China Mum On Romania Mediation

VIENNA, Austria (AP)—Communist Romania says Red China has not replied to a Romanian proposal for a Soviet-Chinese meeting at which Romania would try to mediate their bitter dispute.

LBJ Readies Poverty Plea

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Johnson worked today on a formal appeal to Congress for his billion-dollar plan of federal help to combat poverty in Appalachia.

The Romanians urged the three-party meeting last month to obtain a truce in communists' internal war and to set the stage for an international conference of Communist party leaders to give the world a display of unity.

In a party statement and long analysis of the Romanian mediation effort, the newspaper appealed for a truce in the ideological dispute, saying it was "the duty of every (Communist) party to do its utmost to divert the danger of a split."

The Romanians said the Soviet-Chinese-Romanian conference should discuss and finalize an appeal to all the Communist and workers' parties "to solve controversial issues in conformity with the norms jointly established at the 1957 and 1960 Moscow conferences concerning relations between Communist parties."

The Soviets also have proposed a conference of Communist parties, confident that Soviet Premier Khrushchev's views would be upheld over those of Red Chinese party Chairman Mao Tse-tung, Peking has been cool to such a conference.

Despite the Romanian plea for a halt in the verbal hostilities, Moscow and Peking continued to hurl insults at each other.

The official Peking People's Daily charged today that Khrushchev had once supported Leon Trotsky, the arch-heretic of Soviet communism. Trotsky, Lenin's close collaborator and apparent heir, was purged by Stalin and murdered in exile.

Showdown Of Cypriots Due

NICOSIA, Cyprus (AP)—A showdown appeared to be shaping up today for control of strategic Kyrenia Pass where Greek Cypriot forces have pinned down Turkish defenders dug in around medieval St. Hilarion Castle.

Greek Cypriots felt out Turkish positions with mortar, machine-gun and rifle fire. They denied, however, that they were trying to hit the castle, which the Turkish Cypriots use as their stronghold in controlling the pass along the Kyrenia-Nicosia road.

The Turks, caught by surprise when the attack opened Saturday, cannot lose much ground without surrendering control of the pass. Greek Cypriot forces have advanced to within a mile of this highway between the capital and the north coast.

No Hostility To Business, President Tells Chamber

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Johnson said today that times are good and there is no inherent hostility between business and government.

He pledged to businessmen that the government will act with restraint and responsibility.

In return, Johnson asked for restraint from businessmen in decisions which affect the general economic well-being and responsibility in choosing to support or oppose government policies and proposals which serve all the people.

Johnson faced his largest audience of businessmen, representatives of the U.S. Chamber of Commerce, in Constitution Hall in his prepared address, he said that racial and religious discrimination costs more than \$15 billion a year and unused or underused manpower costs even more.

BURDENS "That is why," he said, "this administration is dedicated to lifting of the burdens which weigh down our national productivity, expansion and prosperity."

The President covered a broad sweep of domestic and foreign policy in generalities. "As this nation can be reasonable without becoming reckless in relations with other nations," he said, "I believe this government must be more frugal without becoming less compassionate here at home."

And he told the businessmen in a speech that was friendly and laced with bits of humor that: "Whatever else you have, you have an independent, tax-paying, light-bill-saving President in the White House — one who has faith in America and faith in American enterprise."

OPPORTUNITY "What I know of opportunity and initiative and enterprise, I learned from life itself. I pledge you from your government restraint and responsibility — a hand that means only to help and never to hinder so long as the public interest is being served. I ask from you only the same — restraint in those decisions you make which affect the general economic well-being, responsibility in choosing to support or not support the policies and proposals of your government which serves all the people."

Johnson said he believes America can work to bring peace to the world but he believes it also must work to "bring peace to the lives of all our own people."

To this apparent allusion to racial strife, the President added: "This is the work of our generation — yours and mine. So, I must get back to work at the White House and leave you to go back to work on me."

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WASHINGTON (AP)—A member of the Teamsters Union's executive board has asked that the union stop paying legal fees of the union president, James R. Hoffa, pending a high-level conference on whether the payments are a violation of federal law.

A spokesman in the New York office of John J. O'Rourke said O'Rourke, fifth vice president and member of the 15-man executive board of the 1.7-million member union, sent a telegram to the Teamster's secretary-treasurer, John F. English.

It called for a halt to any such expenditures until the full board can meet to consider the question.

O'Rourke, in the telegram, said his request was based on the advice of Edward Bennett Williams, Teamster's general counsel, that it is illegal to pay Hoffa's huge legal expenses out of union funds.

Rusk Says U.S. Troops To Stay In West Pacific

VALPARAISO, Ind. (AP)—Secretary of State Dean Rusk says the United States is keeping its troops in the western Pacific until that part of the world "is safe for freedom."

This, Rusk said at a Valparaiso University Law School dedication Saturday, is what he told the United States' Asian allies in his recent 10-day trip to Manila, Formosa and South Vietnam.

"Despite their economic failures — indeed, perhaps all the more because of these failures — the Asian Communists remain dangerous. Desperation might lead them to deeds which rational men would shun," Rusk said.

