# Highway 214 Contract Awarded

A contract for the Highway 214 project, to include widening the road and construction of an overpass, was awarded this week by the Texas Highway Department.

Contract was awarded to Boswell and Crafton, Inc., and Austin Bridge Co. of Dallas. The low bid on the project was \$3,703,589.67.

The project is expected to require an

estimated 350 working days, and will be under Highway Department engineer Rhea E. Bradley of Littlefield.

George C. Wall, Jr., Lubbock District engineer, will supervise the project.

The contract will include grading, structures, flexible base, one and three-fourths surface treatment, seal coat and grade separation.

The project is located on Highway 214 from the Bailey County line to Friona, at

the juncture of Spur 270, and from .2 mile south of the Farmer County line to the county line.

Included at the north end of the project is an overpass to span the Santa Fe Railway leading into the southern edge of Friona. The added safety factor of the overpass has long been desirable for the motorists, which includes school buses, which cross the railroad every day.

City Manager A.L. [Jake] Outland, regarding the awarding of the contract, said "It is especially gratifying to hear of the final approval, and acceptance of the bids and the prospective initiation of the work on this important project."

"One of the first major problems of Friona that I heard upon arrival almost 13 years ago was 'we must do something about the flooding draw and dangerous railway crossing at the south end of Main Street.'

Each mayor and city council in the interim has been interested and involved with the project," he continued.

"Right-of-way acquisition began in 1970 and we felt everything was in order about two years ago, when the freeze was placed on Federal Highway Funds. Both county and city officials deserve recognition for extensive public efforts to promote this project," Outland concluded.

## ANNUAL SURVEY MADE

### County Retains High Rank In Cattle Count

PARMER COUNTY—second only to Deaf Smith County in the fed cattle industry—showed another increase in production during 1973, according to the annual southwestern area survey conducted by Southwestern Public Service Company.

While a declining cattle market has affected 1974 production, the figures for the past year revealed Parmer County's fed cattle production had risen approximately 8,000 head over the 1972 report which showed 428,900.

The SWPSC survey is made annually in the company's southwestern area, which includes the Panhandle-Plains of Texas, the Oklahoma Panhandle and eastern New Mexico. Total fed production for the area was 4,962,763 head during 1973. The total in '72 was about 4.7 million.

Last year's increase, however, was not as much as the jump from '71 to '72. The

29-county area surveyed by the company in Texas showed a total of just over four million head—up about 245,000 over the previous year.

Deaf Smith again led the way last year with a reported 602,589 fed cattle production. Parmer County followed with 437,000 while Castro County was third with 385,500, an increase of about 9000 over the previous year. Deaf Smith's increase was approximately 28,800. Totalling the three-county production, the "magic triangle" came up with 1,428,389, about 15 per cent of the production on the Panhandle-Plains.

The one-time capacity of the seven feedyards listed in Parmer County was 285,500; of eight feedyards in Deaf Smith County, 299,000; and of 11 in Castro County, 213,500. The "magic triangle" total capacity adds up to 798,000 head.

The recent report includes a list of cattle feedlots and their

capacity, as well as packing plants and their locations. Charts also indicated the tremendous growth of the industry in this area since 1966. Slightly over one million head were fed in the southwestern area in 1966 and the '73 figure had climbed to 4.9 million. Seventeen packing plants

were listed in the SWPSC service area with a total average capacity of 2,474,080.

Feedlots listed in Parmer County included Bovina Feeders, Inc., Parmer County Cattle Company, Cattletown, Inc., Far-Tex Feedlot, Friona Feed Yard, Inc., Paco Feed Yard and Hi-Plains Feed Yard.

### Residence Razed, Farm Office Burns

The Friona Volunteer Fire Department has been kept hopping during the past week, with a number of calls, including five during a 24-hour period on Sunday.

Two of the fires caused extensive damage. The home of Mr. and Mrs. Louis Singleterry in the Rhea community was completely destroyed about 1:30 a.m. Monday.

