8,000-Foot Wildcat Slated For Howard

Operations are to start soon at an 8,000-foot Pennsylvanian lime wildcat in extreme Northeast Howard County, two miles northeast of Vincent.

The exploration is to be Fred M. Manning, Inc., of Fort Worth, No. 1 Chester I. Jones.

Location is to be at the center of the southwest quarter of the north-west quarter of section 5, block 25, E&TC survey.

This development is being drilled as a result of a deal worked up by W. T. (Billie) Walsh of Midland. He turned it to Manning to drill and kept any override on the acreage involved and on the well which is to be drilled.

Anderson-Prichard Oil Corporation, Magnolia Petroleum Company and Coffield & Cutbush, all owners of extensive leases in the region adjacent to the drillsite contributed acreage toward the project.

Howard Explorer Is Testing Spraberry

Brinkerhoff Drilling Company and associates No. 1 E. Jones, Northwest Howard County wildcat, 14 miles northwest of Big Spring, and in the Knox community, is bottomed at 6,791 feet in the Spraberry sand of the lower Permian and is running a drillstem test.

After topping the Spraberry sand at 6,627 feet, on an elevation of 2,607 feet, to give the project a datum of minus 4,018 feet on that marker, the project cored down to 6,691 feet and took a one-hour drillstem test at 6,633-9 feet.

Recovery was 160 feet of drilling mud, with no shows of oil, gas or water.

The exploration then cored down to 6,791 feet. The sand, which was cut with a few shale streaks had good oil fluorescence and some bleeding gas on fractures in the sand.

The current test is being run on the section at 6,691-6,791 feet.

Location is 660 feet from north and east lines of the northwest quarter of section 18, block 34, T&P survey, T-2-N.

The wildcat is slated to go to 9,000 feet to explore the Pennsylvanian lime—unless it develops commercial production at a lesser depth.

New Hockley Field Gets NW Steput

Honolulu Oil Corporation and Signal Oil & Gas Company have staked a one-quarter mile northwest stepout to the Ropes Pennsylvania pool in Central-East Hockley County.

The flanker is the No. 2 Hopper, located 694 feet from south and west lines of labor 8, league 5, Wilbarger County School land survey, and five miles south of Smyer.

Projected depth is 9,500 feet.

Operations are to begin by September 1.

The No. 2 Hopper is one-quarter mile west and slightly north of the same operator's No. 1 Hopper, recently completed second producer in the Ropes field.

The No. 1 Hopper—potentialized for 2,751.88 barrels of 42-gravity oil daily through a five-eighths inch choke.

Production was from open hole between 9,293 and 9,413 feet, plugged back total depth.

Continental Stakes Wildcat In King

Continental Oil Company has filed application with the Railroad Commission of Texas for permission to drill its No. 2 Mary Martin, to be a 7,000-foot wildcat in Southwest King County.

The proposed project will be 1,980 feet from south and 660 feet from west lines of section 173, block F, E&TC survey, and 12 miles southwest of Guthrie.

The No. 2 Martin will be three-quarters of a mile northwest of The Superior Oil Company No. 1 Martin, a dry hole abandoned at a total depth of 6,625 feet, and one and one-half miles northwest of Continental No. 1 Martin, another dry hole plugged and abandoned recently at 7,201 feet.

Operations on the No. 2 Martin are to begin immediately.

It previously was reported that the No. 2 Martin would be drilled in section 173, instead of 173.

Discovery Offset In SE Lynn Gets Water

The west offset to the one-well O'Donnell Pennsylvanian pool in Southeast Lynn County has developed salt water in the lime pay of that area.

Magnolia Petroleum Company No. 1 Caswell took a drillstem test at 6,667 feet. Recovery after one hour and 15 minutes was 970 feet of salt mud, 120 feet of muddy salt water and 30 feet of salt water cut mud.

Open flowing bottom hole pressure was 600 pounds. Shut-in bottom hole pressure after 15 minutes was 2,875 pounds.

The venture reportedly is 58 feet low on top of the second Pennsylvanian lime to the Magnolia No. 1 (Continued On Page Five)

Calf Roping, Horse Show Set Monday

Midland will be the scene Monday of the Southwest's greatest Labor Day celebration—the matched calf roping between world's champions and the five-gated and jumping horse show to be staged at Midland Fair Park on East Highway 80.

The special holiday entertainment program will get underway at 2 p.m. Monday, under the sponsorship of the Midland County Sheriff's Posse. The event is expected to attract a record attendance of more than 6,000 persons from over the Permian Basin Empire.

The top roping event of the afternoon will pit Toots Mansfield of Big Spring, five times holder of the world's calf roping championship, against Troy Fort of Lovington, N. M., current world's champion. They will rope 12 calves each.

Two other top-notch calf ropers—Walter Poase of Rankin and Sonny Edwards of Big Spring—are matched in the second event. They will lasso and tie six calves each.

