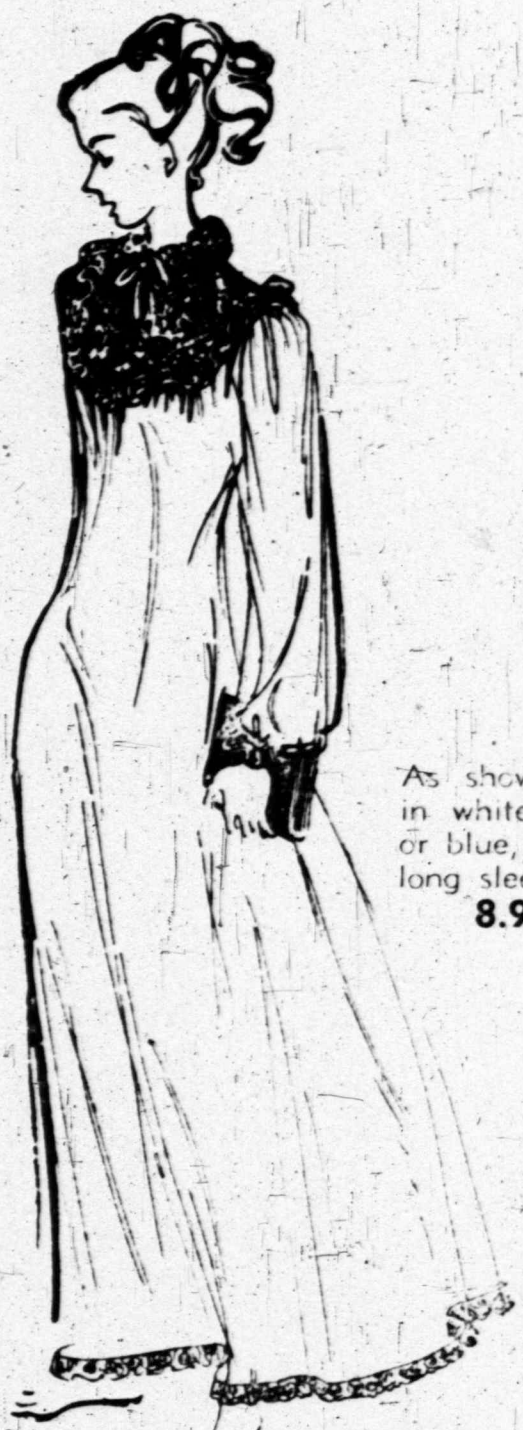

38.2 gravity oil during one hour on a drillstem test at 9,619-90 feet.

The well flowed 69 barrels of oil in one hour from the upper Devonian section at 9,548-9,619 feet, in a drillstem test several days ago.

On the latest investigation the drill pipe showed gas 49 minutes after the tester was opened. A spray of oil started in 32 minutes. Clean oil began to flow out of the drill pipe in 53 minutes. In the first 30 minutes it flowed 37.81 barrels of oil, and in the second 30 minutes the production was 46.1 barrels. Gas-oil ratio was 404-1. The tool was closed after the well had flowed to tanks for 60 minutes and operator is now drilling ahead.

The well is 660 feet from north and 1,980 feet from east lines of section 25, block 13, University survey (and about 12 miles north and slightly west of the town of Andrews).

TEXAS GETS SMALL AMOUNT OF FREE OIL IN I-U STATE

The Texas Company No. 1-U State, Northeast Crockett County Ellenburger exploration, three miles south of Barnhart, and 630 feet from north and 662 feet from west lines of section 22, block 40, University survey, was making hole below 8,980 feet in Ellenburger, which was entered around 8,700 feet.

A drillstem test was taken for two hours at 8,972-8,950 feet. Gas, estimated at 35,000 cubic feet per day, showed at the surface in five and one-half minutes.

Recovery was nine stands of gas cut drilling mud, and three gallons of clean oil. Flowing bottom hole pressure was 425 pounds. Shut-in bottom hole pressure, after 15 minutes, was 925 pounds.