The Hub office of Ag-Chem

Farm Services was completely destroyed by fire, in a case that was almost surely arson.

In other fire calls, firemen had to extinguish an oil pickup that had been pulled under the railroad bridge just east of Friona and set afire; extinguished an air conditioner at 911 West Fourth, and were called to the Charles Myers place Thursday at noon where cotton trailers caught fire.

The Singleterry family was away from home Sunday night when the fire started. Firemen theorized it could have been started at the fuse box, and might have been caused by lightning.

The only thing salvaged at the residence was the garage, plus a washer and dryer from the utility porch, a television set and a recliner from the living room.

The fire was discovered by Mr. and Mrs. Joe Elycio, who live about two miles away. The house belonged to Melvin Sachs, for whom Singleterry works. Outside of the items mentioned, the family lost all of their belongings, including clothing.

Fire Chief Ralph Shirley said the fire at the Hub office of Ag-Chem definitely looked like the work of arsonists. There had been two barrels of oil in the building, which were evidently drained prior to a fire being set.

Several items, including a telephone and other office equipment, were taken from the office, but were dumped in a ditch about two miles away.

Shirley issued a reminder that severe penalties can be imposed for the arrest and conviction of an arson charge.

He also issued a plea to motorists to please pull over and allow fire trucks to pass when they are answering a call. "We have had some instances lately when we have had trouble getting around traffic. Seconds are precious when you are answering a fire," Shirley says.

All members, and potential members, of the Business Activities Committee are urged to attend.

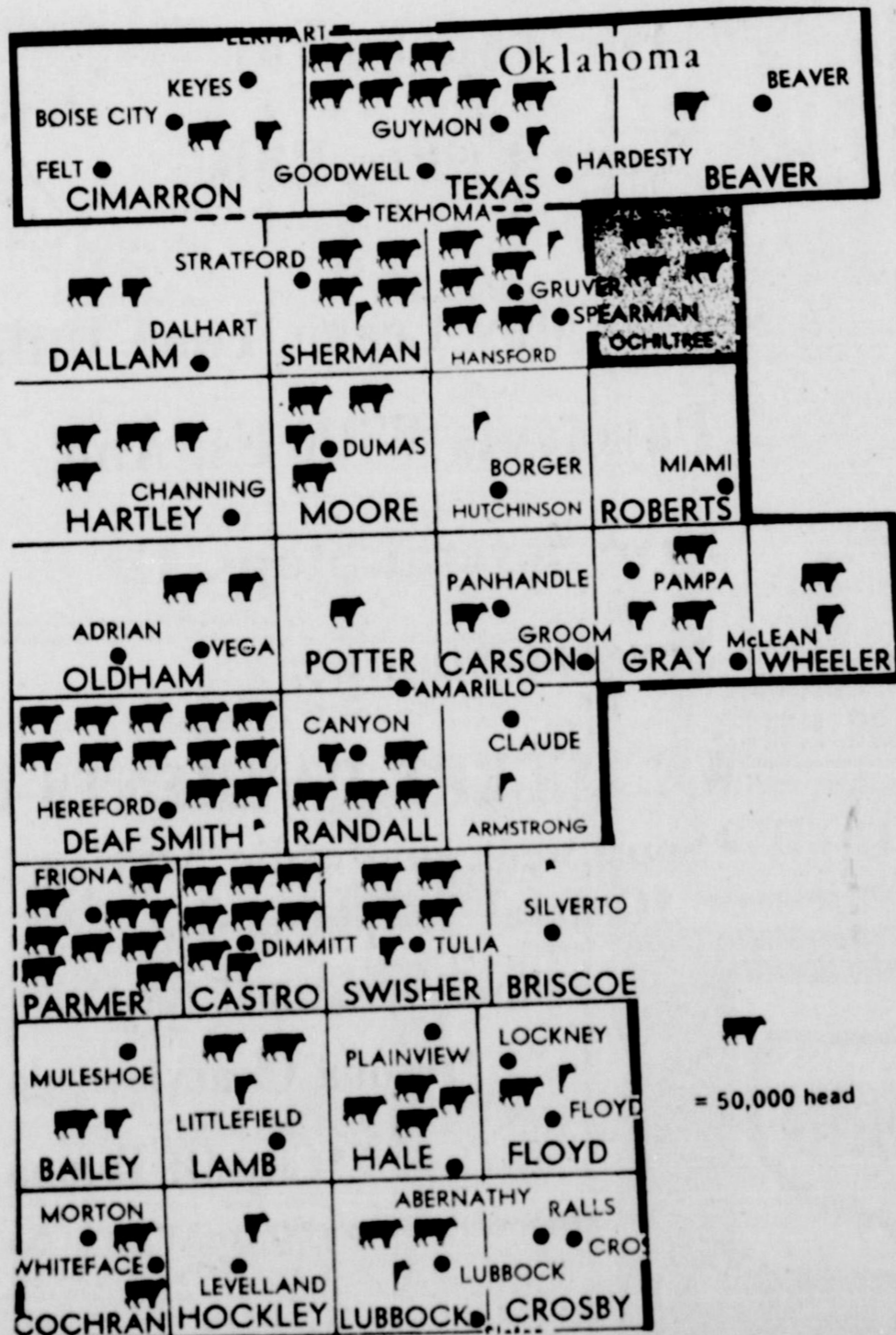
Commencement exercises were scheduled for the eighth grade class Saturday, June 1, also at the Grade School Auditorium. This program also is slated for 8:30 p.m.