Poase last week warmed up for the big Labor Day celebration by capturing top calf roping money in the annual Lamesa rodeo.

CIO Board Kicks Out Bridges' Union

WASHINGTON —(P)— The CIO Executive Board voted 41 to 2 Tuesday to oust Harry Bridges and his West Coast Longshoremen's Union from the CIO on charges of following the Communist Party line.

Bridges, who is free on bail pending an appeal on a perjury conviction, did not show to defend himself. Bridges was convicted of lying about Communist Party affiliations in applying for naturalization papers.

TOKYO — (AP) — South Korean forces gained up to 2,000 yards against flight enemy resistance in the Kigye area on the eastern Korean war front, General MacArthur's headquarters said early Wednesday.

AUSTIN — (AP) — Answering reporters' questions, J. E. McDonald Tuesday said General MacArthur is the best qualified American for the presidency of the United States, adding: "He is the one American who as President could speak a language which Joe Stalin would understand."

OTTAWA — (AP) — Canada's Parliament assembled Tuesday to act on government legislation intended to start the nation's trains rolling again. There were indications the country's first general railway strike might be over by the weekend.

LOS ANGELES — (AP) — Lora Lee Michel, court-labeled "problem child" actress now a ward of the Los Angeles County Juvenile Court, left Tuesday aboard an American Airlines plane to attend a boarding school in Texas. Juvenile Judge A. A. Scott declined to name the school.

McDonald Concedes To John White

J. E. McDonald, 10-term winner as state commissioner of agriculture, Tuesday conceded John C. White's nomination to the post.

He offered congratulations and wishes for a successful administration to the 25-year-old Wichita Falls agriculture teacher.

White collected 11,074 votes more than the veteran McDonald, according to the Texas Election Bureau's final count of Saturday's Democratic runoff election. White had 351,149 votes to 340,075 for McDonald. Votes had been tabulated from 253 of Texas' 254 counties, with 175 complete.

Offers Desk

McDonald offered White a desk in his office after the general election "where, if he desires, he may stay and familiarize himself with the work of the department before he begins his official duties."

McDonald's statement also said: "I am deeply grateful to Texans for having had the honor and pleasure of serving them for twenty years as commissioner of agriculture. I have employed assistants who are worthy, capable and courteous and together we have made a service record in which I have much pride. I have served all Texans, regardless of race, color, creed or politics, because all of these are taxpayers and send their sons to fight our country's battles."

Retiring From Politics

"In retiring from politics, the greatest consolation I have is that through all the campaigns I have never made an unkind remark, in public or in private, about one of my opponents. I hold no animosity but will continue steadfast in my interest in the welfare of agriculture."

McDonald said he was through with politics after 22 consecutive years in state office—two as a state representative and 20 as commissioner of agriculture.

"There is no possibility of my running on the Republican ticket (in the November general election). I am a Democrat," he said in reply to a question.

Draft To Call 2,513 Texans In September

AUSTIN —(P)— Local Texas draft boards have been called on by the State Selective Service office to deliver 2,513 men for induction in September.

They will be the first actual inductions since January, 1948. The inductions will be drawn from the pool of men who have passed their physical examinations.

West Texas draft board centers and their quotas include: Midland nine, McCamey five, Abilene 24, San Angelo 22, Sweetwater 13, Lubbock 46, Odessa 20, Big Spring 17 and Peecos 20.

County To Purchase Recording Machine; Make Jail Repairs

Midland County commissioners Monday voted to purchase a Rectigraph photo-recorder for use by the county clerk in recording all types of deeds and mortgages.

Cost of the machine is approximately \$5,800.

County Judge Clifford C. Keith, who presided at the Commissioners' Court session, said the new machine will eliminate much heavy work in the county clerk's office and will enable the county clerk and her staff to do a more efficient and faster job in recording deeds and mortgages. Several neighboring counties already have purchased similar machines, the judge said.

The commissioners also awarded a contract to J. C. Wilson of Austin for an improvement project on the county jail. Cost of the project will be \$1,485.

Wilson's contract calls for the repair, adjustment, cleaning and lubricating all locks, locking and operating devices on all doors in the jail; repairing hinges on all steel grating and steel plate doors, and furnishing and installing new heavy tumblers type locks.

Judge Keith said several of the automatic-lock doors in the jail now are not in working order.

Lewis Repudiates No-Strike Pledge

WASHINGTON — (P) — John L. Lewis advised AFL President William Green Tuesday his coal miners won't be bound by any AFL-inspired no-strike pledge.

The government has not asked labor groups to forego strikes during the Korean fighting and defense-building period ahead, but Green and some top CIO officers have indicated such a pledge would be given if it was asked.

The United Mine Workers made public a sarcastically worded memorandum from Lewis to Green.