"Most of the leaders and peoples of free Asia know that the free nations are far stronger than the Communist nations. In particular, they realize the power of the United States.

South Issues Strong Rebuff In Compromise

Judge Rules Out Hospital For Ruby

DALLAS (AP)—Lawyers today lost in an effort to get condemned slayer Jack Ruby moved from jail to a hospital for further mental tests. Dist. Judge Joe Brown denied the request.

As lawyers wrangled over whether a defense psychiatrist could read a prepared report, Judge Brown said: "It would be a waste of time to read that because I'm going to overrule your motion."

The dispute arose minutes after Ruby, white-faced and obviously agitated, returned to the courtroom where he was convicted March 14 in the killing of accused presidential assassin Lee Harvey Oswald.

PERSECUTION Dr. Louis West, the defense psychiatrist, said in advance that Ruby was "preoccupied with delusions of persecution of Jews" and "obviously psychotic."

West is head of the department of psychiatry and neurology at the University of Oklahoma school of medicine and a consultant with the aerospace research center at San Antonio.

West examined Ruby after the prisoner's nearly bald head was banged against a cell wall Sunday in what Sheriff Bill Decker said was "a deliberate act."

Ruby was extremely pale and he appeared unusually nervous and agitated as guards conducted him into the courtroom. There were no visible marks, however, of any blows on the head.

Lawyers for Ruby asked Judge Brown several days ago to order the transfer of the prisoner to a hospital. The former night club operator pleaded insanity at the trial in which he drew the death penalty for killing Oswald two days after the Nov. 22 assassination of President Kennedy.

Guards searched all newsmen and other spectators. Dr. West's report, made available before the defense called him to the stand, stated that "Ruby believes 25 million Jews in America will be slaughtered because of what he (Ruby) did — the killing of Oswald."

Jury Trial Called Civil Rights 'Sop'

WASHINGTON (AP)—Southern opponents of the civil rights bill today labeled a compromise jury trial amendment "a sop" and said they will not permit a Senate vote on it this week.

Their decision, reached at an early-morning caucus, apparently eliminated any possibility of an early test vote on the controversial measure as debate dragged into its eighth week.

Sen. Richard B. Russell, D-Ga., spokesman for the Southerners, said they reached "the unanimous conclusion" the amendment is "just a sop to try to make people think" sponsors of the bill have reached a "conciliatory attitude."

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Substitute The compromise, sponsored by Sens. Mike Mansfield, D-Mont., majority leader, and Everett M. Dirksen, R-Ill., the minority leader, was offered as a substitute for another jury trial amendment introduced by Sen. Herman E. Talmadge, D-Ga., and other Southerners.

The compromise would provide for a jury trial in any contempt action arising under the bill if the penalty involved more than 30 days in jail or more than a \$300 fine.

Talmadge's amendment would provide for a jury trial in all criminal contempt cases. The Southerners' stand came as no surprise.

Russell said the substitute did not accomplish anything and the Southerners will continue to fight for the Talmadge amendment.

SHOW VICES "We are hopeful we'll be able to show the vices of the substitute," he said. Russell said that under it, a judge would have to decide whether a contempt merited punishment beyond 30 days and above a \$300 fine before submitting a case to a jury.

"If it ever got to a jury it would be evidence the judge had decided the defendant was guilty and that he felt the offense merited more than a 30-day sentence and \$300 fine," he added.

