



### U. S. Seeks Aid In Korea But Expects To Bear Main Load

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The United States is quietly informing other interested United Nations members it would welcome participation of their ground forces in the fighting in Korea.

There is no expectation among top officials here, however, that the main burden of battle can or will be borne by other than American troops. Several reasons are advanced for this, the chief one being that the United States is the nation in the best possible position to do the job.

President Truman was asked at his news conference Thursday what he thought about ground forces from other countries joining the fight. He simply referred to a news statement which Secretary of State Acheson had made on Wednesday.

Acheson said the State Department was discussing the problem with the United Nations and the Army. Obviously, he added, any offer of troops would be most helpful.


"A sort of western Barretts of Wimpole Street."

### Comely Housewife, Mother Of Two, Is Strangled To Death

DETROIT — (AP) — A stranger's slaying of a comely housewife, mother of two children, stirred a full-scale police investigation Friday.

One man, a neighbor of the victim, was held for questioning. Pretty Mrs. Vivian Stanley, 37, was found dead in a weed patch Thursday, two miles from her Pinehurst Avenue home in a better class West Side district.

Mrs. Stanley was clad only in a nightgown and dressing robe. She had been garroted, apparently with a chain, and her neck was broken. Police said it was evidently the work of an enraged or sadistic killer.

Mrs. Stanley, wife of Crawford T. Stanley, a metallurgist, had been missing since the previous night. Another neighbor, D. W. Davis, 65, a field deputy for the Internal Revenue Bureau, told police Mrs. Stanley had asked him Wednesday night to stay with her daughter, Lucy, seven.

The mother said she was "going out for a little while," Davis said. The father and a son, Thomas, 14, have been on a Canadian fishing trip. They last were reported 100 miles north of Toronto.

Davis said he fell asleep about 3 a.m. and turned in an alarm when Mrs. Stanley failed to return later in the day.

A man walking down an alley discovered the body by chance. One of Mrs. Stanley's shoes lay in the alley. His mate was found three blocks away.

In the weed patch there was no evidence of a struggle. Police theorized that Mrs. Stanley was killed in a car and then thrown out.

A resident of the neighborhood reported hearing a woman scream about 11:30 p.m. Wednesday after which a car parked at the curb sped off. Police placed the killing at about that time.

Coroner Albert E. Harris said Mrs. Stanley's slayer apparently had throttled her with a chain "about the size of a dog leash" and then had forced her head back until the neck snapped.

The first question today deals with a problem which is all too common.

Q—My friend takes vitamins for gray hair and they are making her hair black. Are these safe to take and must one keep on taking them for a long time?

A—Unfortunately vitamins are not of help in making gray hair darken in human beings. There is one which alters the color of the hair in some animals but does not do the same thing to men or women. The experience which you recount therefore is most unusual and the treatment cannot be recommended generally.

Q—Should the family of a woman 74 years old insist that she go to see a doctor. Three sisters and two brothers have lived to between 86 and 88, gradually losing their memories and becoming senile. Is there any medication which would help?

A—Except for certain diseases which might be described as accidents, the age to which people live

### Britain's Doctors Demand Pay Hike

SOUTHPORT, ENGL.—(AP)—Britain's doctors threatened Thursday to quit working for the National Health Service unless the take-home pay of general practitioners is boosted.

Under the National Health Service all Britons are guaranteed free medical care.

A resolution approved by 400 delegates attending the British Medical Association's annual meeting called for a general withdrawal from the government-run health scheme because of delays in negotiations to raise the pay of general practitioners.

The delegates represent most of Britain's 60,000 doctors, of whom about 19,000 work for the national health service.

**Methodists Report West Texas Minister Missing In Korea**

NEW YORK — (AP)—The Methodist Church says Mrs. Lawrence Zellers of Westport, Texas, a missionary, is safe in Japan but her husband, also a missionary, is missing behind Communist lines in Korea.

The church Thursday night reported that six of its missionaries still were missing. Zellers' name was on the list.

The missing last were heard from in Kaesong, one and a half miles south of the 38th parallel in Korea. The report said Mrs. Zellers had been evacuated from Korea to Japan and would be returned to the United States.

