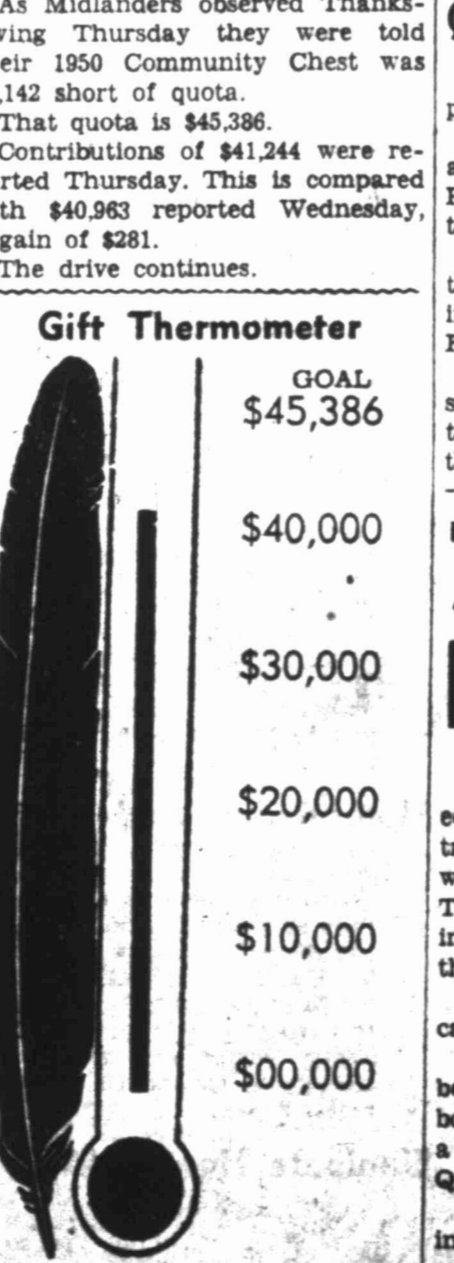

Kirsten Flagstad, soprano, sang to a near capacity house Wednesday night in the high school auditorium. This exciting vocalist sang to a most-appreciative and enthusiastic audience. Her accompanist was Edward Rebner.

She was brought here under the sponsorship of the Civic Music Association.

Her concert consisted of numbers by Schubert, Brahms, Strauss, Grieg, Wagner and others.

When Kirsten Flagstad returned to the United States for the first time since the war an American critic, commenting on her voice, said, "Flagstad is like a sudden breath of Spring after a long, siege of Winter." After her performance Wednesday night Midlanders felt the same way.

This season she will be back with the Metropolitan Opera in her old place as queen of the Wagnerian wing, in the Ring Cycle, as Lenore in Beethoven's only opera, "Fidelio." This opera is to be revived after many years.

The soprano has toured Europe and Latin America many times and

has appeared in every major opera house in Europe. She divides her time between Europe and the United States and last season sang more than 50 concerts in America with orchestra, recital and in opera. She plans to spend the whole season in the U. S., from September until April, with appearances averaging one every other day.

1951 Model Fords To Be Introduced Here Friday

The 1951 Ford, featuring Fordomatic Drive, the new automatic transmission, will be introduced in Ford dealerships here and throughout the nation Friday. The new models may be seen at Murray-Young Motors, Ltd., in Midland.

"Ford cars for 1951 accomplish notable refinements in styling, beauty, engineering, riding qualities, economy, safety and ease of handling," Murray-Young officials said. Addition of the new automatic device will make available to Ford buyers a choice of three transmissions and two engines—six different power combinations in all.

Both the conventional three-speed transmission and the Ford overdrive will continue to be available. There, with the new Fordomatic Drive, will be offered with either the 100-horsepower V8 or the improved 95-horsepower six engines.

Introduction of Fordomatic climaxes several years of intensive engineering research by the company to develop a fully automatic transmission that is simple to operate, economical, long wearing and easy to service. The device, which will be optional at extra cost, combines the advantages of a hydraulic torque converter and a planetary gear train to provide maximum performance and a smooth and economical flow of power.

