Tex-Harvey Pool In East Midland Gets Extension

Harry B. Lake and associates No. 1 Flow, extends the Tex-Harvey field of East Midland County, one and one-half miles to the east. The extender is producing from the Spraberry sand of the lower Permian.

It reported a 24-hour flowing potential of 242 barrels of oil, plus three per cent water. The flow was through a one-fourth inch tubing choke.

The production is in open hole between the top of the pay at 4,987 feet and the total depth at 7,262 feet. The pay section had been shot with 681 quarts of nitro glycerin.

Gas-oil ratio was 700-1. The 5 1/2-inch casing is tested at 8,967 feet. Location is 697 feet from north and west lines of the block east quarter of section 14, block 37, TP survey, T-3-S.

SE Gains Discovery Gauges Natural Flow

Forest Oil Corporation and Anderson-Prichard Oil Corporation No. 1-A Farmer County School Land fee, Mississippi discovery in Southeast Gains County, 18 miles southeast of Seminole, flowed 335.78 barrels of 41.5-gravity oil, and no water in 2 hours, from perforated section at 12,218-235 feet, naturally.

The flow was through various sized chokes ranging from three-eighths to three-sixteenths inch.

Average gas-oil ratio was 751-1. Open flowing tubing pressure varied from 200 pounds to 500 pounds, according to the size of the choke.

Operators were conditioning the hole, likely to perforate and test on some other zones in the Mississippi.

Location is 860 feet from west and 690 feet from south lines of labor 12, league 317, Farmer County School Land survey.

SW Pegasus Extension Rates Daily Potential

Republic Natural Gas Company No. 1 American Republics Corporation, a one and one-quarter mile southwest stepout to the Pegasus multi-pay pool in Central-Northern Upton County, is producing a daily potential of 3,183 barrels of 54.6-gravity oil, and no water.

The potential was rated from an actual flow of 234.8 barrels in seven hours through a 37/64-inch choke. Flowing tubing pressure was 1,150 pounds, and gas-oil ratio was 1,200-1.

Production was from open hole in the Ellenburger at 13,025-180 feet. That section had been treated with two injections of 3,000 and 25,000 gallons respectively.

Top of the Ellenburger is at 13,025 feet, on a minus datum of 10-164 feet. It is 82 feet low to the Republic Natural Gas Company No. 1 Pegasus, one and one-quarter miles northeast, the nearest producer.

Seven-inch casing is cemented at 13,025 feet. This important extension to the Pegasus field is 690 feet from north and west lines of section 8, block 40, TP survey.

East Flanker Assured To Kelley-Canyon Pool

Gene Goff, Standard - Fryer Drilling Company, and others, No. 2 Deway Moore, one location north of a failure in the Canyon lime, reef on the east side of the Kelley-Canyon field in Central Scurry County, has shown as a flowing oil well.

This development, located 487 feet from north and 75.3 feet from west lines of tract 57, section 38, Kirklind and Fields survey, a 4.3-acre mile southwest of Snyder, flowed oil at the estimated rate of 25 barrels per hour.

The flow came in a drillstem test at 8,841-65 feet. Gas showed at the surface in five minutes, mud came to the top in 15 minutes, and oil started flowing in 25 minutes. The well was flowed at the estimated rate of 25 barrels per hour for an unreported length of time. No water was shown. Flowing tubing pressure was 1,900 pounds. Shut-in bottom hole pressure after 15 minutes, was 3,300 pounds.

It deepened 10 feet to 8,865 feet. Operators are now running casing and will test and complete.

The project is one location north of W. A. Moore, No. 1 Moore, Bing Crosby, et al, No. 1 Moore, which was plugged several months ago, as a failure. That venture had some shows of production, but they were never developed for commercial yields of petroleum.

SE Crockett Tester Develops Deep Shows

Magnolia Petroleum Company No. 1 Clayton Ranch, Southeast Crockett County, wildcat, nine miles southwest of Ozona, and 1,320 feet from south and 1,980 feet from west lines of section 12, block GH, GO&SF survey, developed good shows of gas in the Ellenburger and is coming deeper with a diamond-bit.

This venture topped the Ellenburger at 8,489 feet, on a minus datum of 6,000 feet. That made it 21 feet high, according to some correlations, to the top of the Ellenburger in the Michaux and Kidd No. 1 Davidson, Ellenburger failure, two and one half miles west and slightly north.

The Magnolia venture drilled to 8,539 feet and took a one 1/2 inch 23 minute drillstem test at 8,494-539 feet. A 900-foot water blanket (Continued On Page Two)

MESA, ARIZ.—(P)—Two teen-age hitchhikers from Waco, Texas, admitted Monday they shot a motorist to death on the highway Sunday night, Sheriff L. C. Boies said.

The youths were arrested in a motor court near here. They had a pistol.

First U. S. B-29's Sent To Britain

WASHINGTON —(P)—The first batch of about 75 American B-29's takes off for Britain Monday afternoon under the \$1,000,000,000 arms aid program to strengthen Western Europe's defenses.

The four-engine bombers, manned by American crews, were scheduled to leave nearby Andrews field at 2 p. m., bound for a British air base.

Secretary of Defense Johnson and British Ambassador Sir Oliver Franks were to be on hand at the airport for the ceremony formally turning the planes over to the British.

Aid Starts Rolling

The four-engine planes, now powered by modernized motors, are the first American arms to be handed over to the British under the arms program approved by Congress last October. They also will be the first to reach their European destination.

Forty-eight American Hellcat fighters and Helldiver bombers were loaded aboard the French aircraft carrier "Dixmude" at Norfolk, Va., March 8. These were the first American weapons actually given to an Atlantic Pact nation but they are not expected to arrive at Bizerte, the French naval base in North Africa, for some time.

Additional cargoes of American military equipment now are pulling up at East Coast ports for shipment to other Western European nations aboard regular commercial vessels.

Government officials told a reporter it will be "only a matter of days" before American arms start moving to Belgium and The Netherlands. Shipments to Italy are at least two weeks off.

