Communists Hold May Day Fiestas

The Communist world held its annual May Day rites today with massive outpourings of people in Moscow and Peking and the usual tough talk about the inevitability of communism. But the great schism between the Soviet Union and Red China cast its shadow over the gala celebrations. The Soviets refused to attend the Peking rally and withdrew an invitation to a Chinese labor delegation to view the annual parade in Moscow's Red Square.

East Germany, Bulgaria, Hungary and Czechoslovakia joined the Soviets in their boycott of the Peking festivities. Many non-Communist countries also held May Day celebrations to honor their labor force. But there were few such activities in the United States, where labor's big holiday occurs in September.

Methodists Vote Mixing

PITTSBURGH (AP) — Delegates to the worldwide Methodist General Conference voted acceptance today of a voluntary racial integration program for the church. The more than 900 delegates approved the proposal by an overwhelming margin. It calls for merger of white and Negro church subdivisions on a strictly voluntary basis.

The program, officially called "a plan of action," would not necessarily mix Negro and white congregations during the next four years. However, the wording of the plan clearly indicates this is the church's ultimate aim. The 375,000 Negro members live mainly in the area of the Southeast Jurisdiction. There are 9.6 million white Methodists in this country. Southern delegates offered opposition to the plan, mainly in the form of delaying action. Some other opposition came from delegates who felt the program did not go far enough in removing racial barriers in the church. Passage required a simple majority of the delegates, about one-third of whom are from the South. Earlier, the delegates voted down a proposal to eliminate the church's six jurisdictions altogether as a means of effecting racial integration.

With close to 12,000 eligible voters in the county, Frank Hardesty, county Democratic chairman, is hopeful Saturday's primary will see between 7,500 and 7,900 go to the polls.

Most observers think there is more interest in the election than is shown in the comments of the lay voter. They point to the bitterly contested U. S. Senate race between Ralph Yarborough and Gordon McLendon as an incentive for accelerated last minute election interest.

GOP Expecting Up To 600 Ballots Here

Howard County Republicans will hold their first full scale primary election in history here Saturday, and Ralph Gossett, county chairman, is predicting upwards of 600 votes.

Republicans have set up polling places in nine of the 16 precincts. Polls will open at 8 a.m. and close at 7 p.m. Precinct conventions will follow at 7:30 p.m., and Gossett urged all party members to attend.

Although there are no contests, three Republicans are offered for local offices this year. Rich Anderson is a candidate for the nomination as state senator. Harold Hall seeks the nod for county commissioner. Precinct 3, and Mike Moore is a candidate for the sheriff's post.

All will face their first contests in November opposing Democrats.

Although there are no local contests, the GOP has a full slate of candidates at the state level, plus an opportunity for party members to state their preferences for the presidential nod.

County Has 10 Delegates To State Demo Parley

Howard County is entitled to send 10 delegates to the Texas State Democratic Convention, according to Frank Hardesty, Howard County Democratic committee chairman. These delegates will be chosen at the Howard Democratic Convention, set for 8 p.m. May 9 in the 118th District Courtroom.

Girl Born To Margaret

LONDON (AP) — Princess Margaret gave birth today to a daughter, her second child. "It's marvelous news," said Lord Snowdon, the baby's father. "She looks a super baby."

Queen Elizabeth's sister and Snowdon also have a son, Viscount Lindley, born in November, 1961. Snowdon said both mother and child were doing well. The baby was the fourth royal birth this year. Earlier, Princess Alexandra, the queen's cousin, had a boy on Feb. 29. The queen had a boy March 10, and the Duchess of Kent, commoner wife of Alexandra's brother, had a girl Tuesday night. Margaret's baby takes seventh place in the line of succession to the throne, displacing the Duke of Gloucester, an uncle of the 33-year-old princess. The birth was announced in an official bulletin from Kensington Palace, where Margaret and Snowdon live. Snowdon took an armful of daffodils and other spring flowers to his wife and then telephoned his mother, the Countess of Rosse, in London and his sister, the Countess de Vesci, at her country estate in Ireland. Francis Legh, private secretary to Margaret, informed the royal family.

173 Can Vote In Three Races

There are 173 electors in Howard County who will be permitted to vote only for U.S. Senator U.S. Congressman 19th Congressional District, and U.S. Congressman-at-large in Saturday's election.

These are the citizens who refused to pay a poll tax and accepted special receipts marked "poll tax not paid." Such receipts entitle these voters to ballot only for United States offices and not for state or local candidates.

The special receipts were issued to comply with the ruling of the U.S. Supreme Court which has held that a citizen who is otherwise a qualified elector, cannot be deprived of his right to vote for federal officials — including president and vice president — because he has not paid a poll tax. Mrs. Zarah LeFevre, county tax assessor, said that the 173 individuals who were issued these special receipts, will be handed a ballot at the primary voting places on which all races have been marked out, but the federal contests.

By The Associated Press Texas Republicans and Democrats nominate in primary elections Saturday their candidates in state and local elections next November.

The Republican primary also will feature a presidential preference poll which Sen. Barry Goldwater, Ariz., is expected to win.

The Republicans, frankly adding the poll to attract voters to their primary, expect about 300,000 votes. About 1.5 million voters are expected to cast ballots in the Democratic primary.

The Republican preferential primary is in no way binding on delegates to the GOP national convention. In addition to Goldwater—the names of Gov. Nelson Rockefeller of New York, Maine Sen. Margaret Chase Smith and former Minnesota Gov. Harold Stassen are on the ballot. Write-in votes are allowed.

For the first time in modern history Republicans have candidates in all 23 House races. The only Republican statewide contest is that for the U.S. Senate nomination for which there are four candidates.

Fifteen of the present U.S. House members have no opposition in the primaries, including Ed Foreman and Bruce Alger, the state's only Republicans.

The most hard-fought campaign in the Democratic primary was that for nomination as Senate candidate. Gordon McLendon, radio executive and a self-styled conservative, seeks to unseat Sen. Ralph Yarborough.

Gov. John Connally is opposed for renomination in the Democratic primary by Don Yarborough, whom Connally defeated in 1962 by a margin of 28,250 votes out of 1.1 million cast.

Sen. Yarborough planned a statewide television speech from Fort Worth tonight. His opponent in the Democratic primary, Dallas radio executive Gordon McLendon, made his final statewide telecast Thursday in front of the Alamo in San Antonio and predicted he stood "on the threshold of sweeping victory." He outlined about 15 points which he called the "real issues" of the campaign.

These included civil rights. McLendon said he was against the public accommodations section of the Senate bill, which Yarborough would not take a stand on either way.

