

## Texas Electric Is Winner In Odessa Damage Suit Trial ODESSA-A 70th District Court

jury Monday night answered the "half million dollar" question involved in the case of Charles B. Allmon versus the Texas Electric Service Company by saying the de-fendant is not indebted to the plaintiff in any sum. In answer to questions submitted

to it, the jury found, observers said, the utility company had installed and maintained its electric wires at proper height and it was in no manner or degree negligent concerning injuries received by Allmon. The jury, by its finding, foreclosed Allmon's claim against the utility company.

The trial opened here Thursday. and the first day of the proceedings was marked by testimony that the utility wires were strung at heights of 18 feet above the ground in violation of state laws. Utility company witnesses testified the wires were maintained at heights 25 feet above the ground. Whether the wires were insulated properly also was a point in the case, which attracted unusual interest.

The finding in favor of Texas Electric brought to an end the litigation which first was filed in federal court at Pecos, but which was dismissed there to be filed in district court here. William L. ## Communist Mentality

We people of the democratic world may be surprised to learn that, even though most of us aren't Communists, we often are a quite decent sort.

This comfort comes to us from Dr. Klaus Fuchs, British scientist recently sentenced to 14 years' imprisonment for handing atomic secrets to the Russians.

Over the years much has been written about the strange nature of the Communist mentality, particularly as it shows itself in the Soviet Union. But little that's been said matches Dr. Fuch's formal spy confession in providing real insight into this mentality.

Dr. Fuchs said that when he came to Britain from Germany he fell in naturally with extreme leftist people. They were his friends; he understood them and their thinking. And presumably all of them were governed by a deep attachment to Russia, the Communist Fatherland.

Gradually, however, Dr. Fuchs rose in prominence as a scientist. Soon he found himself working with other eminent British specialists on highly secret atomic projects at Harwell, England. Despite the fact that he now was working for the government, Dr. Fuchs still felt a primary loyalty to the political creed he shared with his first British friends. And hence he convinced himself it was proper to pass on to Russia, the Red Fatherland, the secrets he

But what concerns us more here is Dr. Fuchs' reaction to the people he met at Harwell. The scientists and other the United Nations-Vladimir Cleworkers, their friends and relatives were not like his other friends. They were solid Britishers, more or less content with their lot, earnestly doing their jobs. They didn't talk of overthrowing the government.

As time went on Dr. Fuchs grew to admire these people. He concluded, almost reluctantly and with evident astonishment, that they were decent folk. He found they had a calm assurance about life, and some kind of mysteri- don't you tell the story of our great ous wellspring that fed their driving energies.

What a startling confession of the bankruptcy of the Communist imagination. Dr. Fuchs could hardly accept the fact that anyone not a Communist could be a decent individual. And his mind rejected entirely the idea that the motives which lead a non-Communist to pursue a decent life could be understood either by him or them.

This is a perfect example of what happens to a mind thoroughly poisoned by the fanciful propaganda, the pat thinking, the deceitful ideology of totalitarian communism. It makes for a mental isolation so complete that it almost is impossible for the afflicted individual ever to build a bridge to human beings whose minds are free.

## High Plains Croup Opposes Changes In **Present Water Laws**

AMARILLO —(P)— The Texas Water Code Committee Tuesday had moved on to Wichita Falls for another session to consider what the state's water laws should be. It left here after a day-long meeting in which a parade of High Plains farmers and lawyers defended present underground water

conservation laws. The committee was created by the Legislature last year to study and recommend changes in the state's surface water laws. But underground water supplies came in for a good deal of atten-

tion at the meeting here. Four witnesses told the commit tee and the several hundred farmers and ranchers attending the session that they favor the measure adopted by the Legislature last year. They said it authorizes optional control on the local level. Inseparably Interrelated

Rogers Kelley, state senator from Edinburg and chairman of the committee, said the committee had learned that the surface water problem is inseparably interrelated with underground water.

The proposed Canadian River Dam came in for much discussion at a morning session of the com-

Andrew Rollos, a member of the State Board of Water Engineers. and William Broadhurst, Austin, chief of the U.S. Geological Survey in Texas, emphasized three

1. The underground water on the High Plains is a static reservoir. unreplenished by any underground 2. There is no connection be-

tween subterranean water and the Canadian River.

3. The underground supply may be reduced by pumpage to an uneconomical level in many areas on the High Plains.


