Children going to school in the dark. More people (especially in the large cities) are now driving their kids to school, rather than let them walk or ride their bikes. This is supposed to conserve energy?

We realize that people in governmental positions make some hasty decisions at times—some which are done more out of panic than reason. But this has to rank with one of the greatest all-time boondoggles in history.

Saving energy by way of Daylight Savings Time smacks of the same logic in which the old Indian attempted to make his blanket longer by cutting off one end and sewing it to the other.

**YOU REALLY HAFTA** gin around to get anything done during these three-hour mornings (the sun rose Monday morning at 8:56). Of course, if you didn't get all the things accomplished by noon that you had planned, you now have a seven-hour afternoon in which to attempt to redeem yourself.

The trouble with the new time change, from our area's point of view, is that we are a part of the Central Time Zone, the "widest" of the four time zones, and we are located on the extreme western edge of the zone.

Wes Lizzard pointed out this week that residents of many Western states, particularly in Nebraska, are talking of an official protest against the new time, with a request to be put in the Mountain Time zone. The Panhandle might well join in," Lizzard suggests.

## Dividend Figures Are Record At FTFCU

Dividends for the last six months have been posted to members accounts by Friona Texas Federal Credit Union, it was announced this week. The total dividends amounted to a record \$23,684.18.

As of December 14, share deposits in the Credit Union passed the \$1 million mark for the first time. Total deposits as of December 31 stood at \$1,022,463.02, according to Geneva Williams, treasurer.

The dividend figure compared to a total of \$20,017.13 which was paid last June.

Beginning with January 1, the Credit Union will begin compounding interest on a quarterly basis, it has been announced.

Mrs. Williams said that quarterly statements from the Credit Union would be mailed within the next week. Included in the statements will be information for income tax purposes, she said.

The annual meeting for the Friona Texas Federal Credit Union has been scheduled for Tuesday, February 5 at the

## Icy Spell Nets .32"

First moisture of 1974, and the first in almost three months to amount to anything, fell in the Friona area this week, in the form of freezing rain and sleet.

The Pacific storm, which hit late Tuesday and continued into the afternoon on Wednesday, left an official .32 inch of moisture in Friona. It wasn't much by some standards, but at least it was wet—and the country was needing some moisture.

## CITY PROVIDES FUNDS

# Seating Provided For Civic Center

The Friona City Council voted to purchase tables and chairs for the Community Center-Showbarn and agreed to purchase three water well sites from the Friona Country Club at its regular meeting Monday night.

The city fathers agreed to purchase 50 tables (with space enough to seat 300 people) and 300 chairs, which were offered at wholesale prices by Carrol Gatlin, co-chairman of the building committee.

Gatlin had told the council that in his opinion the new center would need permanent

furniture to seat 600 persons for banquet purposes. Through discussion it was determined that the 600 figure would only be necessary once per year, and that half of the total would be more than adequate for most gatherings which are expected to use the center.

The board also acted favorably on Gatlin's request that the city install three guard lights or street lights which will provide light on the center and its parking areas.

It was also agreed that the council would sanction the

establishment of a board of directors for the center, whose job it will be to determine the use of the facility, cost of rental, and other details, subject to approval by the City Council.

Gatlin and builder Delton Lewellen showed the council sketches of proposed refinements which are planned for the center, which will add to the appearance and decor of the new facility.

### WATER REQUEST

In their session with members of the board of directors of the Friona Country Club, the council heard a request by the club that it be allowed to purchase water from the city.

After discussion which centered on the amount of water which would be needed by the Country Club, along with the projected capacity of the city wells, it was recommended by the City Manager that the city not supply water to the club at this time, but perhaps find another method of helping the situation.

Country Club directors then asked if the city would buy the three well sites for future city water wells—the purchase of which would benefit the club by making money available which could be used toward drilling of a well by the Country Club.

## NEAR ASPHYXIATION

# Tragedy Averted; Family Is Spared

A near tragedy struck a Friona area farm family early Thursday, when members of the Manuel Ramirez family were treated for carbon monoxide poisoning after being rescued from their home by relatives and Parsons Ellis Ambulance Service.

Tragedy was averted when six-year-old Moses Ramirez woke up about 6 a.m. vomiting, and roused his 14-year-old brother, Manuel, Jr.

