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# Duck Season Opens Friday

Grab your boots, your old "GI" olive drab trousers, your shotgun and your decoys, and get ready—duck hunting season is almost here.

At 12 noon Friday, the time will be at hand. The season runs from noon Friday until November 21, inclusive. Shooting hours are this way: On November 4 and November 21, from noon to one hour before sunset; all other days of the season one-half hour before sunrise to one hour before sunset.

The "second half" of the season will be from December 21 to January 7, inclusive.

The bag and possession limits for brant, coot ducks, and geese look this way:

Coot: 10 singly or in aggregate with rails and gallinules. Only one day's kill may be possessed.

Ducks: Four in the aggregate per day, eight in possession, including not more than one wood duck. (Exception: American and Redbreasted Mergansers: 25 singly or in the aggregate per day. No possession limit.)

Geese and brant: Eight in the aggregate per day or in possession, including in such limit not more than either two Canada geese (or its subspecies, Hutchins or cackling goose), or two white-fronted geese, or one of each.

Isn't So Simple

But it isn't so simple as just going out and bagging the limit—there are a few rules and regulations to follow, when it comes to hunting migratory game birds.

For instance, on the opening day of the season, no person may possess any migratory game bird in excess of the daily bag limit. And migratory game birds may be possessed for only 90 days after the close of the season.

Baiting and live decoys are prohibited. A shotgun larger than 10-gauge may not be used, and you can not use an auto-loading or repeating shotgun capable of holding more than three shells, including those in the magazine and chamber. Only shotguns may be used.

You may not take a migratory game bird from any power-driven boat or boat under tow or sail. And you may not shoot from a public road or highway.

If you are more than 16 years of age, you are not hunt migratory waterfowl without a federal stamp. These stamps are procurable at post offices.

Now, keeping in mind the rules and regulations, go forth and bag your limit.

## Council Studies Tax Evaluation Cut For Automobiles

A proposal to reduce evaluations of automobiles for city tax purposes in 1951 now is receiving serious consideration by the Midland City Council.

Councilman F. N. Shriver submitted the proposal to cut assessments for 1951 at the council's regular meeting Monday.

Mayor William B. Neely suggested Shriver and Councilman W. F. Hejl study the proposal further and work out a graduated scale of reductions.

Auto taxes in 1950 would not be affected by the proposed evaluations, but auto owners would be assured reductions in 1951.

Under the present setup, automobiles are evaluated according to their price and model. Autos in the Cadillac class, for example, which normally cost more than other models, are assessed at the highest figure. The year the automobile was made also figures in the evaluation. Cars made in postwar years are valued at considerable more than the prewar models.

It's New

The taxing of automobiles on a broad scale here is a comparatively new procedure. Previously only those auto owners who rendered their property for taxes were levied tariffs on their vehicles. This year the city adopted a policy of assessing all auto owners so that the tax burden would be distributed fairly.

However, it has been contended the present evaluations in some cases are higher than the owners actually receive when they sell or trade their automobiles, because the evaluations are set as of January 1 and the tax is not due until one year later.

Shriver's proposal, if adopted, would slash evaluations of postwar models by one-half, and would eliminate the taxing of all prewar automobiles. The tax rate of \$1.75 per \$100 evaluation now levied by the city, and the rate of \$1.40 per \$100 now assessed by the Midland Independent School District, would remain unchanged.

Too Much

Other councilmen who participated in the discussion indicated they favor a noticeable cut in the evaluations, but some are of the opinion a full 50 per cent cut would be too much. Some contend the automobile and personal property tax is the only tariff paid to city and schools by families not owning real estate. A graduated scale of reductions, depending on the model and year of the automobile, appears to be favored over the flat 50 per cent reduction. City Manager W. H. Oswalt says the tax rate may be reduced also.

Shriver and Hejl are scheduled to make a report on the proposal at the next regular meeting of the council, November 14.

## Official Population Figure For Nation Is Released Thursday

WASHINGTON —(AP)—Final, official figures Thursday put the 1950 United States population at 150,997,361.

This census tally, taken every 10 years, reflected a shift in the population that will cause seven states to gain and nine to lose seats in the 435-member House of Representatives scheduled to be elected two years from now.

