Ouch! Olton Derails Super Chiefs, 6-0

When two defensive giants meet, the team taking advantage of the breaks usually wins.

That's the way it was at Chieftain Field Friday as the Olton Mustangs eked out a 6-0 win, a heartbreaking first loss of the year for the Chieftains.

The loss came in Friona's first outing in district play, and left the team needing a series of "ifs" to happen, in order to get back into the title chase, while leaving Olton with a stellar 2-0 district mark with Littlefield and Dimmitt left to play.

Olton won the battle of the district's top defenses in a game of breaks. Going into the game, Friona had given up the least points of any district team—21, while Olton had given up less yardage—less than 100 per cent.

The Mustangs capitalized on their one big break for the game's only score. Friona missed out on two big scoring opportunities, either of which might have given them the win, with a TD and an extra point kick. Friona won the toss, for the seventh straight time, and to the amazement of many fans, elected to kick off, giving Olton the ball first. However, the choice proved to be a good one, and almost gave Friona an early lead and momentum in the big game.

Buster Lloyd fielded the kickoff, and his knee touched at his own five. Center David Clark popped Olton's Glen Johnson on third down from the Olton 14, and David Anderson recovered the ensuing fumble for Friona as the home stands went wild.

Dee King ran for five yards to the nine, Davy Carthel lost a yard, and King picked up six yards in two tries for a big first down at the Olton four.

Two more tries by King put the ball at Olton's one, but on third down Olton's Joe Alcorta broke through to stop Carthel short of the scrimmage line again, and on fourth down, King went wide but was stopped inches shy of the goal-line. Alcorta again made the big defensive play for Olton.

Olton made three first downs to the Friona 43, before having to punt. Friona was driving again, when Clay Bandy hit Dusty Peters on a 16-yard pass play. However, on second and one from midfield, Bandy was intercepted to end that threat.

The Chiefs held Olton and forced a punt, and David Hutson tried for a return. However, the Chieftain safety saw the ball bound away, and Olton recovered at the Friona eight.

Johnson apparently had scored on third down, but an offsides penalty called the play back. Quarterback Jimmy Parker got the yardage back and then some, gaining to the Friona one on a rollout around the left side. That left Johnson only having to make a yard,

which he did with 6:32 left in the second quarter.

King and Strickland forced Parker out of bounds on the point try running, leaving the score at 6-0.

The Chieftains got to midfield again before the half ended, but another long Bandy pass was intercepted by Olton's Freddy Stockdale, to end the drive.

Olton kept the ball for 5:35 of the opening of the third quarter, driving to the Friona 45 before having to punt. On Friona's first play of the half, Dee King almost broke. The fleet-footed Friona halfback got into the secondary and headed toward the west sideline. He finally was forced out at the Olton 40, after a nifty 25-yard gain. It was the longest single run of the entire game by either team.

Blitzing linebackers racked up Bandy on a pass play three plays later, and that was it for the third quarter threat.

Friona got a break early in the final quarter after a short 20-yard punt gave them the ball at Olton's 40.

On a big third down play, Bandy lofted a pass on which Strickland made a great catch, at the Olton nine yard line. Gene's defender kept him from going in for the TD.

A running play lost a yard, and three passes fell incomplete, to again keep the Chieftains off the scoreboard. The two latter passes were halfback option passes by King. The fourth down effort was just out of the reach of the diving Strickland in the end zone.

Olton took the ball and drove to the Friona 39, eating up a big chunk of the clock. The Mustangs got some inspired running from Johnson, who had two 15-yard gains in a row at one point. When Friona finally got the ball back, only 1:22 remained in the game.

Robin Baize threaded his way 20 yards to the Friona 40 yard line, but a 15-yard penalty, only major infraction against the Chieftains all night, ate up most of the gain.

Four Bandy passes gained only two net yards, as the Chieftains ran out of downs and clock time at about the same time.

Johnson's 111 yards rushing gave him 1,048 for the year. He entered the game as the leading rusher in District 3-AA, and should still have the honors.

Defense was the name of the game in District 3-AA Friday night, as Littlefield scored Morton.

STAR 1974 United Fund Sets Goal; Kickoff

The 1974 budget, and kickoff date for the Friona Area United Fund Drive were announced this week by Don Gatlin, general chairman.

