

The first step in the treatment of poliomyelitis is to make the diagnosis as early as possible. This is not always easy because the disease really begins several days before there are any signs of paralysis. Also the symptoms during this early stage are often like those of an ordinary cold or mild infection. Secretary of State Acheson is said to be sounding out Congress to see if the lawmakers want to meet with him regularly to discuss foreign affairs, in the manner of their recent get-together in the capital.

This seems an excellent plan, provided both sides do their utmost to break down the formidable barrier that Itill exists between them. Not much headway was made toward a better understanding in their first meeting.

Next time out the participants will benefit if their conference is less of a performance. The noise and glare of newsreel and television equipment made the discussion itself almost incidental the last time.

For his part, Acheson in the future must behave less like a professor of international law and more like an approachable human being. There's no excuse for frosty aloofness in a meeting whose whole aim is improved understanding among men.

Maybe the next session should be held in a non-air Feonditioned building in the heat of Washington's Summer, Tso the secretary would have to doff his coat and tie. Then occasion.

As for Congress, though it has a right to expect warmer treatment from Acheson, it shouldn't expect him to make over his personality completely to suit the law-

The proposal has been circulated mong delegates to the UN Com-mission for Conventional Armanents in preparation for a discusion by the commission's working committee Thursday afternoon. Cenventional arms are rifles, arillery, navel and aircraft and almost all other weapons except the stom bomb and weapons of mass

The U. S. document proposes that a Conventional Arms Administration should be made up of countries represented in the UN Security Council. Functioning at UN headquarters, it would receive information on arms from each nation, check on the information, and report violations of the arms code as they are found.

PARIS (F) Delegates from all guropean nations Thursday studied French proposals for a Buropean Parliament to centrel their coal and steel production.

The partiament was the keystone of a French plan for the West Eu-ropean coal-steel merger French Foreign Minister Robert Schuman has recommended as a means of preventing future wars, The six nations — France Beligium, The Netherlands, Luxem-

bourg, West Germany and Italyall have agreed to put their coal and steel production under the control of an over-all authority with powers to make its dictates stick. Britain, Europe's largest producer of coal, has balked at giving an international body so in uch power over her major industries and is

staying out of the talks. In what appeared to be a move to meet the British objection, the French Wednesday suggested that the coal-steel authority be respon-sible to the proposed federal parlia-The authority's decisions ment. would be reviewed in a public debate each year, top French economic planner Jean Monnet said at a

closed session. Monnet suggested that national legislatures choose the members of the Biropean Parliament from within their own ranks, much as most of them now pick the members of the European Consultative

Assembly. Chiefs of the six delegations met Thursday to express their reactions

to the French plan. Britain's Labor government meanwhile prepared to stake its future in seeking House of Commons approval of its abstinence from the Schuman plan negotiations. Authoritative sources said Prime Minister Attlee had decided to seek a vote of confidence on a Conservative-Liberal motion demanding that Britain join the talks.

Should the Commons vote against the Laborites, who normally have a majority of only eight votes, the cabinet would resign.
