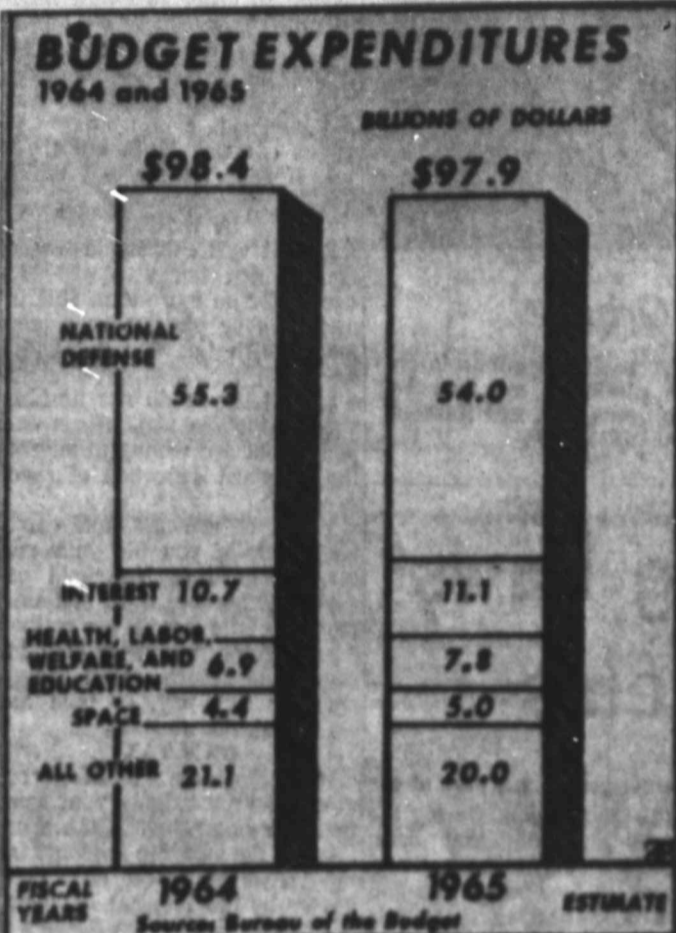

Special Rules Apply To Short Form 1040A

EDITOR'S NOTE—For those who use the familiar form 1040 in filing a tax return on 1963 income, there are a number of provisions covering various types of income. Here, in the second of five special articles, is an explanation of income tax return forms.

Anyone can file his 1963 income tax return on form 1040. So have to. Form 1040A is simpler, but to use it you must fit special rules.

Special Notes on husbands and wives. 1. If a man and wife file separate returns and take the standard deduction, they are allowed to take 10 per cent of their income up to only \$500 on each return.

1040. In such a case neither can use 1040A. The under-\$5,000 income people, who accept the standard 10 per cent deduction without itemizing, can find their tax in the tax-table in the IRS instruction sheet.

OWN TAX If your income was \$5,000 or more, you must figure your own tax, either on 1040 or 1040A.

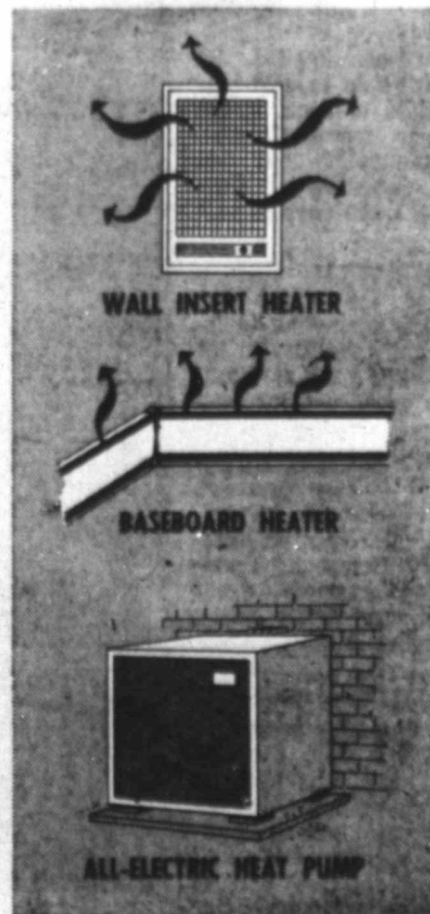

Flying Grandma Eulogized As Ballooning First Lady

NEWPORT BEACH, Calif. (AP)—Barbara Keith, the flying grandmother who died at sea during the first Catalina Channel hot air ballooning race, was named "the first lady of hot air ballooning" as plans were laid for next year's race.

