All the way down the hill we stopped at every likely-looking little market, cafe, gas station, hatchery and what-have-you. You sure can get some funny looks from folks. And when you ask where's a likely place to find some fish, they tell you "Well, out in the stream, I suppose."

Residents Promised Additional Channels

Meeting with the Friona City Council on Monday and explaining the reasons for the \$1.00 per month rate increase to subscribers was Friona Cablevision owner Merlyn Neel.

Neel explained that the cost of materials used by the company had skyrocketed in recent months, making the increase necessary.

The cable television company owner also promised to add to the local system Channel 28, ABC, Lubbock, within the near future. Neel added that there was the possibility of adding two other channels to those available locally within the next year or so.

In other business, the council

agreed to the request by the Boy Scout council for the city to underwrite costs for installation of the water and sewer utilities to the new Boy Scout House.

A payment of \$13,071.58 was authorized to Jake Diel, Contractor, for sealcoating 30 blocks of streets within the city during June.

The council agreed for the city to participate in 50 per cent of the cost of resurfacing the high school tennis courts, provided the school board approves public use of the courts during non-school hours.

City Manager Jake Outland was authorized to attend the National City Manager's convention, which will be held in Dallas this year in October. Outland explained that this was the closest to our area the NCM convention had ever been held.

A number of residents of Austin Avenue presented a petition to the council, asking the closing of the street to through truck traffic. This is the street that runs just west of the Parmer House Restaurant, and is used as a "short cut" considerably by trucks heading to and from feed lots.

The council promised to look into the possibility of having the street so designated.

Outland sought the council's guidance in making up the city's budget for the fiscal year 1974-75, and presented a number of proposed items he felt necessary for capital outlay expenses.

Among the major items included was \$5,000 for renovation of the City Office; \$3,000 for a new patrol car (exchange); \$5,500 for an individual alert system for members of the Friona Fire Dept.

Also, \$4,000 for a new tractor-shredder for the park-cemetery department (exchange); \$5,000 for a Dempster Truck Chassis (exchange); \$8,000 for the swim pool, including \$5,000 for a new filter pump system; \$18,000 for expenditures in the water department, and \$3,500 for expenditures in the wastewater department.

The city's budget hearing will be announced at a later date.

Johnny Spring Hurt In Roping

Johnny Spring, 14-year-old son of Dr. and Mrs. Paul Spring of Friona, was still in critical condition in the intensive care unit at Amarillo's Northwest Texas Hospital at the Star's press time, following an injury last Sunday involving a horse at the local roping arena.

Young Spring was practicing roping a calf during the weekly "playday" activities Sunday when he became entangled in the rope and was dragged a considerable distance by his horse.

It was reported that the youngster was dragged outside the arena, and finally became separated from the horse when the rope caught on the fender of a parked car, and was severed.

He was rushed to Parmer County Community Hospital for emergency treatment.

where by a stroke of fate his father, Dr. Paul Spring, chief of staff at the hospital, was on call for emergency cases.

After emergency treatment locally, young Spring was whisked to Amarillo by Parsons-Ellis ambulance.

Johnny suffered a broken back, head injuries, a crushed left arm, broken above the elbow, and hematoma of the kidney.

A spokesman for the family indicated that the youngster, who had been unconscious since the Sunday ordeal, was close to regaining consciousness on Thursday. He was responding somewhat to questions, and at one point asked where he was, a report said.

The youngster would be a freshman at Friona High School this fall, but a lengthy recovery period is indicated at this point.

A son, Joe, discovered his father sometime after the accident and brought him to Parmer County Community Hospital for treatment and x-rays.