Optimism Bubbles With Steel Firms

NEW YORK (AP)—The nation's \$16-billion steel industry, biting its nails at this time in 1962 and 1963, is brimming with optimism. Production is at a gallop. Major producers report first-quarter profits up in many cases 50 to 75 per cent from a year ago. There is no sign of a serious labor dispute. Edmund F. Martin, board chairman of the second-ranking firm, Bethlehem Steel Corp., told newsmen 1964 might prove a record year for steel companies assuming there is no strike in the auto industry. The main threat to tranquility, a federal indictment charging eight big steelmakers with price fixing in 1955-61, has been crowded pretty much into the background for the time being. The companies have pleaded innocent. Two years ago steel executives were nursing wounds from their run-in with the late President John F. Kennedy over an attempted price increase, later withdrawn. A year ago anxiety lever a possible strike had not

In Texarkana, Yarborough attacked his opponent for indirectly entering the Los Angeles radio market through a Tia Juana, Mexico, station. The Republican four-way race for Senate also created much last-minute huffing and puffing. Robert Morris of Dallas urged his supporters in Austin to "make an extra effort to get a few more votes" to help him win without a runoff. He said his campaign "has followed the code of fair play" and been on "issues and issues alone."

George Bush claimed that Ralph Yarborough was listed as not voting on a congressional amendment to reduce beef imports. Bush said that, regardless of what Yarborough told a statewide television audience, the Congressional Record showed the senator told the Senate "If I were at liberty to vote I would vote yea. I withhold my vote."

JACKSON, Miss. (AP) — Gov. John Connally and his Democratic opponent, Don Yarborough have scheduled statewide television appearances tonight.

U.S. Gov. Preston Smith said that, barring an unexpected recession, Texas next year will not only see its finances in the black but will have a \$50 million to \$100 million surplus.

Smith's opponent in the Democratic primary, Albert Fuentest Jr., told a San Antonio rally he was running against two Republicans, Smith in May and the Republican party nominee in November. He said "we have the votes to win."

Railroad Commissioner Jim Langdon, running for his first elected term, told a Dallas audience his opponent's promise to double oil production would be ruinous if it could be done.

His opponent, Jesse Owens, said in San Antonio the present commission's policy has created eight-day allowables and a drive toward ever wider well spacing.

All-Channel TV Ruling In Effect

WASHINGTON (AP)—American television passed another milestone today.

Any video set made in this country from now on must be capable of receiving 82—instead of 12—television channels.

The result, as time goes by, should be more stations, more program variety and better television reception throughout the United States.

Congress passed the all-channel television set requirement in 1962 and made it effective today to give the industry time to adapt itself to the new law.

It also applies to any sets imported into this country.

Most television sets on the market today are equipped to receive only the 12 very high frequency channels from 2 through 13.

But television broadcasting, says the Federal Communications Commission—which originally asked Congress for the all-channel receiver law—has outgrown those channels.

Ready to accommodate the overflow are 70 ultra-high-frequency channels. More than 100 UHF stations are operating today, but many television owners are not familiar with them

because their sets are equipped for only VHF reception.

The 12 VHF channels can accommodate no more than 650 television stations. Thus, while some larger cities have several such stations, many are limited by FCC allocations to two or fewer. And some cities have none.

But the 70 UHF channels can accommodate up to 3,000 new stations, promising more communities a chance of having their own stations and offering viewers a greater choice of programs.

The FCC points out that the new law does not require owners of VHF sets to buy new receivers.

Viewers have several options if they wish to take immediate advantage of the UHF stations in their areas. They may buy one of the new all-channel sets now on the market. They may have a UHF tuner installed in their VHF set.

They may add a UHF converter to their VHF set. Or they may install what is known as a strip tuner in their present set, allowing them to tune in on one or more available UHF channels.

With "all-channel" reception mandatory, the FCC said, "TV broadcasting will find ample room in UHF to grow on a national basis."

"The end result will be more TV stations, greater TV program variety, and better local TV reception throughout the land."

Baker Data Made Public

WASHINGTON (AP)—Senate investigators made public Thursday a report that Bobby Baker paid for food and services he received from the Senate restaurant for the opening of his Carousel Motel at Ocean City, Md.

The report was submitted to the Senate Rules Committee by Sen. Robert C. Byrd, D-W.Va., chairman of its Senate restaurant subcommittee.

Byrd said he ordered an investigation after Sen. John J. Williams, R-Del., in a Senate speech earlier this month, raised the question of whether the restaurant had catered "the grand opening" of Baker's motel July 22, 1962.

The opening was a gala affair attended by many Washington bigwigs, in and out of Congress. President Johnson, then vice president, was among the guests.

Baker resigned under fire from his 19-000-a-year Senate post last Oct. 7 after Williams and others had raised questions about his outside business dealings.

The Rules Committee launched an investigation of how he acquired an estimated fortune of more than \$2 million while on the Senate payroll. The committee now is working on a report of its findings and recommendations.

Pennies Urged For White House

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Republican Congressional Committee newsletter today urged Americans to send pennies to President Johnson to enable him to keep the White House lights on at night.

It only costs one penny to burn a 100-watt light bulb all night, the newsletter said as it labeled the President's lights-out program "a phony economy which we could well do without."

Tiny Church Hidden On Tiny Channel Isle

ST. PETER PORT, Isle of Guernsey (AP) — This is no place to talk about the awesome size of Notre Dame nor the cathedrals in Milan and Cologne stretching their Gothic fingers into the sky.

Here they have a church that will accommodate one priest and a congregation of two.

An extra acolyte is an inconvenience.

It's the smallest church in the world.

By name, it is "Le Chapel" — Les Voux Belets — and it's good walking distance into the countryside on a nice day.

People do walk it.

Those of medium size stare over the top of the chapel. They have to stoop to enter.

A "poor box" receives their coins.

No one seems to be in charge. There are no "chapel" pamphlets for the tourists who flock to flowered Guernsey in the English Channel. Indeed the tourist would have to hunt for it.

This may be a local mistake but the Guernseverite is not too troubled about that. He's satisfied by and large to accept it as a mere wonder.

ON FARM

The chapel stands on the property of a farm held for generations by the Christian Brothers of the order of De La Salle.

Once they were powerful here. Now they struggle with a farm and a run-down former school which suffers from lack of money. But they refuse to

turn the chapel into a money-maker as a tourist attraction.

"We'll never do that," said Brother Christian, 51, head of the order.

"We simply could not permit it. To charge admission would be like expecting someone to pay for attendance at mass."

"We could easily teach and train 200 students here and I am hoping we'll find a way to do it but that is not the way."

BROKEN CHINA

Medtime, Brother Christian presides over the cow stables and a ramshackle building which contains a cellar full of broken china.

"We have enough for another chapel," he said with a large grin.

Broken China? That's how the chapel came into being.

Back in 1913 the order received Brother Deodat in its midst and he dutifully took up his job as a monk.

After a short while he beseeched the abbot to build a chapel.

The abbot said no but finally gave in and told Deodat he would have to do it without any help whatsoever.

Illustrating a rare understanding of family life, Brother Deodat circulated through St. Peter Port in search of broken dishes. He found what everyone knows, there always are plenty of those.

Then he added sea shells.

New Point In Rights Bill

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate had a new point to consider about automatic jury trials in civil rights cases today: Whether to exempt state officials.

Sen. John Sherman Cooper, R-Ky., Thursday night introduced an amendment to one that called for such for the civil rights bill.

