WASHINGTON - (4) -Dwight D. Eisenhower's statement that America has disarmed beyond the point of safety prompted congressional demands Friday for a new look at the military budget. Senator Ferguson (R-Mich) proposed that Eisenhower be called before the Senate Appropriations Committee.

Chairman Cannon (D-Mo) of the House Appropriations Committee said the five-star general's statement bolsters his own belief that military spending can't be cut in a major way.

Experiments show that superior turkeys cannot be raised unless they are treated kindly and are in charge of one person, who always dresses in a certain way. A stranger frightens and worries them, and they be-

Expanding U.S. Economy

Remember when we used to hear that the U.S. economy was "mature" and that there weren't any more frontiers of growth?

That kind of talk seems pretty foolish now. The general business level is far above where it was in the shaky 1930's when the gloomy prophecies were made. More striking still, great new frontiers have opened up which are providing thousands of jobs, hundreds of novel products, a higher standard of living for almost all.

A good example is the electrical-electronic-atomic field, still almost in its infancy but growing remarkably. Another, already broadly expanded and continuing to swell in size, is the chemical industry.

By this and other measures, the chemical industry has become the premier enterprise of the nation—| senators. surpassing the automobile industry.

With horizons in the chemical field still widening, no expert wants to predict the end of this amazing growth. It stands in conclusive answer to those who felt that the closing of America's geographic frontier spelled doom for

It's thoroughly clear there's been no closing down of the technological frontier. And so long as there is not, we don't have to view the future with long faces.

But the nation's economy must be governed in a way to keep that frontier steadily open. For the latest unemployment figures show that new job seekers are pouring into the labor market in substantial numbers every day. Only a dynamic industry and commerce can absorb them and prevent real hardship.
