MEXICO CITY (AP) — His unopened parachute trailing uselessly behind him, paratrooper Gregorio Garcia, 22, plummeted toward the ground, almost a quarter of a mile

Leaping from the Mexican Air Force C47 almost at the same time, in a mass jump, paratrooper Antonio Sanchez saw Garcia's plight and reached desperately for the 'chute

as it streamed past him. Sanchez caught it with one hand, struggled as the rough cloth slipped through his fingers, finally managed to get a

grip with both hands. To slow his rapid descent caused by Garcia's extra weight, Sanchez freed one hand long enough to open his small emergency parachute in addition to his regular one.

With Sanchez supporting Garcia dangling below, the paratroopers floated to earth. Mexico's defense minister, Gen. Agustin Olachea, and several hundred other spectators who had turned out to see the parachuting demonstration Saturday breathed sighs of



Republicans have reached the general conclusion, however, that the President is weakest in this field and many of them want to be free to voice wide-ranging criticism of the President's handling of international matters.

A U.S. spokesman said that Hines was killed in a fight with elements of two Communist Viet Cong battalions. Two Vietnamese died with him and nine others were wounded

The total of American military personnel killed in action in Viet Nam is now 131, including 35 this year.

Hines' parents, Mr. and Mrs. James B. Hines, live at 2400 Parker St. in Amarillo A U.S. spokesman said 20 Viet

Cong died in the battle. The government forces engaged elements of two Commu nist battalions which had been menacing the town since a four-

day battle two weeks ago. Government troops launched a big-scale operation against the Viet Cong "secret zone" of Do Xa, in the mountainous provinces of Quang Ngai and Kontum. No contact with the enemy was reported during the



MEXICO CITY (AP) - The amount of land devoted to cotton-growing in north Mexico has been decreased sharply for the

coming season, especially in the key Matamoros area. The Confederation of Cotton Associations says the reduction is due primarily to drouth and low yields during the 1963-64 sea-

It says Matamoros acreage has been reduced from 506,500 to about 250,000

In the Delicias zone, the cut is from 45,000 acres to 25,500. A reduction also has been effected in the Juarez Valley's 36,000 acres but the exact figure hasn't been tabulated.

Despite the cutbacks, Mexico's overall cotton yield isn't expected to drop because of new areas being opened to cotton





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

Church Ousts Couple In 'Lola' Uproar

IONIA, Mich. (AP)-An Ionia couple was excommunicated Sunday after charging their Episcopal priest with harboring "archaic beliefs and moral knowledge" in his criticism of a dance in a high school production of the musical "Damn Yan-

Mr. and Mrs. Robert Clore were stripped of their membership in the Ionia Episcopal church by the Rev. Raymond Bierlein, who said he acted because of a letter written by the Clores published Friday in the Ionia Daily Sentinel-Standard.

"We can no longer restrain our feelings concerning the objections voiced by our rector to the dancing in the current high school musical play," the letter said in part.

Terming a dance sequence "salacious and immoral," the Rev. Mr. Bierlein last Monday objected before the school board to the characterization of Lola in the play by 16-year-old Kristi Honson who wore a brief black outfit with a split skirt.

Kristi, playing the role of the provocative temptress danced into the audience and pinched

"I don't want any children taught to dance like that for any excuse whatever," Bierlein told the school board.

Kristi, as a result, was ordered not to dance into the audience by the school superintendent. Robert Boyce and the play director, Raymond Monte. The school board sent a committee to watch the play Friday and



"In recent years we have been able to decrease radioactivity by a factor of 100, and we can make an even cleaner de-vice," he told delegates to the annual meeting of the Texas Medical Association.

Dr. Teller discussed "Operation Plowshare and Peacetime Uses of Atomic Energy." By the time Operation Plowshare is applied, he said, "I think radio-contamination need not be a barrier and will not be a barrier."

Dr. Teller said there is no doubt about the practicality of what he called "geographical engineering" with atomic ener-

I think many common golfers right at the start get their necks and shoulders so stiff it is impossible for them to swing with any freedom and smoothness. A tip that helps a lot of them is to turn the head a little so the chin points to the right of the ball. Then they can turn their shoulders easily without getting out of balance. They'll find it easier, then, to follow the very old (and still very good) advice to keep the head steady until the left shoulder swings around and under the chin, then until the right shoulder touches the chin. It might give you a simple picture of the swing to think of staying steady while you worked your swing from the tip of your left shoul-







FOR BOTH SIDES-the Railroad and the union representatives-negotiated with a club over their heads. This pressure was not revealed to the public, but the "bargainers" knew that unless they agreed by the end of this week, the President would ask Congress to pass a law barring a rail strike while a governmental proc-

ess of settlement was put into effect. Each side had to estimate whether more would be gained or less accomplished by letting Congress enact a new law that would apply not just for the emergency but continuously hereafter. Such a statute would give the government power to prescribe the settlement of issues under an elaborate machinery of mediation and then arbitration.

WHILE THE threat to get Congress to enact new legislation was never defined in the conferences at which government mediators were present, the idea was in the back of everybody's mind constantly and was made evident to the conferees in various ways. It was, indeed, the obvious alternative. The problem of the railroads and of the labor representatives, respectively, during the negotiations, therefore, was how to get the utmost advantage for each side without blocking the road to final agreement.

In a sense the unions were deprived of their normal use of economic power-the opportunity to threaten the railroads with a huge financial loss. This is always the biggest weapon a labor union can wield. The employers could bring about some financial hardships for the workers through wage losses, but this is largely protected against by strike and insurance funds and unemployment benefits paid for by the railroads.

WHILE THE railroads recognized that the dispute had to be settled and a strike averted, this didn't relieve



toward the labor side The pressure on the railroads, moreover, to reach some kind of agreement was intensive for another reason. They couldn't know how much more their costs might be if a government-established board had power to fix the working rules.

SO, ALL IN ALL, the railroad representatives realized that they could not bargain in the customary way and hold out for better terms as the union representatives had done in more than five years of jockeying in negotiations. A settlement, therefore, had to come. But who was to say in a few days of critical parleys which proposals had to be accepted? Here pressure by government, exerted by the Secretary of Labor and government-appointed mediators, came into play. It was simply a case of "take it or leave it," with a hidden warning. For, when the mediators spoke, everyone knew they had behind them a club possessed by and about to be used by the President himself.

THIS, OF COURSE, isn't a "free collective-bargaining process." It introduces a third party, euphemistically identified as the "public interest." It means nevertheless an arbitrary usurpation of governmental power without the explicit sanction of Con-

Indeed, the "public interest" will not be fully served until the Congress, by law, defines and limits the right to strike on the railroads. As things stand today, the exercise of such a right could at any time inflict a devastating loss on the national economy, with untold hardships to innocent by standers. For, as has happened before, there can be a strike threat at any time one one unresolved issue

SO, WHILE the public reaction may be one of relief that for the time being there is to be no catastrophe. the menace can hardly be said to have disappeared. (Copyright, 1964, New York Herald Tribune, Inc.)