The total population figure, announced at the White House, was calculated as of April 1. It showed an increase of 19,028,086 since the 1940 census—the greatest gain for a 10-year period in the nation's history. The increase was 14.5 per cent. Texas Gains Seat

House seat gains will be seven for California, two for Florida, and one each for Maryland, Michigan, Texas, Virginia and Washington. Losses will be three for Pennsylvania, two each for Missouri, New York and Oklahoma, and one each for Arkansas, Illinois, Kentucky, Mississippi and Tennessee.

The Census Bureau's calculations on the reapportionment of seats were the mathematical answer to what changes will be made if the 1953 house membership total remains 435, as at present.

Congress conceivably could make a different matter of it by voting to enlarge the size of the House.

The final 1950 census figures were given to President Truman by Census Director Roy V. Peel and Secretary of Commerce Sawyer and announced as they left the White House.

They provided a refinement of the preliminary census count of 150,520,000 announced last July 22.

## U. S. Casualties In Korea Rise To 27,160

WASHINGTON —(AP)—Announced American casualties in the Korean conflict rose Thursday to 27,160, an increase of 908 over a week ago.

The total included 4,403 deaths. The list includes casualties regarding which the next of kin had been notified through October 27, the Defense Department said.

In addition to 4,403 deaths, Thursday's summary showed 18,779 non-fatally wounded.

It said 4,390 had been reported missing in action. Of these 3,771 still are listed as missing. Two of those reported missing are known to have been captured and to have died, 450 have returned to United Nations military control and 107 now are known to have been captured.

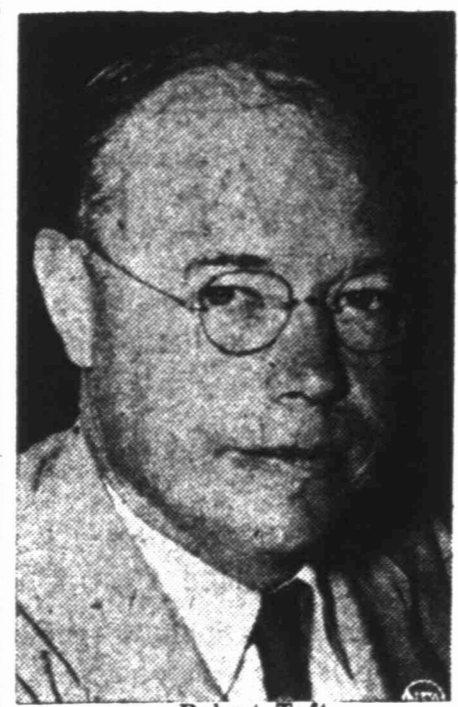

### Ohio Voters To Perform Serious Job On Tuesday

COLUMBUS, OHIO—(P)—If Ohioans appear sober-faced on the coming weekend, there is a good reason: They have an awfully serious and tough duty to perform in next Tuesday's election.

They must select a United States senator, and their decision will affect the destiny of the Republican Party and its No. 1 spokesman.

If they reelect Senator Robert A. Taft to a third term, they will add vast strength to the political physique of a man who twice has bid for the Republican presidential nomination.

Only a giant, political observer feel could overcome the unprecedented opposition pitted against Taft.

If the citizens elect Joseph T. Ferguson instead, it will represent a monumental victory for the Democratic Party and the leaders of organized labor. Such a triumph would mean:

For the Democrats—the demolishing of a figure who, in 1952, might present the strongest challenge yet to their party's 20-year tenure of the White House.

For labor—retirement to private life of the co-author of the Taft-Hartley Labor Act, which has antagonized the hierarchies of the AFL and CIO more than any other legislation in perhaps two decades.

**On U. S. Future**  
Both Republicans and Democrats even say that Tuesday's decision will have an important bearing on the nation's future.

The whole philosophy of the national Administration since 1932 has been debated in the long, bitter senatorial campaign which ends Tuesday.

Taft contends that the Democrats, in league with labor, are trying to foist a socialistic form of government on the American people. His supporters say he is one of the few men in congress with fortitude enough to fight such a program; that defeat of him in the election could cause collapse of the Administration's opposition.

Taft himself says: "The only issue today is whether an independent for Red stamp congress will be in power in the next two years." Ferguson says: "The big boys of the National Manufacturers Association, Chamber of Commerce and American fascists are the supporters of my opponent... the question is whether or not the big money interests and the newspapers are to take control of our nation in a dictatorship that once brought ruin to our country under Warren Harding, Calvin Coolidge and Herbert Hoover."