## 45 YEARS AGO—JUNE 5, 1929

## 40 YEARS AGO—JUNE 8, 1934

Mrs. A.H. Boatman was appointed to membership on the Texas Centennial Advisory Board as one of four members from Parmer County, according to a letter Mrs. Boatman received from Will H. Mayes, temporary secretary of the Texas Centennial Commission.

## 35 YEARS AGO—JUNE 9, 1939

The City of Friona is soon to have a new fire truck, which is now being built and nearing completion in the work shops of Reeve Chevrolet Company, with Charles Bainum, one of the firemen, doing and supervising the work of building.

## 30 YEARS AGO—JUNE 9, 1944

On Saturday afternoon, June 10, Friona will be featured on a historical broadcast over station KGNC by Miss Laura V. Hamner of Amarillo.

Some time Monday afternoon, Mrs. Pearl Kinsley was uninjured when her car overturned while enroute to Friona. Mrs. Kinsley sustained only a few minor bruises, but the car was considerably damaged.

## 25 YEARS AGO—JUNE 10, 1949

On Monday of last week, Day Brothers, house movers of Hereford, arrived in Friona and began preparations for moving the home of Rev. Tommie Allen, pastor of the First Baptist Church, from its old location to make room for the proposed new auditorium to be built on the ground it formerly occupied.

## 20 YEARS AGO—JUNE 4, 1954

The city has begun making street markers for Friona, a badly needed commodity to assist strangers in finding addresses. The Lions Club set up 64 of the markers on Wednesday, and still have 52 to place on the corners.

Thirty-four cars of a Santa Fe freight were derailed Sunday at the east switch at Summerfield. The cars were filled with perishable goods. Five or six carloads of fruit were taken to Hereford to reload on other cars.

## 15 YEARS AGO—JUNE 4, 1959

W.O. (Bill) Wright, 39, drowned sometime Friday night following an unexplained accident at Lake Conchas in New Mexico.

Hail cut a destructive swath through Parmer County, in the shape of a new moon from Rhea to east of Hub, Hail was stacked up a foot deep next to buildings on some farms following the storm.

## 10 YEARS AGO—JUNE 4, 1964

Peggy McNair, who is the reigning "Miss Wool of Texas," paid a visit to the Otho Whitefield sheep ranch this week. Whitefield is an official in both the Columbia Sheep Breeders of America and the Texas Columbia Breeders.