Midland Airport Due To Get Tower Soon

WASHINGTON—(P)—If it gets the money, the Civil Aeronautics Administration plans 10 new airport control towers in eight states, Congress was told in testimony made public Sunday.

Three of the towers would be put in operation during the year beginning July 1, 1950: At Friendship Field, Baltimore, Md.; International Airport, Fort Worth, Texas, and Pittsburgh, Pa.

The agency told the committee there are 19 other control towers which have been authorized previously and which are expected to be placed in operation "in the next few months."

They include Midland and Waco, Texas.

Stanton Prisoners Change Mind After Making Jail Break

A couple of inmates of the Martin County Jail had a change of heart early Monday after they had broken out of the trouble of breaking into the "hall of detention" in Stanton.

Midland police received a call shortly before 5 a. m. It was Anderson Jackson, negro, requesting that he and Qued Gilberte be allowed to give themselves up. He said they broke jail at Stanton.

Martin County Sheriff Kyle Shoemaker accepted custody of the pair about 8 a. m. and returned them to Stanton—and to jail.

Police Department Gets Two New Cars

The Midland Police Department Monday put into service two new radio patrol cars which arrived here Sunday from Dallas.

Complete FM police radio equipment has been installed in the 1950 Ford, Police Chief Jack Ellington said.

The new cars replace the two aged, white patrol cars which have been in use more than a year.

WASHINGTON—Crime does pay in the United States today.

Organized illegal gambling alone is taking in somewhere between \$5,000,000,000 and \$20,000,000,000 annually. These figures are minimum and maximum estimates made in a recent confidential report of the Special Citizens' Committee of Massachusetts.

Because they are based on reports and findings of many other inquiries, the estimates are rated by the experts as the most reliable that exist.

This fabulous yearly take is the result of a post-war crime wave in America which has brand new, sinister elements never before encountered by law-enforcement officers. A group of super-criminals have organized crime syndicates so powerful they threaten

Martin County Town Has Special Cause To Mourn For Writer

TARZAN —(P)—This small Martin County town mourns the death Sunday of Novelist Edgar Rice Burroughs.

The town was named for the principal character in most of Burroughs' books.

Edgar Rice Burroughs, who dug a literary gold mine in the African jungle with Tarzan, is dead.

Burroughs, author, died Sunday, but the ape-man he created will live on to delight other generations of youngsters the world over.

Fifteen novels were awaiting publication when Burroughs died of a heart ailment in bed. A movie producer said he had contracted to make 15 more Tarzan films. A tradition born in 1912, when Burroughs sold his first Tarzan book, apparently will continue for years to come.

The 74-year-old multi-millionaire writer became ill three months ago but up to that time had kept busy turning out new stories about his jungle hero.

"Tarzan of the Apes" brought Burroughs only \$700. After its phenomenal success, he retained control over his literary works and the royalties reached fabulous proportions. From movie rights alone he is reported to have realized \$5,000,000.

Almost 40,000,000 Tarzan books have been sold.

Some have been translated into as many as 56 languages.

Burroughs never set foot in Africa, the locale of his jungle stories.

SNYDER—(P)—No charges had been filed Monday in a Saturday night shooting here which left two persons dead and one wounded critically.

Justice of the Peace W. C. Davidson ruled that Hiram Tom Vance, 38, attempted suicide after his wife, Betty, 25, and Jack Sandefur, 31, were shot and killed.

Vance remained unconscious and in a critical condition with a bullet wound in his head.

Sheriff Lloyd Merritt said charges would not be filed for several days.

Merritt found the bodies of the three persons in a Snyder hotel.

Rucker Cites Reason For Quitting Race

Harold J. Rucker, whose withdrawal as a candidate for Place 4 on the City Council in the April 4 city election was announced in a letter received Saturday by City Secretary J. C. Hugman, said Monday he withdrew because of misunderstanding concerning the length of residence qualification for candidates.

The city charter provides that candidates must have resided within the state for at least a year and that they be qualified voters.

Rucker, who has been a Texas resident 10 months, said he was not aware of this requirement when he filed for the office March 4. He expressed appreciation to those persons who had pledged him their support.

Two Are Sentenced Here For Burglary

District Judge Paul Moss handed down identical three-year prison sentences Monday to two men charged with burglary.

Jackie White, Midland negro, was assessed the sentence on a plea of guilty to breaking in a Midland laundry, January 6. Roy Lee Minto, tooth pleaded guilty to burglarizing the Midland Service Club.

Evacuation Craft Denied Entry Permit

WASHINGTON —(P)—The State Department said Monday the Chinese Communists have blocked a mass evacuation of Americans and other foreigners from China by a last minute refusal to let two landing craft into Shanghai.

American officials on the scene have been instructed to press for reconsideration, an announcement said.

The landing craft—which were to ferry the foreigners from Shanghai to the American Presidential Liner General Gordon—have been ordered to remain at sea. The Gordon was instructed to stay at Hong Kong.

Almost 2,000 foreigners, including 310 Americans, had planned to leave Monday night in the "last such general evacuation since last Fall."

The United States ordered all remaining American diplomats and consuls out of the country two months ago after the Communists authorities at Peiping seized American consular property there.

Unwarranted Apprehensions

Apparently the Communist authorities at Shanghai had "unwarranted apprehensions" that the landing craft were not commercial vessels, the State Department said.

It said they were strictly commercial craft, turned over to the American President Liner Co. The vessels are LST (Landing Ship, Tanks) widely used during World War II in assaults on hostile beaches.

The LST's were to be used to ferry the foreigners to the Yangtze River has been reported mined by the Chinese Nationalists as part of a Nationalist blockade against much of the Communist-controlled area.

The last minute refusal to let the evacuation proceed apparently took the State Department by surprise, although a number of American businessmen at Shanghai have been denied exit permits.

Convicted Soviet Spy Sent Home

NEW YORK —(P)—The government handed Valentin A. Gubitchev his official walking papers Monday and the stubby convicted spy headed home toward his native Russia, "never to return."