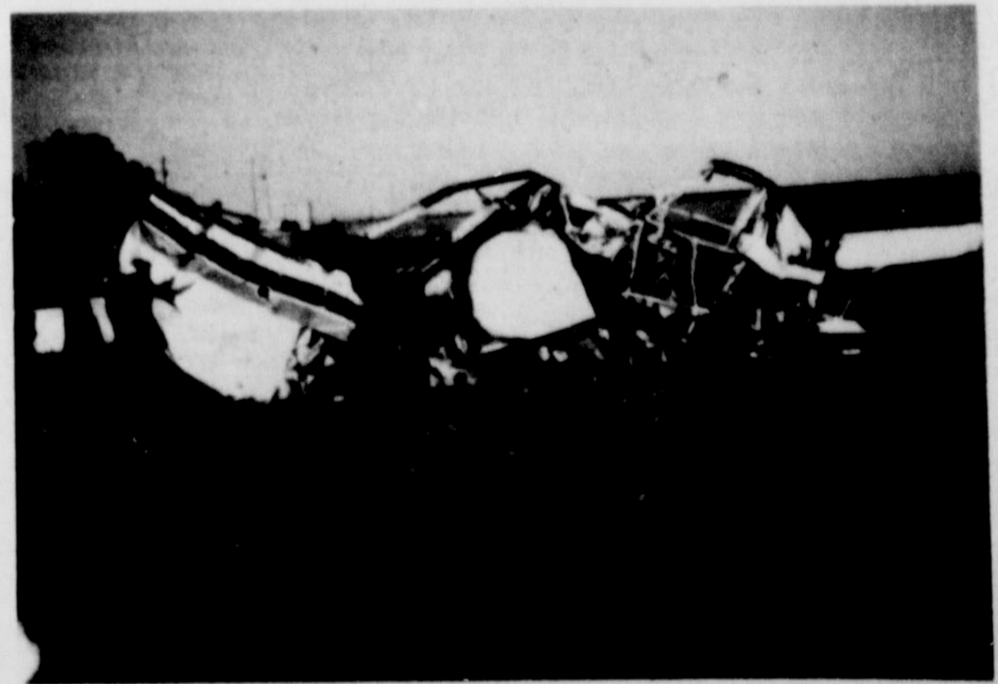
Lewellen suffered a broken rib, a severely sprained ankle, and bad bruises on his side.

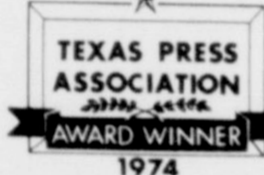

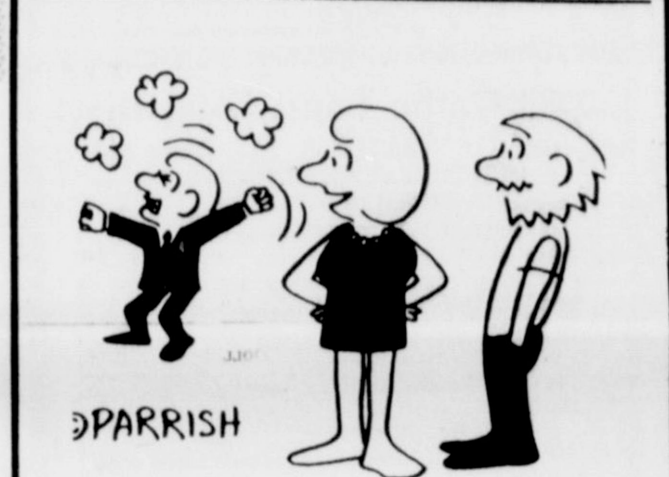

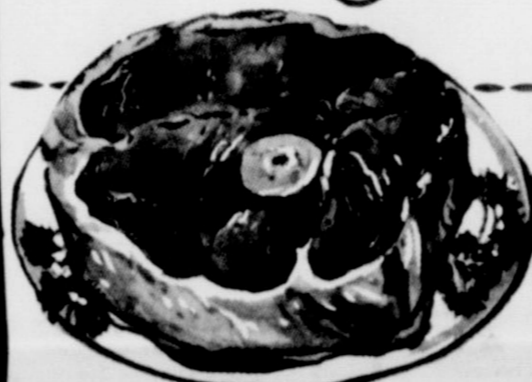

He is the father of Florian Jarecki of Friona.

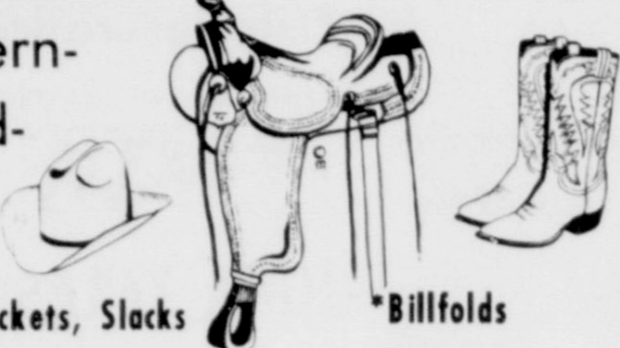
The Jareckis were on vacation when the accident occurred.

July 15 Deadline Set For Signup

With less than one week remaining until the Monday, July 15 deadline for farm program signup and certification, Parmer County grain and cotton farmers are reminded that program participation provides disaster insurance and eligibility for support loans and payments.

"Now that crops are planted, we want to remind farmers to come by the ASCS county office at their convenience to sign up and certify—just as long as they

do so by no later than July 15," said Prentice Mills, county executive director.