Distinctive Styling

The distinctive styling of the 1949 and 1950 models has been retained, but with refinements and improvements both in interiors and exteriors.

A lowered hood, a new dual-spinner grille and a wider, longer wrap-around bumper give a more massive appearance to the front end. Added chrome and new, larger tail lamps add to the appearance of the rear end.

An outstanding feature of the new cars is a new "softer" ride which is made possible by suspension improvements and automatic ride controls. A new control valve was developed in the hydraulic shock absorbers, which adjusts the cushioning effect. The combination of new tension-type rear spring suspension and softer front spring rate maintains a proper balance between the front and rear for a level ride on all roads. Rubber engine mounts also have been redesigned.

The Ford deluxe line includes the business coupe, tudor and fordor models. In the custom line are the club coupe, tudor, fordor and convertible. The Country Squire station wagon and the Crestliner complete the passenger car line. The V8 engine or the Six are optional on all models except the convertible and the Crestliner.

Second Auto Bomb Found After Couple Is Killed In Blast

FORT WORTH —(AP)— "A typical gangland assassination" was the tag police put on the explosion of an automobile bomb which killed an ex-convict, his wife and unborn child here Wednesday.

A nitroglycerine bomb discovered planted in the automobile of another Fort Worth ex-convict about two hours later was "put there by the same people who put it in the first auto," officers said.

Both incidents were compared with the explosion of a similar car bomb in Dallas less than a year ago which killed the pretty wife of Dallas gambler Herbert Noble, Nelson Harris, 41, one of 21 persons convicted here in 1940 as a member of the Green Dragon narcotics ring, was almost decapitated by the explosion Wednesday morning. Apparently the blast came when he stepped on the starter of his 1950 automobile, as it stood in the driveway of his home.

Perforated By Metal

Mrs. Harris, 25, was perforated by flying metal as she prepared to enter the car. The couple was going to a nearby grocery store.

Mrs. Harris and the unborn baby, whose birth was expected in about a week, died soon afterward.

The discovery of the second nitroglycerine bomb was made by Leroy (Tincy) Eggleston, 43, who said he was "a close friend" of Harris.

Eggleston said he started to get in his car, just after hearing of Harris' death, and noticed the hood was not completely closed. He opened the hood and saw unfamiliar wiring, so he called a mechanic. The mechanic found a quart fruit jar filled with a jelly-like substance, behind the dashboard. Eggleston called police.

Tennessee To Be Texas' Opponent In Cotton Bowl

DALLAS—(AP)—Tennessee and Texas, a couple of schools that have been knocking around in this post-season football business for quite a spell, hook up here January 1 in the fifteenth annual Cotton Bowl.

Tennessee Wednesday was invited to play Texas, the Southwest conference champion, in Dallas' New Year's Day classic and accepted it late afternoon—after Gen. Bob Neyland, the Volunteers' coach, had finished the day's work-out.

Tennessee, you know, has two more games to play, the same as Texas. The big one for the Vols is Saturday when they meet undefeated, untied Kentucky, an apparent Sugar Bowl participant, at Knoxville.

The Cotton Bowl was filled this time the earliest in its 15-year history. This was made possible by the conference champion being determined two weeks ahead of the time it usually is. Also, Tennessee's willingness to accept an invitation before finishing its schedule helped hurry things along.

The game here January 1 will complete the circuit of the major bowls for Tennessee, which has been in the Rose, Sugar and Orange Bowls twice each. The Vols have won only two of the games. Texas hasn't been to the Rose Bowl and probably never will in view of the current "closed corporation" in the Pasadena classic whereby the Big Ten and Pacific Coast Conferences furnish the teams, but the Longhorns have played in the Cotton, Orange and Sugar Bowls and are you listening Tennessee? — never have lost a bowl game.