Mrs. Keith, 42, from Hartford, Conn., was found in the seat of the hot air balloon that had lifted her off Santa Catalina Island 48 hours earlier.

An autopsy showed she drowned. Chief Deputy Coroner Gene Massey also said she de-

veloped pneumonia before she died.

He estimated the balloon fell into the sea about 6:15 p.m. Saturday, and said the time of death was probably 2 a.m. Sunday, almost 8 hours later.

Members of the California Balloon Club, however, were undaunted.

In a prepared statement issued after a meeting Monday, they said: "We are all terribly grieved at the passing of a gallant and wonderful person, Barbara Keith."

"With the number of boats and aircraft in the area, it is inconceivable to all of us that Mrs. Keith's descent was not seen and she located."

"We believe the magnificent performance of Ed Zost in winning the race, landing safely and exactly where predicted while other balloonists came down just short of the mainland, indicates the challenge and competitiveness of the race."

"The balloonists are anxious to see the race continue, and the club is formulating plans for next year's race, hoping to exemplify the spirit typified by the first lady of hot air ballooning, Barbara Keith."

Mrs. Keith's body was located eight miles off Dana Point by the crew of a Coast Guard cutter. The recovery spot is about 25 miles due east of Santa Catalina Island, where nine balloonists took off Saturday afternoon.

Coast Guard spokesmen said Mrs. Keith's body, encased in an inflated lifejacket, was tied to the balloon's gas tanks by a 25-foot rope.

Another length of rope tied her body to a stuffed poodle she had laughingly described as her copilot.

TB Hospitals Ban Cigarettes

HARRISBURG, Pa. (AP) — Pennsylvania has banned cigarette sales at its four hospitals for tuberculosis and may ban them at state general and mental hospitals.

Dr. Charles L. Wilbar, health secretary, said Monday the ban was effective immediately because "smoking is an extremely dangerous habit."

Heavy Snow, Rain Pound North California, Nevada

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—Heavy snow and rain driven by gale winds continued to buffet Northern California and much of Nevada after chasing people from their homes, snarling traffic and causing injuries Monday.

The forecast today even mentioned the rare "possibility of snow in hills" around the San Francisco Bay area tonight as temperatures were expected to skid in a wide area.

In Orick, 45 miles north of Eureka, Calif., most of the town's 700 residents were back in their homes after being routed when Redwood Creek overflowed. Water was reported five feet deep in the logging community Monday.

In the southern part of Humboldt County, the Eel River broke its banks and flowed into farmland. Wind-felled trees, rain and snow temporarily blocked roads throughout Northern California and Nevada.

Winds were so strong Monday at the Golden Gate Bridge that motorists were asked to slow down and keep to the right-hand lane to avoid being pushed into on-coming vehicles by gusts up to 60 miles per hour.

Traffic on the span and its approaches was snarled for hours as heavy rain and wind tore in to the city during the evening rush hours, stalling many cars.

Radio station KSCO near the ocean at Santa Cruz reported a 30-second gust of wind measured by its instruments at almost 50 m.p.h. Monday night, and a 15-minute average of 30 m.p.h.

Gusts about 50 m.p.h. battered San Francisco and Reno most of the day, damaging cars in the Nevada city. Several San Francisco pedestrians were injured when blown over by the wind, cut by wind-shattered glass or hit by rain-blinded vehicles.

Agriculture Reduction Biggest In LBJ Budget

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Johnson called upon agriculture to take the largest percentage reduction in its budget—20 per cent—of any single governmental activity for the coming fiscal year.

In his budget message to Congress, the President outlined expenditures for agriculture and agricultural resources totaling \$5,065,000,000 for the financial year beginning July 1. This is a reduction of \$1,285,000,000 from estimated spending in the current fiscal year.