Lewis said the newspapers reported Green "as plodding about the country seeking someone to whom you can give a 'no strike pledge.'"

Lewis commented: "Restrict your pledges to your own outfit. We do our own no striking."

District Court To Resume Wednesday

District Judge Paul Moss, of Odessa, will return to Midland Wednesday to conduct another 70th District Court session.

The judge held a morning session here Monday, hearing several divorce suits.

Judgment on a civil suit, Norman F. Hoffman, vs. R. H. Murray, et al, is expected to be rendered during the Wednesday court session. Judgment on the suit was postponed Monday when attorneys for the defense failed to appear.

Shoplifters Are Reported At Work

Police Chief Ellington Tuesday warned Midland business firms to keep a close check for shoplifters.

Ellington said two expensive cameras have been stolen here in the last few days, one from Midland Drug and one from Midland Studio. He said it definitely is the work of shoplifters.

1,500 Troops From Britain Reach Korea

TOKYO —(P)— Allied troops beat back Red attacks in two wild battles at opposite ends of the curving Korean war front Tuesday.

That apparently ended Communist chances of a quick end-run on Pusan, the Reds' August 31 goal.

But the North Koreans were building up at the center of the line for a major stab at United Nations forces.

The bloodiest battle was on a bald hill at the southern anchor of the line. There American negroes and South Koreans turned back a North Korean bayonet charge in hand-to-hand combat. One American machine gun nest was wiped out by Red bayonets.

At the other end of the battle front a Red force whipped behind Allied troops and cut a road three miles southwest of Pohang at the east coast anchor.

The Pohang sector still was controlled by United Nations troops. The attacking 20,000 Red troops there were pushed back around recaptured Kigye, nine miles northwest of Pohang.

While these developments took place, the first contingent of British troops to reach Korea—a token force of 1,500—landed in the south. See-Saw Action

Near the center of the line another 20,000-man Red force attacked South Korean infantry in 18 miles north of Taegu, the UN hub.

Taegu and Pusan, principal UN seaport at the southeastern tip of the Korean Peninsula, are the main North Korean objectives in the southeast.

An official spokesman said the Communists had lost all chance of seizing Pusan in a quick end-run thrust.

American troops approached the main area of battle around Pohang. But they had not gone into the battle. U. S. artillery ringed the air field six miles southeast of Pohang and supported hard-pressed South Koreans.

The Pohang sector battle was developing into a see-saw action. While one force of Reds was pushing southward another was forced back by the South Korean Capitol Division. It moved north more than a mile and retook Kigye.

Kigye itself is not important, but the complex network of roads around it leads west to Taegu, (Continued On Page Five)

Nation May Hear Report By Truman

WASHINGTON — (P) — A White House official said Tuesday President Truman is preparing a report to the nation.

The report, this official said, would cover international affairs, the fighting in Korea and the controls the President feels are needed at home.

This official, who asked not to be quoted by name, said no time has been set for the speech. But he said it would be in the nature of a "fireside chat"—such as President Roosevelt used to make—and would be televised and broadcast.

Waiting On Congress

White House sources previously had said the talk might be ready by this weekend. It would be Truman's first report to the nation since his July 19 radio address spelling out a partial mobilization program to deal with the Korean fighting.

The official said no definite time had been set because Congress has not yet acted upon the President's request for legislation which would enable him to impose limited controls on the domestic economy.

A Senate-House committee Tuesday buckled down to the task of compromising a dispute over how much leeway to give the President over wage and price controls.

Conferees agreed in advance to keep at the job until midnight if necessary in an effort to break a deadlock and speed anti-inflation legislation to the White House.

Tim Baird, 38-year-old Hobbs, N. M. man apprehended by Midland officers early Monday near here, has been turned over to Sheriff R. H. Emery of Sterling County to face charges in connection with the burglary of three business firms in Sterling City.

Two other men sought by officers in a search southeast of here Monday were not located. However, two men were detained by officers in Hobbs for questioning.

Midland officers said Baird also will face charges of burglary of the Cook-Houston Hardware Store early Monday in Garden City. It was during that burglary E. R. Morgan, Garden City resident, spotted Baird and two companions. The chase which led to the arrest of Baird and the search for two other suspects followed.

Officers said evidence gathered here and at Garden City and Sterling City indicated the Sterling City and Garden City burglaries were done by the same persons.

Congress Sends Big Budget Bill To President Truman

WASHINGTON — A \$35,544,600,425 money bill to run the government this year was ready Tuesday for transmission to President Truman, who objects to its provision for a loan to Spain.

Despite the President's open opposition to the \$22,500,000 loan to Franco's government, congressional leaders don't look for a veto, since the bill finances almost all operations of the government for the year which started July 1.

Finishing touches were put on the bill late Monday by the Senate and the House. Both approved it by voice vote. It had been before Congress since April.