Texas has won seven games and lost one this season—the defeat being 14-13 to Oklahoma. Tennessee has won eight of nine games, the loss being to Mississippi State 7-0 in early season.

Tennessee has rolled up 265 points in its nine games, being shut out only in the Mississippi State melee. Texas uses the T formation, Tennessee the single wing.

Kentucky, Oklahoma Sugar Bowl Shoo-ins

NEW ORLEANS—(AP)—Kentucky and Oklahoma supporters can breathe easy—their football teams will get invitations to the 1951 Sugar Bowl unless something goes haywire Saturday.

That's straight from a pair of birds that roost in a tree next to the stadium.

If either team declines the bid or gets knocked around too badly Saturday, Wyoming is very much in the picture. All three teams are unbeaten and untied, but Wyoming's schedule wasn't as impressive. Kentucky completes its schedule against Tennessee Saturday, while Oklahoma faces Nebraska Saturday and Oklahoma A&M next week. Wyoming meets Denver Thursday.

The two birds figure a Kentucky victory or tie against Tennessee would bring an immediate announcement of the team's invitation to the Sugar Bowl. Tennessee's acceptance of a Cotton Bowl bid against Texas makes Kentucky a sure thing unless Tennessee mauls them out and Wyoming in.

In 1949, Colgate's football team scored 186 points but won only one game.

Names Of 'Chutists Killed, Injured In B-36 Mishap Listed

PORT WORTH—(AP)—Two crewmen were killed when they parachuted from a giant B-36 bomber shortly before it crashed near here Wednesday morning.

The other 14 crew members were only slightly injured.

The dead:
Capt. Horace C. Stewart, Jr., 33, navigator of Philadelphia, Miss., who died when his chute did not have time to open after he jumped from the plane.

Capt. James H. Yeingst, 30, radarman, of Mount Holly Springs, Pa., who died when his parachute caught in a propeller, jerking him into the whirling blades.

Two of the bomber's six engines went out on an early morning flight to a gunnery range at Matagorda Bay off the Gulf Coast. The plane was unable to land because of a 300-foot ceiling along the gulf. The plane almost had regained its home field when a third engine went out and the pilot ordered the crew to bail out.

The pilotless plane crash landed in a field about 20 miles south of Port Worth and burst into flames. The survivors and their injuries are:

LOS ANGELES—(AP)—In distant Trieste, Ivan and Darja Popov, aged and ailing Yugoslav refugees, can be happy this Thanksgiving Day.

A Superior Court judge Wednesday signed a stipulation providing the couple with \$400 a month each pending settlement of their son's \$200,000 estate.

Retrospective to last January 1, the payments will be made from a \$25,000 partial distribution of the estate.

In the mid-70's and almost blind, the couple is in the Opicina Refugee Camp in the Free City of Trieste. If the State Department grants them visitor permits to this country, the stipulation also provides \$2,800 for traveling expenses.

Their son, Ivan Denis, an osteopath, died in Pasadena three years ago.

West Allies File New Protest Over Austria
WASHINGTON—(AP)—The United States, Britain and France again Thursday protested against alleged Soviet interference with the Austrian government's control over its own police in the Russian zone.

The new protest charged that the Russians have prevented Austrian authorities from maintaining law and order and demanded that Moscow order its representatives in Vienna "to conform strictly" to four-power agreements which would prevent such interference.

Two Puerto Rican Radical Chiefs Held In Plot On Truman

NEW YORK—(AP)—Two Puerto Rican radical leaders, suspected of being chief plotters in the attempt to assassinate President Truman, were held in separate New York jails Thursday under heavy guard.

The two men were seized here late Wednesday by Secret Service agents.

They are Julio Pinto Gandia, 42, veteran terrorist and president of the New York unit of the Puerto Rican Nationalist Party, and Juan Bernardo Lebron, 28, past president of the New York unit.

More arrests were believed in the offing. The wives of two men who attempted to kill the President in Washington—Oscar Collazo and Grisello Torresola—were arrested here shortly after the November 1 gun battle outside Blair House.