Federal Judge Sylvester J. Ryan suspended Gubitchev's 15-year prison sentence shortly after 9 a. m. in accordance with a previous recommendation by Secretary of State Dean Acheson and Attorney General J. Howard McGrath.

The Russian was convicted with Judith Coplon of plotting to spy for the Soviet Union.

Meanwhile, a large force of policemen guarded the Gydnia-American liner Batory, on which he sailed, to make sure he got on and didn't get off again. His attractive wife boarded the ship in mid-morning.

The ship sailed at noon for Gdynia, Poland.

Rough Patrol officers were ordered to stay aboard until the Batory reached Ambrose Lightship off New York Harbor.

Ambassador Denies McCarthy's Charges

WASHINGTON—(P)—Ambassador Philip C. Jessup declared Monday that Senator McCarthy (R-Wis.), by accusing him of "Communist affinity," showed a "shocking disregard for the interests of our country."

With a sweeping denial of any Communist sympathies, Jessup told a Senate investigating subcommittee that it is a matter of "utmost gravity" when an American envoy is "held up before the eyes of the rest of the world as a liar and a traitor."

The ambassador-at-large lashed back at McCarthy after speeding home from a survey mission to the Far East. He said that during his absence his integrity was attacked only by two sources—McCarthy and the Moscow official newspaper Izvestia.

Jessup added:

"Anyone who believes in the concept of guilt by association might draw some startling conclusions from this fact. However, I do not believe in the concept of guilt by association.

Remarks Aid Reds

"Moreover, I do believe that anyone who, without adequate proof, levels a charge of conscious or ignorant support of communism at a member of the United States Senate—or at any official of the United States—(Continued On Page Two)

Plan To Cut Another Billion Off Spending Budget Gets Support

WASHINGTON —(P)—A politically appealing plan to lop another billion dollars off federal spending next year was picking up strong bipartisan support Monday in the House.

Its strong appeal to the lawmakers is that it would be aimed at "non essential" spending, with the total 26 billion dollar bill financing more than 40 federal agencies for the 1951 fiscal year starting next July 1. The committee hopes to have the bill in shape to send to the House floor early this week. It is slated for House debate next week, but won't be voted on until after the Easter recess.

Committee members said the committee already tentatively has cut more than one billion dollars from the money requests in President Truman's \$42.4 billion dollar budget.

Want More Cuts

Rep. John Taber of New York, top Republican on the Appropriations Committee, and a number of others want further reductions. Another "billion or two" would be in order, Taber told newsmen.

Republican strategy probably will be to withhold cutting drives until the bill reaches the amendment stage in the House. Any reductions made by the committee could be credited to the Democratic majority because committee votes are not made public.

Explosion Damages Giant Plane; Eight Workers Are Injured

SAN ANTONIO —(P)—An explosion ripped out a wing fuel cell of the XC-98, world's largest military land airplane, and injured eight workers at Kelly Air Force Base Monday.

Precautions taken against fire hazards held damage to a minimum. Firemen threw carbon dioxide and foamite before the project would be resumed.

S. J. R. Hendricks, one of the workers, was treated at the Lackland AFB Hospital for burns about the face.

A. Langan, inside the wing, suffered from shock.

Others suffered minor injuries when they jumped 20 feet from the wing surface and work stands to the ground.

An investigation to determine cause of the explosion was started.

The left board tank tank exploded as workmen were spraying carbon dioxide gas into the big 4,000-gallon fuel cell to clear it of gasoline fumes. Kelly officials reported.

The huge transport, with a 250-foot wingspan, was scheduled for April 15 delivery after extensive modification and overhaul at Kelly.

Only two or three weeks of work remain on the project, which would have been completed and the airplane plane be made ready for test flights.

(Continued From Page One) was used. There was a good blow of gas at the surface during the test.

Recovery was the 900-foot water blanket and 1,900 feet of gas cut mud. There were no shows of oil or of water. The drill pipe headed out some gas and some gas cut drilling mud, while being pulled.

The venture is to core ahead with a diamond bit. It is 15 miles southeast of the Childress-Ellenburger field.

NW Fisher Wildcat To Eliminate Water

Operators of the Hiawatha Oil & Gas Company No. 1 Morrow, a possible Ellenburger discovery in Northwest Fisher County, are attempting to determine the exact depth of the Ellenburger water table.

Five and one-half-inch casing is set on the venture bottom at 6,832 feet. A section from 6,830-80 feet has been perforated and tested. After one and one-half hours, recovery was 280 feet of sulphur water cut mud, with no free water and no traces of oil or gas.

There's no argument about it at a local cafe. The ladies' powder room is marked: "Girls' Gossip Room."

On a previous drillstem test at 6,700-6,862 feet, the project flowed 27 barrels of 40-gravity oil in five hours through a one-quarter-inch choke. When the drillpipe was pulled on this test, recovery was 330 feet of oil and gas cut mud and 570 feet of sulphur water.

The Hiawatha No. 1 Morrow is 933 feet from north and 330 feet from west lines of section 48, block 2, T20 survey, and two and one-half miles southwest of Rotan.

Recovery in the 75-minute test at 8,197-8,222 feet was the 1,900 feet of free oil, and no water. Flowing bottom hole pressure was between 300 and 500 pounds.

This project topped the Ellenburger at 7,700 feet with an elevation of 2,826 feet, which is 146 feet high to the same company's No. 1-GG University, Ellenburger producer in the Block 39 pool.

Stanford Oil & Gas Company, an outpost to the Block 39-Ellenburger pool in Northeast Crockett County, recovered 1,900 feet of 40-gravity oil on a drillstem test in the Ellenburger.

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Visit Of American Destroyers Incites Indochinese Rioting

SAIGON, VIETNAM, INDOCHINA — U. S. Destroyers were the target of Communist-led riots which killed three persons and wounded at least 30 others—left on schedule Monday.

Sunday, 3,000 students and 1,000 workmen, waving the gold-starred flag of Moscow — trained Ho Chi Minh's rebels, began a march toward the harbor to protest North American backing of the French-supported Vietnam government.