**FOR 1974**

**Farm Program Signup Begins**

It is time for growers to certify their wheat, barley, oat and rye acreages under the 1974 farm programs.

Any acreage or small grain that a farmer wants (or needs) to have made a matter of record should be measured and certified before harvest and before any other use is made of the land planted to the crop.

Farmers will sign that they intend to participate in the program(s) at the time they certify their acreages. The question has been asked "Why sign to participate in the 1974 farm programs?"

There are at least three reasons which are (or can be) important.

1. It behooves farmers to protect their farm's allotments. They do this by measuring their acreages and reporting them to their ASCS Office during the signup period.

2. A farmer who signs to participate in the programs has automatic insurance coverage on the crops planted on the farm. He will probably receive some benefits in the event that the farm's 1974 production is low due to adverse weather, insects, or other circumstances beyond the farmer's control.

3. A participating farm is eligible for a deficiency payment should such payments be triggered by a low market price. Certainly, it is hoped that the market will never go that low; however, no one can predict what might happen in the coming marketing year.

One other thing, not mentioned above, is that the wheat, feed grains, cotton, soybeans and other price supported crops produced on a participating farm are eligible for price support through the loan program. This loan program is sometimes a useful measuring tool.

If a farmer has a disaster strike his crop, he should contact the ASCS Office and report the situation before doing anything to the land where the crop is planted. He should know (by carefully measuring) the acreages involved before contacting the ASCS Office.

July 15, July 15 is the final date for enrolling a farm in the feed grain and cotton programs.

What does it take for a farm to be eligible for all program benefits? Farmers must plant a total acreage of crops for harvest equal to the total allotments for their farm or the farm will lose allotments for 1975; however, if a farmer doesn't have enough crops planted to protect the farm's allotments, he may waive deficiency payments on one or more of the crops and protect the farm's allotments for 1975. This applies even if there is actually no payment due in 1974.

What it all boils down to is—if a farmer will make a visit to his ASCS Office, there is a way (in all cases) whereby he can protect his farm's allotments. All wheat, feed grains and cotton growers who have not already done so, are urged to call at their ASCS Office at their earliest convenience.

## Water, Inc. Elects New Board President

An optimistic report on energy availability for operation of a water import system and the election of a new president highlighted a meeting of the Water, Inc., Board of Directors at a meeting in Lubbock on May 17.

Edward G. Weber, Amarillo, vice president of Southwestern Public Service Co., told Water, Inc., directors that by the year 2000, projected electrical needs for all purposes in Texas drastically shrink the percentage needed for the import program.

In that year Weber said, the

import project would require only five percent of the total state needs, although in 1980, the requirement would be 19 percent. Weber and K. Bert Watson, also of Amarillo, and president of Pioneer Natural Gas Co., both said that

operation of the import system during hours that did not coincide with peaking requirements for other purposes would further ease overall generating

capacities. Both Weber and Watson are Water, Inc. directors.

Watson emphasized that

sufficient energy fuels were available within the United States for all purposes for hundreds of years. "It is just a matter of developing these fuel sources," he said.

Geo. W. McCleskey, a Lubbock attorney and one of the founders of Water, Inc., more than eight years ago, was elected president of the regional organization to fill the unexpired term of A.L. Black, Friona. Black resigned when he was appointed to a six year term on the Texas Water Development Board.

McCleskey has been serving as first vice president for more than a year. Second vice president, A.C. Verner, also of Lubbock, was elevated to the first vice president post.

In accepting the presidency, McCleskey pledged a continuing effort to the end that importation of water to Western Texas and Eastern New Mexico become a reality.

**Rate Increases Sought By SWPS**

Southwestern Public Service Company announced today that it will seek the first general rate increase from its Texas customers since 1967.

The proposal requests an average increase of 10 per cent, to be effective with billings in September. The request is addressed to municipal governments in the communities served by the company, those bodies being the regulatory authority in Texas.