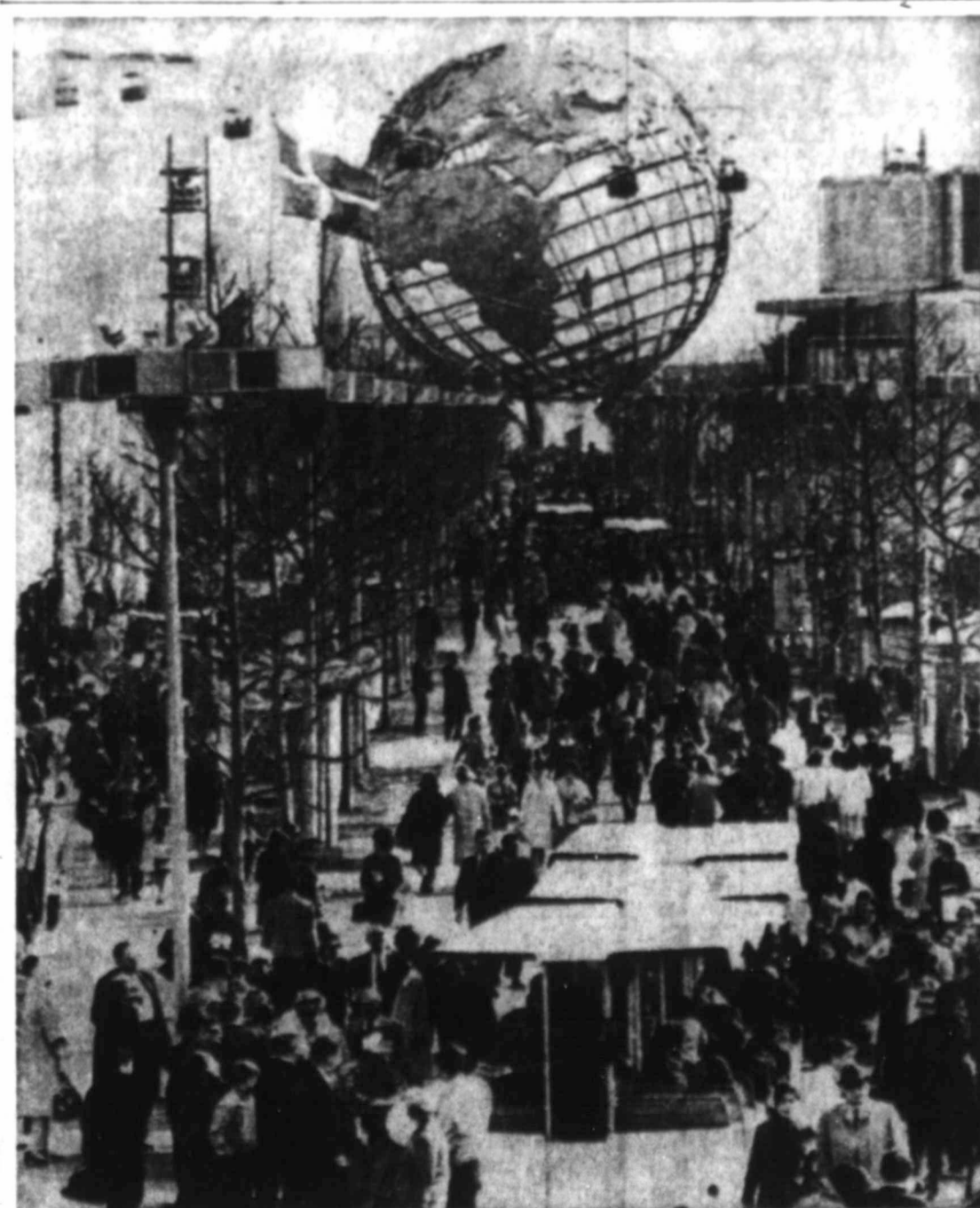
Russell said the Southerners will continue through this week "and there will be no vote this week if we can prevent it." He called the substitute "totally unacceptable."

Russell said a week of debate on the amendment would "not be undue time in view of the importance of the issue."

OATH SACRED "We don't appreciate the intimations in the debate that jurors of the South do not regard their oath as sacred as those of any other section," he added.

Russell said his group discussed the possibility of other amendments. He said that the Talmadge amendment was subject to modification by its sponsor. If such a course should be determined, before the Senate could vote on the substitute.

But, he said, "We are strong for the Talmadge amendment." Sen. Lister Hill, D-Ala., amplified Russell's remarks by telling a newsmen that Southerners "do not look for a vote for many days. We have a lot of discussion on the amendment to get out of the way first."

Church Ousts Couple In 'Lola' Up roar

IONIA, Mich. (AP)—An Ionia couple was excommunicated Sunday after charging their Episcopal priest with harboring "archaic beliefs and moral knowledge" in his criticism of a dance in a high school production of the musical "Damn Yankees."

Mr. and Mrs. Robert Clore were stripped of their membership in the Ionia Episcopal church by the Rev. Raymond Bierlein, who said he acted because of a letter written by the Clores published Friday in the Ionia Daily Sentinel-Standard.

"We can no longer restrain our feelings concerning the objections voiced by our rector to the dancing in the current high school musical play," the letter said in part.

Terming a dance sequence "salacious and immoral," the Rev. Mr. Bierlein last Monday objected before the school board to the characterization of Lola in the play by 16-year-old Kristi Honson who wore a brief black outfit with a split skirt.

Kristi, playing the role of the provocative temptress danced into the audience and pinched cheeks.

"I don't want any children taught to dance like that for any excuse whatever," Bierlein told the school board.

Kristi, as a result, was ordered not to dance into the audience by the school superintendent, Robert Boyce and the play director, Raymond Monte. The school board sent a committee to watch the play Friday and Saturday.

Clore, whose son, Richard, had a part in the play, said, "I am entitled to make this comment about the play just as much as the rector."

Bierlein said he decided on excommunication after talking to Bishop Charles Bennison of the Western Michigan diocese.

Feared Snatched By 'Most Wanted'

HUMBOLDT, Tenn. (AP)—Federal and local officers searched today for one of the FBI's ten most wanted men and an 8-year-old boy who is feared kidnapped.

Police from Humboldt and three neighboring towns in west Tennessee abandoned a dragnet around a 6- to 8-square mile section of the city Sunday night but said they were continuing their search.

Officers were looking for Denis Burke, who disappeared Friday night, and for Joseph Francis Bryan Jr., of Audubon Park, N.J., wanted by the FBI in connection with the slaying of a South Carolina boy.

Police Chief Joe Riding said police had received several reports that an automobile driven by a man resembling Bryan's description was seen in Humboldt.

Educational TV Still Falls Short

HOUSTON (AP)—Just nine short years ago, school districts in the Pittsburgh area began the first full-time experiment in the use of classroom television. Only 20 classes and about 600 students were involved.

Today, across the nation, there are 9,164,000 students enrolled in classes utilizing TV courses.