The court would have the power to "punish" officials who in their official capacity disobeyed its orders.

Until Cooper introduced his amendment to one offered earlier by Sen. Herman Talmadge, it had looked like the Senate was all set to vote by the middle of next week on a substitute proposal—a compromise calling for jury trials in only certain cases.

Now, action apparently must come first on the Cooper amendment before anything can be done about the substitute.

With a final flick of his hand toward the chapel, he bid adieu.

Business Status In Attack Talked

DENTON (AP) — About 65 Southwest business leaders met Thursday to work out methods for continuing production in the event of a nuclear attack on the United States.

Meeting in the new \$2.7 million underground federal center here, the executives dealt with hypothetical problems concerning material necessary to survival and to national defense.

The emergency mobilization exercise, a one-day meeting also involving government men, was one of several currently being held throughout the nation to provide key production leaders with the essential groundwork and organization for emergency production.

All the executives have been sworn for federal office and would automatically become federal employees in the event of a nuclear attack. They are referred to as "executive reservists" and would have the power in the event of an emergency to allocate and control certain phases of the country's economy.

Each has received specific instructions from the Business and Defense Services Administration (BDSA) in Washington as to where he would report and what his authority and responsibility would be.

There are 1,400 of these reservists in the nation. Many served in the War Production Board. Their service is voluntary and without pay.

The hypothetical problem considered Thursday put the reservists in field relocation centers 10 days after a nuclear attack. The problem assumed that Abilene, Austin, Corpus Christi, El Paso and Fort Worth had been destroyed, as well as Little Rock, Lake Charles, Shreveport and Roswell, N.M.

It was assumed that a severe shortage of certain critical items, such as morphine, milk containers, power distribution cable, and electronic equipment existed. The reservists discussed how best to allocate and control production of such material, as well as other aspects of the economy.

These are advertising models, of course, but unlike their glamorous feminine counterparts, cavorting for the camera is not a full-time career.

Especially in this city therefore, the man who smiles at you from a magazine, billboard or your TV set can easily be the same man driving your cab, serving your dinner, or trying to sell you insurance.

Among the most successful male models are insurance brokers, farmers, salesmen, cab drivers, and stock brokers. And, because modeling assignments fit into their irregular working schedules, the largest portion (about a third) are actors.

Top-notch male models have an earning capacity of \$35,000 a year. And from the looks of all the fun those charming gentlemen have surrounded by feminine pulchritude it would appear to be a much sought after career. But it isn't.

Men are not as interested in modeling as women are because it is a fairly short time thing. A man wants to be working towards a larger goal that will take care of the future.

Actually, modeling is one of the few fields in which the woman definitely gets the better of him. He earns less, has fewer jobs, and much less opportunity in the future than she does.

Womanly beauty commands up to \$60 an hour, while top-notch male charm is worth up to \$50.

HE'S NOT PRETTY—Since a man expects a career to build with each year, modeling cannot be his main goal in life. Yet the handsome he who meets the exacting demands of the modeling profession and who lives in one of the primary ad photography areas can earn a little or a lot, temporarily.

The ideal male model is 6 to 6-foot-1, weighs 170 pounds, wears a size 40 regular or long, and makes his clothes look good. He is not pretty as models were a half dozen years ago. He is rugged, outdoorsy, pleasant and oozing with masculinity.

E-1-2-3-4, etc. This "E" is for the east side of the house. Also mark your windows at the same time to match that awning with the same letters, E-1-2, etc. On the north, west and south, mark these awnings and windows with an N, W, or S, starting from the left hand side, which is the way we read. . . with 1, 2, 3, etc., for each window in the row. We used to have a lot of confusion trying to get the proper awning or window to fit that certain opening until the correct screen was found. Joe Was a Good Fellow

Joe provided well for his family. He was a good father and husband. He paid his debts and gave to charity. He was fair in his business dealings. He was a good citizen. He left his family with a comfortable income and a good home.

There were many flowers and lots of friends. The preacher made a nice talk about Joe's good qualities, but he didn't have much to say about Joe's hereafter. You see, Joe was not a Christian. Religion was "for little children, or perhaps women," but not for him. So Joe ignored God in his life; he didn't obey his will; he didn't talk to him; he made no effort to become a Christian, or to worship and serve as a Christian should. If there was a hereafter, he trusted in his own goodness to carry him through. He had no promise that it would. He just figured it out that way.

But Joe was guilty of sin, even as you and I. There were some things that he did when he was younger that he didn't like to think about, and he had tried to avoid those mistakes since then. But those sins were committed and they injured others and himself, and the sins and the injuries still stand on Joe's record.

He was much like Cornelius, who in some respects was better than Joe (Acts 10:1, 2). But the goodness of Cornelius was not enough to save him. He, too, had to hear words whereby he and his house could be saved (Acts 11:14). Neither Joe nor Cornelius could be saved without Christ, for Jesus himself said, "No man cometh unto the Father, but by me" (John 14:6).

Joe could have put his faith in Christ, repented of his sins, and been baptized for the remission of sins (Acts 2:38). He could have been forgiven by the Son of God who gave his life for that very purpose, to forgive and blot out, for those that obey him, the sins that mortals cannot forget. But he didn't. He just figured out a way of his own, and now he is gone—gone to meet his Maker, the one he ignored all his life. Joe had provided for almost everything except the main thing.

Well, it is all over for Joe. But at the funeral there were other Joes and Harrys and Petes and Sues and Marthas and Janes just like him who some day will attend their own funerals. Will they be ready? It all depends on what they do about it now. "And now why tarriest thou? Arise, and be baptized, and wash away thy sins, calling on the name of the Lord" (Acts 22:16).

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College Students Help Mountain Folk

Collegians Aiding Distressed Folk

HYDEN, Ky. (AP) — Like knights of old, college students sally forth each weekend to help the distressed mountain folk of eastern Kentucky.

Instead of armor, they wear sweat shirts and blue jeans. They carry hammers and nails, and bring, among other things, big sheets of wallboard.

The students call themselves the Appalachian Volunteers, a loosely knit group from 19 colleges who want to do their bit to help.

"We don't have any membership as such. No one carries any kind of membership card," Milton Ogle, director of the group, said.

But what began as a spark with four students three months ago has fanned into a flame involving more than 100 students working on six to eight projects every Saturday.

As a starter, the group decided to work on some of the 1,004 one-room schools in eastern Kentucky, many of them sorely in need of repair. They have organized recreation and health education at some of the schools.

"It's sort of a people-to-people program," Ogle said. The volunteers go only to communities where local residents will pitch in and help.

A \$50,000 grant from the Federal Area Redevelopment Administration and donations from private individuals and firms finance the project. The grant is earmarked for salaries. Private donations buy materials.

The students receive only gasoline money and lunch. The decision on which schools will be worked upon, Ogle said, is made on the answers to these questions:

1. Will the school be eliminated through consolidation within one year? If so, no work.
2. Is the school genuinely in need of repair?
3. Is it reasonably close to the campus from which the volunteers will come.
4. Are the county school

board and local residents willing to cooperate? — If the answers to the last three questions is yes, then the volunteers try to work it into their schedule.

