

Probably nothing is tougher than trying to guess Russia's next move. We'd be wrong, for example, if we imagined the keepers of the Kremlin as mental robots with every step mapped out according to a fixed timetable. The record proves Stalin and his Politburo are opportunists.

They move if and when they view a stiuation as favorable. Right now no one outside Stalin's ruling circle knows whether Moscow is embarked on a continuing schedule of aggression. If it is, the Politburo will gauge the will to resist shown by the likely victims, measure the aid that might be brought to their side, and act accord-

Many observers see Yugoslavia as the most eligible victim on the list. They believe Russia still doesn't wish to commit her own forces but to rely upon satellite armies, as in Korea. And Tito is surrounded by the Red puppet forces of Bulgaria, Albania, Rumania and Hungary.

There's a possible error in this appraisal, however, because Tito's army generally is rated strong enough to beat off satillite attacks. The Yugoslavs themselves believe it. And they reason that the Russians know it, too. Some reports suggest, therefore, that Tito will not be really worried until he hears that Soviet troops are grouping to join an assault against him.



U. S. Faces Up To Ten Years Of Swelling Taxes For Defense

NEA Washington Correspondent WASHINGTON-The Korean war has let the United States in for perhaps 10 years of total preparedness effort. This fact is gradually emerging from the confusion of present defense planning. Proposals sent to Congress by President Truman thus far are just the beginning. It will take two to three years for the United States to

get ready. It will take the, -"When the hand was actually Soviet Union about the same time to get ready for a total war in which Russian troops would be used. This is the theory that many military experts have held for some time. They're still sticking to it-Get ready for war

> Russia has the manpower and the military potential now. It may not have the industrial potential, in at least a dozen critical materials such as steel, petroleum, an atomic bomb stockpile and so forth.

> The Korean incident is still not regarded in Washington as "it"meaning the start of a third world

After the Korean incident is cleaned up-perhaps before-other similar outbreaks are expected. Nobody knows where. Iran was considered a likely trouble spot, but is not considered so now. The reasoning is that the Russians would have to use their own troops in Iran-

Impatient Congressmen Purpose of all Communist upris-The theory is that the American people won't stand for 10 years of police action all over the world. involving total mobilization, high taxes, big military budgets, shortages of consumer goods, allocations and

other economic controls. There is some belief that Russia will not strike at the U.S. direct until after this bleeding process has been well advanced—until American people are softened up and ready to revolt against defense burdens.

On the other hand, some congressmen are impatient to have this country strike before Russia is fully prepared. Congressional appropriations committees would now approve far more than \$10,000,000,000 additional military spending, if the President asked for it.

Congressional thinking on this point obviously reflects public sentiment. It worries military planners. Curbing this strong impulse to "get at 'em and clean out the Commies" is considered necessary until the United States is itself ready. Also, it is traditional U.S. policy not to attack unless it is itself attached.



When persons are unconscious in aleep or under an anesthetic, they cannot control their muscles in the throat any more than they can anywhere else so there is not much which they can do about it. Clearing the nose before going to sleep may help if the snoring comes from mucus.

Snoring also is less likely to occur when the person goes to sleep lying on the stomach or the side. However, a person cannot fasten himself in this position and may turn during the night and start! snoring.





UN Might Have Died By Muffing Korea: Still Risks Losing Russia And Friends

LAKE SUCCESS, N. Y .- (NEA) --The United Nations, bent on quelling aggression in Korea, is gaining its soul at risk of losing one of its most powerful members—the stub-

born Soviet Union. That is the outstanding conviction of important delegates and members of the official UN family who have watched the organization work under the impact of the Korean war. It's the view especially of U.S. representatives.

Here's how these top figures see the UN as it grapples with the greatest world crisis since the end of World War II: 1. Driven to the brink of death

by Russia's half-year boycott, the UN would have tumbled into its grave had it faltered in this test. 2. When the reverse happened and the UN acted resolutely to rescue the peace, it bounced back to vibrant health almost overnight. In so doing, it took the longest stride forward any international organization has ever made, and fired the hopes of people all around the

3. But this action, though warmly supported by 51 nations, is aimed indirectly at Russia, master of North Korea. If it should drive Russia and her friends out of the UN, it will put in peril the UN's prized "universality."