Rioting flared for four hours and before French police dispersed the shouting mob it had burned part of the block-square Central Market, set the torch to 15 buses and trucks, and ripped down French and American banners raised in honor of the destroyers' visit.

The destroyers Stichel and Anderson both sent here as a gesture of American support for the French-sponsored government of former Emperor Bao Dai. But cries of "Down with American Aid," "Down with Bao Dai," and "Long Live Ho Chi Minh" were heard from the rioters.

There were repercussions Monday from Sunday's violence, although Saigon appeared quiet. Students and private schools decided to go on strike in protest against the deaths of two of their comrades in the rioting.

The third victim was a policeman. Students refused to publish in Saigon because Vietnam authorities had issued an order that they print only official statements on the rioting. The authorities hit back by suspending the newspapers for two weeks.

BRUSSELS, BELGIUM — (AP) — Belgians opposed to the return of King Leopold III began a round of work stoppages Monday, calling out 30,000 men to underscore determined socialist opposition to the pro-Leopold forces.

Tramway and foundry workers walked off the job in widely scattered parts of the country, but the hardest hit city was Antwerp, where 128 ships were immobilized.

The entire port administrative staff, including 126 pilots, joined with 11,000 dock and shipyard workers in a 24-hour strike.

The main sea lock of the port was blocked by the 6,800-ton Norwegian vessel Trondanger. She arrived when the strike started. Lock operators said they won't release her until the strike ends Tuesday morning.

Farm Price Support Bill Faces Stubborn Opposition In Senate

WASHINGTON — (AP) — A farm price support bill which would loosen controls on peanuts and cotton but tighten them for potatoes faced an admittedly stiff fight in the Senate Monday.

Republicans vote as a unit and are helped out by some of the boys on our side, it may be defeated," Democratic Senator Kimer Thomas of Oklahoma told a reporter.

Thomas, chairman of the Senate Agriculture Committee, is leading the floor debate for adoption of a compromise farm measure the House passed last week.

Although most of the talk has been about multi-million dollar losses on surplus potatoes Senator Aiken (R-Vt.) said opponents would stress the prospective \$125,000,000 extra cost to taxpayers for surplus peanuts and cotton which are not needed or wanted.

Thomas agreed readily that most of the pressure for the compromise comes from the south.

Democratic Leader Lucas of Illinois brought the potato surplus headache into the cotton-peanut measure when it reached the Senate but failed to win a "no crop control—no price supports" provision for this year's crop.

Retained in the compromise is such a provision for next and future year's potato crops plus authority for the secretary of agriculture to reduce the number of acres of potatoes that could qualify for supports.

The measure would permit planting of 1,200,000 additional acres of cotton above previous limits and 100,000 additional acres of peanuts.

Symphony Is Received With Enthusiasm

Applause which called for three encores and innumerable bows from Conductor Walter Hendi and the entire personnel of the Dallas Symphony Orchestra measured the approval of the audience for the orchestra's concert here Sunday afternoon.

It played for the Midland Civic Music Association in the new Midland High School Auditorium. The audience included also a number of CMA members from other cities.

Each of the orchestra's selections was applauded enthusiastically. The favorite was probably the overture fantasy "Romeo and Juliet," Tschalkovsky with its familiar theme and exciting passages depicting the feud of the Montagues and Capulets.

The orchestra played the entire "Symphony No. 4 in A Major, Opus 90," of Mendelssohn, usually called the "Italian Symphony" because it resulted from the composer's travels in Italy. It is in four movements, the first cheerful, two slower, and the last with contrasting force and rapid tempo.

Contemporary pieces Closing the concert was Ravel's second "Daphnis et Chloe" suite music composed for a ballet based on the Greek myth of nymphs and shepherds, with a flute solo preceding the final animated dance. Contemporary music was introduced in the encores, selections from a composition by Hindemith which was commissioned last year by the Dallas Symphony. The first was a march based on a Beethoven theme, played by the wind and percussion instruments alone, then the strings were starred in another selection.

Finally, the popular "Sabre Dance" was played for a still-applauding crowd.

The orchestra's concert, regarded by most members as the high point of the year's program, was the third in the Civic Music Association series this season. Two more programs are scheduled this Spring. The next, on April 3, will present Andres Segovia, guitarist.—S. C.

These confident assurances sound wonderful. All of us would like nothing better than to believe them.

But some reporters and columnists have been charging gravely that the facts are otherwise.

These critics get down to specific cases, talking in numbers of planes, ships, submarines.

On virtually all specific counts, the critics find America's defenses wanting.

What do they base their charges of inadequacy upon? They rely upon estimates of need made by such groups as the Finletter commission.

Up to this point Johnson has not answered these criticisms. For to say we are "girding our loins" is no reply to a man who has just said that aircraft replacement lags so many per cent behind aircraft obsolescence.

Of course, the secretary has not ignored the attacks. There are times, in fact, when he seems to enjoy them.

Johnson's display of iron nerve and good humor under this drumfire may be admirable but it's wholly beside the point.

The only way they can gauge that is by getting specific answers to specific charges.

Drew Pearson says: Big business begins early drive against Truman "socialism"; Senator McCarthy had quite a record as a Wisconsin judge; Governor Warren champions liberal oath in California.

WASHINGTON — A quiet campaign by big business to defeat the Truman Administration was launched in New York the other day under the auspices of the National Association of Manufacturers.

Chairman of Standard Oil of New Jersey, a group of big business executives discussed plans for a propaganda drive through employe magazines and by putting slips into employes' pay envelopes.

"Chief speaker at the closed-door meeting was Lemuel Boulware, vice president of the giant General Electric Corporation and former vice chairman of the War Production Board.

"Roosevelt, Truman, Reuther and their ilk are the avowed enemies of American business," Boulware told his fellow executives in brief.

"They consider the American businessman a thief, a cheat, a coward. The time has come for the American businessman to stand up and take a stand for what he believes in."

"Therefore, General Electric," he said, "is taking a strong stand against socialism which we regard as a more serious menace than communism."