East did not have it in his mind to make matters easy for his vulnerable opponents in today's hand, so he opened the bidding with a preemptive call of three diamonds. South had the equivalent of a demand bid and, since he did not require much from partner to produce a slam, he announced his values in the only way possible by making a forcing cue bid in the opponent's suit.

When North bid four hearts, South retreated to four spades. Having found a safer haven, North might have been content to drop matters at this point. He paused, however, to reflect on why South had bothered to make a cue bid, when the

latter could just as well have overcalled directly with four spades, since that was obviously his intention from the beginning.

North concluded that his partner had a very powerful hand and was interested in reaching a slam. Inasmuch as South's aggressive sequence of bids had not been based on a solid trump suit, North reasoned that his spade holding as well as the singleton diamond would be unexpected values, and he accordingly raised beyond game to five spades. South cheerfully contracted for slam.

West opened the six of diamonds and East's queen forced out the ace. Declarer observed that he was off the ace of clubs with the possibility of another loser in that suit. His first objective was to develop the dummy's heart suit for a discard.

The ace of hearts was cashed and then the North hand was entered with a trump in order to ruff a heart. Another spade lead put the dummy in to trump another heart and, when both opponents followed suit, success was assured. Dummy could be reentered via a diamond ruff to establish the long heart and then another spade lead permits South to discard his ten of clubs on the jack of hearts.

Had hearts not broken so favorably, South would still have had time to make club plays from the dummy in an attempt to find East with an honor in that suit.



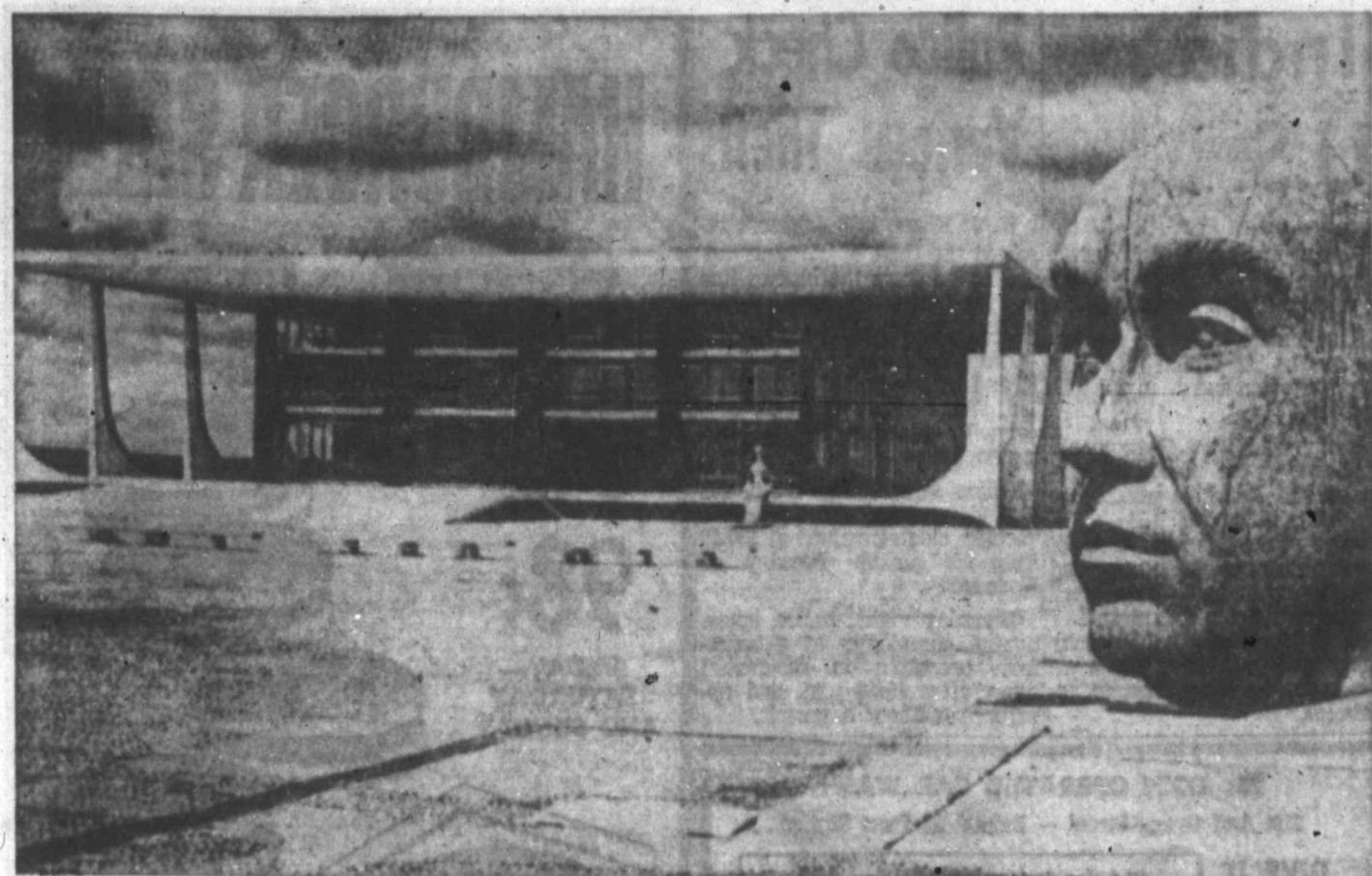

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Chaos Seen With School Prayer Laws

WASHINGTON (AP)—A constitutional amendment to permit prayers in the public schools would produce "an utterly impossible and chaotic situation," says a Columbia University professor.

Testifying before the House Judiciary Committee, Prof. Philip H. Phenix predicted it would require a national agency to supervise the various religious exercises that would blossom under such an amendment.

ENDORSEMENT

Phenix was one of three witnesses who opposed any prayer amendment Thursday after the committee heard strong endorsements of school prayers by Roman Catholic Bishop Fulton J. Sheen of New York and Alabama's Gov. George C. Wallace.

Phenix said the principle of government action in religious life established by such an amendment would open the way for government suppression of religion.

"It is a matter of simple logic," he said, "that we Americans cannot enjoy the constitutional protection of religious liberties and at the same time authorize the public schools to conduct religious exercises involving prayers and Scripture readings."

OWN WAY

Virgil M. Rogers of Washington, D.C., a former public school superintendent and dean at Syracuse University, said the issue before the committee was not the desirability of prayer "but the right of the individual child or adult to pursue his own way in religious matters uncoerced by the state."

Leo Pfeffer, a New York attorney and general counsel for the American Jewish Congress, said proponents of the various amendments to permit public school prayers have built their case on "fiction."

NAACP Chief Denies Pickets

AUSTIN, Tex. (AP) — The president of the Austin civil rights group has denied that demonstrators will picket President Johnson when he arrives here May 30 to receive an honorary degree from the University of Texas.

Volma Overton, president of the local chapter of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, said Thursday night the prediction of picketing "was made by someone not acting in official capacity" for his group.

