



French Shelve Social Goals

The Socialist parties of Western Europe are a prime source of disunity in the West. It's time they made up their minds which side they're on.

Socialist maneuvers in France illustrate the problem best. They're to blame for most of the shakiness in recent French governments.

With Western Europe trying to gear itself to meet the biggest threat in its history—the Russian army— French Socialists are upsetting governments on issues like higher wages, pensions and other social benefits.

These are fine objectives. Would that we had nothing more to worry about at this time than achieving new social goals. But military necessities unfortunately have intervened, and social benefits must be pushed into the background.

The Socialists are apparently blind in other ways, too. Many are naturally suspicious of American capitalism, which is their privilege. But too few see the Red menace on the other side in its true character; some are outright sympathizers with Russian communism.

They must not dip into their history books very often. Russia's path is strewn with the wreckage of socialist and other moderate leftist parties.







New UMT Legislation May Get OK If Put Up To Congress Now

WASHINGTON-With a White House endorsement expected soon, the heat will be on again to get a Universal Military Training bill through Congress. As the plan stands now, the idea will be to give about 800,000 18year-old boys six months of basic military training out-

active training. Cost of this whole program has been estimated at about \$1,500,000,-000 a year. Proponents of universal military training add that this is equal to one week's cost of the last shooting war. Since UMT is presented as a great national defense measure, to speed up mobilization, the argument is that it would be a good buy, if not an actual economy. The last Gallup poll on UMT showed 72 per cent of those guestioned favoring it, 12 per cent opposed and 16 per cent with no opinion. This was over a year ago. poll were taken today. Up to now, Congress never has had any enthusiasm for UMT. But until recently, Congress never had any enthusiasm for a peacetime draft, either. Times have changed. drafted to put UMT into effect is designed to overcome most of the objections that have been raised to it in the past.

Instruction of trainees would be by officers of the regular defense services, at camps and bases designated by the President, near the trainees' homes. It would be unlawful to keep houses of ill fame, brothels, bawdy houses or places of nuisances near any training camps. Sale or giving of intoxicating liquor to any trainee would be made unlawful

The whole program would be run by a National Security Training Commission of three members, two of them civilians and one a military man. The commission would have an advisory board made up of from 10 to 25 members, to help shape policies, and provide for high moral, religious, recreational and educational training, along with military training. A strict code of military justice would be prescribed to protect the rights of the trainees.
