New Look For Old Problem

This month approximately fourfifths of the American people, from wage-earners to millionaires, will begin to reap the benefits of the new tax reduction law. To many the benefits may seem "token," but appreciated none the less.

In the midst of the general euphoria it may be well to pause for a moment to consider the other one-fifth of the American people. There is no tax relief for those who have no jobs or whose income is so low that it now escapes taxation. The hope—and it is really no more than a hope-is that the increased purchasing power generated by tax reductions will renew and strengthen the bloodstream of the economy. The increase in consumer spending will stimulate business and plant expansion, creating new jobs, generating a chain reaction to strengthen the entire economy, so the theory goes.

But the most ominous statistic about this almost forgotten fifth of the population was given in a recent study by the National Policy Committee on edies is clearly needed.

Pockets of Poverty. These people "are not part of the economic structure," the study concluded. Another study made by Fortune Magazine revealed that the poor and the unemployed are not necessarily the same. Only one - third of all families with unemployed heads were classed by Fortune as poor-that is, a family with income of less than \$3,000 a year or an individual living on less than \$1,500 a year.

This, Fortune said, "suggests strongly that most of America's poor are not 'lazy'—the majority work hard for their low incomes-and that they do not like to live on handouts."

These findings give more than a hint that the traditional policies which seek full employment as the answer to poverty may not be effective-certainly not for those who are not part of the economic structure. What then can be done for this unfortunate fifth of the population? No ready answers are available, but a re-examination of premises and the formulation of rem-

Thirteenth Juror

It is difficult to understand why the Texas Legislature has through the years rejected numerous proposals to authorize selection of a 13th, or standby or alternate, juror in murder trials

But with a standby juror, who would be properly qualified and hear all testimony, one juror's incapacity would not stop a trial, and the odds against two jurors being afflicted in a single trial are too high for serious consideration.

Equal Justice For All

WASHINGTON - Equal Justice Under Law. Those are the brave words carved in foot-high letters on the great marble pediment of the Supreme Court Building.

But a searching look in recent years has made it all too clear that there is one kind of justice for the rich and the powerful and another for the poor. Shocked by the glaring inequities built into the American legal system, the late President Kennedy and his brother, Attorney General Robert F. Kennedy, set out two years ago to find some corrective

THEY LAUNCHED what was, in effect, a quiet war against one of the cruelest forms that poverty takes. It served to shed light on a condition long ignored. Senate and House have now passed a public defender bill providing legal help in the Federal courts for those unable to pay for it. While the House version falls short of being adequate, the hope is for a compromise that will at least be a start.

The poor man cannot afford bail. His court-appointed lawyer, if he has one, usually serves without pay and he begins the defense only at the start of the trial. None of the resources available to the affluent defendantthe search for evidence and witnesses. the taking of depositions, the cost of a transcript of the trial looking to an appeal-is within reach of the poor

IN THE MATTER of bail alone a survey showed that of defendants charged with simple assault only 22 per cent of those free on bail were found guilty while 71 per cent of those who had to remain in jail were convicted. In unlawful entry cases the ratio was 23 per cent for those at liberty and 75 per cent of convictions for those in jail. The man who cannot put up bail may spend from a year to two years in prison and then be found not guilty.

One of Kennedy's objectives is to encourage Federal courts to free prisoners pending trial on their recognizance. It has been shown that this works, where specific tests have been made, about as well as the bail sys-

A YEAR AGO the Supreme Court handed down a decision in Gideon vs. Wainwright holding that the poor man's right to legal counsel applied to every court in the land. The drama of the origin of this case shows that one obscure individual can by chance find a crack in the elaborate legal structure to plead his case.

CONCERN OVER whether "equal justice under law" means just that today was the theme of Justice Arthur Goldberg's James Madison Lecture at New York University's School of Law. He pointed out that the defendant without means is penalized in a variety of ways not only following his arrest and at his trial but when he is convicted. The "choice" of paying a \$100 fine or spending 30 days in jail. Goldberg observed, is really no choice at all to the person who cannot raise \$100. The resulting imprisonment, he added, is no more or less than imprisonment for being poor.

THE HOUSE public defender measure provides maximum fees of \$300 in one category and \$500 in another for court - appointed counsel acting for poor defendants. It eliminates the 12 public defenders serving full time in the judicial districts which the Justice Department considers a vital corrective. But a beginning has been made and, most important, the searchlight of publicity turned on another dark corner of poverty and injustice. (Distributed by United Feature Syndicate, Inc.)