The Rev. Esley Sims, minister of the Bethany Christian Church, said Wednesday that Johnson would be picketed. Later, Clarence Laws of Dallas, regional field secretary for the NAACP, said he knew nothing of the plans and would not approve of a demonstration unless "there is some reason for it."

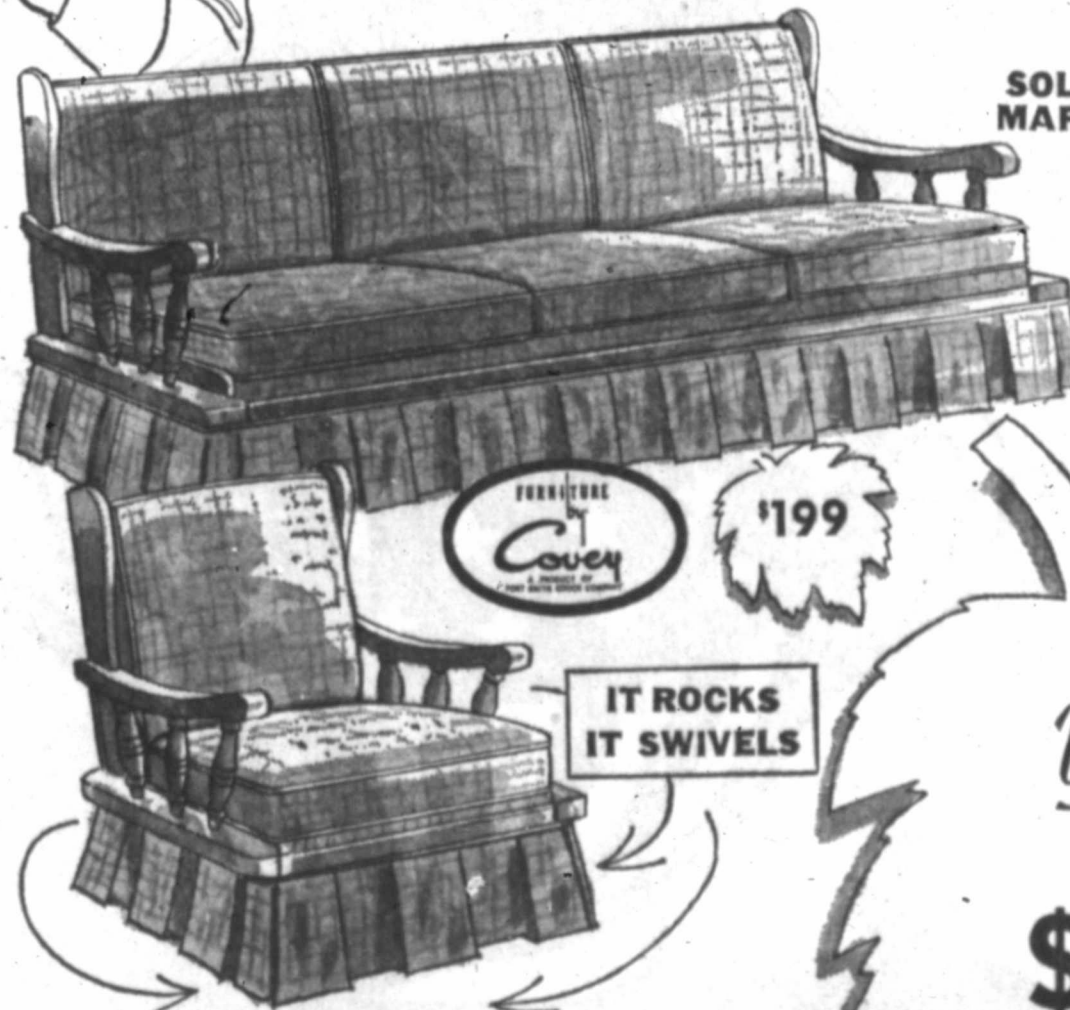

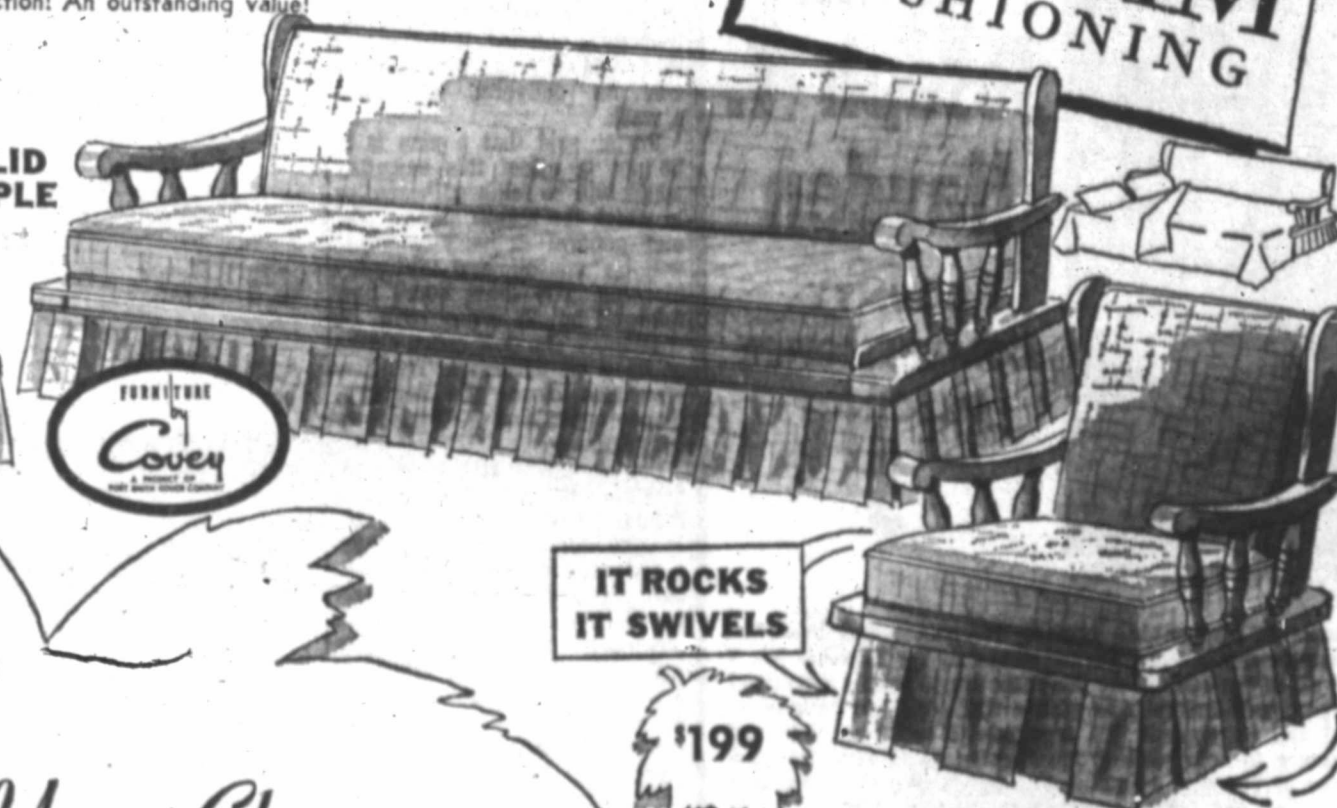

Soviet To Finance India Plant Rejected By U.S.