The older boy called an uncle, Salerino Leal, who lives about two miles from the Ramirez residence. Leal came and assisted by Manuel. Ramirez was able to get the other three children out of the house.

However, they had trouble moving the parents, who were unconscious. Leal then called Jerry Fancher, for whom he farms in the Hub community, and Fancher immediately summoned the ambulance and had it sent to the Ramirez place, which is three miles east and two south of Hub. Ramirez is employed by Clarence Monroe.

Mrs. Ramirez [Janie] was the hardest hit by the fumes. She

was given oxygen when the ambulance arrived, and was breathing better by the time she arrived at Parmer County Community Hospital.

In addition to the ambulance, the Friona Fire Department's emergency vehicle was taken, to assist in bringing the patients in to the hospital, where they were treated.

### NEST IS CULPRIT

Cause of the near-tragedy was laid to an open-flame bathroom heater that was left burning, and the house being air tight.

It was reported Thursday afternoon by Monroe that a bird's nest was the culprit in the event, as a bird had built a nest over an air vent, and the moisture of Wednesday had caused it to pack down and shut off the vent, thus making the house air tight.

It was explained that the bathroom is located between two of the family's bedrooms, where the parents and their daughters sleep. The boys' bedroom is down the hall from the others.

When Manuel Jr. awoke, he first attempted to wake his parents, but could not. He then

went into the next room and roused his older sister, Oralia, 15, who fainted. The younger girl, Margaret, who is 10, could not be aroused.

Junior then called his uncle, and the near-tragedy was averted.

According to one source, just a few minutes later might have been "too late," especially for the mother.

Upon arrival at Parmer

County Community Hospital, Mrs. Ramirez was given oxygen. The two girls and youngest boy were put to bed for observation. By the time he reached the hospital, the father was on his feet.

After observation for a few hours, the family was released, and by Thursday afternoon things were just about back to normal. Mrs. Ramirez had only a headache to show for the ordeal.

Holst has released two stereo albums of his talks. He is primarily a humorist, and is expected to make a big hit with those attending the Chamber banquet.

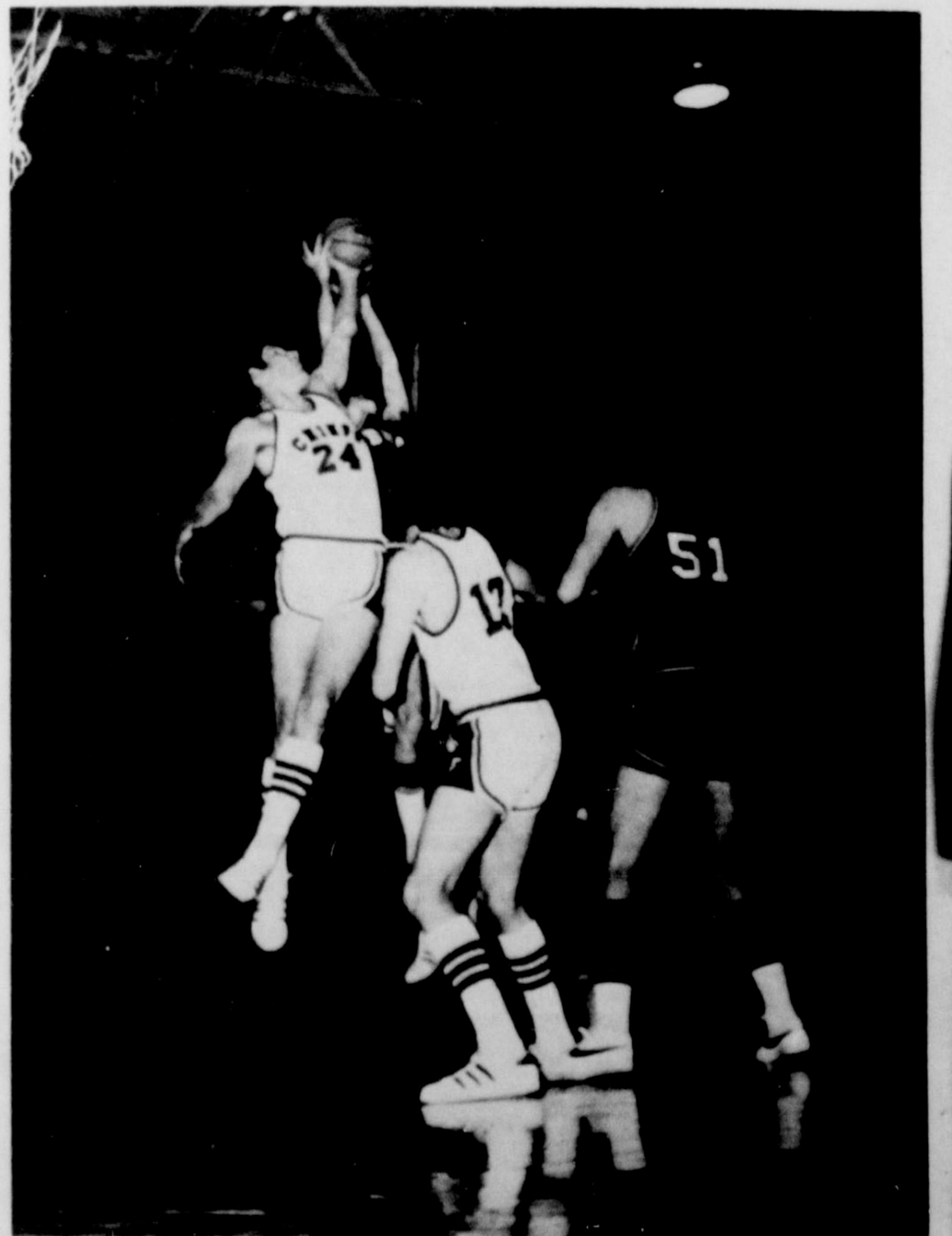
At the monthly meeting of the chamber's board of directors Tuesday morning, the board voted to have Earl Graham cater a meal which will consist of rib-by steaks.

