### Texas Righters Hurl Challenge On FEPC At Truman Regulars

DALLAS — (AP) — States' Rights Democrats put a chip on their shoulder Wednesday night and dared Truman Democrats to knock it off. "We challenge the black and tan faction of the Texas party at their dinner in Austin next Saturday to show the political courage either to approve or disapprove the President's FEPC bill," read an unanimously adopted resolution.

The resolution was the climax of a gathering of about 100 persons to hear Leander Perez, director of the Washington office of the States' Rights Democrats. His theme was the "Truman-Pendergast Road to Ruin."

Mrs. P. R. Carlton of Dallas read the challenge, addressed to Democrats who plan to attend the \$25-a-plate fund raising dinner in Austin Saturday.

The resolution commended Texas Senators Tom Connally and Lyndon B. Johnson for voting against the FEPC.

Judge W. M. Holland, vice president of the Southern Democratic Club, which sponsored Wednesday night's dinner, predicted that any Democrat who dared make a speech at the Austin dinner favoring the FEPC "would be thrown out the window."

Palmer Bradley of Houston hinted that his group might have a candidate in the race for Texas governor this Summer.

### Warren Warns Oil Industry Faces Government Control

AMARILLO—(P)—A. D. Weatherly of Amarillo was named president of the Panhandle Producers and Royalty Owners Association at its annual meeting here.

Other officers elected late Wednesday included Jack Oats of Stinson, ex-officio vice president; Gene Green ofampa, vice president; F. V. Wallace of Amarillo, secretary, and M. T. Johnson of Amarillo, treasurer.

Wednesday night J. Ed Warren of Midland, president of the Independent Petroleum Association of America, warned that the industry was faced with a threat of "government management."

"It is now apparent that in certain parts of Congress and the Administration a strong trend toward governmental management is being developed for the petroleum industry," he said.

Warren said that "Governmental management of industry means political management and will be detrimental to the public's interests."

Warren also pointed out that State Railroad Commission figures show crude oil imports by 11 major companies will be slightly higher the last six months of the year than current figures.

He said the total expected daily crude imports during the last six months of the year are placed at 488,750 barrels, compared with 460,800 estimated for May, and 472,284 in April.

### General Motors Bets Cool Billion On Five-Year Boom

By SAM DAWSON  
NEW YORK —(P)—General Motors is making a billion-dollar bet the next five years will be fat ones. It probably will ask you, its customer, to put up a sizeable part of the money.

One billion dollars is what the big auto concern will pay out extra to workers in the next five years, under the contract announced Tuesday. Certain "ifs" are attached.

Most of the billion will be paid out by you, the customer. It will be included in the cost of cars you buy—whether that means a hike in car prices, or just a cancellation of price cuts that might have come along.

### Bissell Appointed Commander Of Air Reserve Squadron

Lt. Col. C. E. Bissell of Midland has been appointed commanding officer of the 9818th Volunteer Air Reserve Training Squadron with headquarters here, it was announced Thursday. He succeeds Col. Eldine Perrin, who has been transferred to the San Angelo squadron.

The squadron is composed of three flights—A in Midland, B in Odessa and C in Big Spring. The Big Spring unit now is in the process of organization.

Bissell, who is engaged in the insurance business, said he will announce his staff within the next several days. He has been executive officer of the squadron since its establishment in July of last year. Col. W. W. Walmsley was the first commander.

The flights hold weekly training meetings in their respective cities and meet in joint session here each month.

During the war years, Colonel Bissell was commandant of cadets at Midland Army Air Field, and served later at Dalhart, Pote and other Air Force Installations. He is a director of the Chamber of Commerce and is active in civic affairs.

If the next five years don't turn out to be as prosperous for auto producers as GM is betting, GM likely will curtail production, and its five-year wage bill won't be boosted by all of that billion by any means. No Guaranteed Peace

If the wage-pension pattern GM is setting proves hard for some little fellows who supply it with parts, there might be strikes there, and these could tie up production at the assembly line.

So the five-year contract is no absolute guarantee of five years of labor-management peace in GM's overall operations, as some quarters are prone to hail it.

It probably is a well-calculated bet on GM's part. The auto giant apparently is counting on national income staying high. It appears to believe the free-spending era that has followed the war will continue for some time, that the dangers of a sharp deflation within the next five years are slim. And you might remember that at the same time the GM contract was announced, the tire companies raised their prices, and hinted of more hikes to come.

**Methodists Report Membership Gain**  
BIG SPRING —(P)—Reports made to the forty-first annual Northwest Texas Methodist Conference in session here show a membership gain of four per cent during the last year.

Dr. J. O. Haymes, Lubbock district superintendent, said Wednesday night the conference now has a membership of 94,262, an increase of 3,426 for the year.

He said donations increased nearly 20 per cent. Gifts for all purposes increased \$750,000 for a total of \$4,129,000.

Total building projects during the last year included \$1,141,000 spent on 17 new churches and nine new parsonages.

The conference body approved the joining of the theological schools at Southern Methodist University and Southwestern University. The proposal also must be approved by other conferences.

### Harry F. Sinclair Retires On Pension

NEW YORK —(P)—Harry F. Sinclair retired Wednesday as board chairman of the Sinclair Oil Corporation—an oil empire he founded on a shoestring 34 years ago.

He retired on a pension estimated at \$37,000 a year, but he will continue to serve as a director and a consultant. He also was named honorary chairman.

The 73-year-old magnate simply told the board he wished to retire under the company's pension plan and did not want to be re-elected.