Despite this phenomenal growth, an expert said today, classroom television still falls far short of its potential.

Charles Hettinger, field representative of the National Instructional Television Library, said, "If used well, instructional television is a powerful tool of untold potential. Used poorly, it is a waste of time."

PREPARED
"The best television lesson in the world can, and probably will, fail to succeed unless the classroom teacher is favorably disposed toward television instruction and prepared to utilize it effectively."

In the first report on a recent survey, Hettinger told the National School Boards Association in a prepared address there are now 81 educational television stations in the United States, 41 closed circuit installations, and 51 commercial channels offering instructional television courses.

Total student enrollment includes 7,400,000 in kindergarten through grade 6, and 2,240,000 in grades 7 through 12.

Of the total instructional series being shown, 23 per cent are in science and 16 per cent in foreign languages. History-social studies, English-language arts, music, arithmetic-mathematics, art and physical education, health, safety rank next in order.

TV lessons are 15-30 minutes long.

MODEST QUALITY
Hettinger said, "most instructional television programming appears to be of modest quality... too little is invested to achieve real quality."

Henry Jones Jr., 38, was fatally wounded when struck by a blast from a shotgun in Dallas Saturday. Police said the shooting occurred during an argument at a drive-in. They sought a 40-year-old suspect.

Roy J. Switzer, 38, of Houston, a former Southern Methodist University football player, drowned in the Blanco River near San Marcos Saturday. Switzer and his 8-year-old son were canoeing when the canoe capsized. The boy was rescued.

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—National Republican leaders and political observers will focus their attention on Tuesday's Pennsylvania primary to see how big a write-in Gov. William W. Scranton gets for the Republican presidential nomination. Scranton has not encouraged the write-in drive.

There were no presidential candidates on the ballots, but state Republican leaders hope a strong write-in for the wealthy, 46-year-old industrialist will ignite a draft movement for him. Scranton, who had to be persuaded to run for governor two years ago, has often said he is

not a candidate, that he does not want the nomination and would take it only in the event of a sincere and unengineered draft. A Scranton-for-President committee met in Kansas City Sunday and said the outcome of the primary here would not affect its efforts.

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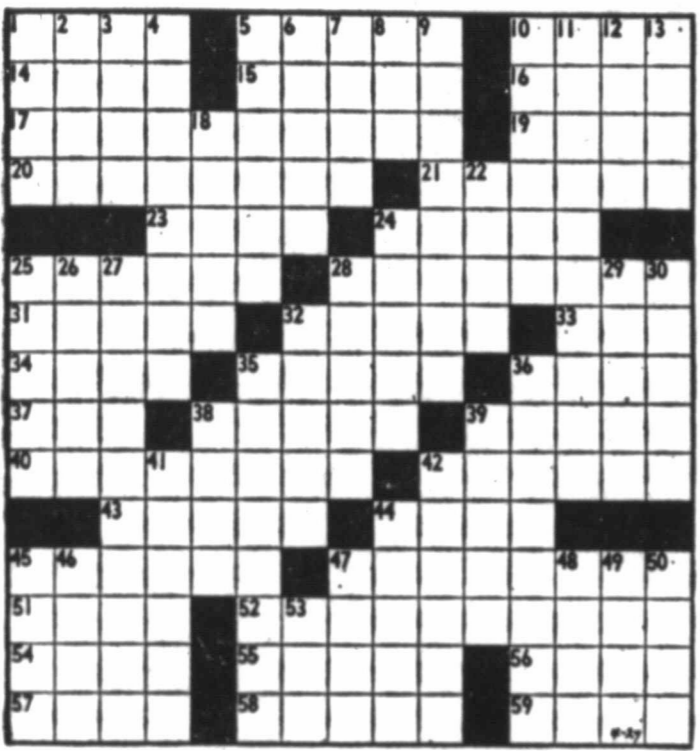

Soviets Blasting At Big Landslide

MOSCOW (AP)—Soviet engineers have begun blasting in an attempt to drain off flood waters threatening the fabled Mongolian capital of Samarkand and villages along the Zeravshan River blocked by a huge landslide.

The Communist party newspaper Pravda said engineers sent to the edge of the Pamir Mountains in Southwest Asia Sunday night began blasting a canal through the slide, which was said to be as high as an 80-story building and 2,000 feet wide.

Pravda said 625 million cubic feet of water have built up behind the slide, which on Friday formed a huge natural dam. It said the water level behind the dam rose more than 105 feet in 50 hours.

The Soviet news agency Tass said an attempt would be made to divert the blocked, fast-rising river and remove the threat to Samarkand, an ancient city of blue-tiled old mosques and new industries. It is 1,700 miles southeast of Moscow, near the juncture of the Soviet Union, Red China and Afghanistan.

Tass said the landslide occurred Friday when the Darnorz Mountain "cracked" as a result of earth tremors and was "cut in two by water." The huge mass of earth and rock fell into the river, swollen by a month of heavy rains, and the slide formed a natural dam.

A lake is forming 100 miles upstream from Samarkand, a city of 215,000 persons, but the earth dam threatens to break and unleash a raging torrent.

"This catastrophe is fraught with the danger of an unprecedented flood in the whole of the Zeravshan Valley," said Tass.