NEW DELHI, India (AP) — The Soviet Union has agreed to finance construction of the Bokaro steel plant for India, which the United States turned down, the Indian government announced today.

Moscow will provide aid initially for the 1.5-million-ton first stage of the plant, Steel Minister Chidambaram Subramaniam told Parliament.

This will be expandable ultimately to 4 million tons of capacity, he said.

No total cost was mentioned. It was the second time in recent years the Soviet Union has stepped in to fill a huge foreign aid gap left by U.S. refusal to provide the money.

In 1956, the United States withdrew abruptly from Egypt's Aswan Dam project and the Soviet Union provided \$271 million plus the plans and dozens of technicians. The first stage of the dam is to be finished May 15, with final completion scheduled for 1970.

After the United States backed out of the Aswan project, President Gamal Abdel Nasser of Egypt seized the Suez Canal. A world-shaking chain of events ensued with the Israeli and British-French invasions of Egypt, Soviet threats of "volunteer" counter invasion and Western retreats.

India withdrew its request for U.S. aid for Bokaro last September after U.S. congressional action last summer blocked funds for the project for the rest of the year. A number of members of Congress objected to aiding in construction of a big steel plant that would be government operated.

India had pinned much of its hope for economic development on the government-owned steel plant at Bokaro, 175 miles northwest of Calcutta. Lack of steel has long hampered Indian development.

Curtailment Will Begin Saturday At Post Office

Starting Saturday, the Big Spring post office will put into effect "limited adjustments" in postal services which were ordered by the postmaster general March 10. A. A. Porter, assistant postmaster, said several of the changes are important to local patrons.

Parcel post deliveries, for example, will be put on a five day a week basis. In Big Spring, it has been decided that no regular parcel post route deliveries will be made on Wednesdays. Parcel post deliveries however, will be made by mounted route mailsters, rural routes, box deliveries and star routes. Even though the one day cut in deliveries is planned, it is stressed that perishable parcel post items will be delivered six days a week.

Porter said that a plan is to be put in effect this Saturday which will be followed hereafter in which the stamp, parcel post and general delivery windows will be consolidated Saturday morning. The same hours now followed on Saturday will be continued. The post office closes at noon on Saturday. The new plan also closes the registry, money order and COD windows on Saturday.

Porter said that the new restrictions make no change in essential major services. No change will be made in the customary home delivery and special delivery operations. Regular business deliveries will be continued unchanged. Letters and other first class mail will be handled with the same priority as ever.

The economy step which the postmaster general said would save the post office department more than twelve million dollars a year, is in accord with the general program drafted by President Johnson when the recent income tax cut was ordered.

Disposable personal income rose 470 per cent to \$402 billion in 1963. A big chunk of this went to pay for the 122 per cent rise in the cost of living. Corporate profits before taxes increased eight times. After taxes the rise was 5 1/2 times.

The Dow Jones industrial average — a widely followed measuring stick for the stock market — is almost 700 points higher than when the 1939 fair opened.

The brokerage firm, Merrill Lynch, Pierce, Fenner & Smith has made a study of how 20 major corporations fared between the two fairs. These companies were represented by exhibits at both fairs.

SALES SOAR
Most impressive were the gains racked up by International Business Machines Corp., in 1939 a small office equipment maker. Its sales have soared from \$39 million to \$2.06 billion, its profits from \$9.1 million to \$296.5 million and its stock price from \$6 to a high of about \$600.

National Cash Register has grown more modestly. Sales increased 16 times, profits 11 times and stock 15 times.

Radio Corp. of America, which introduced television at the 1939 fair, has chalked up gains of 16 times in sales and eight times in profits.

General Electric and Westinghouse boosted sales 12-fold in the quarter century.

The Big Three automakers, major fair exhibitors then as well as now, have made sharp gains. General Motors sales climbed from \$1,377,000,000 to \$16,495,000,000 and profits from \$183.3 million to \$1,591,800,000.