"Boulware, who is in charge of G. E.'s labor relations, also stated that no union on a national level is any good.

"Business executives also were urged to give as much circulation as possible to 'The Road Ahead,' written by bitter Roosevelt-hater John T. Flynn.

"Note—Anti-Trumanites are putting on such a strong campaign for the book it has been required reading for many of the girls at the Swank Holton Arms School in Washington.

Irrepressible McCarthy Republicans have been getting more and more embarrassed over the antics of harum-scarum Senator Joe McCarthy of Wisconsin.

"The trouble with Joe is that he rushes into a position where he does not have the facts, just as he rushed into his own election campaign in Wisconsin without resigning from the Court of Appeals.

"It is difficult to conceive of any conduct upon the part of the presiding judge which would bring judges and courts into greater disrepute and contempt than the conduct of the defendant (McCarthy) challenged in this proceeding.

"He, as an officer of the court, knowingly and willfully, placed the gratification of his personal ambition above the interests of the public and the rights of litigants.

"The defendant, by his conduct, chose to defy the rules of ethical conduct prescribed by the Constitution, the laws of the State of Wisconsin, and the members of the profession, in order to attain a selfish personal advantage.

Only experience will make a good card player. However, a person may become a good player more quickly learning to use the gadgets employed by the experts, such as safety plays, squeeze plays, coups, and so on.

Of course, the first lesson you must learn is to count your tricks. Then, if you have a basic knowledge of the different expert plays you quickly can become a fine card player.

This week I am going to give you a series of safety plays. In other words, we will count our tricks and then see if we can play the hand safely to make the contract.

What should the declarer do at trick one in today's hand? Should he play the five-spot from dummy and let the ten of spades ride around his queen? If he does, he will not make the contract, because East will win and shift to a club.

McCarthy Charges May Put Spotlight On Far East Policy

WASHINGTON—Senator Joseph R. McCarthy of Wisconsin finally has struck what for him may be pay dirt. By bringing out into the open the name of John Stewart Service as one of his State Department security risks, Senator McCarthy may be heading the Senate Foreign Relations subcommittee into an investigation of the whole Far Eastern division of the State Department.

Of course, the Senate Foreign Relations Committee made one investigation of the State Department's Far Eastern division in 1946 when Gen. Pat Hurley hurled his charges against the department after resigning in a huff as ambassador to China.

Three of the men named by General Hurley as having sabotaged U. S. policy in China now have been named by Senator McCarthy. They are John Stewart Service, Ambassador John Carter Vincent, and John P. Davies, Jr., now on the State Department's Policy Planning Staff.

The Senate Foreign Relations Committee dropped the Hurley charges after a short investigation. The new Foreign Relations subcommittee under Chairman Millard E. Tydings of Maryland had no intention of taking up the McCarthy charges this time. But these things hang on like the plague and it probably will be necessary to reinvestigate them every few years till all the principals are dead.

Senator McCarthy has brought in a lot of old dirty linen. It might be just as well to turn the Tydings investigation into a Chinese policy laundry. Run it through the mangle and the wringer again, then hang it on the line for everyone to see. That's the only way a lot of suspicious neighbors are going to be convinced.

Ambassador Jessup Leads Off The Tydings Committee's investigation into China policy will get off to a good start when it hears Ambassador-at-Large Philip C. Jessup give the opening address in Washington.

Instead of taking a slow boat from China, in order to answer the charges of Communist front affiliations which Senator McCarthy had thrown at him, Owen J. Lattimore of Johns Hopkins University, sometime consultant to the State Department, adviser to Chiang Kai-shek, and referred to by Senator McCarthy as one of the chief architects of U. S. China policy is now in Asia as an adviser to the Nationalist Government.

But his wife says he'll have an answer to the charges when he gets back. In justice to Ambassador Vincent and John P. Davies, Jr., they should be given a chance to appear in public hearing, too. Service has been ordered to return from India to appear personally before a department loyalty board. Then either find them guilty of charges or clear them once and for all and let them alone.

Ambassador Vincent is Senator McCarthy's case No. 2 in his first list of 50 security risks. Vincent, 50, is now U. S. ambassador to Switzerland. He served in China from 1928 to 1935 and in 1941 and '42. In 1943 he was made chief of the Far Eastern Division, serving until he sent to Switzerland a year or so ago. Vincent has for years been criticized as the man who gave U. S. China policy a slant towards the Communists.

In describing his case No. 2, Senator McCarthy said: "This individual contacts a Russian espionage agent, and that agent is followed by the Russian embassy, where the material is handed over."

John S. Service, 41, recently was ordered to India as U. S. consul at Calcutta. He was born in China of missionary parents. He served in various posts in the Orient from 1933 to 1945. On the Senate floor Senator McCarthy said, "It will be recalled that Service picked up Service for having delivered secret

Veteran Smokeater Has Been Dublin's Fire Chief 53 Years

"I'm a firebug against fires," says Uncle Buck Hallmark. "Been fighting 'em 70 long years."

For 53 of those years, William Hallmark has been chief of the Dublin, Texas, Fire Department; so many years that Dublin firemen have voted to make him chief as long as he lives.

"Uncle Buck has fought more than 3,000 blazes at Dublin, a community of 4,000 persons in Erath County. His only pay: satisfaction and a few medals for heroism he won't discuss. Never has Dublin's Fire Department had more than one or two paid workers. A strenuous stop the fire station screams to round up volunteers.

But the department has five pieces of motorized equipment and a swell record. "And Dublin has the lowest fire insurance rate in the state for a town its size," Uncle Buck says.

"Helped fight my first fire when I was a kid of six in northeastern Alabama," the stocky, grey-haired, 76-year-old Hallmark said. "I held my daddy's horse while he put out a forest fire.

"In a year or two I was dragging a green cowhide to put out forest fires. I remember how thirsty I got. I lapped many a drink of water from cowtrucks."

Uncle Buck married young and moved to Dublin in 1861 from Alabama because he read in a book that it had "plenty of frontier spirit."