TV Won't Replace Parents For Bringing Up Children

Worried about the effect your television set is having on your children? If so, you can find some reassuring and good advice on the subject in an article by Elizabeth Hurlock in the current issue of "Today's Health," published by the American Medical Association.

Any parents who conscientiously follow Dr. Hurlock's advice ought to have the television problem licked.

One of her suggestions for the wise handling of television in the home could apply equally well to other diversions besides TV.

That is: "Television should not be confused with paregoric—it must never be used just to keep children quiet and out of mischief."

That's as true of comic books as of television. An occasional comic book isn't going to hurt any child. But parents who buy comic books as fast as they are published for their children, just because a kid

with a comic book is a quiet kid, are falling down on their job.

So are the parents who use the movies as a place to take care of Junior whenever he happens to be in the way. A good movie occasionally is a fine treat for children—but parking kids in any old movie any time Mama and Papa want to get rid of them for half a day is a vicious habit.

It's silly for parents to pretend—even to themselves—that they can't cope with the effect that movies, television and comic books have on their children.

Used wisely and with discretion all three can add to their children's pleasure with no harm done. It's when the parents themselves come to depend on these forms of amusement for taking care of their children for them that the trouble begins.

LONDON —(P)—Princess Elizabeth's new baby Tuesday was named Anne Elizabeth Alice Louise.

The child's father, Prince Philip, entered the names—all of which are famous in the history of England's monarchy—on her birth certificate Tuesday morning at Clarence House, the royal couple's London mansion.

The two-week-old baby's proper title and name thus will be Her Royal Highness Princess Anne Elizabeth Alice Louise of Edinburgh.

The new princess will bear the names of two great queens of England—Elizabeth, who reigned from 1558 to 1603, and Anne, who held the throne from 1702 to 1714.

The choice of the name Elizabeth also was a tribute to the grandmother of the baby princess, the present Queen Elizabeth.

Alice and Louise are names common in recent generations among members of Britain's royal family.

Alice also is the given name of Prince Philip's mother, who is known formerly as Princess Andrew of Greece, Andrew being the name of her late husband.

Universal Military Training

The foot soldier shuffled along the hot, dusty road that led away from the front, somewhere in South Korea.

"There aren't enough of us," he said. There was weariness in his voice, and a little bitterness, too.

This was August, 1950. By now there are more men to help hold such hills—maybe even enough men to start pushing the shrunken U. S. battle lines northward again.

But it will take many more men to win the long, grim war that began a little less than two months ago as "police action" against a Red invasion.

We don't have the men now.

In a few months, as the draft boards get up steam, we hope to have a million in uniform.

We could have had the men in August, 1950.

Four years ago President Truman, General Marshall, General Eisenhower, General MacArthur and others of the nation's leaders asked for a Universal Military Training law.

Now "there aren't enough of us," as the tired soldier in Korea said; and UMT has been revived.

The Defense Department is going to ask Congress for it; the American Legion again is leading the fight, and this time it appears Congress is listening with a favorable ear.

Some American parents still may shy from the idea of their 18-year-old sons leaving home for six months of basic training, plus another six months of specialized training.

"How many lessons must we have? How many lives of untrained youths must we sacrifice before we realize that aggressors will not threaten if we are ready . . . before they come? Universal Military Training is not a system of aggression. It is a method of peace."

General Hodge wrote those words in 1947—ironically, when he was commanding U. S. forces in Korea. And in 1950 an aggressor knew we were not ready.

UMT will not be in time for Korea. But it should be written into our laws right now if it—and America's defenses—are to be in time for anything.

(Continued From Page One) which draws much of its supplies through Pohang port.

A U. S. Eighth Army communique said the Reds controlled the hills around Kiyu and had blocked one highway southwest of Pohang.

A spokesman for General MacArthur warned that the east coast area still offers the possibility for a major breach in the United Nations wall, which 40,000 to 60,000 Reds have been probing for a soft spot for days.

The Reds kept pressure on adjacent sectors west of the east coast.

The Eighth Army communique reported an attack on the South Korean Sixth Division by units of 30,000 Reds.

Nearby the South Korean Eighth Division attacked to straighten its lines after some earlier losses.

The big Red buildup on the central front was hit by Allied bombers to delay it. The Reds, centering their main forces between Waegan and Kunwi, north and west of Taegu, may shift their forces either to the east or south.

B-29 bombers plastered Red supply centers to try to weaken them.

