C-SW Kent Wildcat Develops Oil Shows Christian Rites Mark Good Friday . In Pennsylvanian

Barnsdall Oil Company and Seaboard Oil Company of Delaware No. 1 Spires, Central-Southwest Kent County wildcat, six and one-half miles north of the Cogdell-Canyon field, developed some shows of oil and gas in a Pennsylvanian lime at

Those shows came during a threehour drillstem test. Gas flowed at the surface in 39 minutes. The gas volume was at the rate of 150,000 cubic feet per day.

No fluid came to the top while the tester was open. Recovery was 985 feet of fluffy, heavily oil and gas cut drilling mud, with no signs Gravity 39 Degrees

Gravity of the oil was 39 degrees. Some observers estimated the fluid to have been 60 per cent oil. Others say the mud was about 10 per cent

When 11 stands of the drill pipe remained to be pulled from the drillstem test at 6,760-6,800 feet, fluid was unloaded from the top three of those 11 stands. It was a part of the 985 feet of oil and gas cut mud which constituted the total recovery from the test.

Crockett Test Sprays Distillate-Cut Mud

More signs of petroleum were developed at Magnolia Petroleum Company No. 1 Clayton, Southeast Crockett County wildcat, nine miles southeast of Ozona.

Those shows came in a drillstem test in the Ellenburger at 8,667-8.695.5 feet.

The tool was open four hours. No water cushion was used. Gas showed at the surface in 10 minutes. Minimum gas volume was at the rate of 250,000 cubic feet per

After the tool had been open one hour and five minutes, a very light spray of distillate cut mud appeared at the surface.

That had changed to a spray of mud cut distillate at the end of the test. Recovery was 1,330 feet of gas and distillate cut drilling mud. There were no signs of formation

Boil sugar, water and salt to the soft ball stage (234°F). Pour slowly over stiffly beaten egg whites and continue beating until cold. Carefully fold in crushed berries and then the whipped cream. Turn into mold and pack in ice and salt for about 4 hours or freeze in freezing tray of a mechanical refrigerator. When ready to serve, garnish with whipped cream and strawberries cut into eights. Yield: 8 servings.

Critical Gap In Senate

Senator Arthur H. Vandenberg's recent proposal for a non-partisan commission to study foreign policy points up how sorely missed in the Senate these days is the voice of the Republicans' leading foreign affairs spokesman. Not only his party but the whole country is the loser.

Presumably ill health will compel Vandenberg to keep to the sidelines most of the time from now until his term expires in 1952. He does not intend to run again.

There's no doubt Vandenberg is the man who made the bi-partisan foreign policy a working formula in Congress. That service has been of inestimable value to the nation at a time in history when the United States needed to show a united front to a world plagued by communism.

Vandenberg uniquely was fitted for this role. He dedicated himself in recent years almost entirely to foreign issues. As a specialist he gained stature in the eyes of both parties. His remarks took on added weight because he was not constantly embroiled in the daily verbal brawling on domestic questions.

Strangely, too, his influence seemed the greater because he was an isolationist before he was an internationalist. His colleagues felt in him something of the fervor of the convert. His dramatic shift, made in response to the realities of atomic and guided missile warfare, was the real beginning of his leadership in the Senate.

Within the Senate Republican group there developed a sort of division of labor. Vandenberg carrying the burden in the foreign field and Senator Taft piloting domestic policy.

Though many of his colleagues didn't go the whole way toward sharing his internationalist views, the Michigan senator often was eloquent enough to persuade them to follow him on key matters like the Marshall Plan and the foreign arms aid program.

Up to now no other Senate Republican has showed McCarthy has an engaging manner, Lewis is the inside story back of the similar power to command the support of his party colleagues for a broadly internationalist foreign program. The internationalists in both parties, who constitute an overwhelming majority in the Senate, are regretful that no one is yet rising to take Vandenberg's place.

Hopes once had been pinned on Senator John Foster Dulles, veteran of many an international parley, but his defeat in New York last Fall dashed them.

Some talk of Senator Lodge of Massachusetts as a likely successor, but thus far he has not made great strides toward establishing himself as a foreign affairs leader.

It will be unfortunate if strong new leadership does not emerge to fill the gap Vandenberg is leaving. For the United States has not yet won the cold war. It still has great need of presenting to Europe and the rest of the world a single determined front.