The question of new chamber officers was discussed, but action was deferred until a later meeting. New officers will be installed as part of the annual banquet on March 11.

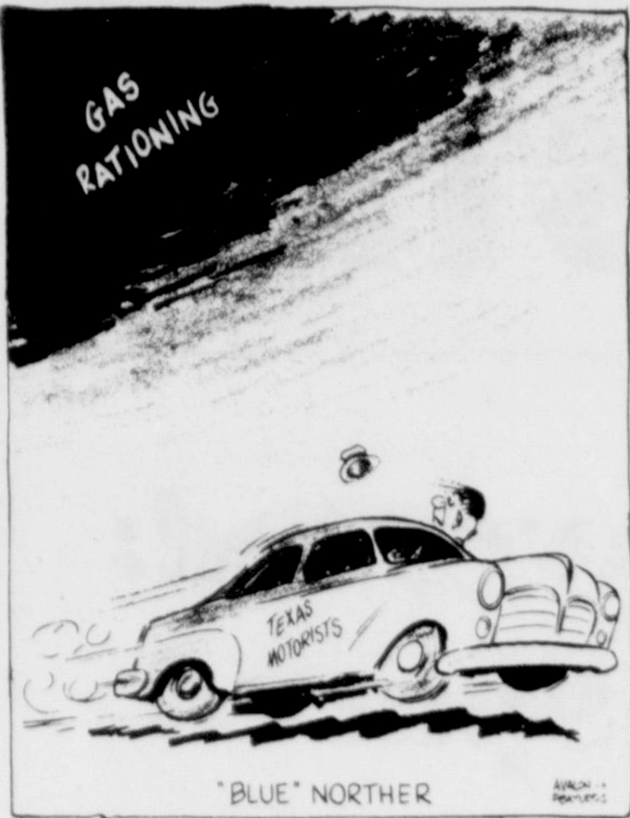

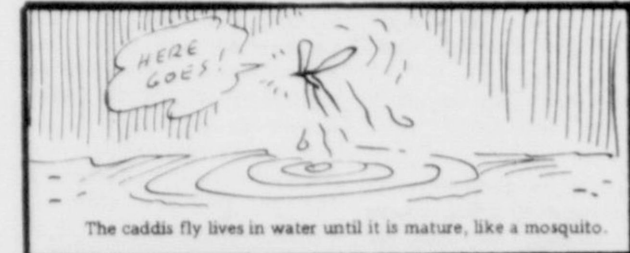

# Friona Flashbacks

... from the files of the Friona Star

### 45 YEARS AGO—JANUARY 18, 1929

Harvest of the biggest row crop in Parmer County history was being completed, with an estimated 3,000 tons of maize heads on the ground at Friona Grain Co., and about 7,000 bushels of corn.

