Joe provided well for his family. He was a good father and husband. He paid his debts and gave to charity. He was fair in his business dealings. He was a good citizen. He left his family with a comfortable income and a good home.

There were many flowers and lots of friends. The preacher made a nice talk about Joe's good qualities, but he didn't have much to say about Joe's hereafter. You see, Joe was not a Christian. Religion was "for littlechildren, or perhaps women," but not for him. So Joe ignored God in his life; he didn't obey his will; he didn't talk to him; he made no effort to become a Christian, or to worship and serve as a Christian should. If there was a hereafter, he trusted in his own goodness to carry him throughs

He had no promise that it would. He just figured it out that way.

But Joe was guilty of sin, even as you and I. There were some things that he did when he was younger that he didn't like to think about, and he had tried to avoid those mistakes since then. But those sins were committed and they injured others and himself, and the sins and the injuries still stand on Joe's record.

He was much like Cornelius, who in some respects was better than Joe (Acts 10:1, 2). But the goodness of Cornelius was not enough to save him. He, too, had to hear words whereby he and his house could be saved (Acts 11:14). Neither Joe nor Cornelius could be saved without Christ, for Jesus himself said, "No man cometh unto the Father, but by me" (John 14:6).

Joe could have put his faith in Christ, repented of his sins, and been baptized for the remission of sins (Acts 2:38). He could have been forgiven by the Son of God who gave his life for that very purpose, to forgive and blot out, for those that obey him, the sins that mortals cannot correct. But he didn't, He just figured out a way of his own,\* and now he is gone-gone to meet his Maker, the one he ignored all his life. Joe had provided for almost everything except the main thing.

Well, it is all over for Joe. But at the funeral there were other Joes and Harrys and Petes and Sues and Marthas and Janes just like him who some day will attend their own funerals. Will they be ready? It all depends on what they do about it now. "And now why tarriest thou? Arise, and be baptized, and wash away thy sins, calling on the name of the Lord" (Acts 22:16).





### Chaos Seen With School **Prayer Laws**

WASHINGTON (AP)-A constitutional amendment to permit prayers in the public schools would produce "an utterly impossible and chaotic situation" says a Columbia University pro-

Testifying before the House Judiciary Committee, Prof. Philip H. Phenix predicted it would require a national agency to supervise the various religious exercises that would blossom under such an amendment.

ENDORSEMENT Phenix was one of three witnesses who opposed any prayer amendment Thursday after the committee heard strong endorsements of school prayers by Roman Catholic Bishop Fulton J. Sheen of New York and Alabama's Gov. George C. Wal-

Phenix said the principle of government action in religious life established by such an amendment would open the way for government suppression of

"It is a matter of simple logic," he said, "that we Americans cannot enjoy the constitutional protection of religious liberties and at the same time authorize the public schools to conduct religious exercises involving prayers and Scripture

Leo Pfeffer, a New York attorney and general counsel for the American Jewish Congress, said proponents of the various amendments to permit public school prayers have built their case on "fiction."



The gypsy lived in Hazelton, a mining village founded in the 1890's. She placed the curse when it became a ghost town as Valdez thrived.

#### Wallace In Indiana

INDIANAPOLIS - Having learned the lesson of overconfidence in Wisconsin, no one from Gov. Matthew Welsh on down will speculate about the size of segregationist George Wallace's vote in next week's primary.

Not only were the discontents underestimated but the shrewdness of the Alabama governor's appeal has also been underrated. In the Midwest he never talks about Negroes, except to say he gets along well with them, or about segregation or racial trouble.

HIS TARGET is the federal government and the evil of its ever-encroaching power. Wallace denounces the civil rights bill as another and more insidious extension of that power.

"They can order you to hire a redheaded Chinese or a Baptist Japanese," he tells Indiana audiences.

What he is saying, in effect," ernor Welsh remarked after one of these telecasts. "is that we in Alabama would secede if we could afford it. But with all that federal aid they get down there they can't afford to.'

AFTER A TERRIBLE civil war over secession and 100 years of trying to heal the wounds that is what Wal lace is preaching-nullification. He is exploiting all the discontents of a troubled and uncertain time and focus ing them on the effort of the Negro to attain equality of status through

action by the federal government. The discontents are abundant here where after a long hassle between Welsh, a Democrat, and the Republican legislature a two per cent sales tax was adopted. It was the only way out if the schools were to be able to expand to take the rising tide of youngsters out of the postwar boom. But organized labor, the core of Democratic strength, is bitterly opposed to

the tax which Welsh supported. The

unions are having their own integration problems.