The goal for the United Fund for 1974 will be \$7,090, which is \$314 below the 1973 goal of \$7,404.

Kickoff for the 1974 drive will be held here the week of November 4.

Agencies who will benefit from the local United Fund drive, and the amounts each will receive from the 1974 budget, if it reaches 100 per cent of its goal, are as follows:

Girl Scouts—\$2,000; Boy Scouts—\$2,000; Red Cross—\$1,200; Salvation Army—\$900; USO—\$125; Local emergency fund—\$465; American Field Service—\$350; Texas United Community Service—\$50.00.

The 1974 goal is some \$63 more than was raised by the drive here last year, which reached 94.9 per cent of its goal.

Gatlin announced that Joe Tongate is to serve as city chairman for the 1974 drive. Kenneth Williams will be the rural chairman, and Wendell Gresham, assisted

by Andy Hurst and Hollis Horton.

The advance drive was already underway this week, with \$554.00 collected as of Thursday morning.

Recently elected as a new board member to Friona's chapter of the United Fund was Albert Cupell. Richard

Collard was elected to serve as board president, with Alton Farr as vice president and Louisa Wilson as secretary.

Gatlin reported that the local United Fund has a \$5,000 certificate of deposit at Friona State Bank, ear-tagged for the local emergency fund.

Standard Time To Return On Sunday

Central Standard Time returns Sunday morning, for four months at least.

Clocks will be turned back one hour at 2 a.m. Sunday over the United States, ending the longest spell of Daylight Savings Time ever in the United States. DST went into effect in January when the then President Richard M. Nixon signed the new DST bill designed to conserve energy. The bill was slated to have Daylight Savings Time run through October 1975.

In Friona, it seems people will have an extra hour's sleep before Sunday School and worship services begin in local churches, school children will get to classes an hour later beginning next week and lose an hour of daylight between the end of classes and bedtime.

School Time Stays Same

Superintendent of Schools Tom Jarboe reminded school patrons that the school's schedule will remain the same, according to the clock, with the switch to Central Standard Time.

Although residents will gain an hour by "sun time" on Sunday morning, students will report at the usual time for classes Monday.

Tax Discount Ends Oct. 31

A three per cent discount on state, county and city taxes will end Thursday, Oct. 31, according to Hugh Moseley, Parmer County tax assessor-collector.

Taxpayers have only until Thursday of this week in which to take their payments to the tax offices in Farwell. Payments mailed to the offices, which are postmarked on or before the deadline, will receive the three per cent discount.

Soaking Rains Halt Harvest Operations

Rainfall of from two to almost four inches in the Friona area during the past week called a halt to the corn and maize harvest once again, and thoroughly wet down the cropland in the area.

Most observers feel that it will be at least a week, barring further moisture, before machines will be able to get into the soggy fields.

Officially in Friona, the measurement was 1.99 inches for Tuesday and Wednesday of this week. A total of 1.34 inches had been received up until 8 a.m.

Wednesday, with another .65 inch falling during the morning hours Wednesday, when the rains really came down for a short time.

Wheat farmers, especially those in the dryland areas, are hailing the moisture as a blessing, since the wheat is off to its best start in a number of years. The moisture which has already been received has wheat farmers thinking in terms of bumper crops.

Apparently, the rains of the past week were heavier in the direction of Hub and southward in the direction of

Lazbuddie. Moisture was general, however, with around three inches reported in the Rhea community.

Through Friday morning, the rainfall for the month of October amounted to 3.29 inches, bringing the three-month total (August, September and October) to a

whopping 11.91 inches in the official gauge at Friona—after one of the driest seven-month period on record for the first part of the year.