The date was the summer of 1933.

CHARLES F. URSCHEL, millionaire oil man, had been kidnapped from his Oklahoma City home July 22. Later he had been released on payment of \$200,000 ransom. Because Urschel was one of the most levelheaded and logical victims of any snatch, he provided clues which led to the arrest of his abductors in days after he had been released.

One of the kidnappers was a coldeyed gangster type named Harvey Bailey. Bailey was locked up in the Dallas jail. Somehow he got his hands on a gun, seized a jailer as a hostage, and made his way down to the ground floor. In the jailer's car they fled north on US, 77.

WHEN THEY reached my town, the car and the two men were spotted by the police. A pursuit through the town followed. It was a "cops and robbers" in real life with the pursuing police blazing away at the careening car in which Bailey and his hostage were riding.

At the time I first heard the sirens and the shots I was in the lobby of a hotel just across the street from our newspaper office. I called the police station and found out what all the shooting was about.

I reasoned that if they caught Bailey, they would take him to the police station. Therefore, I rushed to the station and waited

President Johnson could have done better than to compare this situation with the one that existed when General Eisenhower was poised to invade Festung Europa in 1944. SPECULATIVELY, it has been reasoned that Johnson cannot start winning with a losing team, and that he must dismantle the foreign relations Brain Trust which served under Mr. Kennedy. A beginning was made when LBJ almost immediately picked a fellow Texan, Thomas Mann, to head Latin American affairs, displacing a couple of losers in command of that front. The other day, when Roger Hilsman Jr., one of Mr. Kennedy's masterminds on Viet Nam, resigned, the President had a chance to insert a "can do" man of his own into the line-up. Instead, he merely reshuffled the Kennedy team that has failed to win in Far Eastern Affairs. William Bundy was brought from the Defense Department to the State Department. John T. McNaughton, Chief Counsel at the Pentagon, replaced Bundy as head of world security affairs for defense.

WASHINGTON - Nature abhors a By maintaining a rotating force of around 20,000 men in Viet Nam, the U. S. Armed Services are materially improving their capacity. Casualties in the order of 200 fighting men a year are regrettable but not unacceptable by military standards. There is no substitute in troop conditioning for being "shot at," even while not often shooting back. Had we had battletoughened troops, instead of garrisonsoftened soldiers, to throw into Korea, we would not have lost dozens of battles and thousands of lives.

> (2) A SHORT-OF-WAR invasion of North Viet Nam: It is known that William Bundy is in possession of a "position paper" which sets forth the advantages of paratroop and helicopter landings in North Viet Nam by the forces of South Viet Nam. The author of this paper, not in an official position at this time but a man of considerable military experience and validity, tells me that this plan at best is a "substitute for victory." "What the Vietnamese government of the hour needs, of course, is a smashing triumph that can be celebrated and exploited. This being out of the question in present circumstances, the alternative would be to put the Hanoi government under the same sort of harassment that besets Saigon, and to hope for a stalemate in which President de Gaulle's mediation would make more sense.

THERE IS LITTLE to recommend in these two speculative propositions, except that they provide additional alternatives to the either-or choices of going to war in Asia or of bringing the boys home.

the normal pattern is part of Young feeders learn about the

other half of a winning combination-namely feed. They get a knowledge of what it takes for a balanced ration, what certain types of feed are supposed to do for the animal, the hard fact that too much of a good thing can be quite as disastrous as not enough. They learn about supplements and why animals need them.

When it comes to a show. there is more to be learned than merely feeding. Animals must be made gentle, capable of being herded or led, capable of being posed to best advantage. They also must learn how to wash hair, clip hair, curl hair, brush hair and to make a steer or lamb look like it had stepped out of the band box. In short, they learn to attractively "package" their product

In the judging ring, they learn a vital lesson - that of sportsmanship. Not everyone can win, but everyone tries. When the results are in, boys and girls learn to accept them bravely, although sometimes this may involve heartbreak.

And finally, they learn the biggest lesson of all—that life has its heartbreaks, too. Just watch some youngster turn away with tears in his or her eyes when the auctioneer's gavel goes down and their lamb or steer is led away. Even success has its moments of sad-