The city commission voted to grade and re-surface with caliche Main Street from Highway 33 to Eighth Street, although it was the consensus of many that more permanent paving program would be money better spent.

G.M. Baker, who farms north of Friona, is reporting good profits from 300 White Leghorn pullets he owns.

### 40 YEARS AGO—JANUARY 19, 1934

Reliable reports come from the county seat to the effect that the right-of-way for State Highway 33 or Federal Highway 60 has been assured as far west as one mile west of Friona.

Five-year-old Johnny Jasper, son of Mr. and Mrs. J.J. Jasper of Friona, died from scalding burns suffered when he tumbled into a vat of boiling water, which was being used to scald freshly butchered hogs.

### 35 YEARS AGO—JANUARY 20, 1939

It was decided that the necessary plans be made to introduce a 12-grade school system in Friona next year, similar to that being introduced in a number of the larger schools of the state.

The Friona girls won a hard-fought game from Farwell here Tuesday, 23-22, to take the lead in Parmer County conference play with three straight victories.

### 30 YEARS AGO—JANUARY 21, 1944

O.B. Ginn, superintendent of Friona schools, attended the 11th annual mid-winter conference of the Texas School Superintendents and Teacher Training in Austin last week. Uncle John White's "Sons in the Service" column included letters from James T. Guinn, Jr., Robert Bicknell, Jr., C.B. Hanson, Gilbert Baker, Virgil Weis and Arthur Thompson.

### 20 YEARS AGO—JANUARY 16, 1954

Don Lewis of Friona was one of five Panhandle contestants appearing on the Carl Hair talent show last Saturday night over Station KFDD-TV. Don, son of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Lewis, sang "Vaya Con Dios."

Judge A.D. Smith announced for re-election as county judge, and Walter Loveless announced for re-election as justice of the peace, Precinct 2.

### 15 YEARS AGO—JANUARY 15, 1959

The construction of a new bus barn, to cost \$11,425 on the Staley property now owned by the school district was approved at a meeting of the Friona Independent School District Board of Trustees last week.

Administrative offices for Friona Independent School District will move from their present location in the high school building to the old band hall, located west of the auditorium.

### 10 YEARS AGO—JANUARY 16, 1964

Friona's Western Auto, now under the ownership of Mr. and Mrs. Ben D. McDonald, will hold grand opening Friday and Saturday.

The Friona Squaws rolled to their 17th straight win of the season here Tuesday, downing the Morton Indian Maidens, 57-32 for their second district win without a loss.

Construction is underway for a new sanctuary for the United Pentecostal Church. Rev. Frank Baber, who headed building programs in six other communities, is architect for the construction, due completion in March.

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## Hunting Accident Kills One

One man was killed and another injured in a hunting accident near Bovina Sunday, Dec. 30, according to Parmer County law enforcement officials.

Samuel Rodriguez, 21, of Mexico was killed instantly when an aluminum irrigation pipe he was lifting came in contact with electric lines. Rodriguez and a companion, also from Mexico, were rabbit hunting when they lifted the pipe to dislodge a rabbit.

The other man was only slightly burned in the incident which occurred near the intersection of the Bovina-Rhea-Friona highways some seven miles north of Bovina on FM 1731.

The two men were employed by George W. Jones, who lives west of Friona. Rodriguez' body was taken to the Jones residence where he was pronounced dead by Wilbur Charles, Bovina Justice of the Peace.