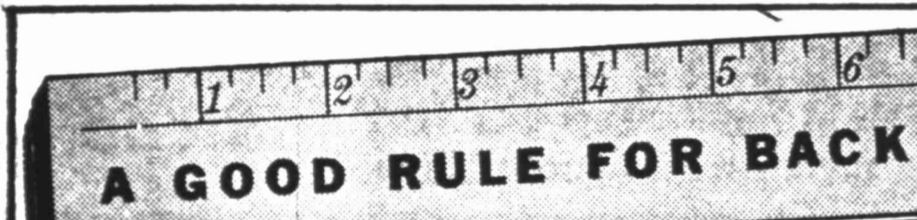

Humble Planning To Hike Capacity Of Crude Oil Line

HOUSTON.—(P)—Humble Oil & Refining Company plans to add 20,000 barrels per day to the capacity of its new West Texas-Houston crude oil pipe line.

A company announcement Tuesday said a pump station at Eckert, 14 miles north of Fredericksburg, is scheduled for completion around October 1.

The new station will boost the 370-mile, 14-inch line's daily capacity from 84,000 to 104,000 barrels.

Two other intermediate stations, near Fort McKavett and Warda, are to be completed later in the year. With all three stations, the line will move from 120,000 to 125,000 barrels a day.

The line, opened two months ago, runs from Kemper Station, near Big Lake, 75 miles west of San Angelo, to Satsuma, near Houston.

Humble Oil & Refining Company No. 1 Midkiff, possible discovery from the Spraberry sand of the lower Permian, in Southeast Midland County, about 25 miles southeast of the city of Midland, and 680 feet from north and west lines of section 46, block 38, T&P survey, T-4-S, is bottomed at 7,337 feet in the Spraberry and is running 7-inch casing.

Discovery Offset In E-C Coke Falls

The south offset to Union of California No. 1-B Daisy McCutchen, the discovery, topped the Cisco sand by electric log at 3,974 feet, 2,031 feet below sea level.

Italy Frees Former Mussolini Sidekick

ROME —(AP)— Former Marshal Rodolfo Graziani, once slated as Mussolini's successor, was freed Tuesday from a 19-year prison term as a traitor and Nazi collaborator. The 68-year-old former Fascist army commander and viceroy of a faded African empire had been sentenced May 2 after years of legal maneuvering following his capture just before World War II ended. His term was reduced to 14 months by Italian government amnesties recognizing him as a war hero, and then cut further to cover time he was in American custody.

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British Fighting Men Land In South Korea

A SOUTH KOREAN PORT —(AP)— British ground troops in their jungle green battle dress stepped ashore Tuesday to give the British Commonwealth its first fighting force in the United Nations action against North Korean Reds.

Tan and hardy Scotsmen and lean young warriors from the London area disembarked from the aircraft carrier Unicorn and the cruiser Ceylon to the cheers of South Koreans and Americans.

The Unicorn touched the pier at 12:20 p.m. (9:20 p.m. EST, Monday). The bagpipes played "The Glen Aurl Highlanders" as B Company of the Argyll and Sutherland Highlanders Regiment trotted down the gangplank of the Ceylon. They were cheerful, these men from Britain who were brought here from their station at Hong Kong. Sgt. Ian Bell of Paisley, Scotland, said: "The lads feel we should have

been here sooner." Company Sergeant-Major Robert Murray of Glasgow commented, "We are quite happy. We can handle the mountain fighting. We have always taken it—so we can carry on." One laughing soldier said: "I am just an immigrant." And another put an identification tag in his eye, as if it were a monocle, and inspected Korea. A moustached soldier called to an American on the pier and asked: "Any gum, chum?" Has Sad Look Pvt. Patrick Boyd of Port Glasgow yelled "Are there any pubs here where a man can get a drop o' drink?" He looked a bit sad when he was told the staple native drinks were sake and unguaranteed apple brandy.

As the carrier slid up to the pier, the U. S. 56th Army Band played "God Save the King." It was a moment of high emotion for those watching.

On the decks of the carrier, the British came to attention. They stood at the rail, tall and straight. And then, as the notes died away, they cheered.

A South Korean band also welcomed the British and a chorus of South Korean girls sang the British anthem. Most of the girls had fled Seoul, capital of South Korea which fell to the Reds early in the invasion.

Then the girls sang the "United Nations Welcome Song," written by a South Korean. They sang: "The United Nations Army is coming, holding up the forces of righteousness, to put an end to wickedness."

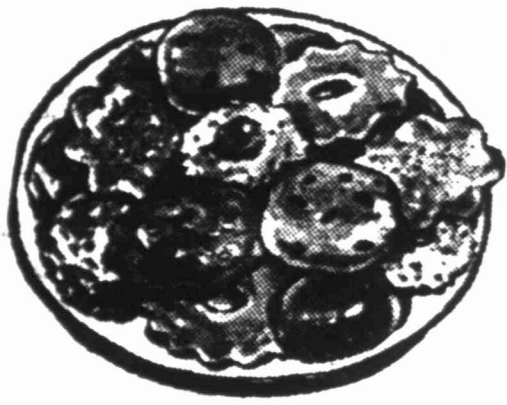

THE KINGDOM AS PERVERSION AND INVASION

The Kingdom of God is at your doors! We have seen that when we welcome this invading Kingdom, we welcome the Heaven Natural—the Homeland of our soul. Jesus said, "The earth beareth fruit of herself—the soil and the seed are made for each other. The soil of your being and the seed of the Kingdom are affinities. You have tried to grow the poisonous weeds of sin in the soil of your being, but the whole process brought, not comfort, but conflict; not rest, but rebellion.