**STRIKE BILL SHELVED**  
WASHINGTON — (AP)—The Senate Labor Committee Thursday shelved a bill to outlaw rail strikes. The 10 to one vote—with only Senator Donnell (R-Mo.) the bill's sponsor, voting to send it to the Senate for debate—confirmed a recommendation made by a subcommittee last week.

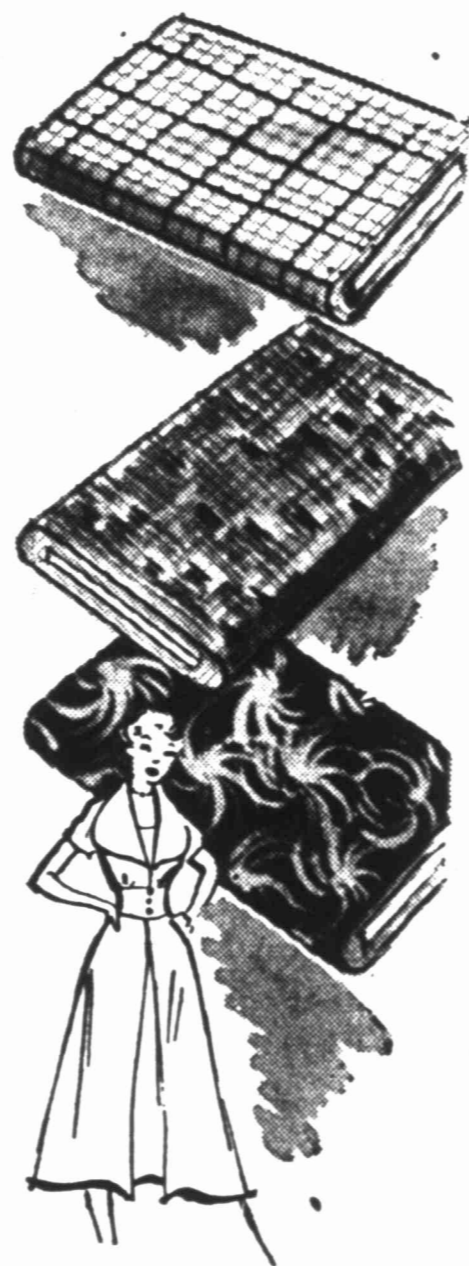

**Texas Stays Cool As Rains Range From Sprinkles To Deluges**

Scattered rains and cool temperatures for summer continued in Texas Friday.

Light rains at San Antonio, Austin, Cotulla, Laredo, and Fort Worth added to moisture reported Thursday in every section of the state.

The rains Thursday ranged from sprinkles to downpours. They kept temperatures surprisingly low for the middle of July. Laredo was high with 97 degrees. At the other end of the range was Dalhart, with a 74. The lowest temperature Thursday night was 53 at Amarillo and the highest, a 79 at Galveston.

At El Paso, the Rio Grande River rose to the highest level in recent years, boosted by drenching rains in New Mexico. At midnight the crest of the flood waters was about seven feet. Normally one can wade across the river bed.

Wichita Falls Thursday night reported a 24-hour measurement of 3.91 inches. Palestine received 1.54 inches and Victoria 1.21.

Up to seven and a half inches fell between Eldorado and Mertzon, in West Texas, Wednesday and Thursday.

The Dallas Weather Bureau reported 42 inch Thursday but some sections of the city had rain heavy enough to fill streets curb to curb.

# Will Korean Junket End In Another Dunkerque?

By HAL BOYLE  
NEW YORK —(P)— There is a growing uneasiness among Army veterans that the American expedition in Korea may end in another Dunkerque.

Time, they feel, is fighting right now on the side of the heavily armored North Koreans—and against the lighter-armed U. S. forces.

One retired, high-ranking officer I talked to felt that only an immediate mobilization of manpower and industry could stave off disaster in Korea—and perhaps other fronts to follow. He is one of the most experienced veterans of the last war, having fought in Africa, Sicily and Europe.

"We'll be lucky if we aren't pushed right back into the sea," he said. "The situation there is simply a matter of mathematics."

Like Kasserine Gap

"So far we've had to send a boy to do a man's work. We've had to throw in a couple of companies here—a battalion there—and watch them get chewed to pieces. It's the same thing we did at Kasserine Gap—feed small units in one at a time to be destroyed."

This officer felt there was real doubt whether enough reinforcements could be put into the field in time to avoid a complete withdrawal from Korea.