**Taft Won't Speculate**  
Senator Taft, who began his campaign for reelection a year ago, doesn't care to speculate on his possible role in the presidential nomination.

But he has said: "I am certainly not going into any campaign in connection with the 1952 presidential nomination."

His friends, however, comment that if the GOP leaders should offer the nomination to Taft, "well—that would be something else." In other words, they feel he would accept it.

Ohioans also will elect a governor and other state officials Tuesday, plus 23 congressmen. But the Taft-Ferguson senatorial contest has permitted the voters to give only scant attention to the other races.

### Irish Playwright George Bernard Shaw Dies At 94

AYOT ST. LAWRENCE, ENGLAND—(P)—George Bernard Shaw, 94, the century's most famous playwright, died Thursday.

The life of the frail old Irish-born wit who amassed a fortune by poking fun at the shortcomings of his civilized age, flicked out at last at 4:59 a.m. (10:59 p.m. CST Wednesday).

A tumble in his garden on September 10 while pruning a tree proved the undoing of the self-styled Napoleon of drama. He broke his left thigh bone and was taken to Luton Hospital to have the bones pinned together. A bladder ailment complicated his condition. A minor operation eased the trouble and he was brought home October 4, but suffered a relapse Sunday.

Mrs. Alice Laden, his housekeeper at the brick cottage, "Shaws Corner," announced the death to reporters. He had lapsed into a coma at 3 a.m. Wednesday.

**Author Of 55 Plays**  
No announcement has been made of funeral plans, but friends expected the body will be cremated, the ashes mixed with his wife's and scattered over the Shaw garden.

The author of 55 plays, five novels and countless essays—the best of which were turned out after he was 40—Shaw was credited by many critics with reviving British drama after its golden age of Goldsmith and Sheridan. No stickler as to mod-

esty, Shaw considered himself the successor to Shakespeare and even an improvement on the bard of Avon.

As a political propagandist he espoused the cause of the Fabian Socialists and helped lay the foundation of the present Labor Party.

He claimed to be a Communist and an atheist. But if he was a Communist, the brand was not orthodox. Some of his comments, if made in Russia, would have landed him in Siberia.

His atheism also was questioned. **Master Of Studied Insult**  
The quizzical sage, whose bushy, once-red eyebrows and beard and unruly white mane were known to millions, kept the ear of the world for 50 years by his mastery of the studied insult.

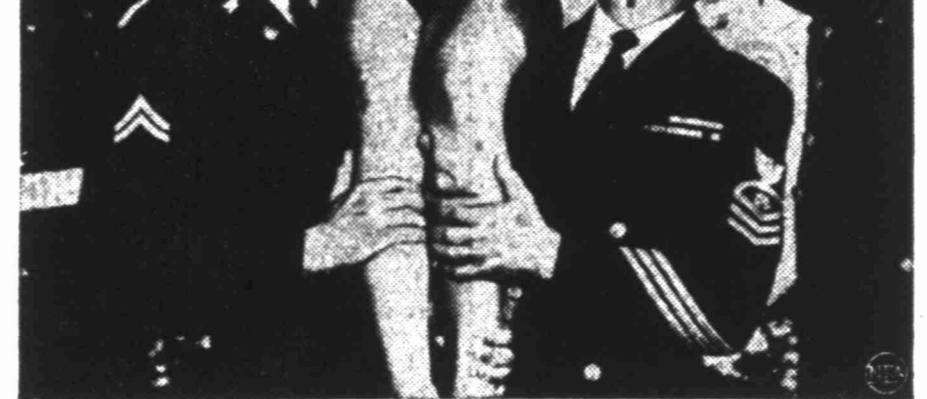
As a dramatist he exposed slum housing, prostitution, class distinction, shortsighted politicians. His acid comment ranged from religion and education to doctors and tax collectors.

Americans were among his chief targets.

His egotism was mixed with an occasional debunking of even himself.

Asked to write his own obituary for a substantial fee, Shaw answered with a crude sketch of a gravestone bearing the words:

"Here jacet Bernard Shaw. Who the devil was he?"

We come to the next step in guidance: (4) God guides through opening providences—matching us against some opening opportunity or need. A little waif boy of the street of London sidled up to a doctor and said, "Do you want to see where we live?" He took the doctor by the hand and led him into alleys where boys slept in boxes and under steps, huddled together to keep one another warm. Before morning that doctor knew he belonged to those boys, and went out and set up Dr. Bernard's Homes, through which thousands of boys have been blessed. For this very law and order is of God—He is in it, is the author of it, works through it, but is not strait-jacketed by it. For this law and order is full of surprises and of freedom. A closed system of nature is now unscientific. God guides through science. Accept that fact.