Organized Plot
Assistant U. S. Attorney Frederick H. Block said a federal grand jury has evidence of "the possible existence of an organized plot" to kill the President, with the gunmen "having been guilified in their mission by Gandia and Lebron and the gunmen's wives."

The two would-be assassins, both New York City residents, were active in the Puerto Rican Nationalist Party—a radical group which demands complete independence of the island from the United States. The party recently staged an armed uprising.

The charge against Gandia and Lebron is that they conspired with the two wives—Mrs. Rosa Collazo, 42, and Mrs. Carmen Torresola, 22—against the safety of the President. U. S. Commissioner Edward W. McDonald held Gandia and Lebron in \$50,000 bail each for a hearing December 6.

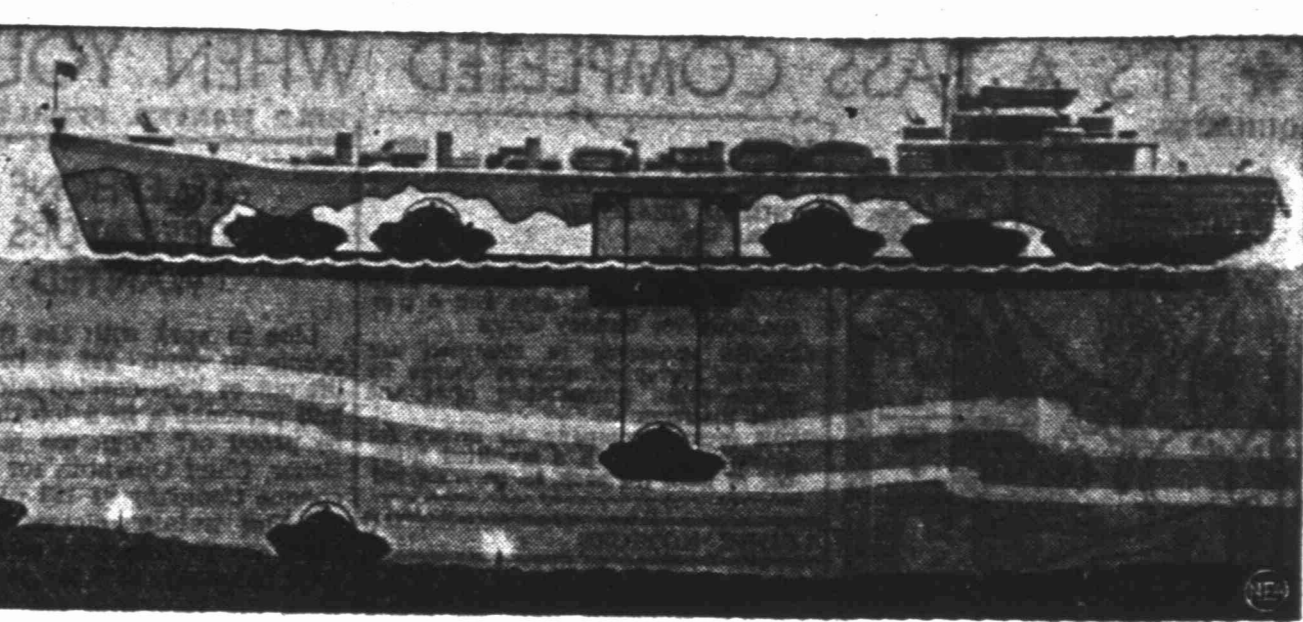

back because of heavy casualties, intensive bombings and superior UN fighting power.

Actually, there was no more explanation of the withdrawals than of the unprecedented release of the 27 prisoners.

The American POW's were driven in trucks 60 miles southward from a prison camp at Pyokjong on the Manchurian border. They were hidden by night to avoid UN war planes, and were released about a mile in front of the U. S. First Cavalry Division lines.