He pointed out that the North Koreans had bucked 100 miles in slightly more than two weeks—and that another 100-mile advance would carry them to the tip of the peninsula.

"We may be able to hold a defensive beachhead in the south, where the terrain is pretty mountainous," he said. "But it will be terribly difficult."

From Tokyo To Berlin

"The battle line is about 125 to 135 miles wide. To do the job right we ought to have at least six good divisions on the line—and two in reserve. That means eight divisions at the least. And eight divisions is an army—150,000 men or more."

"Where can we get that many men without mobilizing? We have only 12 divisions now all told, and they're stretched all around the world from Tokyo to Berlin."

What worried him also is the fact Russia has a reported 85 divisions in being, and some 200 more in reserve.

"She is just throwing a left jab at us in Korea, testing us out," he said. "And she isn't even using her own men—she's using satellite troops."

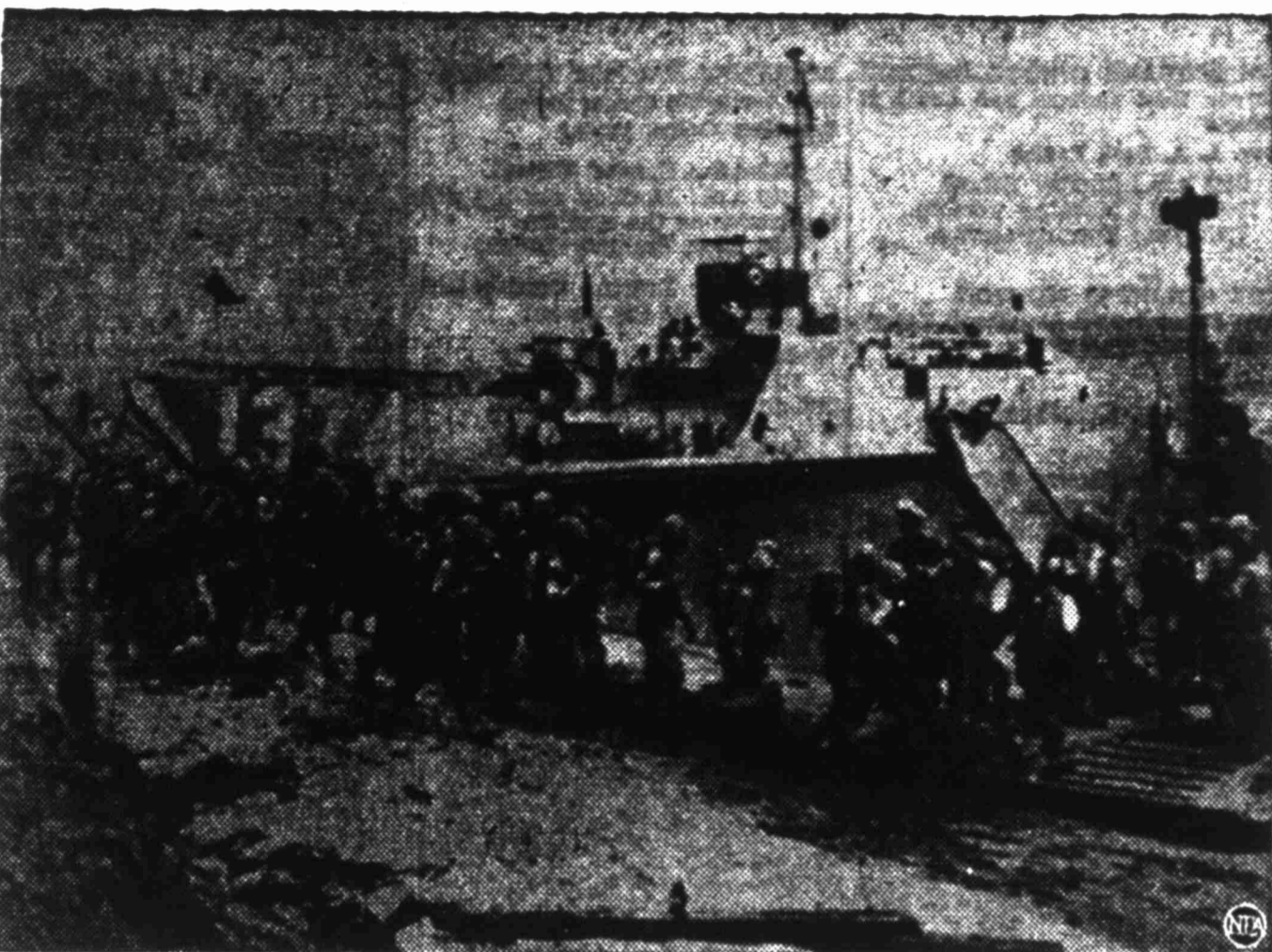

## West Texans Invited To Formal Opening Of Andrews Library, Agriculture Building

ANDREWS—Citizens from all of West Texas are invited to attend the formal opening of Andrews County's new and completely modern agricultural building and library. Open house will be held from 3 to 8 p.m. Sunday.

The agricultural building is located in City Park and the open house there will be presided over by women of the Andrews County Home Demonstration Club, directed by HD Agent Hattie G. Owens. The Study Club will be in charge at the library, which is located west of the Andrews County hospital.

Completion of the two buildings marks a dream come true for Andrews citizens.

The \$85,000 agricultural building is of brick, tile, steel and concrete construction and is completely fire-proof throughout, as is the library. Haynes and Kirby, Lubbock, were the architects and Houston Hill of Midland contracted the job, which was started in September, 1949.

The agricultural building contains a large, 71 by 62 feet auditorium which will serve the multiple purpose of auditorium, ballroom and gymnasium. It has a seating capacity of 600 persons and is equipped with folding chairs and 30 tables which will be available for dinners and banquets.

There also is a smaller auditorium, 47 feet long and 18 feet wide, which can be converted into three clubrooms by the use of folding doors.

A roomy, double-sink, double-cabinet kitchen equipped with the best in modern furnishings, two restrooms, two dressing rooms, a hat-check room and a lounge are included in the agricultural building, which will serve as a community center as well. Linens, dishes and silver to accommodate 200 diners have been purchased.

Outstanding Architecture

The architecture of the modern library is considered to be outstanding. The \$55,000 structure has a floor space of 2,975 square feet and contains an office, workroom, stock room, conference room, adult reading room and children's reading room. Like the agriculture building, it is equipped with air-conditioning and steam-heating facilities.