When the child passes from the womb to the outer world, it finds a world for which it is made—air for its lungs, light for its eyes, food for its stomach, love for its affectional nature, and a world of growth for its latent possibilities. The child and the world are made for each other. So you and I are made for the Kingdom.

But Christianity is not merely the awakening of the Kingdom within; it is an invasion of the King-

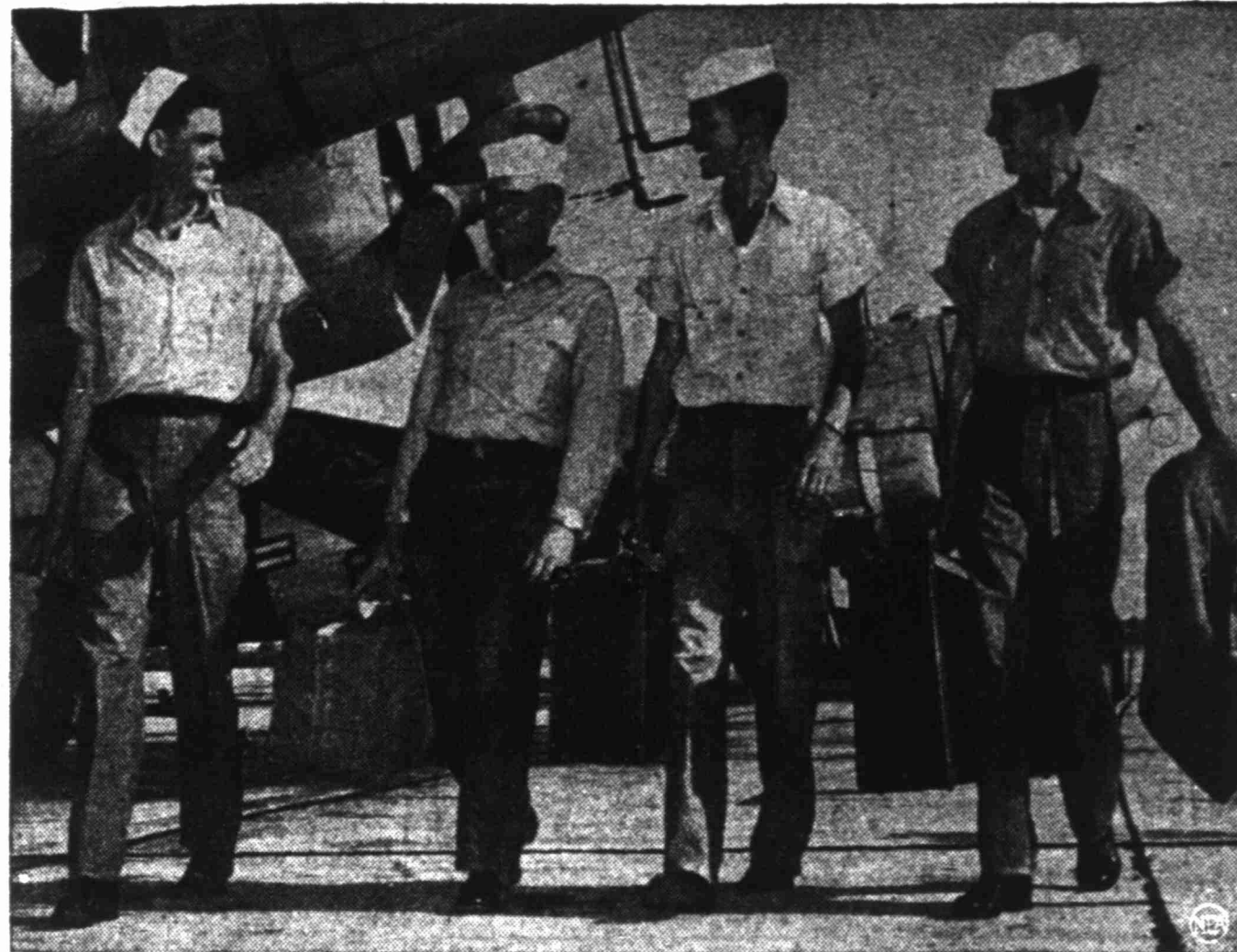
dom from without. If it were only the first, we should get the interpretation of the nature of the Kingdom by looking within. But the nature of the Kingdom cannot be truly seen by looking within, for we have so overlaid that Kingdom by unnatural ways of life that the interpretation is blurred. Only in the face of Christ do we see the nature of the Kingdom. But we see more than the nature of the Kingdom in Christ—we see in Him what it costs God to get to us in spite of our sin. The Kingdom at our doors is there only because in Christ that Kingdom came down to us through an Incarnation, down to us through a Cross, down to us through a Resurrection, down to the very threshold of our being, there to await our consent for entrance.