To expect to be guided by the revelations of science makes you open-minded to life around you as well as to life above you.

O God, whose will is wrought into the natural order, and who, by that very order art disciplining us to lawful, orderly living, help us to accept and rejoice in that discipline. For Thy disciplines are our freedom. Help us to accept Thy laws, which have become our liberties. In Jesus' name. Amen.

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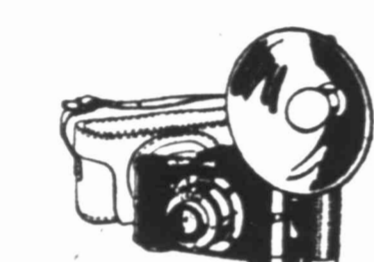

**+ Jacoby On Canasta +**

Written for NEA Service  
A letter from St. Paul reads as follows: "You state on the cover of both your books 'How to Win at Canasta' and 'Oswald Jacoby's Complete Canasta' that they contain the official laws of canasta. Recently I came across a small book which also claimed to have official laws, and its laws were different from yours. Who makes the laws, and under what authority?"

The answer to the question is that anybody is allowed to write a book on Canasta, and make up laws for the game and call them official, whether they represent just his opinion or that of a large group. However, responsible writers on card games recognize the need for one set of laws.

With this idea in mind, the late William E. McKenney, who prior to his death wrote on bridge and Canasta for NEA, Inc., suggested that a National Laws Commission be organized. This commission was organized in August of 1949.

I am chairman and Mr. Walter L. Richard of New York is secretary. The other members are John R. Crawford and Charles Goren of Philadelphia, Theodore Lightner, Albert Morehead and Otilille Relly of New York, Robert Lee Johnston of Los Angeles, and Ralph Michaels of Chicago.

The first work of the commission was to prepare the Standard 1950 Code, which appears in my book and in books by other members of the commission, and in books by many other writers who recognize the need for uniform laws and have agreed to go along with the com-

mission. The laws have also been adopted by the Regency Club of New York, where Canasta really started in this country, and by the Association of American Playing Card Manufacturers.

We don't claim that our laws are perfect. We are studying them continually, particularly with the idea of simplifying them and reducing the penalties. Furthermore, our indefatigable secretary, Mr. Richard, is in South America right now, talking to South American representatives with an idea to standardize the laws for the hemisphere, and we hope to have such a standard code available in 1951.

There is no need to worry that this Hemisphere Code will change the game materially. In particular, if someone states that we are going to make any radical change in the rules, he is just talking through his hat, because there just aren't going to be any radical changes.

The commission is strictly a non-profit organization. Although it copyrights its laws, it makes them available without charge to anyone else writing on Canasta. We can't force other writers to use our laws, but we can state that any writer who doesn't use them is just silly, and is hurting the game of Canasta, not helping it!

## Plump Chicken is A Favorite

Budget sense turns thoughts to chicken these days. Those plump little 3 to 3 1/2 pounders raised in

the state of Delaware are a good type for frying, broiling or roasting. These recipes come from noted Delaware cooks. They say it is always thriffter to cook two 3 or 3 1/2

pounders at a time, calling attention to the joy of a school child finding a drum stick in the lunch box next day.

**Chicken Fried In Covered Skillet**  
Cut two young frying chickens (about 3 pounds each) into serving pieces. Wash and dry well. Put 3/4 cup sifted flour in paper bag, add salt and white pepper to taste; shake chicken pieces (two at a time) in paper bag until well coated with flour.

Meanwhile, heat about 1/4 pound butter or fortified margarine in 10-inch frying pan. Fry chicken in hot fat until well browned, turning occasionally. Add 1/4 cup hot water or soup stock to browned chicken; cover pan, lower heat and cook until chicken is tender. Remove chicken to warm platter.

make gravy from drippings in pan, giblet stock or light cream or top milk.

**Chicken Fried In Uncovered Skillet**  
Prepare chicken for frying as above. Heat enough fortified margarine or vegetable shortening in 10-inch frying pan to cover about 3/4 inch of bottom. Saute chicken in hot fat until well browned, turning frequently.