Mrs. June Armstrong, librarian, is in charge of the more than 1,700 volumes of religion, philosophy, fine arts, general arts, history, science, social science and literature.

The library will be opened to the public Monday and will be open from 9 a.m. to 9 p.m. five days a week. It will be closed each Sunday and Thursday.

In 1947 the Andrews Study Club took the building of a library as its major project. Through the efforts of its president, Mrs. Carl Ham, and others, the project was completed with a library set up in a room of the courthouse. It contained 354 volumes at the completion of the new county library.

The necessity for a public meeting place, such as the new agricultural building, was first pointed out by the women of the Andrews County Home Demonstration Club. A women's committee, along with representatives of the Lions Club and other civic organizations, appeared before the Andrews County Commissioners Court with a request for the desired building.

Now, less than a year after construction was begun, a dream has been realized with the completion of two imposing structures—the Andrews County Agricultural Building and Andrews County Library.

# Taft Opposes Emergency Authority For President

WASHINGTON —(P)— Any idea of giving President Truman standby authority to impose economic controls ran into flat opposition from Senator Taft (R-Ohio) Friday.

Taft, who heads the Senate Republican Policy Committee, told a reporter he is willing to work with the Administration in preparing a bill for congressional action, if controls become necessary because of the Korean war.

"But I am opposed to the idea of giving the President blanket check or standby authority to put controls into operation," he said. "I think Congress ought to be on the job and approve any measures that are necessary in the light of the situation that exists at the time."

Truman indicated at his news conference Thursday he has no immediate plans for asking for emergency powers to deal with the allocation of materials, conversion of industry or price-wage controls.

Under Consideration

He said, however, that every phase of possible industrial mobilization efforts is under consideration. He added that at the proper time, necessary steps would be taken. Calling in of the National Guard, Reservists and specialists is under consideration.

The President's advisers were reported divided on the best course of action, with one group contending that he ought to ask immediately for standby authority and another arguing that the country can absorb the needed military outlays and still keep business going as usual.

Lawmakers generally welcomed Truman's statement that there is no food shortage or rationing in sight and that there is no need for hoarding.