Despite the slash, Johnson said that if new cotton and dairy programs to be recommended by him become law, farm income would be improved over this year's level.

The bulk of the reduction in agricultural spending would be on programs not directly connected with a farm-income bolstering activities. Included would be the Food for Peace program under which surpluses are sold at concessionary terms or donated to needy countries; a plan to shift financing of rural housing loans from the government to private funds under an insured loan program; and a plan to shift cost of inspection of meat, poultry and grains

from the federal Treasury to processors and dealers. Johnson estimated spending in the new year on programs relating to farm price supports, bolstering of farm incomes, conservation of water and land and payments for holding cropland out of production would total about \$1,891,000,000 during the coming year compared with \$1,890,500,000 this year if present programs are continued.

He envisioned a saving of \$230 million in costs of these activities if Congress enacted new cotton and dairy legislation. While details of his recommendations on such legislation are yet to go to Capitol Hill, they are expected to propose making payments to producers who help adjust production to market demands. The cost of these payments is calculated to be less than the cost of cotton and dairy product surpluses that government must now buy and store—often for long periods.

Administration and other advocates of such payments contend that a dollar spent in such fashion will do much more to bolster farm income than a dollar spent in buying and holding surpluses.

The proposed slash in the Food for Peace program—about \$500 million—would not involve any reduction in quantities of food supplied needy areas. The saving would come largely from the fact that domestic prices of wheat—the major item moved under this program—are expected to drop to close to world prices.

Under such a price change, the government no longer would be required to pay an export subsidy to make the grain competitive abroad. Because growers rejected a control program for this year's wheat crop, the price support will drop from \$1.82 a bushel to \$1.25. Under the present support—which expires with 1963 crop marketings—an export subsidy of about 65 cents a bushel is being paid. This drop in wheat prices will cut costs of the international wheat agreement from \$100 million this year to less than one million next. Funds provided for the agreement are earmarked for export subsidies.

John Myers Wins Another Round

John Edwin Myers, 34, confessed slayer of four, won a third continuance in his scheduled murder trial in Belleville, Ill., Monday but he lost two other defense maneuvers.

The defendant, well known here where he was held for more than two years for one of the homicides, was scheduled to go on trial Monday in the Illinois city for the murder of George Ballard, 47, and his 10-year-old daughter, Carole. These were the first two victims of Myers and his teen-age girl friend, Donna Marie Stone, when they launched a murder spree in late August, 1961. Their fourth victim was Arthur De-

Kraal, an Iowa hitchhiker who was shot to death a few miles west of here on Sept. 1, 1961. Monday, Judge Joseph Fleming ordered a psychiatric examination for Myers before his trial begins. This brought about the continuance of the case set to open Monday.

However, the judge denied a motion by Myers' attorneys for a change of venue and also refused to consolidate the murders of Ballard and his daughter into one case.

Myers was tried in Rusk for the murder here of DeKraal and his punishment fixed at death in the electric chair. The Texas Court of Criminal Appeals reversed the verdict, holding the jury guilty of misconduct. The case was remanded for retrial. An attempt to try it in Lynn County was made and absence of witnesses led to a continuance.

Soon afterwards, Gil Jones, Howard County district attorney, agreed to let Illinois officers take Myers back to Belleville to stand trial for the Ballard homicides.

The fourth victim of the murder spree was Margaret Wernicker, a saleswoman whom Myers and Donna Marie forced to accompany them on their trip south after the Ballard murders. They shot her to death in the hill country of southern Missouri.

Donna Marie was returned to Illinois some time ago where she was committed to the Illinois youth authority to serve an indeterminate sentence for her admitted part in the Ballard slayings.

ALBUQUERQUE, N. M. (AP)—The assistant secretary of the interior for public land management asked livestock men today to help cut the cost of administering public lands.

In an address to the National Wool Growers Association, John Carver, Jr., said sheepmen would help their own interests by helping to reduce government overhead.

He said costs of supervising grazing rules and regulations have "soared beyond expectations."

MUTUAL TRUST "What I am suggesting is that we should move toward regulation based upon mutual trust and confidence and away from the formula-ridden, pseudo-precision which now seems to dominate our regulatory structure," Carver said.