Lower heat slightly and fry in open pan until tender, turning occasionally. Drain on brown paper, and serve immediately on warm platter. Make gravy if desired.

### Midlander Expresses View To Editor On Arrest Of Three High-Ranking Hungarians

A Midlander, Paul DeCleva, has written the following letter to the editor of The Dallas News.

It is self-explanatory. The letter reads:

"A short time ago The Dallas Morning News published an article in which it was stated that 700 Hungarian army officers including three high ranking generals—Lasslo Solyom, Imre Reval and Ily had been recently arrested for attempted desertion to Tito.

"I fled my native Hungary in 1948. At the time of my leaving I was serving as the military aid to the Speaker of The Hungarian Parliament. In that position it was necessary for me from time to time to deal with the high ranking generals mentioned in the article. I became familiar with their political views and their characters. Their story is typical of those who are desirous of com-

promising with communism.

"Lasslo Solyom and Gustav Ily were appointed to the Hungarian military General Staff school before World War II. Each year this school turned out ten to fourteen officers. Solyom and Ily, captains at that time, did not meet the high requirements of this school and therefore they were not allowed to graduate. With their feelings hurt they both resigned from the army. When the Russians moved into Hungary after the end of World War II, these two officers were among the first to claim martyrdom as having been persecuted by the former regime. Sympathizers with the Russian cause saw immediately the advantage of supporting such men as these and both men were placed in uniform and promoted to generals. These men became the executives of the army and in this capacity they were able to carry out Russian interests without opposition.

"Imre Reval was a captain in the cavalry before the war. It was well known that he possessed neither intelligence nor ambition. But strongly influenced by his socially ambitious wife, he searched for opportunities and joined the communist party. At the end of the world war II puppet Reval was placed in charge of the Hungarian Military Academy. It was his job to turn out large numbers of young officers well drenched in the communist theory. We were amazed that a man of Reval's capacities could transform so many normal people into communist fanatics. But Reval's conscience was not at ease. It was his custom to salute with one hand and cover the communist insignia on his coat with the other when he met former friends on the street.

"As the article stated, these men were accused and arrested by the communist Hungarian government. Knowing the communist system, upon these men the death sentence has already been passed. They are dying because the communists no longer need them.

"They can expect sympathy from no one. In Hungary as well as in America well known is the proverb of the man who sold his soul for a mess of pottage."

### Chicago's Headache Man Battles Public And Criminals, Too

CHICAGO—(NEA)—Former FBI Agent Virgil Peterson has more headaches than any other man in Chicago.

In his unique position as director of the Chicago Crime Commission he frequently finds himself at odds not only with criminals, but law enforcement officials, politicians, and even the general public as well. Peterson is sort of a super trouble-shooter, functioning as the leader of a civilian group working to reduce crime, improve laws, and improve law enforcement. His commission is the watchdog of the public.

The Chicago Crime Commission is supported entirely by public subscription and has no official authority. It can only suggest, probe, and prod. It was formed by the Chicago Association of Commerce in 1919 during the crime upsurge after the first world war. Following Chicago's lead, prominent citizens in many other major cities have launched similar organizations.

Works For FBI  
An Iowan and an alumnus of Parsons College in his home state, Peterson graduated from Northwestern University's law school and worked with the FBI for 12 years before taking over at the Chicago Crime Commission in 1942.

His work received national attention when he was called to testify before the Senate crime investigating committee earlier this Summer. The slim, graying, 46-year-old veteran described the set-up of nation-wide crime syndicates for seven hours to the Kefauver committee.

Peterson thinks the work of the committee may reduce crime considerably, but he firmly believes any real solution will have to come on a local level.

"This is because corruption of local politicians is an absolute must for the existence of organized crime," he says. "And this corruption inevitably seeps down to many law enforcement officials."

Political corruption and public apathy are the two chief bugaboos Peterson is fighting. As long as people are indifferent about the existence of handbooks and refuse to think much about prostitution and the "rackets," big-time crime will run rampant, he believes, adding: "These activities provide the bulk of the underworld's 'easy money.'"

### Saskatchewan Thugs Blow Their Tops

AQUADELL, SASKATCHEWAN.—(AP)—Safe-crackers tried to get \$2,400 from a safe in the Saskatchewan Pool elevators' office here. But they blew their chances sky high with an overdose of nitroglycerine. The safe's top went through the office ceiling and kept on going through the roof. The \$2,400 was destroyed in the blast.