Something crucial, something decisive had to happen in history before the Kingdom could stand at our doors. The barriers have been broken down from God's side by His offensive suffering, redemptive love. The cross is therefore the pivot upon which history turns.

Gracious Christ, Thou hast come to me at supreme cost. Help me to respond to Thee with all the cost I can pay. For Thy Kingdom knocks with nail-pierced hands at my doors. Help me to open with hands that are willing to be pierced. A. en.

X-Ray, Diathermy May Help In Treating Painful Bursitis

The most common causes of inflammation of a bursa, or bursitis, are single severe injuries or lesser but repeated ones. Kneeling for a long time may affect a bursa just above the knee resulting in the common malady, "housemaid's knee." In "tennis elbow," a bursa around the elbow is involved.

Now, any small pocket lined by delicate tissue lying near one of the movable joints of the body is called a bursa. Typical bursae are those above the knee, and around the elbows and shoulders.

Bursitis often starts suddenly and in such cases the involved cavity is likely to be swollen and contain a

fluid, the nature of which depends on the cause. Acute or subacute bursitis brings tenderness and pain. In the more chronic conditions in which the fluid develops gradually and lasts for a long time, discomfort may be entirely absent. Diagnosis is not always easy.

What can be done for an inflamed bursa depends partly on the cause and partly on the acuteness of the inflammation. In the more acute conditions, complete rest aided by a splint, bandage, or cast is generally advised.

In those cases in which the swelling is great and the pressure causes considerable pain, the physician may have to remove some of the excess fluid. Since the fluid may return, such removal is likely to have to be repeated several times.

Hot wet bandages may bring relief and heat in the form of diathermy is frequently extremely helpful. Deep X-ray treatments also have been used in some cases with success.

Resists Treatment
 Unfortunately, some cases of chronic bursitis are resistant to all these forms of treatment. Injection of a local anesthetic into the bursa itself often is useful but may not bring lasting effects. The injection of some irritating fluid called a sclerosing solution has been reported to be useful occasionally.

In the most resistant cases, an operation involving removal of the entire lining of the bursa may have to be employed, but this is more or less of a last resort. The sufferer from a severe bursitis usually feels quite sorry for himself—and with good reason.

\$14,000,000 Asked Of Shipping Line In Benevolence Sinking

SAN FRANCISCO — (AP)—The government charges the Luckenbach Steamship Lines with responsibility for the sinking of the Navy hospital ship Benevolence. It asked \$14,000,000 damages.

A suit filed in federal district court also asked seizure of the freighter Mary Luckenbach which collided with the Benevolence Friday in dense fog off San Francisco's Golden Gate.

Benevolence casualties were 18 dead and 13 missing, with 492 saved. The freighter, its bow damaged, had no casualties.

The government asks \$3,500,000 for loss of the hospital ship and \$10,500,000 for hospital equipment aboard.

It charges the freighter was operated negligently, and specifies:
 The freighter was traveling at excessive speed, failed to sound proper fog signals, failed to maintain proper watch lookouts, failed to have competent officers on watch, failed to change course to avoid collision, failed to keep her proper starboard (right) side of the channel, and failed to maintain the proper use of radar and other navigational aids.

Keith R. Ferguson, special assistant to the U. S. attorney, filed the suit after sitting in on Monday's opening session of the Navy Court of Inquiry investigating the disaster.

52 Persons Injured In Train Collision

CONNELLSVILLE, PA. — (AP)—A Baltimore and Ohio passenger train, gathering speed after a station stop, crashed head-on into a B&O express near the Connelleville station Monday, injuring 45 passengers and seven crewmen.

Passengers were thrown from their seats as the two steam locomotives smashed together.

Only one of the 15 persons hospitalized was reported in serious condition. She is 80-year-old Mrs. Kate Michel of Connelleville, who suffered a possible skull fracture.

Railroad officials launched an investigation to determine cause of the wreck.

Says \$20,000 Find Is Driving Him Crazy

NEW BEDFORD, MASS. — (AP)—David Lumiansky Tuesday became the legal owner of \$20,000 he found a year ago—but, he says, "It's driving me crazy."

"Half the people in the country are trying to claim the dough," he said. "And the other half want to help me spend it."

"I haven't slept for four days. I'd be better off if I'd never found the stuff."

Lumiansky, a former manager of boxers, found the money on a roadside last August 29. No one has established a legal claim to it. He became the owner Tuesday under state law.