The President refused to discuss the supply of general consumer goods. He did say higher food prices can be blamed on profiteering.

Truman left open the question of whether he will make a report on the Korean situation to the lawmakers. He did say that he will keep the American people fully informed.

Taft's opposition to the granting of standby economic controls was linked with Republican demands for a voice in calling Congress back into action in the event of a possible early August recess.

Senator Lucas of Illinois, the Democratic leader, told a reporter he is going to operate on a day-to-day basis, with any possible recess depending on the improvement and stabilization of military operations in Korea.

Many Democrats, including Chairman Maybank (D-SC) of the Senate Banking Committee, said they expect a request for control legislation unless the Korean military prospects brighten quickly.

Senator Lyndon Johnson (D-Texas), a member of the Armed

Services Committee, said essential industries ought to be put on a round the clock basis.

"We are still geared for a cheap, quick war in Korea, although it is plainly apparent that this will be at best a costly, prolonged operation," he said in a statement.

President Truman's news conference assertion that this country had never had the tar licked out of it and wouldn't suffer any such fate in Korea didn't silence all of the questions in Congress about military reverses.

Senator O'Connor (D-MD) said in a statement that this country ought to reassess promptly "its ability to halt militant communism" and profit by the mistakes of the Korean campaign.

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## Ochoa Held In Mexico City Jail

MEXICO CITY —(P)— George Ochoa, charged with murder in the fatal shooting of two men in Laredo, Texas, is being held here pending the outcome of an extradition appeal from Texas.

Ochoa arrived here under guard Thursday from Mexicali, Mexico, where he was arrested earlier this week.

The U. S. request for extradition now is being processed.

In Nuevo Laredo, Mexico, Ochoa's son has asked for an injunction against extradition. The petition denies that Ochoa committed any crime and contends he is a Mexican citizen.

Mexico rarely grants extradition of her own citizens, who may be tried here for crimes committed in other countries.

Ochoa was indicted Oct. 19, 1949, in Laredo in the fatal shootings of Henry D. Whittenburg of McAllen, Texas, and James Lindsay of McKenzie, Tenn. The two were slain last July 31 on separate floors of a Laredo hotel.

### MacArthur Accepts UN Flag In Ceremony

TOKYO — (AP) — General MacArthur Friday accepted the flag of the United Nations and said his command would "do all in its power to uphold this noble ideal."

The flag—a white globe surrounded by laurel branches on a blue field—is the "symbol of one of the greatest efforts man has made to free himself," MacArthur declared. He is UN commander for the Korean war as well as U. S. commander-in-chief and chief of the Allied occupation of Japan.

The flag was presented by Gen. Joseph Lawton Collins, U. S. Army chief of staff, in a brief ceremony at Supreme Allied Headquarters.

The three-by-five-foot standard is the same one that flew over the Palestine headquarters of the late Count Folke Bernadotte, UN mediator in the Holy Land dispute, a UN official said.

Collins, speaking for Gen. Omar N. Bradley, chairman of the joint chiefs of staff, told the first commander of UN troops:

"We are wholly in support of your efforts here and pledge the fullest support within our capabilities to assist you in this great endeavor."

### Millions Sought To Add Sheer Power To 'Campaign Of Truth'

WASHINGTON—(AP)—An attempt to blast through the Russian radio jamming screen by sheer power is part of the proposed new "Campaign of Truth" sent to Congress by President Truman.

Truman Thursday asked for \$8,000,000 to launch an immediate, stepped up campaign against Communist propaganda throughout the world. The President termed such a program "vital to our national security."

The biggest share of the special fund would be for powerful new transmitting equipment to carry the "Voice of America" into all corners of the Far East and Europe—and to get through Soviet interference listeners in Russia.

At almost the moment Truman's request reached Capitol Hill, the Senate was debating a proposal to add \$4,000,000 to the \$2,700,000 set aside for the "Voice" in a big appropriations bill carrying funds for most government agencies for the year ending next June 30.

Some of the opposition to boosting appropriations for the State Department broadcasts came from senators anxious to trim the \$34,888,000,000 "one-package" money bill wherever possible.

But other lawmakers who voted against the increase said they did so on grounds Congress would get another chance to consider additional funds for the Voice after looking over the White House request.

