General MacArthur's headquarters communique, issued at 3:10 a.m. (11:10 a.m., Friday, CST), said "unofficial reports that the Communist aggressors had achieved a bridgehead over the Kum River were not confirmed."

U. S. Seeks Aid In **Korea But Expects** To Bear Main Load

WASHINGTON - (AP) - The United States is quietly informing other interested United Nations members it would welcome participation of their ground forces in the fighting in Korea.

There is no expectation among top officials here, however, that the main burden of battle can or will be borne by other than American troops. Several reasons are advanced for this, the chief one being that the United States is the nation in the best possible position to do the





Many wise statesmen have been appealing insistently to the free world to exert greater effort to the grim "struggle for men's minds.'

They have pounded repeatedly on the idea that it isn't enough to combat Russian communism with economic and military measures; that freedom must be shown to be the great cause it really is, a way of life eminently superior to the slavery imposed by Moscow.

The first imaginative stride in this direction now has been taken. From a secret radio transmitter in Europe, a new series of programs is being beamed to the countries behind the Iron Curtain—Poland, Czechoslovakia, Romania, Hungary and Bulgaria.

Radio Free Europe, as the new transmitter is called, is the product of the National Committee for a Free Europe, which was organized about a year ago by outstanding American citizens.

But this is no duplication of our official government Voice of America. Much of the broadcasting will be done by leading democratic exiles from the Iron Curtain nations themselves. Among them are a former premier of Poland, a former Czech ambassador to France, a one-time Romanian foreign minister.

The new group, being privately financed and administered, has the further advantage of being free of the diplomatic restrictions which hamper the broadcasts of the Voice. Radio Free Europe can speak with tremendous vigor and frankness.

'Campaign Of Truth'

to blast through the Russian radio jamming screen by sheer power is part of the proposed new "Campaign of Truth" sent to Congress by Pres-

ident Truman. Truman Thursday asked for \$89,-000,000 to launch an immediate, stepped up campaign against Communist propaganda throughout the world. The President termed such a program "vital to our national

The biggest share of the special fund would be for powerful new transmitting equipment to carry the Voice of America" into all corners of the Far East and Europe—and to get through Soviet interference listeners in Russia. At almost the moment Truman's

request reached Capitol Hill, the Senate was defeating a proposal to add \$4,000,000 to the \$82,700,000 set aside for the "Voice" in a big appropriations bill carrying funds for most government agencies for the year ending next June 30.

Some of the opposition to boosting appropriations for the State Department broadcasts came from senators anxious to trim the \$34,-688,000,000 "one-package" money bill wherever possible.

But other lawmakers who voted against the increase said they did another chance to consider additional funds for the Voice after looking over the White House re-

That raised the hopes of some Administration leaders that the \$89,-900,000 "Campaign of Truth" might get a more favorable reception than the \$4,000,000 appropriations amend-