Teller Sees Atom Digging

HOUSTON (AP)—Nuclear scientist Dr. Edward Teller predicts when atomic energy is used to dig canals, the nuclear explosives will be clean enough for workmen to go to the site immediately without fear of radiation.

"In recent years we have been able to decrease radioactivity by a factor of 100, and we can make an even cleaner device," he told delegates to the annual meeting of the Texas Medical Association.

Dr. Teller discussed "Operation Plowshare and Peacetime Uses of Atomic Energy." By the time Operation Plowshare is applied, he said, "I think radio-contamination need not be a barrier and will not be a barrier."

Dr. Teller said there is no doubt about the practicality of what he called "geographical engineering" with atomic energy.

"Now there is a tool at hand powerful enough so we do not need to take a coastline in the form in which it happens to be in our particular little geological period. We can change our surroundings to suit our needs," he said.

At the closing session Sunday, TMA delegates named Dr. David Wade, an Austin psychiatrist, as president-elect of the 9,000-member organization.

Dr. Travis Smith of Abilene was named vice president. Officers re-elected included Dr. C. E. Willingham, Tyler, and Dr. N. L. Barker, Paris, Tex., trustees.

Shift Likely To Federal Urban Funds

NEW YORK (AP)—Businessmen are being advised to plan for a gradual shift of some government spending from defense to civilian programs.

The financial publishing firm, Prentice-Hall, discusses the change and possibilities in the latest issue of its Executive Report.

"Develop your capabilities so you can take advantage of the big new growth markets that are shaping up," it counsels. "Initiate or intensify research and development of new products and technologies in the directions that growth in nondefense sectors is likely to take."

PUBLIC WORKS

It is expected that actual and prospective defense spending declines will likely be offset—and outweighed—by heavier expenditures on civil public works and nondefense services.

Prentice-Hall says: "Prepare now to tap new growth markets in nondefense lines by either expanding into them or merging with firms now active in them."

Whether you are a defense contractor or not, your business will be affected by defense spending cuts—either directly as contracts and subcontracts get skimpier, or indirectly as the secondary effects of defense spending weaken.

URBAN PROJECTS

The publisher sees the areas likely to gain most from prospective channeling of public funds into civilian uses as urban renewal, urban mass transit, water and sewer systems and education and medical services.

To rehabilitate American cities, an average of \$10.5 billion annually in public and private funds will be required for the next 20 years. About \$1.5 billion was spent for that purpose in 1963.

Financial requirements to relieve growing congestion in downtown areas by fast rail and bus service are officially calculated at \$1 billion a year for 10 years. Current annual expenditures run to less than one-fifth of that.

URGENT NEEDS

Spending of about \$4 billion yearly through 1970 is needed to eliminate the backlog of urgent needs for water and sewer systems. Only about half that amount is being spent now.

Construction of 100,000 classrooms annually is needed through 1969 compared with about 65,000 built in 1963. The market for educational aids will grow faster than school construction as industry and government manpower training programs expand.

Health services will expand rapidly. About \$1 billion is needed to modernize hospitals. Medical schools, now training 8,000 enrolled students a year, will eventually have to take care of 12,000 to meet health service demands.

Methodists Open Meet

PITTSBURGH (AP)—The 1964 General Conference of the Methodist Church opens formal business sessions today confronted with a challenge to remove speedily any mark of segregation among its 13 million members.

The challenge was issued Sunday as some 900 delegates opened their quadrennial conference in Pittsburgh's vast Civic Arena. The conference is to end about May 9, depending on completion of the legislative docket.

Bishop Gerald Kennedy of Los Angeles told delegates "this general conference should insist upon the removal of any mark of racial segregation and we should do it without wasting time."

High on the conference docket is abolition of the church's Central Jurisdiction, embracing some 375,000 Negroes in the United States. The jurisdiction is one of six. The others are geographical.

Some Southern delegates have voiced the belief that integration should be on a local and voluntary basis.

Midland Sailor Found In River

CHARLESTON, S.C. (AP)—William T. Russell Jr., 20, a sailor whose parents live in Midland, Tex., has been found dead in the Cooper River here.

Russell's body was found Saturday at the head of a pier at the Charleston Naval Base near his ship. He had been missing since last Monday after a weekend liberty.

Russell was an internal communications man aboard the guided missile destroyer USS Charles F. Adams.

Lamesa Schools Face Crowded Conditions

Expenses Filed

LAMESA (SC)—Ten local candidates spent \$6,707 on the upcoming May 2 primary election, according to expense statements filed in the Dawson County clerk's office here. Filing fees accounted for the bulk of the total and advertising and printing costs accounted for the rest of the expenses. No candidate reported any "gifts."

LAMESA (SC)—Another anticipated record enrollment here has caused an intensive study at Lamesa High School to decide how to best accommodate the 925 expected to register for the 1964-65 term.

Current registration filled every classroom, and pre-registration figures indicated a need

for a program to take care of the influx.

Bill E. Reeves, principal, studied similar problems in Odessa, Bellville and Andrews school systems and devised a tentative program.

