### Boyle's Mama Says Girls Nowadays Have Less Fun, Security

By HAL BOYLE NEW YORK -(AP)- Look backward 50 years-look forward 50 years—and which period would you rather live in? The right answer to that lies in

what kind of a world is being

made right now. But as the century rolls into its 50th year, many elderly people are in newspapers doubtful that life today holds as much fun or security as it did between 1090 and 1910. My mother is one of these.

"I think young people today have a much harder time of it than we did when I was a girl," shre told me. This surprised me, as it is more customary for her contemporaries to complain that this is a lazy, pleasure-seeking generation. asked her why she thought as she did. And her answer surprised me even more.

"Well, we didn't have all the labor-saving things around the home that young wives do now," she said "But I think we had more real security. People in those days didn't seem to have so much trouble finding a place to live, and I den't think they had to worry so much about what would happen

And she added placidly: "I really feel sorry for the young people today, and I wouldn't want to trade places with them at all.' More Zest For Living

Other people her age tell me that they are sure they got a bigger kick out of life than young folks do now, because they had more real zest for living. In the world of 1900 to 1914 America was a young self-confident giant just realizing his power, certain he could stand alone and whip all comers because he had always done so. But in the world of 1950 Amer-

ica is a middle-aged giant, even stronger in adulthood, but realizing now the responsibility of his power-and that he doesn't stand The difference between those

Whereupon the infuriated pedestrian stepped onto the convertible's running board, next to its fender, then to the hood, and so down the other side. His heavy-soled shoes ground big dents into the hood and fenders. As the woman stared open-mouthed, he strolled nonchalantly off.

In many of our cities today, the man on foot is a forlorn orphan. To often he seems sadly neglected even in those communities whose traffic laws are designed to favor him.

President Truman has asked Congress to spend \$13,500,000-almost one-third of the total budget-for a compact, well-equipped fighting force capable of rapid expansion in view of "current world circumstances." Overall cut in military personnel from present strength is about three per cent; but, because of cutbacks in overhead, the total personnel assigned to combat forces will be greatest since the demobilization following World War II. The Marine Corps suffers the greatest cut, of 11,300 men, or about 13 per cent of total strength. The President's plan calls for 10 Army divisions, a 48-group Air Force and a fleet of 238 warships—about the same as now.



Born Gustav Halbach in the Hague, Holland, he married Bertha Krupp when he was 36 and was granted the right to assume the name of Krupp Von Bohlen and Halbach by Kaiser Wilhelm II, who attended the wedding. Bertha then was heiress to the vast Krupp interests and was one of the wealthiest women in the world. Thus, the son of an American-

born German diplomat married into and became the successful head of a network of holdings which at their peak were estimated to be worth \$200,000,000 to \$1,000,000,000. Both his father and mother were born in Philadelphia, Pa. His mother's father, Henry Bohlen, was a northern general in the Civil War and was killed in the Battle of the Rappahannock.

Gustav began as a German diplomat, serving in the German Embassy in Washington. He was transferred to Rome where he met the woman he was to marry less than a year later.

Once called the "prince consort of the Kingdom of Krupp," Gustav steered the company which armed German militarists for two world wars. At one time it was the biggest armament plant in the cuted. Noxon maintained it was world, employing about 180,000 an accident. He said he had been