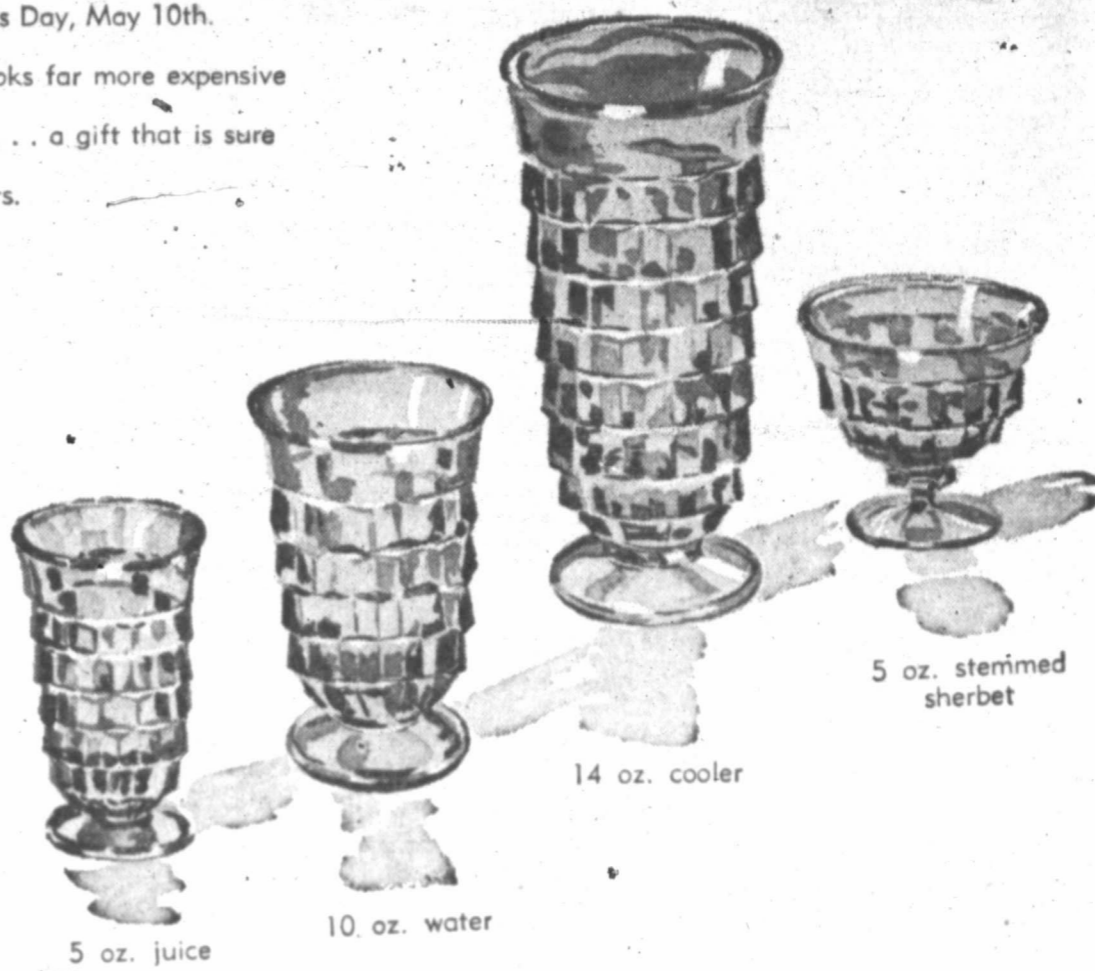

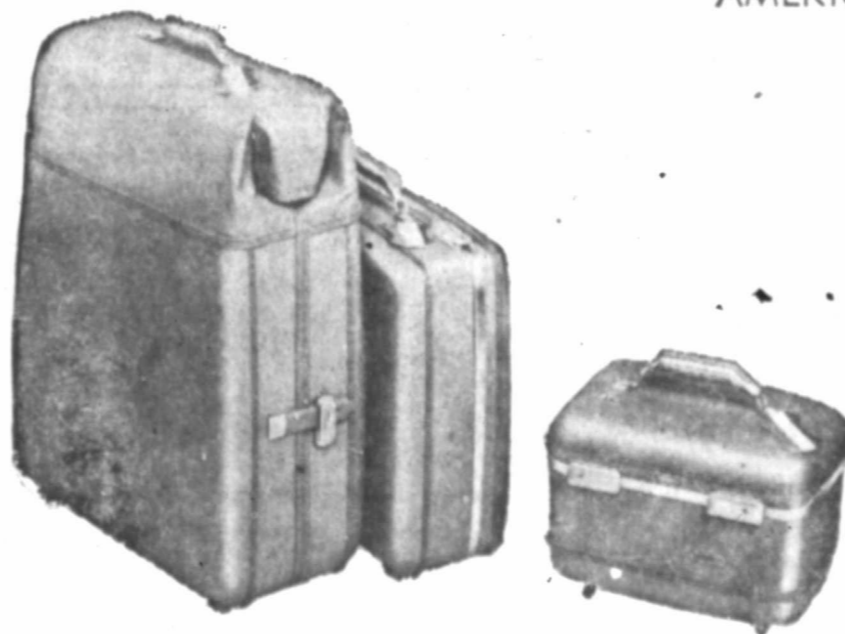

Club Hears Talk On Alcoholism

Alcoholism is as much a disease as diabetes, Dr. Charles Abney, psychiatrist and staff physician at the Big Spring State Hospital, told the Big Spring Kiwanis Club Thursday.

People sometimes believe that an alcoholic is just seeking sympathy when he claims he can't stop drinking. He is not pretending, the psychiatrist said, he is as much enslaved with the desire for alcohol as a morphine addict is enslaved with his need for narcotics.

The widespread prevalence of alcoholism is a grave national problem, he said. No one knows how many alcoholics there are in this land. No one knows how many persons are drinkers. It is a known fact, though, that there are thousands of luckless individuals who are gravely addicted.

Dr. Abney's address was in connection with Kiwanis observation of National Mental Health Week. He was speaking

in the absence of Shelby Parnell, who had been slated to deliver the address. He was introduced by Bob Travis, program chairman.

Dr. Abney discussed the program of the State Hospital in treatment of alcoholics and pointed out that it is much better if an alcoholic does not check into the hospital for treatment until he has "dried out" for a few days or a few weeks.

"If he comes into the hospital when he has been drinking," he said, "the problem of his being able to adjust to the pro-

gram we have is more difficult."

Hopes Seem Brighter For South Viet Nam

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP)—South Viet Nam's hopes for survival seem brighter than they were six months ago today, when Ngo Dinh Diem was overthrown.

This is not saying too much. Diem's final days had many aspects of despair.

"If Diem had lasted another month, South Viet Nam would have gone down the drain," a top American diplomat says.

"The situation here was in its terminal phase then. We were hitting bottom."

The consensus today is that the decline has halted, but an uphill struggle stretches far ahead.

POLITICAL

The main danger ahead appears to be political, not military.

Communist Viet Cong forces controlling much of the countryside have shown in recent weeks they can attack with strength and boldness. But the reaction time of government forces has improved significantly.

A top American diplomat told the French after they lost-Indochina at Dien Bien Phu 19 years ago: "A second-rate general could have won in Indochina if he had had the proper political atmosphere."

A prime requisite is stabilization of the military situation and the development of trained and dedicated civilian administrators.

The government has lost ground and population to the Viet Cong. The Communists have extended their control in the critical southern delta, in provinces around Saigon and in key populated areas in central Viet Nam.

STRONGER

Communist military units are stronger and better equipped. They are taking an increasing toll of U.S. and Vietnamese aircraft.

"On the civilian side there was more competence in the national bureaucracy last fall than there is today," a government expert says. "It reflected a rigid regime that had been in control for nine years and could exert its influence down to the grass roots."

"We need a few military victories to start building up civilian morale," an American said, "and we must develop honest and able civilian administrators in the capital and throughout the countryside to back up and consolidate the military."

The government, with strong backing from the United States, has launched campaigns to tackle both problems. "We are just starting to do what we should have started two years ago," says an American in a position to know.

RECEPTIVE

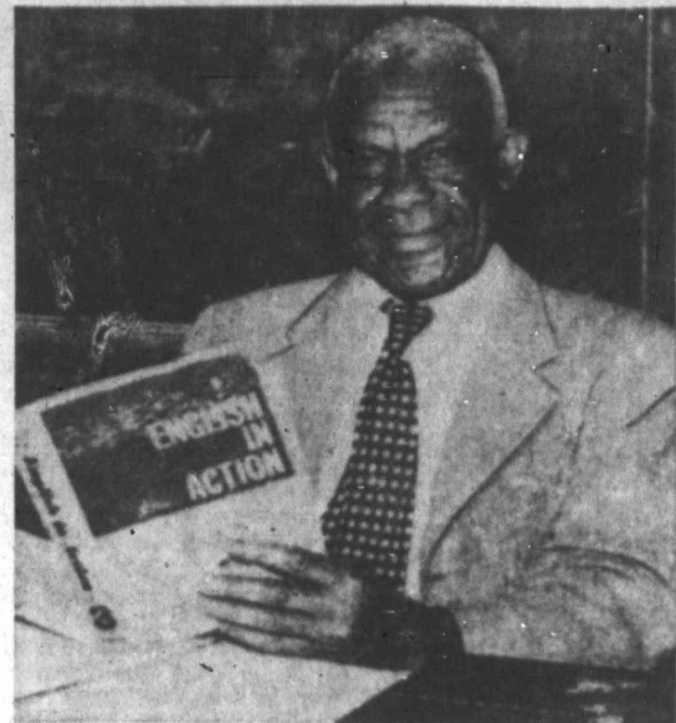
U.S. military advisers in the field report Vietnamese army commanders are more receptive to advice. The morale of the U.S. advisers themselves has started to climb.