Although no definite action has been taken, there seemed to be no alternative expected to make use of present physical

facilities for a longer period of the day.

No drastic changes in classroom schedules will be required, but it will be necessary to add a "zero" hour between 8 and 9 a.m.

It was announced that certain academic courses generally offered in multiple sections will probably be offered during the zero hour. Reeves said enough students will probably enroll in the courses to ease the cramped conditions.

It is estimated the new plan will house between 150 and 250

more students between the hours of 8 a.m. and 3 p.m.

Meanwhile, trustees are working on a major construction program for the system.

Presbyterian Stand Asked

MONTREAT, N.C. (AP) — Southern Presbyterians looked for ways today to translate into action a stronger stand on civil rights.

Commissioners (delegates) to the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in the U.S. (Southern) adopted Saturday a general policy favoring the civil rights movement but couldn't agree on a plan of action.

Court Studies Marriage Mix

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Supreme Court agreed today to rule on validity of Florida laws prohibiting marriages between Negroes and whites. The laws also make it a crime for a Negro man and white woman, or white man and Negro woman, to habitually occupy the same room at night.

The ruling was asked by Dewey McLaughlin, described as a Negro, and Connie Hoffman, a white woman, who were arrested in Miami Beach in February 1962. Each was sentenced to 30 days in jail and \$150 fine after conviction of living in the same room.

Counsel for the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, in a brief on behalf of the defendants argued their conviction violated federal guarantees of equal protection and due process of law.

A Florida welfare worker testified at trial of the two that the white woman stated she began living with McLaughlin as her common law husband in 1961 but had never had a formal marriage to him.

The Florida law under which the two were convicted bars living together by persons of different races "who are not married to each other." The appeal of the two persons said their case raised the question "whether a state can forbid parties from contracting a lawful marriage within the state because of their race, and then convict the same parties for entering into 'unlawful' cohabitation."

—Adopted a resolution "deploring" the use of children by adults in the advancement of local or national programs "regardless of the nature or purpose of such programs."

—Rejected a resolution proposing that a representative attend tomorrow's church assembly for civil rights in Washington, D.C. The national council of churches will sponsor the assembly.

—Went on record in favor of some form of "voluntary devotional recognition of God" in public schools.

—Adopted a benevolent budget totaling nearly \$10 million and established a central treasury for the administration of benevolent monies.

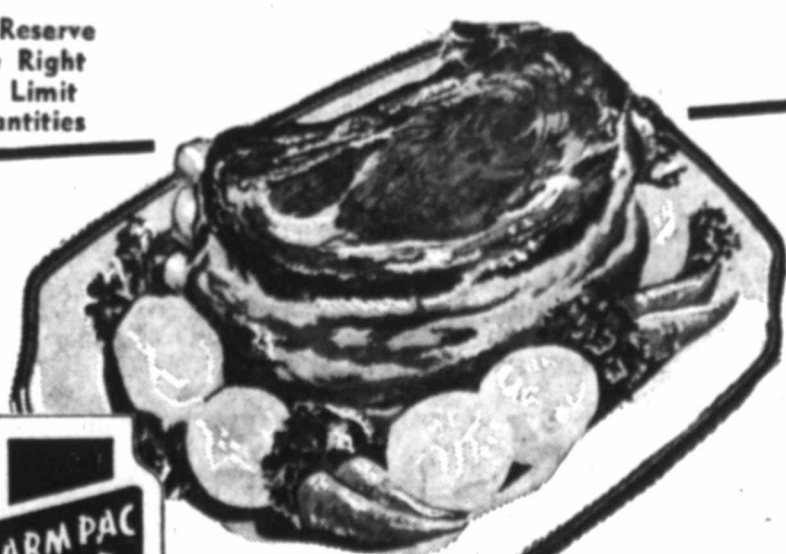

\$3 Billion Viet Nam Aid Shows Marked Difference

WASHINGTON (AP)—Cumulative U.S. aid to South Vietnam has topped \$3 billion in a program now markedly different from any other U.S. aid effort around the world.

The difference stems from its close link with the campaign to stamp out Communist guerrilla warfare.

It shows up in ways such as:

1. Top priority on material improvements that will benefit South Vietnamese villages this year—not next year or the year after. This contrasts with other programs like the Alliance for Progress for Latin America where economic plans are supposed to be developed carefully with an eye to long-range gains.
2. U.S. willingness to prop up the Vietnamese economy in a general way, not confining aid to selected projects.
3. Use of economic aid funds for antiguerrilla and propaganda support operations, such as providing thousands of special radios and drafting surrender appeals.
4. Scattering U.S. aid personnel through the countryside to spread American assistance at the grass roots. More than 200 are now in the provinces, many of them picked more for their ability to work with natives than for any special technical skill.

The massive U.S. economic and arms assistance program, which got going after the Indo-Chinese states became independent in 1954, totaled \$2.9 billion by the end of fiscal year 1963. It amounts to about \$400 million a year now, around half economic and half military, not counting the expenses of some 15,000 U.S. servicemen there.

The Johnson administration is planning some step-up in the aid effort and is urging other countries to join in. Among those supplying some assistance so far are Australia, Britain, Canada, France, West Germany, Malaysia, New Zealand and South Korea.