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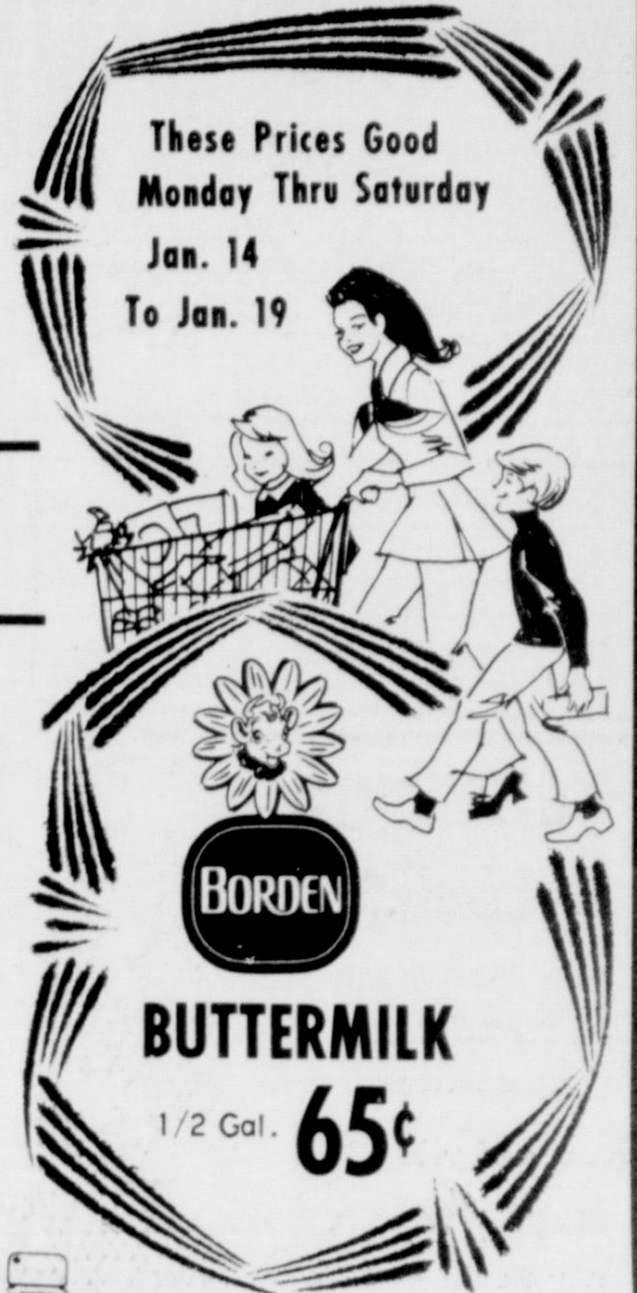

**Growers Banquet Features Guest**

"America's No. 1 Intellectual Humorist" will be featured when the Texas-New Mexico Sugar Beet Growers Association holds its annual banquet at the Bull Barn in Hereford beginning at 7 p.m. on January 12.

All growers will be guests at the banquet, and the general public is invited to attend. Tickets, at \$4 a plate will be available at the door.

Dr. James Blakely, the featured speaker, is an associate professor at Wharton Junior College in agricultural chemical technology—a unique program developed at his initiative. His occupations include teaching, traveling, flying, ranching and speaking.

Born in Rush Springs, Okla., and reared in Duval County, Texas, Dr. Blakely holds the distinction of being the only professional humorist in Texas with a Ph.D. He graduated from Sam Houston State University and earned his M.S. and Ph.D. degrees at the University of Missouri.

He is a member of the official board of the First United Methodist Church of Wharton, is past president of the Rotary Club of Wharton, and is a member of the Wharton C of C.

Jay Boston, association president, sent a letter to growers this week reminding them of the business meeting and banquet, and also urging more sugar beet acreage in 1974. Boston listed the following reasons for planting more beets:

(1) We have a higher guaranteed price for beets through our contract than any of the other crops we grow in this area.

(2) The other crops we grow depend mainly on export market, while we only grow approximately one-half of the sugar we use in the United States.

(3) Sugar beets stand hail better than any other crop.

(4) According to information we get from all the grower associations, there will be a short sugar crop in 1974. We believe this will mean a higher price for sugar in 1974.

(5) With our new varieties, we believe we can produce from \$20 to \$50 an acre more on beets.

(6) We believe the records will show we can grow higher sugar with less water which will mean higher profit per acre.

waste problem.

The city has written to the state agency's Austin office with a request for an additional six-month extension for the purpose of complying with the regulation that no city trash be burned.

The city's present sanitary landfill is virtually full, and efforts have been made by city officials for quite some time as to securing additional land for the disposal of solid wastes, but to no avail as yet.

However, mayor Fleming reported to the council on a new possibility along this line, which he is to continue working on.

In other business, the council passed a motion confirming an expenditure of approximately \$2,338 for new parts and pumps for the city's wastewater plant, which had not been replaced in some 15 years.

The reason for the delay in construction on State Highway 214 and the overpass was explained as the gas shortage, which has caused contractors not to bid on the project, in the event that money was advanced.