That raised the hopes of some Administration leaders that the \$88,000,000 "Campaign of Truth" might get a more favorable reception than the \$4,000,000 appropriations amendment.

### Child's Death Leads To Drive On Taverns

LOUISVILLE, KY. — (AP) — A campaign to keep children out of taverns has been started here as the result of the death of a three-year-old child.

Joyce Joan Shouse disappeared last Friday night from a tavern where her mother, Mrs. Florine Shouse, 29, was drinking with a male companion.

The child's decomposed body was found shortly before noon Thursday under a truck loading dock about 100 yards from the tavern.

Discovery of the body intensified the search for James Irvin Robinson, 31-year-old former service station employee who police want to question in connection with Joyce's disappearance. Witnesses said a man fitting Robinson's description left the tavern about the same time the child strayed away.

Shortly after the discovery of the body, A. J. Bartholomew, city alcohol beverage control administrator, said he would conduct a

personal campaign to keep children out of drinking places.

He said he would revoke licenses of places where he found "questionable characters" and children in the same establishments. He said the licenses would be revoked without warning.

The first stages of a medical examination failed to show whether the child had been raped, but deputy coroner William T. Kammerer said the position of the body suggested the little girl had been assaulted sexually.

Louisville police were informed that J. E. Herrington, one of three men wanted for questioning in connection with the child's disappearance, is being held in Oklahoma City. Officers there said he told them he left Louisville two days before the child disappeared.

NEW YORK—(AP)—Joe Louis is coming back to fight Ezzard Charles in September if he can settle his income tax problems.

Jim Norris, president of the International Boxing Club, gave out the news Thursday when he revealed plans for a Louis-Charles bout at Yankee Stadium in the last week of September. The date probably will be Thursday, September 28.

"Joe owes the government a considerable sum of money," said Norris. "The only way he can ever pay it and get straightened out is to fight again."

"He has asked the government to accept whatever his purse would be for a Charles fight in full settlement of the government's claim. That would hold whether his purse amounted to more than what he owed or less."

Norris said Louis got into tax difficulties a couple of years ago because the government disallowed certain deductions he had taken on advice of his auditors and counsel. He pointed out that the champ's investments hadn't turned out too well.

"The government has shown leniency in tax problems of athletes and others who made their money in a short period of time," said Norris. "He placed Louis' debt at 'considerably more' than a reported \$58,000."

There is no indication as to when and how the government might answer Louis' request. A bout between Louis, the retired defeated champ, and Charles, the NBA-recognized heavyweight king, should be a huge financial success.