GI Declares Report Slightly Exaggerated

PALESTINE, TEXAS — (AP)—Pfc. Hubert R. Speer was at home to read the Defense Department's telegram notifying his family he had been wounded in Korea.

Speer has been in the United States on emergency leave for several weeks. He was listed as wounded on Sunday's casualty list.

He said he left some clothing and that "one of the boys must have been wearing my things."



Iraan's Bud McFadin Is Picked For All-American

AUSTIN—(AP)—Three years ago, a West Texas giant—Lewis (Bud) McFadin—was the object of the most spirited recruiting campaign in Southwest Conference football history.

He was from a little town and the press hadn't paid much attention to him. He wasn't even mentioned on the All-State teams. But the coaches knew about him and they were so thick in his vicinity he scarcely had a minute to himself.

The University of Texas won out. Now, as McFadin enters this third varsity season in Longhorn foot-

ball, it is easy to see why he was so widely sought. Here at Texas they consider him a certainty for All-America. He is the anchor of what many think will be the finest line Texas ever has produced.

McFadin is called man-mountain and the reason is obvious—he is six feet three and weighs 340 pounds, and to quote his coach, Ed Price, "Bud is blessed with exceptional physical qualities—size, speed and agility."

Big Tough
McFadin is equally good at busting a Bronco or an opposing line. He's tough and strong and because of his speed was a fullback in high school at Iraan. Bud was tested at that spot as a freshman at the University but the coaches decided his talents could be put to better use in the line.

Coaches of opposing teams have been as high on McFadin as Price and Head Coach Blair Cherry of Texas.

Coach Bob Woodruff of Florida, who was at Baylor last year, described him as "one of the best looking linemen I've seen since I coached DeWitt Coulter at West Point."

After Texas ripped Temple University 54-0 last year, Owl Coach Al Kawai said: "I doubt if there is a better guard in the country than McFadin. He stands out equally well on offense and defense."

Minnesota and Michigan State will meet on the gridiron for the first time in 1960.

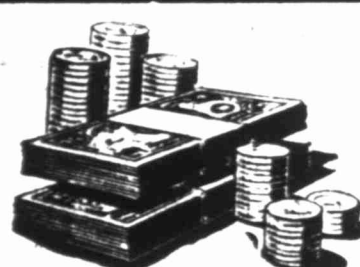

'Ghost Of Guam' In World War II Goes Back To U. S. Navy

PORTLAND, ORE. — (AP) — The Yankee sailor who lived like Robinson Crusoe while surviving on Japanese-occupied Guam in World War II has gone back to the fleet.

Burly George Ray Tweed, now 48 and a Navy veteran of 22 years, has been recalled to active duty after two years as a stateside landlubber. He returns as a chief electronics technician.

Eventually, Tweed may be assigned to the War Western Pacific, where he once was known as the "Ghost of Guam." He then was a wreath-like island fugitive from a feared enemy.

When the Japanese overwhelmed the tiny American force on Guam in the months after Pearl Harbor, Tweed eluded capture. He was the only American to survive there until the Stars and Stripes again were hoisted over the island.

With the aid of natives, he managed to stay alive for 33 months. He slept in caves and moved his hideout when enemy patrols came too close to his jungle trails. Four years ago, Tweed rewarded one of the natives. He gave a new automobile to Antonio Artero, who had fed him more than a year while he hid from the Japanese.

A few days prior to the American recapture of Guam, Tweed was snatched from the island in a daring rescue. He was able to give the U. S. Fleet vital information about enemy defenses, later was awarded the Legion of Merit and promoted to the rank of lieutenant. He retired to civilian life two

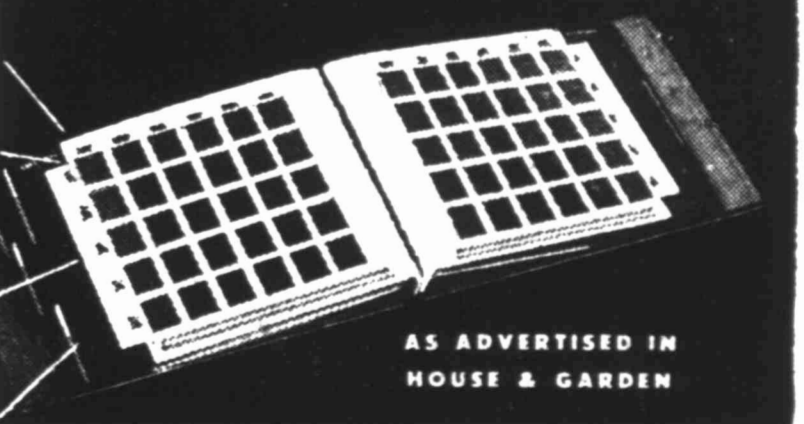