## LIBRARY CORNER

"No matter how much you read in High School, it will never be enough." This is the message that comes to students currently in school from students who have gone on to college. There the competition is keen with others who have apparently read almost everything and who casually mention names and trends entirely new. For this reason, Friona Public Library invites all students to take advantage of the many books offered on our shelves and of the Inter-Library Loan System. Mrs. Billie Fairchild will get any book you may want within two days and all you have to do is pay the postage when you pick the book up.

College bound students know they are supposed to read and read. What to read then becomes the problem. Listed in this column are books taken from a College Preparatory Reading List. Your college faculty will assume that you have read the classics and important recent authors. This list, partial here, was drawn from all fields.

**NOBODY KNOWS MY NAME** by Baldwin is a story of the struggle of the American Negro to find his place in society. Other novels by this author are recommended: **ANOTHER COUNTRY**, **NOTES OF A NATIVE SON**, and **THE FIRE NEXT TIME**.

**TO KILL A MOCKINGBIRD** by Harper Lee is perhaps familiar to all young persons as a movie seen often on television starring Gregory Peck. The book is a sensitive comment on the conflict between races in the thirties in the South.

**CRY, THE BELOVED COUNTRY** by Paton is social commentary in novel form. The Paton book concerns the events in the life of a Zulu minister in South Africa.

**NATIVE SON** by Wright is fictional writing in novel form the racial dilemma.

This book and those mentioned above are mentioned together so that the reader may compare views and attitudes of authors as well as styles in treating one subject.

**THE RED BADGE OF COURAGE** by Crane is often described as the "first modern war novel." This story of men under fire in the Civil War also belongs in the same line of American novels as **HUCK FIN**, **A FAREWELL TO ARMS** and **THE CATCHER IN THE RYE**. These books bear comparison as novels which place innocent in an indifferent or hostile world he cannot understand.

**THE TRIAL** by Kafka is a strange novel in which the reader is sure to be asking the "perhaps" and "maybes" of the stories. The story treats man's loneliness in terrifying awareness.

**TOM SAWYER, CONNECTICUT YANKEE AT KING ARTHUR'S COURT, ROUGHING IT, and INNOCENTS ABROAD** by Twain are must reading for the college bound student. Twain was a humorist and spokesman for the enduring values of the frontier in American life.

**WAR AND PEACE** by Tolstoy is a richly detailed chronicle of Russia during the Napoleonic wars and is often called the "greatest novel ever written." It is a long book so choose an unbusy time to read it!

**ALL QUIET ON THE WESTERN FRONT** by Remarque is the best known World War I novel, describing the war as a typical German soldier saw it. This bears comparison with the romantic and glorified view in Tolstoy's novel.

For high school readers, most of these books are available at the high school library. For all reading needs, come by Friona Public Library.

To attain this honor, he held a 3.43 grade point average on a 4.0 point system.



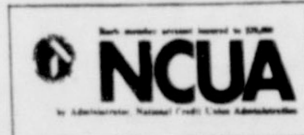

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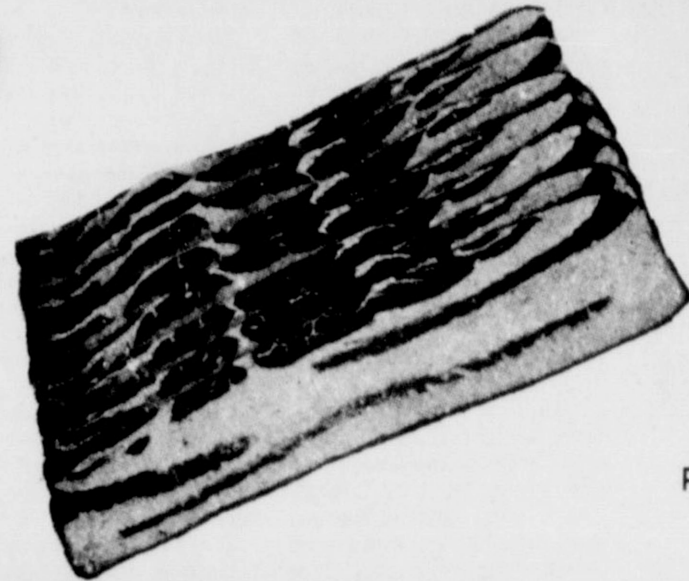