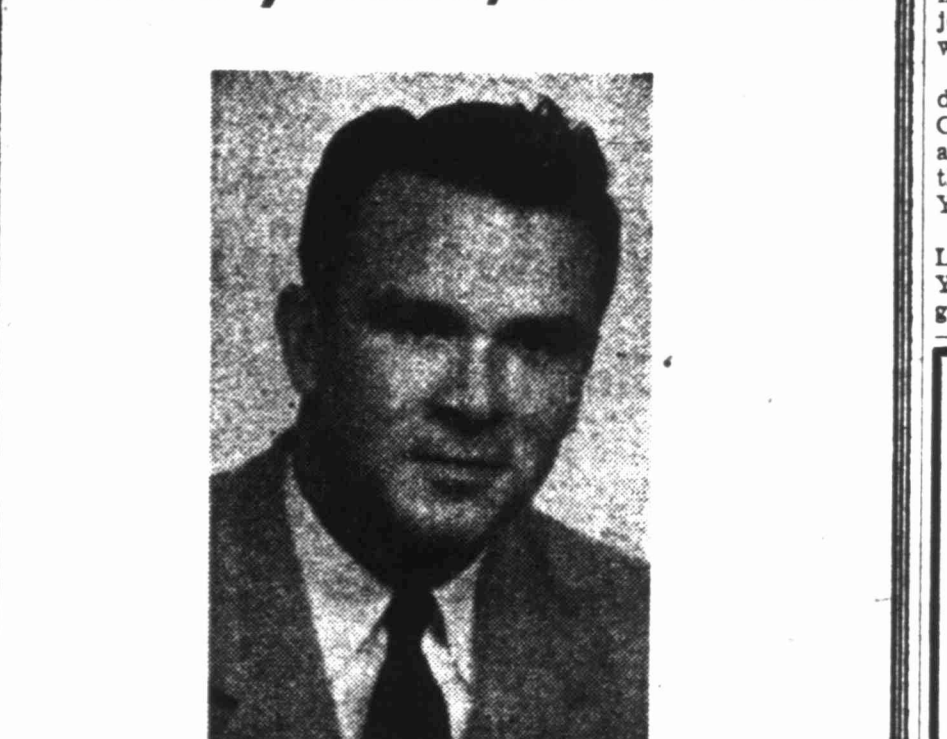

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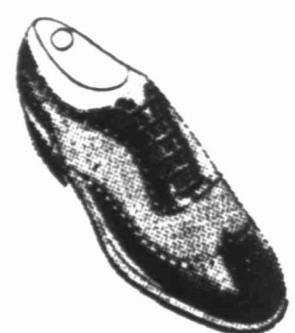


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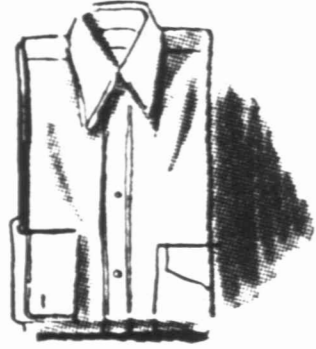

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## Abundant Living

Ps. 6:2-3, 6-7; 19:7; Matt. 9:1-7.  
**DISEASE IS NOT THE WILL OF GOD**  
If disease and physical disharmony are ours it is probable that they are from one or more of four causes: (1) actual structural disease, brought about by heredity, accident, contagion, ignorance, or willful abuse; (2) functional disease, which may pass into structural disease, brought about by wrong mental, moral, and spiritual attitudes; (3) lack of or unbalanced nutrition, brought about by poverty, ignorance, or willful neglect; (4) environmental factors which directly produce disease, or wrong mental and spiritual attitudes, which in turn produce disease.  
Note that in the four sources of disease and disharmony I do not mention the will of God. God does not will disease. God wills health. Disease is an enemy which Jesus fought against and healed whenever He could get co-operation. He never once told people to bear disease as the will of God. "I am come that they might have life, and that they might have it more abundantly." That is the Christian note. It is true that disease comes from breaking the laws of God which He has written into the constitution of things, but God does not send it; we break His laws and they break us. But that makes us, not God, the author of that disease. God has provided for health, not disease. A friend once said to Dr. W. B. Cannon, the great Harvard physiologist: "When you know all the diseases it is possible to have (something over a hundred and twenty-five), you wonder how anyone is ever well." To which Dr. Cannon replied: "When you know a great deal about the human body, you wonder why anyone is sick." (Quoted by Dr. Russell L. Dicks, Religion in Life, 1941, Vol. X, No. 4, p. 515.) The human frame is organized for health and, if the way is cleared by right co-operation with nature, will produce health.  
Gracious Father, Thou has wrought possibilities for health and rhythm into the structure of my being. Help me to co-operate with Thee, so that no crippling disease shall mar the efficiency of my work for the Kingdom. Help me to keep fit for Thee. Amen.

### Churchmen Approve UN Korean Action, Oppose A-Bomb Use

TORONTO.—P.—Leaders of the world's largest body of Protestant and Orthodox church members Thursday night approved United Nations military action in Korea, but condemned any use of atomic or bacteriological weapons.  
Representing 160,000,000 church adherents in 44 countries, the policy-making Central Committee of the World Council of Churches adopted a resolution urging also that a "just settlement" in Korea be sought through negotiation and conciliation.  
With only two dissenting votes, the 90-member committee agreed "Armed attack as an instrument of national policy is wrong. We therefore commend the United Nations, an instrument of world order, for its prompt decision to meet this aggression and for authorizing a police measure which every member nation should support."  
"At the same time, governments must press individually and through the United Nations for a just settlement by negotiation and conciliation."  
As a general principle applicable to the Korean situation, the committee unanimously endorsed this statement:  
"Such methods of modern warfare as the use of atomic and bacteriological weapons and obliteration bombing involve employment of force and a destruction of life on so terrible a scale as to imperil the very basis on which law and civilization can exist."  
"It is imperative that they be banned by international agreement and we welcome every sincere proposal to this end."