"It did, too," he chuckles now. "About 1,000 people and every other building a saloon."

Joins Volunteers

In 1862 he joined the Dublin volunteer firemen and began washing hose and greasing hand pump carts the men pulled to fires. He was elected chief five years later.

"Got our first horses, Bud and Barney, in 1917," Hallmark remembers. "We sure were proud. They were beautiful red horses with black manes and tails and they loved a

fire.

"I remember 1917, too, because that year Dublin had its costliest fire—a \$600,000 blaze. A warehouse 350 feet long and 50 feet wide, piled with peanuts 50 feet high, caught fire. These blazed peanuts burned six weeks. I fought that blaze the whole time. Slept on the ground."

"I want to spend the rest of my life preaching fire prevention," he said. "I've seen people burning to death. I've seen fires take the homes and all the belongings of widows and children. When a man sees things like that it gets in his blood to do something to keep fires from happening. I guess I hate fires as bad as any man on earth."

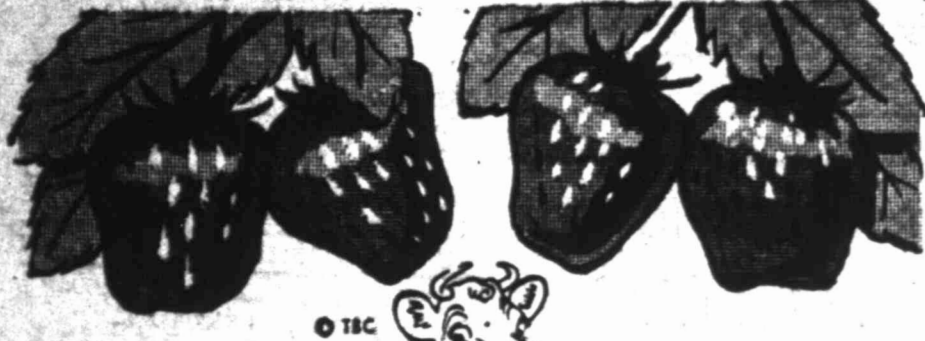

 Frank Costello, Frank Erickson and Joe Adams are high on the list. But the studies admit there are other big men who just aren't known.

Most of the personnel involved, though not necessarily the top men, are the grown up "young bucks" of the prohibition era. Many are members of the former Capone gang. The younger members of the gangs and syndicates are wayward youths who have been well trained in the ways of crime by the older hands.

Grew Up During War
 The syndicates really became big-time during the war, while most citizens were preoccupied with the fighting. Since then they have perfected their organization and consolidated their gains, taking advantage of the fact that any post-war era is likely to be lax in its attitude toward gambling and crime.

Crime experts credit the syndicates' new techniques of operation for a considerable part of their success. In addition to their cage use of the courts and maintenance of a correct legal facade, they have gone in for:

Organized public relations activities and lobbying to force the country and its public officials on legalized gambling. Their jobs function in every state capital, striving to get laws rigged so their operations will be made easier—if not wholly legal. Thousands of local officials are on their payroll, and there is evidence their influence extends to Washington.

Bold and ruthless plots are hatched to smear public officials who dare to fight the syndicates.

Mayor Fletcher Bowron of Los Angeles describes this technique: "You can see their pattern of action in cities all over the country. They start organized whistling campaigns against honest city officials. They will do everything they can to make the police look inefficient and corrupt. They even manage to make good traffic officers look like brutes and bums with their slick tactics. They work out elaborate schemes to frame police and city officials in scandals."

Mayor Dorothy Lee of Portland, Ore., says that seven weeks after her election "slot machine operators in Portland sought to organize and launch a campaign to get me out of office, one way or another."

The California Crime Commission believes that 20 per cent of the annual take in the slot machine racket is spent for bribery and corruption of public authorities. It describes the efforts of syndicates to influence public activity as "the perfect blueprint for plutocratic gangster government."

Girl Slays Her Twin Sister; Asserts She Would 'Do It Again'

FRESNO, CALIF. (AP)—A 14-year-old girl, yielding to long smoldering hatred, calmly killed her sleeping twin sister Sunday.

Then, said Dan E. Eymann, assistant district attorney, Alice Richard "almost defiantly" told him: "I hated her. I don't feel bad because my sister is dead, but I feel bad for my folks. This'll hurt them. I'd kill Sally again if I had the chance."

Sally Richard was killed by a single .22 rifle slug into her brain as she lay sleeping about 3 a.m. She was one of eight sons and daughters of Mr. and Mrs. Edward V. Richard. None of the family heard the shot. Eymann said a murder charge would be filed against Alice Monday.

The killing was an apparent case of what psychologists call sibling rivalry—rivalry between offspring of the same parents, said Sheriff J. W. Ripperdan. The twins were not identical.

Eymann quoted Alice: "I hated her for a long time and had it in the back of my mind to do it."

"I hated her because she was stupid and loud and always acting like a nut. I learned to hate her when we were in the sixth grade and ever since then this has built up."

A quarrel Saturday over use of a telephone brought her antagonism to a boil.

Sally had a baby-sitting job at a neighbor's. Alice joined her at 11 p.m.

The girls got home about 2 a.m. Sally went to sleep. Alice lay awake brooding.

She arose, went through the darkened house, groped until she found the rifle and cartridges—and shot Sally.

Then she telephoned the sheriff's office: "Come to 4721 Harvey Avenue, there's been a murder."

That awakened her mother, who grabbed the phone and said, "Don't be too hasty. She's having a nightmare."

Alice led her mother to Sally's body.

The horrified mother called officers right back: "It's true."

Last Surviving Child Of Ex-President Dies

LEWISTON, ME.—(AP)—President Rutherford B. Hayes' last surviving child—his only daughter—is dead at 82.

Mrs. Frances (Fanny) Hayes died Sunday night at the Maroonette Home here.

She was born Sept. 2, 1867 and went with her father to the White House when he was elected President in 1877.

Mrs. Hayes' mother died in 1888, her father four years later.