Southwestern has had only two previous rate increases, 23 and seven years ago, respectively. The 1967 increase was 7.62 per cent. There have been 14 rate reductions since 1942, when the company took its present form, according to Ed Weber of Amarillo, vice president of the company.

Increased costs of labor, materials, money and taxes were cited by the company as the major reasons for the rate increase request. Spokesmen said that a standard wooden pole had increased in cost by 175 per cent since the last rate change, with a 365 per cent increase in the price of crossarms used on the poles.

Other increases in costs since 1967 include a 162 per cent rise in the price of steel for substations; a 124 per cent increase in copper wire; labor costs up nearly 54 per cent and taxes going up by almost 57 per cent. Interest paid on borrowed money has jumped up 68 per cent.

The company pointed out such increases in other prices since 1967 as 108 per cent for ground beef; 67 per cent for coffee; 58 per cent for milk; 28 per cent for margarine; and 100 per cent for lettuce as indications that its request for an average increase of 10 per

cent was reasonable.

For residential service in homes which are not electrically heated and do not have electric water heaters, the new schedule would be as follows: 7.10 CENTS per kwh for the first 50 kwh used each month 4.70 CENTS per kwh for the next 50 kwh used each month 2.35 CENTS per kwh for the next 900 kwh used each month 1.90 CENTS per kwh for all additional kwh used each month

Southwestern's average residential customer uses 536 kilowatt-hours a month, said Weber. Under the new rates, the monthly bill will be increased \$1.38, or 8.9 per cent.

The company has a fuel-cost adjustment as a part of its approved rates. This allows it to pass on to customers increases in fuel costs.

However, fuel is only about 20 per cent of the total cost of providing service and there is no similar protection against the increases that have taken place in the other 80 per cent of the costs necessary to provide service.

In connection with the fuel-cost adjustment, it is charged on the basis of the number of kilowatt-hours used by the customer. As a result, it has the least effect on customers using smaller amounts of energy, both as to amount and percentage of bill, and has the most effect, both ways, on larger consumers.

Southwestern's peak demands for electric service fall in a short three to four-month summer season because of irrigation of agricultural crops and air conditioning. In order to more evenly balance the

year-round load on the company's system and use the generating equipment and transmission and distribution lines most efficiently and economically, the company offers electric heating rates during the winter season. This type of rate structure benefits all residential customers, whether they heat electrically or not, because it brings in more revenue dollars, which helps keep all rates lower, than would be the case without the incentive for those customers preferring electric heat.

The new general service rate that applies to most commercial customers, is as follows:

7.1 CENTS per kwh for the first 100 kwh used each month 4.6 CENTS per kwh for the next 900 kwh used each month 2.4 CENTS per kwh for the next 6,000 kwh used each

month 1.4 CENTS per kwh for the next 6,000 kwh used each month .9 CENTS per kwh for all additional kwh used each month

The company projects that the rate increase will produce annual revenues in Texas, where it serves the great majority of its customers, of \$6,161,000.00. Of this amount, \$3,021,000.00 will go for additional taxes.

In the face of high interest costs that now range from 9 to 11 per cent, the company's rate of return on its investment is 5.87 per cent. If the proposed new rate had been in effect during 1973, it would have yielded a rate of return of 6.61 per cent. Texas law allows as much as eight per cent rate of return for utility companies.