WALLACE APPEALS to secondand third-generation Poles and Czechs working in the steel plants of Gary in Lake County. They are concerned about status and about jobs in an area where the Negro population may be 40 per cent. As everywhere it is housing with proposed anti-discrimination ordinances in several cities that is the root of the discontent.

Heading a slate of delegates pledged to President Johnson, Welsh and the Democratic organization are working to hold down the vote for the Wallace slate. But Welsh cannot succeed himself under Indiana's constitution, which seems to have been written shortly after the discovery of the wheel, so his hold is limited.

IN 1961 WELSH, working with the Republican legislature, got through a state civil-rights act that in some respects goes beyond the measure now before Congress. Last year it was strengthened with only three dissenting votes. With a strong civili-rights commission it has been widely accept-

Currently, and this may be the saddest commentary on the whole business, the seeds of rebellion are being planted, Government in Wallace's perverted fairy tale becomes the dragon to be resisted at any cost.

NULLIFICATION suits perfectly the ends of the John Birchers and others who seem to want either no government at all or a tyranny in which all would conform to their iron dogmas. In 1861 Lincoln resolved not to free the slaves but to save the Union from nullification and secession. Those it has been said, who do not learn from history are compelled to live it over again. There is probably a great deal wrong with the President's program to heal the suffering Appalachians. But what is not wrong is the central theme of it: The American dream cannot endure the continued affront that is contained in the vast, cheerless sweep of this chronically - depressed area; if our system is any good, it can cope with this problem, and if it is not good enough to do it, then it is not good enough to survive.

RECENTLY WE spent a few days revisiting some of the forgotten people of eastern Kentucky. Our series of articles was widely used, and nothing written here recently has aroused the reaction that the Appalachian articles

Dozens of letters were written in response, and almost invariably they asked: What can we do? How can we help the children stay in school? Where can we send clothing? Money?

THE REACTION was encouraging, and it suggested that Americans are still a great-hearted, compassionate people. This is a thing that President Johnson understands. He believes the people will support his Appalachian program and his war on poverty; else he would not have launched either in an election year. Lyndon Johnson may occasionally be cornball enough to touch off the gag reflex on a bronze billygoat, but he has the psychic stethoscope tuned to the heartbeat of

SEN. BARRY GOLDWATER is aptly cast as this election's Piltdown man. He is persuaded that all that is needed to loose the Appalachians from the thralldom of want is to permit free

WASHINGTON - Misreading the enterprise to have full sway in the area. Like so many of his attitudes, this one is the product of arrogant ignorance. The coal barons are probphenomenon to a policy few others ably the greatest examples of predatory free enterprise in our culture, and the strip mine is a wholly appropriate memorial to their destructive genre. It is certainly the only one they'll leave behind when their rape of the land and its people is done with.

> A LOT OF worn-out stereotypes will have to be discarded if the United States is to capitalize on the opportunity opened to it by President Johnson's program to restore Appalachia and its people to our affluent society. Foremost among these (and it is one you will hear often in the days to come) is that the people are shiftless, moonshining, incestuous hillbillies who deserve no help. This is, of course, a libel. Appalachia contains a higher percentage of children under age 15 than the national average. If these shamefully ill-used youngsters become the cliche people noted above, then it will be a monstrous wrong that will diminish us all.

THE SECOND falsehood about Appalachia is that the land itself is ruined and worthless. If the strip miners are not stopped, it soon may become just that, but it isn't yet. It still contains untold mineral wealth. Rainfall averages 45 inches a year throughout its 340 counties. With a wise and far-seeing program of enlightened land use it could become a matchless recreational area-priceless to a nation whose population will double in the next 50 years.

When the facts become available (as Mr. Johnson is sure to arrange), the American mood will be one of anger and determination. The people will support a sane and compassionate Appalachian program.

SO PAR AS the friends of Bobby Kennedy are concerned, the fight has hardly begun. They are very influential inside the party in the big cities of the populous states which have large electoral votes. These individuals are active politicians who worked under Bobby Kennedy when he was running his brother's campaign before and after the convention of 1960. They are persons who feel there is a sentiment for the Kennedy name inside, and outside the party which amounts to a real emotion. \*

It is all very well to say by way of rebuttal that the present Attorney General has antagonized the South politically by his dramatic moves in enforcement of court orders in "civil rights" cases. But for every electoral vote that could be lost in the South, it is contended that there are far more electoral votes at stake in the North that could be lost if key men and women in the party organizations were disappointed and became apathetic because the Attorney General had been turned down.



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