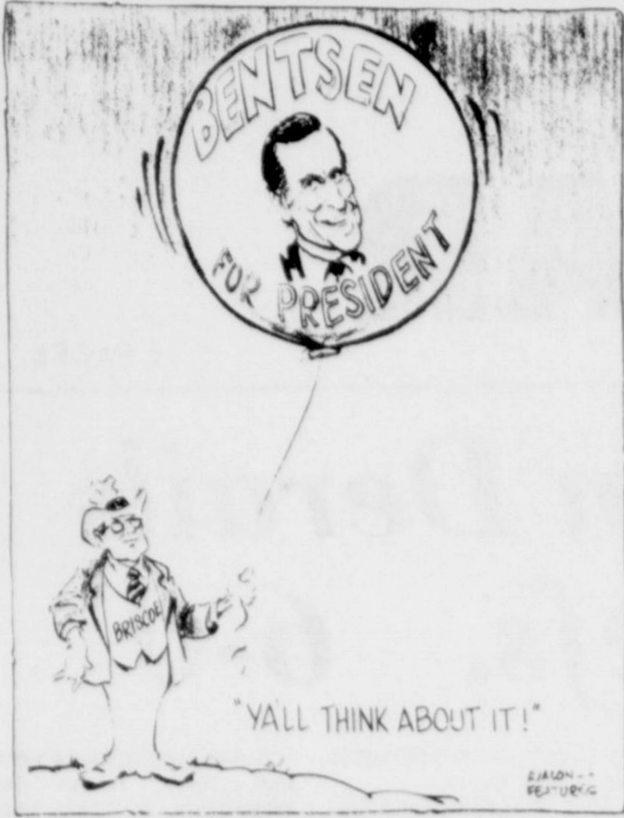

Farm Census To Be Taken

The 1974 Census of Agriculture, the largest agricultural statistical project of the past five years, will begin in January. It will be conducted by the Bureau of the Census, part of the Department of Commerce's Social and Economic Statistics Administration.

From Alaska to Florida, from Maine to Hawaii, farmers and ranchers will receive census forms in the mail around the first of the new year. The report forms are to be filled out and mailed back promptly.

Farmers themselves have participated in deciding what information is collected in the census. Representatives of farm organizations such as the Farm Bureau, The Grange, Farmers Union, National Farmers Organization, and Farmers Cooperatives serve on the Advisory Committee that recommends to the Bureau the questions that should be included in the census.

Three kinds of information are requested about operations during 1974:

first, a count of farm resources, number of farms, area of farm land, acres of cropland and pasture, number of each kind of livestock and poultry, number of persons working on farms, number of various kinds of farm equipment; second, a record of farm products produced and sold during 1974; and third, selected farming activities during 1974 such as number of days of off-farm work by the farmer, amount spent for farm labor, for custom work, for feed, for gasoline and oil.

To report this kind of information, a farmer will need to have a few simple records. The Census Bureau is urging each farmer to have his records of quantities harvested, products sold, major farm expenses and the like readily available so that he can easily and accurately fill out his census report when it comes.

It is from the Census of Agriculture, conducted every five years, that data are taken to form the basis

for programs of the U.S. Department of Agriculture, Congressional farm legislation, farm organization policies, farm programs established and administered by State departments of agriculture, and many other services provided by colleges, business firms, manufacturers, publishers and broadcasters.

The Census of Agriculture is the only source of statistics on agriculture that are comparable from county to county nationwide. It is the sole source of comprehensive data tabulated for each State and for the U.S. for farms classified by size, tenure, type of organization, market value of products sold, and type of farm enterprise.

Every farmer's report is confidential by law. It may be seen only by sworn Census employees and may be used only for statistical purposes. The mail census method reinforces confidentiality. And it allows the farmers to complete his report on his convenience with accurate information from his records.

Patrol Investigates Twelve Accidents

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated 12 accidents on rural highways in Parmer County during the month of September according to Sergeant W.E. Wells, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in two persons killed and four persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first nine months of 1974 shows a total of 88 accidents resulting in three persons killed and 51 persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region for September, 1974, shows a total of 471 accidents resulting in 17 persons killed and 213 persons injured as compared to September, 1973, with 601 accidents resulting in 24 persons killed and 364 persons injured. This was 130 less accidents, seven less killed, and 151 less injured in 1974 at the same period of time.

The 17 traffic deaths for the month of September, 1974, occurred in the following counties: two each in Lipscomb, Moore, Parmer, Haskell and Parker; and one each in Castro, Deaf Smith, Hartley, Oldham, Randall, Hale and Lamb.

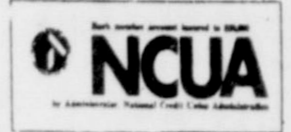

At Home In Parmer County

HOMEMADE snack crackers provide taste treats at a fraction of the cost of store-bought ones.

Simply prepare them from ordinary soda crackers.