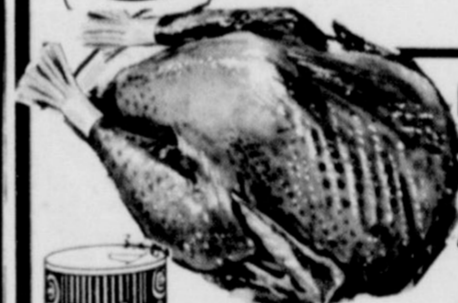

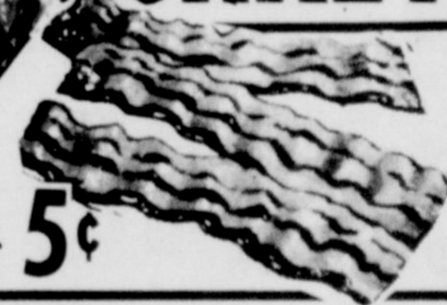

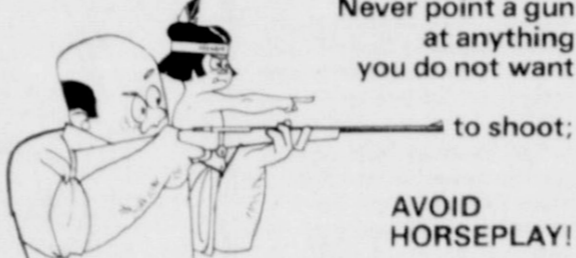
### Young Folks Ready For Summer Activity