Signup and certification are as important as ever to producers this year, he noted. The new program provides for disaster payments to participants if their feed grain, wheat or cotton crops are lost or the yield substantially reduced because of natural disaster. Also, as in prior years, eligibility for support loans and payments is dependent upon being in the program. Accuracy is extremely important in certifying crop acreages.

"Remember, July 15 is the last day farmers can sign up and certify their farm program participation. We hope that every eligible producer has visited the Parmer County ASCS office by then," reminded Mills this week.

Turn points for the contest will be Floydada, Snyder, Midland, Wink, Littlefield, Post, Lamesa, Andrews, Morton, Seagraves and Brownfield in Texas. Turn points in New Mexico are Whites City,

Artesia, Portales, Jal, Crossroads and Hobbs.

Sixty American glider pilots and five foreign pilots are expected to take part in the event which will be held at Hobbs Industrial-Air Park on the Hobbs-Lovington Highway, near New Mexico Junior College and Llano Estacado Medical Center.

Visitors are welcome to the contest to view the planes prior to takeoff and to witness the launching each day about 11 a.m. For those who are unable to see the launch, landings will be between 3 to 5 p.m.

The contest will be unique this year, according to Gomez, since there will be many new American-made ships competing. In past years foreign ships, particularly German ones, have dominated the show.

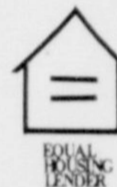

Employment Survey To Be Taken Locally

Local representatives of the Bureau of the Census will interview a sample of households in this area the week of July 15-19 to obtain information on employment. The Bureau is part of the U.S. Department of Commerce's Social and Economic Statistics Administration.

Percy R. Millard, Director of the Bureau's Data Collection Center in Dallas, said the households are among 50,000 across the country that have been scientifically selected to represent a cross section of the American people.

The survey, which the Bureau conducts each month for the U.S. Department of Labor, provides a continuous measure of employment and unemployment for the nation. For example, the May survey showed that employment was 86.0 million, up slightly from the 85.8 million at which it had stood since January. The unemployment rate edged up to 5.2 per cent from 5.0 per cent in April, primarily because of a rise in joblessness among teenagers.

Information supplied by individuals participating in the survey is kept confidential by law and results are used only to compile statistical totals.

Moving to Hale Center from Sudan, he served as assistant football coach for two seasons under Coach Jax McSpadden before he was promoted to head coach in 1972.

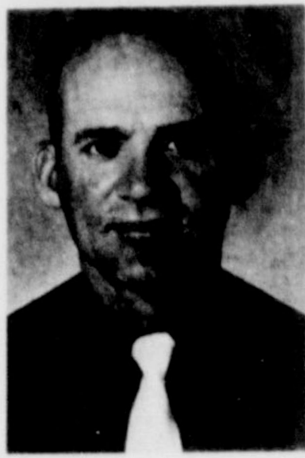
Hale Center had been demoralized by a losing streak when he became head coach, but under Lacewell's quiet leadership Hale Center regained the victory trail.

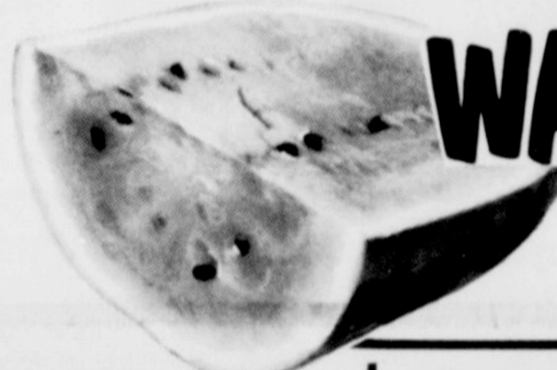

"Feeding your child commercial baby foods is like feeding your husband a thawed-out TV dinner every night," claim the authors who want the reader to by-pass the baby food section in the supermarket and introduce the baby to a whole new and nutritious world of eating.