First, separate crackers and place on a cookie sheet. Brush with melted margarine or butter—or slightly-diluted egg white—and add topping. Toast in a 400-degree oven until slightly brown.

Possible toppings include seasoned salt, poppy seeds, sesame seeds, parmesan cheese or any other desired flavoring.

Bread sticks and other shapes can be prepared similarly—using inexpensive refrigerator biscuits that come in a tube.

First, cut each biscuit into four pieces. Shape each as desired—into a ball, bread stick or knot.

Coat with margarine or egg white, and top with seeds or seasoning—such as sesame or poppy seeds, garlic salt or vegetable flakes.

Or, divide a bread slice

into strips for another type of bread stick. Roll each in melted butter or margarine, add topping, and toast in oven—turning once to brown both sides.

Although inexpensive enough to use every day, these crackers and bread sticks are great for guests and special occasions.

Church To Honor Law Officers In Special Service

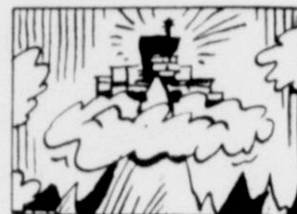

Lester Lee Harrelson Killed At WTSU Rodeo

Funeral services for Lester Lee Harrelson, a 27-year-old student at New Mexico State University in Las Cruces, were conducted at 1:30 p.m. MDT Tuesday, Oct. 22, at Steed Memorial Chapel in Clovis, with Rev. Bill Penland, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Friona, officiating. Burial followed in the Oklahoma Lane Cemetery.

Harrelson was killed Saturday, Oct. 19, at the West Texas State University Rodeo in Amarillo. He was thrown by a 2,000-pound bull and trampled. According to his aunt, Mrs. E.R. Coffman of Farwell, the bull stepped on the arterial vein of Harrelson's heart and caused acute hemorrhaging. Approximately 2,500 spectators witnessed the accident.

Harrelson was pronounced dead at North West Texas Hospital in Amarillo.

The rodeo champion was a member of the New Mexico State University rodeo team competing in the rodeo at the Tri-State Fair Grounds. He was president of the New Mexico State University Rodeo Club, a member of Alpha Zeta fraternity at the university and past president of the American Junior Rodeo Association. Harrelson was past AJRA world champion bull rider and AJRA reserve champion steer wrestler.

Harrelson was born in Clovis on Aug. 6, 1947, and grew up in the Clovis-Texico area. He served a tour of duty in Vietnam with the United States Army.

Pallbearers were rodeo friends and classmates including John Massengill, Wallace Cox, Kyle Reid, Mike Rising,

Dean Shipp and Larry Noland.

Survivors include his wife, Sharon Ann, and two children, Kyle Lee and Benjamin Shawn, all of University Park in Las Cruces; his mother, Mrs. Mary Lou Collier of Friona; step-father, Robert W.

Farmers Praised For Attitude

Elbert Harp, executive director of Grain Sorghum Producers Association, has praised farmers for "keeping cool" under the potential panic situation caused by the recent halt of proposed grain exports to Russia.

In spite of being alarmed by the sudden postponement of Russian grain shipments, producers remained calm and avoided the panic situation, Harp said.

"The natural reaction would have been to rush the market before prices dropped," the GSPA executive director said. "The president's announcement definitely created an unstable grain market situation temporarily, but the grain market is now beginning to restabilize."

Speaking on behalf of the Lubbock-based national or-

ganization, Harp continued, "We feel that the market will rebound fairly rapidly within the next few days. It appears that the overall effect of the Russian grain purchase will be bullish in the long run because of the additional demand in the world market place for available grain."

Harp commented he was pleased to see prices rebounding as anticipated, and added that "while they may take a few days to get back to prior levels, the recovery should be rapid and we should see even stronger markets in the future than we have seen yet."