The people should stop worrying about a coup and get on with the war, strong man Premier Nguyen Khanh, who seized power three months ago, has said.

Top U.S. military men praise Khanh however does not yet exert complete control over his staff. His power is diluted among several top Vietnamese generals. He still does not have sufficiently solid support to crack down on dissenters.

Recent statements by President Johnson and Secretary of State Dean Rusk have raised hopes U.S. aid efforts may be broadened to include support from other nations.

Such a joint international effort might counter Communist claims the war in Viet Nam is "America's war."

Cong Gunfire Downs Copter; Yanks Injured

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP)—Four U.S. Marines were wounded and a helicopter was brought down Thursday as Communist ground fire raked a fleet of Marine helicopters taking South Vietnamese forces out of a battle area 35 miles west of the northern city of Danang.

A Marine officer and an enlisted man suffered bullet and shrapnel wounds, a U.S. spokesman said. A Marine enlisted man in another helicopter also was hit.

The Viet Cong fire knocked out the engine of a third helicopter. A crew member was wounded.

The American spokesman said the crew destroyed the helicopter. They were rescued by another Marine helicopter.

Several Marines were wounded Monday when a helicopter was shot down and another crash-landed with engine trouble in the Do Xa region.

Showers Dot Texas

Thundershowers rumbled over Southwest and South Central Texas early today, as a moist air surge from the Gulf of Mexico caused clouds to form in much of the state.

Laredo and Cotulla were hit by storms during the night.

The Weather Bureau said the moist air kept temperatures sandwiched between the upper 50s and lower 70s in most areas.

Only in far West Texas was the air crisp and dry.

Forecasts called for scattered thunderstorms in the central and eastern parts of the state during the late afternoon and evening today, with clear to partly cloudy skies elsewhere.

There was a possibility of rain for election day Saturday.

Later some roads were built northwest of Coahoma, and finally a road was paved for approximately two or two and a half miles which is now FM 57. Two or three years later, approximately two more miles were paved, and it ends there. The remainder is dirt road, crooked and hilly. Some heavily loaded trucks can hardly make the hills. We were promised that this road would be finished. Over this road there are lots of oil travel, a mail route, a school bus route, etc.

A couple of years ago I got with some others and met with the commissioners at a regular meeting. All I got was an accusation of embarrassing the commissioners court. Later on, some surveyors were checking on this road and it looked as if they were going to put some of the crooks back in the old road. There is a cattle guard on top of a steep hill which is very dangerous. One Sunday morning my wife and I nearly got knocked off the road but by going into the fence were saved from having a wreck with a long drilling rig being moved and making about 30-40 m.p.h. downhill. It would take just a little over two miles to complete this road over to FM 821 or the Forsan paved road. Instead of getting this road finished, they are tearing up the old Bankhead Highway which already was paved. If we had the money to build an already paved road, why couldn't we get something done on a dirt road which is crooked and hilly?

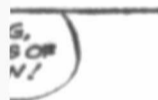

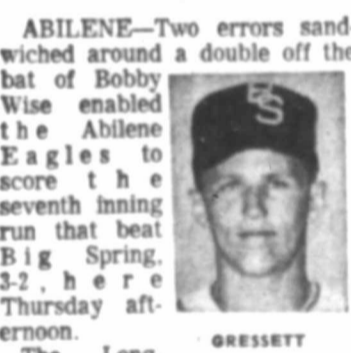

HANS SCHMIDT, a professional wrestler of the late 1940's, when asked by a television sports writer what he thought of sportsmanship:

RAY SONS, Chicago Daily News, writing about the Windy City's Marigold Arena where some of the past's most illustrious boxers (among them ARCHIE MOORE, JOE LOUIS, TONY ZALE, and JOEY MAXIM) fought before they reached the really big time:

"Monday night at Marigold became a Chicago institution. The place was packed with more than 1,700 fans who wouldn't permit anything to keep them away. The good seats were so tightly held by the regulars that 'somebody had to die to open up a ringside seat,' says BEN BENTLEY, a veteran boxing publicist and matchmaker.

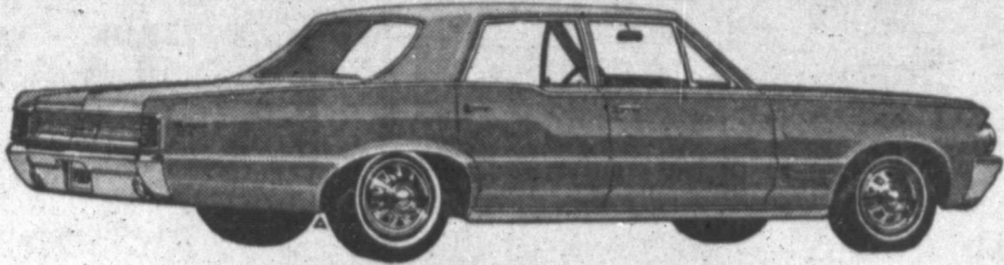

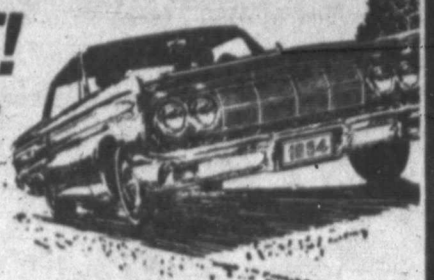

Final American Prisoner Freed By East Germans

BERLIN (AP) — Communist authorities have freed the last American believed to be a prisoner in East Germany.

John Frederic Loba, 41, of Alameda, Calif., was released Thursday after serving nearly two years of a 2½-year sentence for helping East Germans flee to the West.

PANAMA (AP) — U.S. and Panamanian negotiators will meet in Washington next week but will not take up the basic issues of the Panama Canal dispute until the middle of the month.

ACCRA, Ghana (AP)—Ghana's government hospitals are down to their last 60 vials of snake bite serum, Health Minister Lawrence R. Abavana says.

The West African nation normally uses 6,000 vials a year.

NEW DELHI, India (AP) — Talks between Sheik Abdul and Prime Minister Nehru on the bitter Kashmir problem may continue until next week.

They held a two-hour exploratory session Thursday on the problem of religious minorities in the Himalayan state, divided by India and Pakistan, and the desire of many Kashmiris to be independent of both.

The trend of the conversations was not revealed.

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP) — The Security Council is expected to meet in mid-May on a request by 57 African, Asian and American nations for immediate action to prevent racial conflict on South Africa.

VIENNA (AP)—Stefan Cardinal Wyszynski of Poland arrived today from Warsaw for talks on the situation of the Roman Catholic Church in Eastern Europe and a pilgrimage to Austria's national shrine of the Holy Mary.

The Polish primate, who will go to Rome Sunday to attend commission meetings of the Ecumenical Council, was greeted at the railroad station by his host, Franziskus Cardinal Koeng.

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