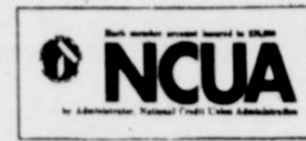

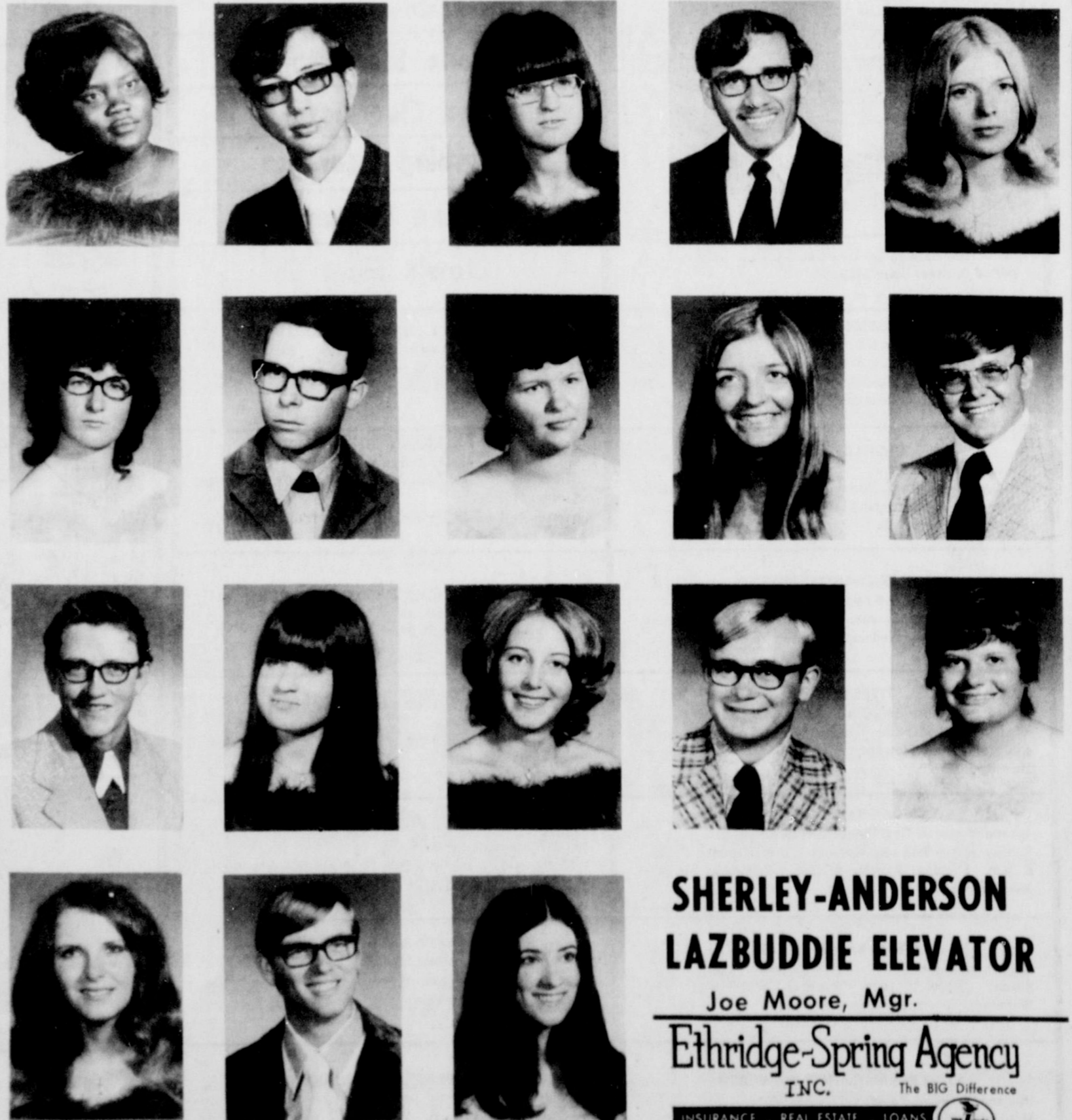

**AT CONVENTION**

**Delegates Defeat Judiciary Article**

The delegates to the Texas Constitutional Convention have spent the past two weeks engaged in what has so far been a fruitless task. After long and heated debates on the important Judiciary Article, which will provide the base for the Texas court system in the new constitution, delegates voted to defeat the article, in effect sending it back to the committee for a new start.

The major source of dispute on the article, according to Representative Bill Clayton, Springlake, were provisions which would have established a system of circuit courts and eliminated the present duties of the county judge, and a provision which would have allowed the state to appeal adverse lower court decisions in certain instances. Representative Clayton reported that it was a coalition between the opponents of these two issues

that led to the defeat of the entire article.

One attempt was made to salvage the work done on the article, but after heated debate on a proposed "compromise" substitute for the article, it too went down to defeat. The Committee on the Judiciary must now try again to work out a document acceptable to a majority of the delegates, according to Clayton.

The Convention has now moved into consideration of the proposed General Provisions Article, which contains more potentially controversial sections than any other article. Included under the General Provisions topics are such subjects as right to work, branch banking, abortion, usury rates, gambling and the environment. Representative Clayton stated that debate on this article should be as long and heated as has been any article thus far in the convention.

**Insurance Program**

**Increases Benefits**

Farmers in Parmer County are eligible for a 25 per cent increase in irrigated wheat insurance benefits under the All-Risk Federal Crop Insurance program for the 1973 crop.

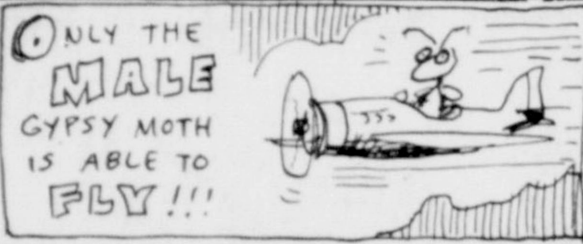
Mike E. Custer, field representative from the District Office at 1205 Texas Avenue, Room 214, Lubbock, Texas 79401, said today that insured farmers are now able to value their guaranteed production under the FCIC program at \$2.50 per bushel compared to \$2.00 a year ago.

"This change has been made to help keep pace with insurance coverage in the face of rising farm production expenses estimated to have jumped an overall average of 25 percent in the past two years in the major wheat producing counties of Texas, Oklahoma and New Mexico," Custer says.

In addition, the federal agency has given Parmer County wheat producers a virtual "pat-on-the-back" by increasing its production guarantees for the 1975 crop year based largely upon good insurance experience in the area due to good farming practices.

Custer will be in the county for the next few days advising farmers of the FCIC program changes and taking applications from those interested in participating in the volunteer insurance program. He may be contacted through the FCIC District Office or the local ASCS County Office.

During the 36 years Federal Crop Insurance has been available to farmers, the program has underwritten the local farm economy in Texas by protecting growing wheat crops with an insured value in excess of \$11.7 million.