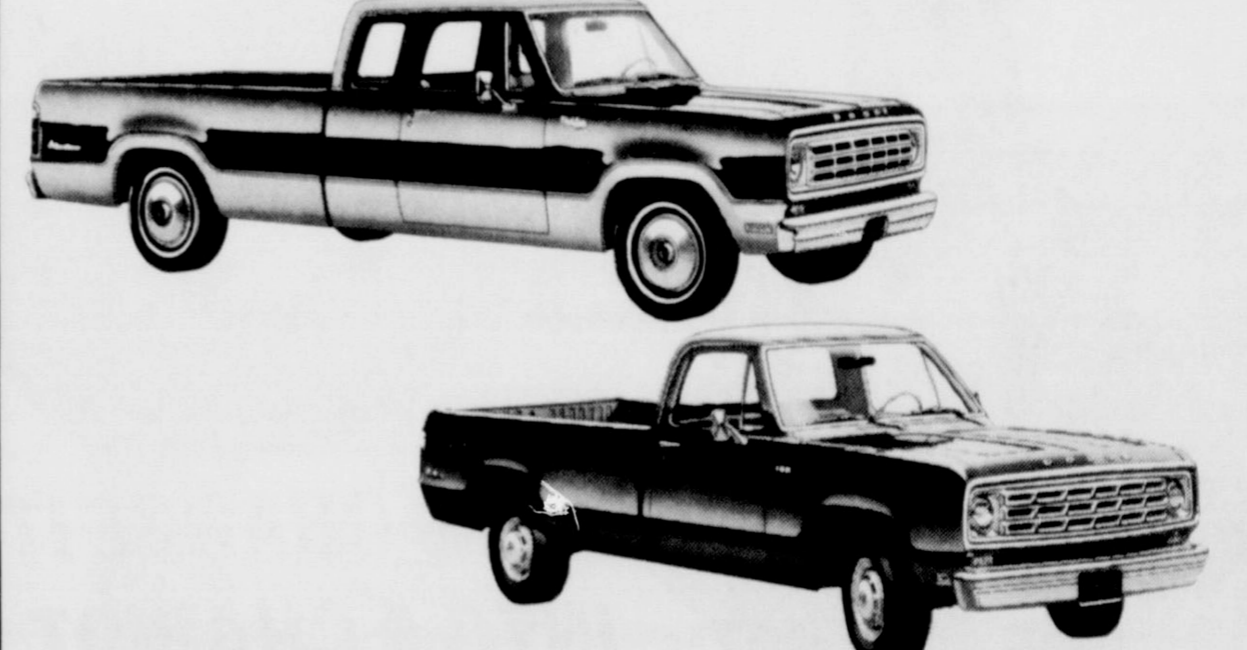

'Team Effort' Needed To Control Crime

An extensive team effort by citizens and law enforcement officers is needed to control this country's rapidly rising crime rate.

Operation Identification, the kickoff project of the Friona Police Department's crime prevention program, is the first community-wide crime control project designed to reduce the burglary rate in Friona.

The following is how you can participate:

Operation I.D. has basically two parts. First, mark all your easily stolen valuables so they can be identified. Second, display a warning sticker which tells burglars that your property is protected with your mark.

Marking property accomplishes several things. Items marked in Operation I.D. are harder for the burglar to see or "fence," and an Operation I.D. sticker on a front and back window or door deters burglars because your property can be easily and positively identified. Also the identification mark makes the owner's chances of retrieving stolen property much higher in addition to simplifying the apprehension of criminals.

The Friona Police Department has purchased engraving pens which can be checked out at no cost to you.

When home owners and businessmen obtain an etching pen, the department encourages them to talk to their friends and neighbors about marking their property while the pen is handy.

The actual marking process is simple. Use your driver's license number to mark your property in the following manner: Engrave TX for state identification, so that if the property is taken out of the state, the number can be easily traced; then write your license number. (Example: TX5551212).

If you don't have a

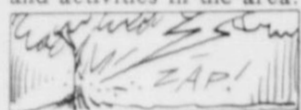
driver's license, call the Friona Police Department and ask for a number you can use.

Once items have been marked, use the Property Listing form supplied with the pen for your own reference. This is your check list of your property in case of theft.

Small and fragile items such as jewelry, silver and china can be protected if you will take a photograph of them, and keep the photos in a safe, fire-proof place.

You will be issued a self-adhesive decal to put outside your home or office to warn burglars that the property inside is protected by Operation I.D. Displaying the decal will deter burglars since they know that having marked items in this possession is dangerous.

Operation Identification also has a cumulative effect. The more people in your neighborhood participating, the less attractive the area is for burglars. They know that aware citizens are going to be suspicious of unusual people and activities in the area.