Richard de Felice of the agriculture department's Foreign Agricultural Service, said Monday United States Agriculture is threatened by the European common market.

He said the imposition of a variable import levy by the Common Market in poultry cut U.S. poultry exports to Europe by half. Levies on other American agricultural products "could put one-third to one-half of our agricultural exports to the East in jeopardy," De Felice said.

SHEEP TARIFFS Wool Growers President Hugh Barber urged the sheep industry to oppose further U. S. tariff decreases on imports of lamb, mutton and wool cloth.

He said requests to other nations for voluntary decreases in exports to the United States have brought only increases. Barber urged pressure on Congress to have competing imports removed from the list of commodities on which American negotiators will offer further tariff reductions.

REDISTRICTING ISSUE

Connally Sees No Court Disruption Of Elections

AUSTIN (AP)—Gov. John Connally reassured Texans Monday that he sees no court action to disrupt Texas congressional races, under threat from a federal court redistricting order since Oct. 19.

Connally has stated before that he feels the U.S. Supreme Court would not interfere with Texas congressional elections after the process begins with the Feb. 3 filing date. He noted that the court recessed Monday until Feb. 17 without acting on the Texas case.

Because the Feb. 17 date is "well past the filing deadline for party primary elections in Texas," Connally said, "I anticipate no disruption of the political races in the present congressional districts this year."

A three-judge federal court ruled Oct. 19 in Houston that Texas' 23 congressional districts discriminate against urban voters and that congressmen must run in the state at large unless the districting law was changed by Feb. 3.

The state won a stay of the order pending disposition of its appeal.

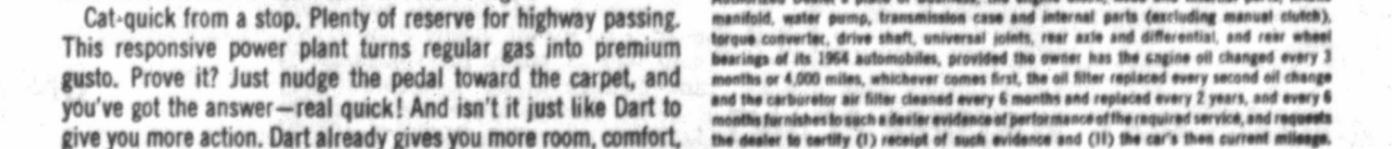

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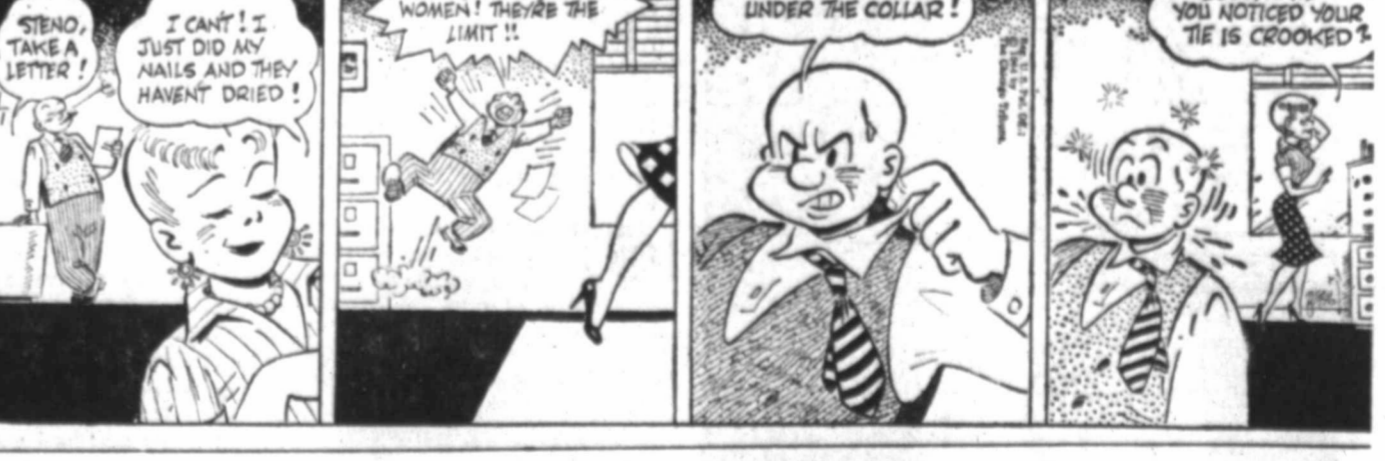

Some 425 volunteers participated in the drive, which began about 6 p.m. It terminated about 9:30 p.m.