She was married to Ensign Harry E. Smith in 1887 but dropped the name of Smith on getting a divorce.

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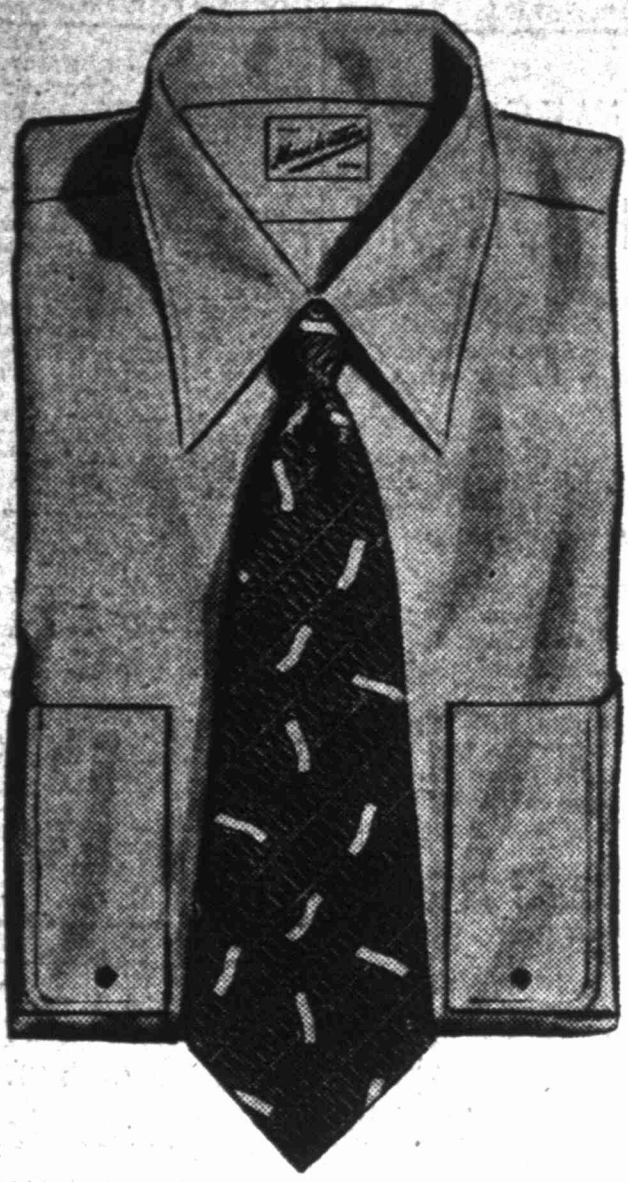
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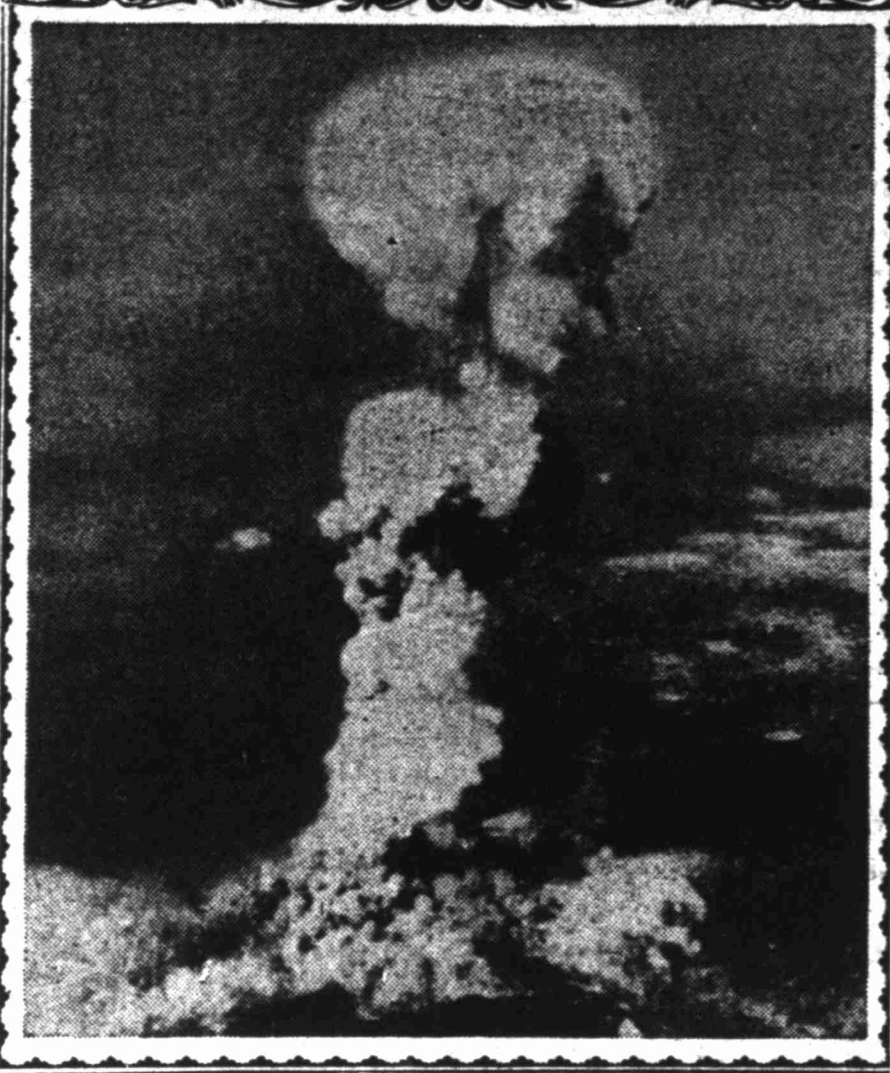
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HALF-CENTURY HIGHLIGHTS



Hiroshima, Aug. 6, 1945. A spectacular, mushrooming atomic cloud billows 20,000 feet into the air, informing the world that man had harnessed a power so great, so dreadful as to overtax the imagination. Only one more atomic bomb was to fall on Japan—at Nagasaki two days later—before World War II ended. Those two bombs alone killed more than 100,000 and injured many thousands more. Since then, the awful A-bomb and its possible successor, the infinitely more powerful Hydrogen Bomb, have been objects of more speculation, more research, more fear, than any other phenomena achieved by man. How to control atomic energy's power to kill, while exploiting its marvelous peacetime potential, is the most vital problem of the twentieth century.