Spear-heading the U.S. aid program is a counter-insurgency plan costing about \$30 million a year plus another \$30 million worth of U.S. surplus food.

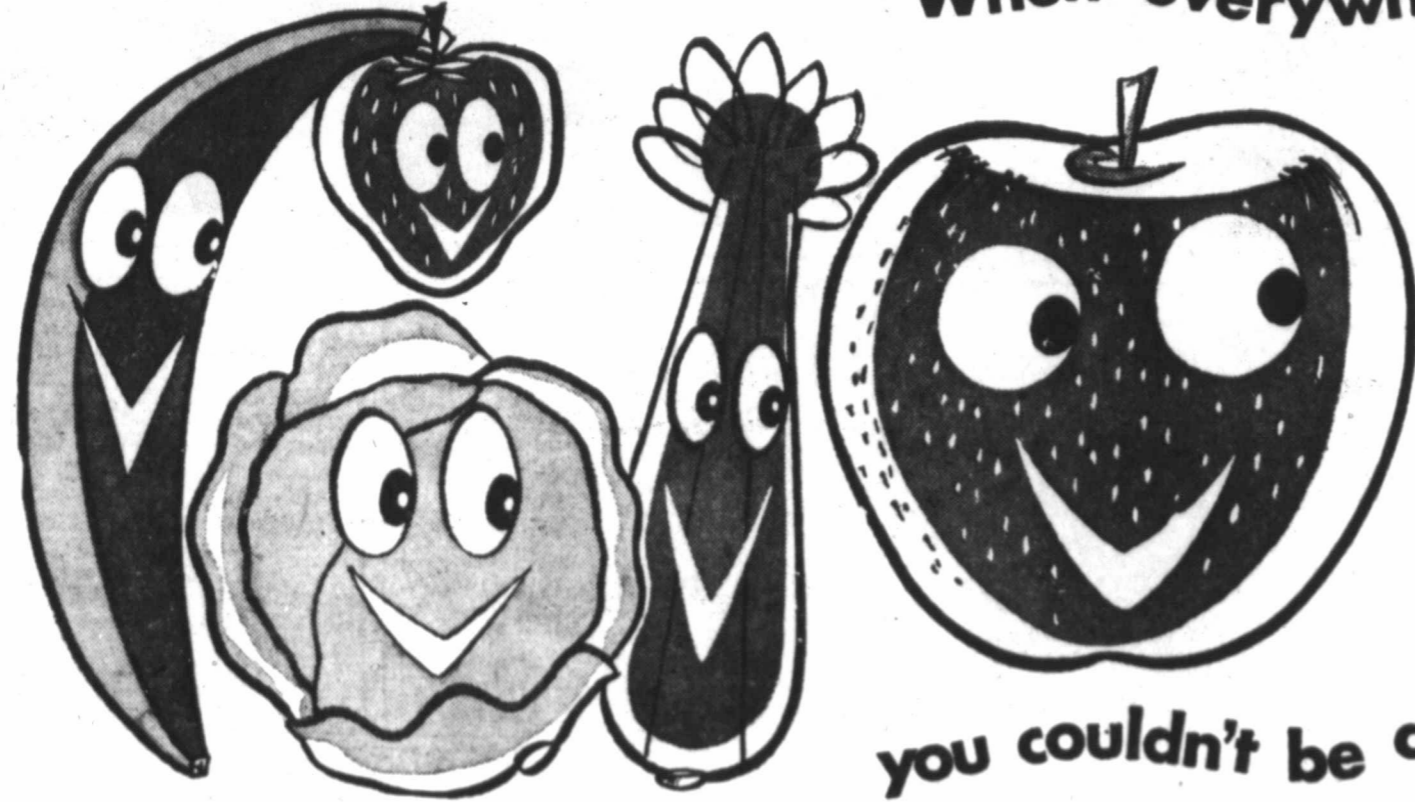

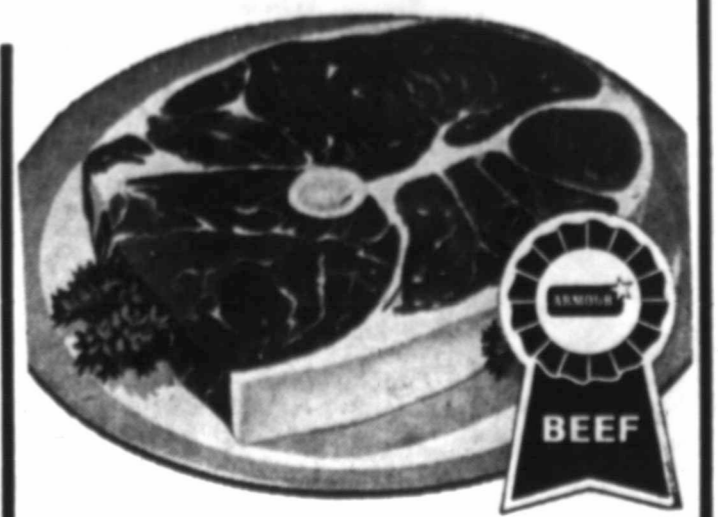

Enthusiastic Theme Marks Yarborough

Enthusiasm is the key to the governor's race, says Don Yarborough, Democrat.