"The mothers did a wonderful job and deserve most of the credit for the success of the drive," Mrs. McCann said. "Not all were connected with the P-TA, either. Many just volunteered their services. Many men also lent their services."

Enrollment Down Again

Enrollment in Big Spring public schools declined for the sixth consecutive week, according to a count Friday, and for the first time since Sept. 6, 1963 it went below 7,500 pupils.

A drop of 29 during the past week put the figure at 7,468 pupils, only 80 above the 7,408 recorded during the same week a year ago. After deducting the 121 pupils enrolled at Gay Hill school, the county shows to be nearly 50 below the number from the same area that was covered in the report for Jan. 17, 1963.

Elementary grades dropped 19 pupils for a total of 4,364. There was no change in special education, which has 154 enrolled, but the population of secondary schools dropped 10 to 2,970.

By school, enrollments Friday were: Airport 492, down six; Bauer 520, down five; Boydston 276, down two; Cedar Crest 287, down eight; College Heights 462, up one; Gay Hill 123, no change; Kate Morrison 245, no change; Kentwood 110, no change; Lakeview 188, down seven; Marcy 536, up seven; Park Hill 247, no change; Washington 678, down two; Goliad 803, up two; Lakeview Junior High 66, down two; Rummels 846, down three; and Sun-Sea 1,255, down seven.

Speed Record Set In Jury Trial Here

"Instant justice" perhaps? An all-time speed record for trial of a jury case in 118th District Court was scored Monday afternoon. Three and one-half hours after the jury panel marched into the court room, a damage case had been tried and a verdict returned by the jurors.

Judge Ralph Caton, 118th District Court, said that it was the fastest time scored in a civil jury suit in the court to his knowledge.

Fern Cox, district court clerk, was the timekeeper although there was no intent to set a time record. Indeed, it had been anticipated the case would be on trial today—hence the other jurors on the panel had been excused to report back Wednesday morning. As a result, no cases were on trial today.

The case tried was a damage action brought by Carl L. Giles and his son against Horace J. Smith. The litigation arose from a car accident at 11th and Donley April 24, 1962. Giles asked for \$8,900 damages. The jury panel took the seats at 2 p.m. The entire panel was qualified and 12 members selected by 2:30 p.m. The two witnesses in the case were placed on the stand and interrogated. The court prepared his charge, read it to the jury. The jury heard argument by Don Jon Davis, attorney for the plaintiff, and Jack Little, defense lawyer. It began its deliberations. One hour later, at 5:30 p.m., the jury reported its verdict. It had found the plaintiff entitled to \$284.10 for damages to his car. The jurors were complimented by the court and told to be back Wednesday.

Wednesday Rites For John T. Ward

John Thomas Ward, 94, retired farmer and long-time resident of Howard County, died in a hospital here at 7:55 p.m. Monday. He had been in declining health for the past few years.

For 35 years he had lived in the Luther community and at Big Spring, and he was one of the oldest citizens to participate in the Howard County Old Settlers Reunion.

Services will be held at 2 p.m. Wednesday at the Nailey-Pickel Chapel, and burial will be in the City Cemetery beside the grave of his wife, Paul Keele, minister of the Marcy Drive Church of Christ, will officiate, assisted by Earl C. Evans, minister of the West Fourth Church of Christ.

Mr. Ward was born May 15, 1869 in Prentiss, Miss., and was married to Miss Margaret Fitzpatrick Jan. 18, 1903 in Ellis County, Texas. They came to Howard County from Rummels County in 1929 and settled in the Luther community where he farmed until retirement in 1955. Mrs. Ward died July 31, 1950. He was a member of the Church of Christ and attended the West Fourth Church.

Surviving are three sons, Frank Ward, Big Spring, Fred Ward, Odessa, Floyd Ward, Denton; four daughters, Mrs. W. B.

