#### Lesson For GOP

A lot of our Republicans think the British election results boost their own stock for next November's balloting in this country. They see a worldwide "trend to the Right."

There may well be some substance to this notion. But there are some matters the Republicans ought to review before they start getting too confident.

In the first place, as has been pointed out many times, the welfare state wasn't at issue in Britain. Nor was the socialism that already has been put into effect. The Conservatives accept all that the Labor Party has achieved up to now under these headings.

They do promise not to do any more socializing. But on the other hand they pledge themselves to expand some welfare programs, particularly housing.

All this places the Conservatives well to the left of the most extreme leftists among President Truman's Democratic followers. And it stamps them unmistakably as a

## Basketball Results Texans Ask Higher Acreage Allotments

WASHINGTON — (P) — Several witnesses urged amendments to the cotton acreage control program at a House Agriculture subcommittee hearing here Wednesday.

A half-dozen growers from scat-tered parts of Texas were among those who argued the crop control program is a severe hardship on many farmers. Similar views were expressed by farmer spokesmen from Florida and Arkansas. A. L. Hartsog, speaking for farm-

ers in the Texas Panhandle, suggested the law should be changed so no allotment would be less than 60 per cent of the 1942 figure. "If we go back to the old years for a base," Chairman Pace (D-Ga) retorted, "you would add millions of bales of cotton to the crop from some states over what they now

are getting. "Then you'd have a problem to take care of the people out there in California, parts of your own State of Texas who in recent years have gone into production for the first time."

Suggests Lower Supports
Curtis Traweek of Hereford, Texas, told the committee the law might be changed to lower price supports from 90 to 75 per cent of parity, and that it would cost the government less.

He suggested farms in East Texas and the Old South should be converted to dairying or gardening if they couldn't produce cotton as cheaply, or as much per acre, that grown in the Panhandle other Western sections. "And what would happen to your

dairy prices if they all started producing milk?" Pace asked. J. Perrin Willis of Rusk told of the troubles of the small farm op-



#### Oklahoma Town Of 5,000 Literally ls 'Undermined'

The town of Picher, Okla., (pop. 5,000), faces the unsettling fact that a large area of its downtown section may collapse at any time into a giant mine cavern tunneled 250 feet below its surface. At right is an airview of the abandoned mine and downtown Picher, showing the weakest section where big cracks have already appeared in the streets. Below is one of the huge stone mine pillars, sole supports of Picher, that mining engineers have warned are shifting dangerously. Residents in a five-square-block area have been advised to move out within a month. But many refused to be alarmed. At right below, some Picher citizens look over the cracking main street and chat about the possibilities of a cave-in.

It was in 1906 when Beard, then editor of a recreation magazine, got the idea for a boys' outdoor organization. He formed the "Sons of Daniel Boone," which grew to 150,000 members in five years. In 1910, Beard's "Sons" merged with a British organization headed by Lord Baden-Powell to form the International Boy Scout movement. Today there are two and a quarter million American Boy Scouts.





#### This Machine **Pumps Sardines**

SAN PEDRO, CALIF.—(AP)—H. J. Kimmerle invented a machine that pumps sardines from the sea. The fish are normally caught in nets. The Los Angeles inventor says he tested the device aboard a purse seiner and that it picked up sardines at the rate of from 50 to 200 tons an hour.

Kimmerle's unit consists of a vacuum pump hooked to an eightinch hose with a 10-inch funnel entrance. The funnel is dropped into a closely packed school. The fish are sucked up and discharged on a conveyor belt which carries them to the hold. The inventor hopes his system will be adopted by the local sardine fleet.

#### Is There To Be A Superweed Race?

NORTH PLATTE, NEB. -(AP)-Are the new chemical weed killers, such as 2-4-D, in danger of producing a race of "super weeds"? It's a good bet under certain conditions in the opinion of Glenn Viehmeyer, assistant in horticulture at the University of Nebraska's substation here.

Assuming that a dose of 2-4-D doesn't kill all weeds, then those that survive must be presumed to be possessed of some degree of resistance. Offspring of the weeds with resistance should inherit some of this resistant quality. Repeat the process regularly enough and the weeds eventually will "reach the highest degree of tolerance inherent in the race under treatment," says Viehmeyer.







Casserole Sandwiches (Serves 6) One 7-ounce can tuna fish, 3 tablespoons mayonnaise, 2 tablespoons minced onion, 12 slices bread, 11/2 cups grated cheddar cheese, 3 eggs, 3 cups milk, 1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce, 1 tea-

spoon celery salt. Mix together tuna fish, mayonnaise and minced onion. Spread on six slices of bread, cover with remaining slices and fit into six individual casseroles. Top with grated cheese. Beat eggs until frothy, stir in milk, Worcestershire sauce and

Pour over sandwiches. Let stand for 30 minutes. Bake in moderate oven (350 degrees F.) for about 25 to 30 minutes or until puffy and golden brown. Garnish with green peas and mushrooms. Serve very

Broiled Cheese Sandwiches

Two tablespoons softened butter, 1/4 teaspoon dry mustard, 1 teaspoon celery salt, 6 slices bread, 2 medium sized tomatoes, 6 thin slices large onion, 6 thin slices cheddar

cheese, paprika. Mix together butter, mustard and celery salt. Spread on bread slices. Cut tomatoes in 3 slices each. Place on bread, top with onion slices and cheese. Sprinkle with paprika. Place under broiler and broil for 5 to 6 minutes or until cheese has melted and is golden brown. Serve immediately with crisp salad greens.