They are veterans of the cavalry's Eighth Regiment. The regiment was cut off and savagely attacked in the surprise Red counter-offensive in the Unsan area of Northwest Korea October 31 and November 1.

Well Fed, Well Treated
The prisoners—all enlisted men—said they were well fed, well treated, and cared for by two captured American doctors. They were not questioned about UN military dispositions.

When released, the guards shook hands with the Americans and told them how to reach their own lines. Those unable to walk were carried by their comrades to American lines.

U. S. Eighth Army Headquarters was surprised and relieved at the unannounced release. Headquarters began to wonder at the meaning of the Chinese action. Both the treatment of the men and their release was in marked contrast to atrocities committed by North Korean Reds.

Freed Americans said that once a North Korean guard shot a straggling American cavalryman in the foot. The Chinese beat the North Korean "ferrociously."

Whatever the Chinese reason for releasing the Americans, it was a Thanksgiving Day gift for the freed men.

Engineer, Woman Pal Convicted In Atomic Spy Case

NEW YORK—(AP)—A chemical engineer and his woman business associate were convicted Wednesday night of conspiring to hinder a federal investigation of the engineer's relations with confessed atom spy Harry Gold.

They are Abraham Brothman, 36, and Miriam Moskowitz, 24.

A federal court jury of seven men and five women brought in the guilty verdicts after almost four hours' deliberation.

Maximum penalties at the sentencing set for November 28 could be seven years in prison and a \$15,000 fine for Brothman and two years and \$10,000 fine for Miss Moskowitz.

Gold, formerly employed by Brothman, was the government's star witness against the pair.

Brothman and Miss Moskowitz were convicted of obstructing justice in a grand jury probe. They were accused specifically of conspiring together with Gold to defraud the government of its function of enforcing the federal criminal laws.

Gold, 39-year-old Philadelphia biochemist, is awaiting sentence on a plea of guilty to espionage. He has confessed to acting as a go-between for Dr. Klaus Fuchs, a top British scientist who once worked on atomic research in the United States, now is serving a prison term in England.

Strenuous Sports May Prove Harmful To Some Children

It is almost universal for youngsters in their teens to take part in high school athletics. There is no doubt that this is good on the whole, but one question which has never been satisfactorily answered is whether competitive athletics of the more strenuous kinds are harmful.

This is not much of a problem for girls, but the possible effect of some kinds of sports on the heart can be very important indeed for boys. Competitive sports like baseball, football and field events would not be likely to harm the hearts of any of those thus engaged who are in good health. Football causes injuries, of course, but not to the heart because there is no long-continued muscular effort. Rest periods come at frequent intervals.

The question of injuring the heart is more likely to come up in basketball, crew racing and middle distance track. In these last-mentioned sports the muscles are in constant motion for rather long periods of time, thus throwing a continuous burden on the heart. Sometimes one hears the expression "athlete's heart." Not all who have studied this question agree there is such a thing. Dr. J. W. Wilce, who was the famous health director of Ohio State University, studied the heart size in 233 American male athletes.

He found that in many of these the heart was enlarged, but that this did not cause any apparent ill effects, if the athlete was otherwise normal.

A heart which is merely enlarged as a result of occasional strenuous exertion usually returns to normal size. Long-continued physical strain may result in permanent heart enlargement, though this of itself is not harmful.

However, the person who has any trace of heart disease and engages in extreme physical effort is much more liable to serious injury. From the practical point of view there is little danger to the heart from any sport which does not involve continuous muscular exertion at top speed for several minutes at a time. In sports that do require this exertion, the heart must be carefully watched for evidence of disease or strain.

Beware Even Minor Ills
It seems particularly undesirable to engage in this form of athletics during or immediately after even a minor illness like a common cold. Also if the growth is especially rapid, there may be some increased danger of injuring the heart by over-exertion.

Everyone agrees that proper training before engaging in competitive sports is highly desirable. Physical examinations before hand and repeated at frequent intervals are well worthwhile.