On return of the judge, the case was resumed.

It is another in the series of jury trials of criminal cases. Plans are for another case to be called Wednesday.

Symphony Matinee Set For Children

The Big Spring Concert Association will offer matinee tickets for the San Antonio Symphony for school children starting Monday.

This is the first time that the association has ever offered a single admission ticket, and it is being restricted to school children only. The concert will be the afternoon of Jan. 30.

Sales will be held at the various schools, Monday through Thursday from 8:30 a.m. to 9 a.m. and will be 50 cents each.

Mothers in the concert association will be present at the auditorium to supervise arrangements and to be of assistance to the young symphony fans.

The program to be offered at the matinee is entirely different from the one which will be given in the evening for concert association members only. For many years the San Antonio Symphony has given these matinees in order to encourage appreciation of good music.

Students who hold season memberships will not be admitted to the matinee on these, but rather to the evening performance. They may acquire tickets and attend the matinee session also, if they desire.

ceding the annual meeting, executive board members supported L. E. Patterson, Midland, in his stand to curtail staff replacements if necessary to bring the budget in balance. 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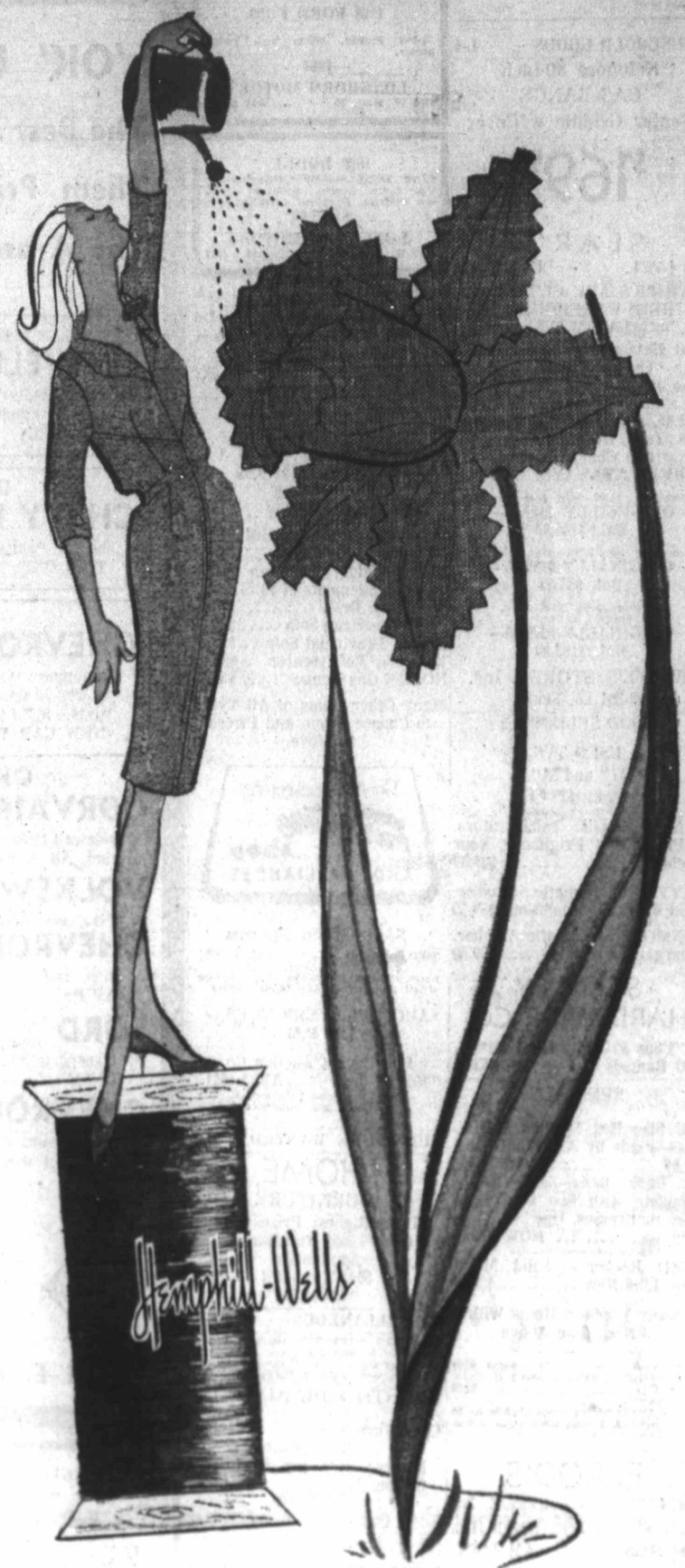