Inside, Outside, They See Snakes

TAMPA, Fla.—(AP)—An eight-foot boa constrictor gave birth to 39 wriggling snakes at a pet shop Sunday night to the amazement of monkeys inside and spectators outside the store.

The mother had just arrived the day before from South America for delivery to a snake collector.

The proprietor, James M. Coker, said it was the first time he had heard of a boa constrictor having young in captivity.

The store was closed at the time, but started passers-by told police of the blessed event. Coker was called from church to take over.

He found the 18-inch youngsters crawling all over his shop and that two excited monkeys had turned over their cage.

Three National Guard Airmen Die As Planes Collide

FORT WORTH —(AP)—Three National Guard airmen died Sunday after two light planes collided in the air near the National Guard Eagle Mountain Lake Base.

The dead, all Fort Worth residents, were District Clerk Lewis D. Wall, Jr., 32, a second lieutenant in the National Guard.

Fred W. Bowden, 24, second lieutenant, an inspector at Consolidated Vultee Aircraft Corporation.

Charles R. McMinn, 26, first lieutenant, a law student at Southern Methodist University.

They were officers in the Army Air Section of the 49th Armored Division.

Wall and McMinn were in one plane and Bowden in the other.

Water Program Report Issued By WTCC Head

ABILENE —Significance of a \$200,000 domestic and irrigation water development program sponsored by the West Texas Chamber of Commerce and West Texas Domestic Water Association in cooperation with the Bureau of Reclamation was highlighted in a news letter from J. M. Willson, WTCC president, to the 180 directors of the WTCC-WTDWA.

The letter also transmitted a brief prepared by the Domestic Water Rights Committee of the WTDWA for President Truman's Water Resources Policy Commission which recommended that the federal water laws be amended to recognize "adequate water as a menace to the national welfare" and that "municipal water be given first priority use in federal water projects, and established as a criterion for dam building."

Commenting on the municipal and irrigation water program for West Texas, Willson commended the work of management and officers' committee, Homer D. Grant of Lubbock, WTDWA president, and of the association for rapid development of the projects.

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Crane Youth Dies In Fall From Cliff

CRANE—Ray Fred Omo, 16, Crane High School student, died late Saturday night on the Chandler Ranch 27 miles south of Sheffield after he plunged over a 175-foot cliff.

The accident occurred about 7:45 p.m. Saturday. Omo lived for about two hours while his companions sought frantically for a doctor.

Members of the four-youth party said Omo died about 9:15 p.m. At about 11 p.m. Dr. V. A. Sherrod of Iraan arrived on the scene. He pronounced the youth dead.

Omo, Delaine Schoenover, James Hobson and Marquis Stark had made the trip to the Chandler Ranch to fish in the Peos River.

They said they climbed a mountain late Saturday. Omo and another member of the party started down one side, while the other two took the other side. Neither of the three boys actually saw Omo fall.

They surmised he lost his footing in loose gravel, and rolled over a cliff they estimated to be between 150 and 200 feet high. They described it as being an almost-90 degree cliff. They believed Omo plunged straight down without a chance to check his fall.

Fractures Suffered
The youth suffered compound fractures of the right leg, a dislocated left ankle, internal injuries and a possible neck fracture.

Omo was a member of the Crane Baptist Church. He was a native of Crane. He was a popular member of Boy Scout Troop 87 here.

His mother, Mrs. Marie Omo, survives. Other survivors include two brothers, Amel Omo of College Station, Texas A&M College student, and George Omo of Crane; and one sister, Mrs. Maxine Jones of Fort Stockton.

Services will be conducted at 4 p.m. Tuesday in the Crane First Baptist Church. The Rev. H. D. Christian, pastor, will officiate. Interment will be in the Crane Cemetery under direction of the Hubbard Funeral Home of Odessa.

A. C. Holley, Sr., Dies At McCamey

McCAMEY—Andrew Burton Holley, Sr., 64, former director of the Security State Bank and at one time McCamey city secretary, died at his home here Saturday. He had been ill several months.

Funeral services were held at 4 o'clock Sunday in the First Methodist Church with the Rev. C. J. Mann, pastor, and the Rev. Fred J. Brucks of San Angelo, officiating. Burial was scheduled at Timson, where Holley lived as a child.

Brin Miller, 22, and C. M. Stanley, 22, died in the flames that destroyed a small house near Dallas early Sunday.

Marceline McKinney, 22, of Houston, was killed in a Houston traffic accident Sunday.

The badly mangled body of an unidentified man was found on railroad tracks in Houston Saturday night.

George Tobe Urdy, 33, negro, was killed late Saturday night in a two-car wreck near Taylor.

Mrs. Opal Mason, 25, was shot and killed in an Amarillo cafe Saturday night. Her estranged husband, Milton M. Mason, 22, was charged with murder.

Mrs. Betty Vance, 25, and Jack Sandifur, 39, were shot and killed Saturday night in a Snyder hotel. Mr. Vance's husband, Hiram Tom Vance, 28, was critically wounded. Justice of the Peace W. C. Davis ruled the shooting was a double murder and attempted suicide.

Gussie Mae Hampton, 35, was stabbed to death in West Dallas early Saturday in an argument with her husband.

Mrs. Marguerite Schmuch, 35, died in Orange Saturday from a pistol wound in the abdomen. Justice of the Peace Will Fountain said it was self-inflicted.

Two-year-old Tommy Cook died Saturday night 12 hours after he was burned in a fire that destroyed his home near Grapevine.

Robert Houston, two-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. N. H. Houston of Dallas, died Sunday when he fell from his parent's car into the path of another automobile.