"I want your enthusiasm for just a few short days," the tall, handsome brunet told a group of college students. "If each of you will give me your enthusiasm and then in turn will give me 100 votes, we'll win this race."

Yarborough, 38, follows his own advice.

"I'm working 18 hours a day. Will you be willing to work 4 or 5 hours to help me?" says the Houston attorney, a Marine Corps veteran of both World War II and the Korean fighting. He has never been elected to public office. However, in 1960 he got 43 per cent of the vote for lieutenant governor in a campaign against political veteran Ben Ramsey, who is now a railroad commissioner.

In 1962, Yarborough survived

a six-man race in the first Democratic primary, which eliminated then governor Price Daniel, and was defeated by about one per cent of the vote in the runoff by present Gov. John Connally.

"Right here in this room might be enough votes to elect Don Yarborough the next governor of Texas," is a favorite ending to campaign speeches—except that it is hard to tell when Yarborough ends a speech.

Aides complain good naturedly that Yarborough keeps talking after he leaves a platform and often is still talking as he is driven off in a car.

"I'm going to be an action governor," Yarborough promises over and over. "If I can't get action out of the legislature it won't be because I have not

brought the issues before the people."

TO THRIVE

Yarborough appears to thrive on the campaign trail. His deep tanned complexion usually is accented by a white or light blue shirt, a white or light gray tie, and a dark blue suit. When he has a hand free from gesturing or holding a telephone receiver, he smokes cigars.

"His only relaxation is swimming," says a harried aide. "Give him a choice between a nap or a swim and he'll take the swim every time. He's not a long distance swimmer or a diver, just a splasher."

"We've left a trail of forgotten swim trunks from El Paso to Texarkana," the helper added.

ANY GROUP

Yarborough says he likes to talk to any group, particularly young people. "Mr. Don," was the title used by several college students in a question-and-answer session at San Antonio.

"How many of you are from towns of 5,000 or less?" he asked. "Who are your parents?" he then demanded of a hand-raiser. "I didn't carry that county last time, your parents didn't work as hard as they should have. Use your enthusiasm and get everybody working."

"Let's have a contest. I promise that the one who gets the most votes for me will get to spend a weekend at the mansion when I am governor."

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Navy Researching Subs To Be Built Of Glass

WASHINGTON (AP) — In the news from Washington: "GLASS SUBS" Most people would never think of building deep-diving submarines out of glass. But the Navy disclosed today it is doing more than thinking.

The Navy told The Associated Press its scientists had scored encouraging results in tests of glass models subjected to pressures up to 300,000 pounds per square inch.

The tests are described as an early stage in the research and development process.

Wind-Up With Bang Likely In Campaign's Last Week

The countdown is on for the final week of a Texas primary campaign which promises to wind up with a bang.

The day of decision is Saturday when an estimated 1.8 million Texans are expected to turn out for the Democratic and Republican primaries.

Sen. Ralph Yarborough appeared set to fan the fire in a hot U.S. Senate race as he announced a scheduled statewide telecast of "major importance" Tuesday night.

"I invite the people of Texas to watch this telecast Tuesday night and witness the unmasking of the most fraudulent huckster act ever attempted on American government."

Yarborough spoke of exposing "the infamy of the falsehoods broadcast against us."

It was an obvious reference to

his opponent for the Democratic nomination, Gordon McLendon, Dallas radio executive.

McLendon appeared on a statewide telecast Saturday night with two men who said they saw Billie Sol Estes give Yarborough an envelope containing \$50,000 in 1960 at a barbecue.

The two were Midland policeman James Fonville and Ernest Keeton of Pecos.

Yarborough said after the McLendon telecast: "This huckster is attempting a character assassination of me." The senator earlier had termed the charge of receiving \$50,000 from Estes "an infamous lie."

DENY PRESENCE
McLendon predicted Sunday that Yarborough would "try to get someone to deny the presence of one or both of these two men at the Estes barbecue."

A round of appearances for Yarborough, McLendon and other political aspirants was scheduled today.

Yarborough was due in Bexar County for a college students' rally, public reception and banquet. McLendon planned to stop in Dallas, Corpus Christi, Harlingen and San Antonio.

Gov. John Connally was due

in Corpus Christi.

Connally, seeking re-nomination for his second term, said at Brownsville Sunday that state and local governments in Texas must provide vocational and technical education for young people.

Don Yarborough, contesting the governor for the Democratic nod, was scheduled for a Fort Worth appearance before the state convention of Texas Association of College Teachers of Education.

AT HOUSTON

Yarborough spent Sunday at Houston preparing television broadcasts for use this week.

Jack Crichton, the only Republican gubernatorial candidate was due in Brady today.

GOP challengers for the Yarborough Senate seat lined up a busy schedule for today. George Bush was due in El Paso and Odessa, Jack Cox in Victoria, Milton Davis in San Antonio and Robert Morris in Austin and Houston.

In the Democratic campaign for congressman-at-large, Robert W. Baker planned to be in Dallas while Dan Sullivan was expected at Lubbock, Amarillo and Wichita Falls.