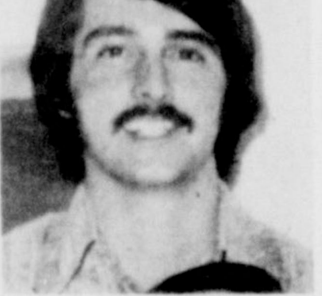
Mike Parsons Makes Dean's Roll At SMU

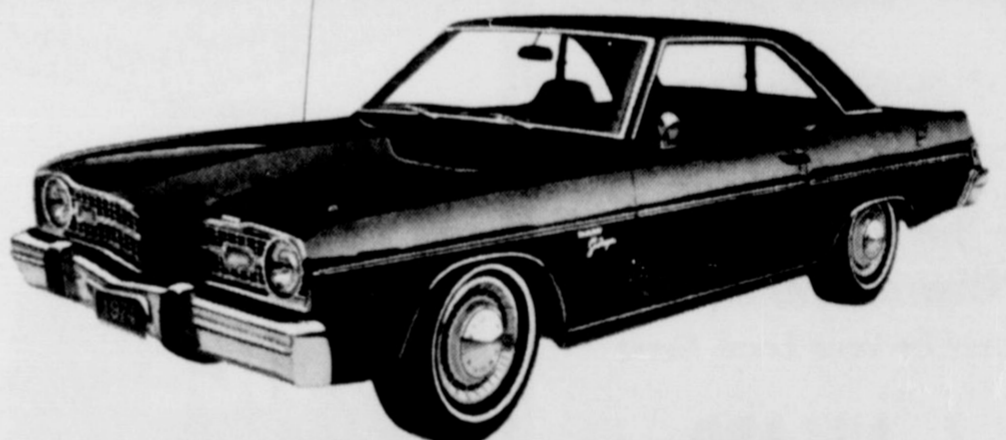

On The Farm In Parmer County

By R. MACK HEALD

LIVESTOCK PRODUCERS should be aware that 1974 has the earmarks of an extremely bad screwworm season, and we should make every effort to reduce the number of outbreaks. A positive case of screwworms has already been found in the Bovina area.

Livestock producers can support the screwworm eradication effort by carrying out three key practices: 1) Inspecting their animals frequently; 2) Treating all found wounds with an approved product; and 3) Collecting and sending worm samples from wounds to the USDA Screwworm laboratory at Mission, Texas, for identification. The post office box is 969.

As cases are confirmed, sterile screwworm fly treatment is initiated by the USDA. It is vitally important for program officials to know where cases are happening in order to begin the sterile fly treatment before cases are too numerous.

As spring migrations of fertile flies from south of the Rio Grande continue, the cases move northward across Texas rather rapidly.

If you need collection vials you can come by my office and pick them up.

MOST OF THE 1974 COTTON CROP has been planted, but it's far from being in the bale. In fact, most prognosticators now look for a much shorter crop than first predicted, leading to a generally tight supply situation through 1975.

Early in the year many people had visions of a bumper cotton crop for 1974. This led to depressed prices and a scarcity of buyers for the remaining 1973 crop as well as little interest in forward contracting of this year's crop.

However, specialists now see an improvement in cotton prices as the 1974 crop progresses and supplies continue to diminish.

Carryover by August 1 is expected to be down to 3.4 million bales, the second lowest level in the past 22 years. Cotton mills had only about an 11-week supply on May 4, with supplies of one inch and longer cotton especially short.

Both foreign and domestic demands continue to keep pressure on cotton stocks. About six million bales of the 1973 crop will be exported and some 5.5 million bales of the 1974 crop should move abroad. Although domestic consumption was down to 7.5 million bales during the past season, this should increase to about 7.9 million bales during the coming year.



At Home In Parmer County

CHECKING the construction of newly purchased garments may save much time and expense later.

Spend a few minutes initially with a new garment and you will have extra hours of confident wearing pleasure.

Some guides for checking new garments follow:

-If stitches are too loose in the hem or too visible on the right side, remove the stitches and re-hem, either with a suitable thread or by using a fusible.

-Thread dangling threads into a needle. Bring them inside the garment and fasten securely.

-Reinforce loose buttons, snaps and hooks and eyes before they become missing items.

-Prolong the life of a poorly

constructed machine-made buttonhole by going over it with a buttonhole hand stitch or machine zig-zag.

-Reinforce sleeve and crotch seams with a second line of machine stitching 1/8 inch inside the seam allowance using a short stitch length, thread and needle appropriate for the fashion fabric. Narrow or crooked seams need this same treatment of a second line of stitching.

-Reinforce underarm seams of raglan and kimono sleeves with seam tape.

-Strengthen pockets, or plaquets with a few firm hand or machine stitches placed in prime areas of stress.

-Iron-on patches or interfacing on the inside can reinforce areas of hard wear such as knees, elbows and seats of pants.

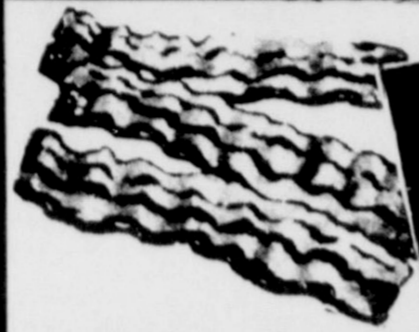