Specter Of Revolt Unnerves Citizens In Borneo's Capital

KUCHING, Malaysia (AP) — A tragic pattern familiar to scores of Southeast Asian cities may be developing in this tiny jungle capital on the island of Borneo.

Nervous citizens whisper about terrorist hands loose in the countryside. Young helicopter pilots jam the bars, excitedly reliving the day's flights. Soldiers pack rifles under a tropical sun.

It is almost like the cities of South Viet Nam and Laos — and many here fear that Kuching is in for what has happened in Saigon and Vientiane.

Under a canopy of big power politics, the specter of revolt has been raised by disgruntled factions, foreign intruders and a highly disciplined Communist organization.

IN SARAWAK
Bloodshed so far has been limited, but nerve-shattering, for citizens of Sarawak state, who gained independence from Britain Sept. 16 and joined in forming the federation of Malaysia.

British troops, guarding the queen's former possession under a defense agreement with Malaysia, have taken the heaviest losses and are carrying the burden of trying to stamp out terrorists.

There are about 5,000 British troops in Sarawak. Britons also man the main line of defense in neighboring Sabah, formerly British North Borneo.

The question for most everyone here is, "What will Sukarno do?"

MASTERMIND
The Indonesian president is regarded by most in Kuching as the mastermind of the young federation's troubles. British officials insist that Indonesian army officers and noncoms are leading raids over the border out of Indonesian Borneo.

More than 60 Indonesian army men are listed as among the dead of terrorist bands trapped by British commandos or Gurkhas on the Sarawak side of the border. Seven Indonesians, who the British say were captured in jungle ambushes, have been tried and convicted of leading raids or training revolutionaries within Sarawak.

Some officials in Kuching fear that Sukarno, as a foe of Malay-

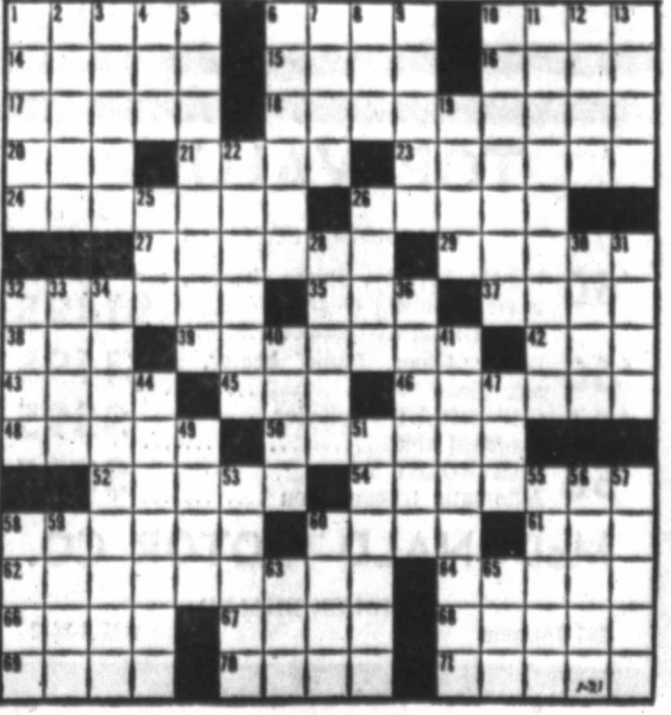
sia, picked Sarawak as the place for a showdown. Others regard Indonesia as a military and economic paper tiger, puffing and puffing in hopes the Malaysians and their British protectors will pack up and leave, as the Dutch left a section of Borneo.

According to reports reaching Kuching, terrorist bands operating out of Indonesian territory haven't done well tactically in any case where the mission was to attack British units directly.
